## 13. <u>Progress on Remodeling Administration Building and Other</u> Capital <u>Improvements</u>

## A. Administration Building

The remodeling of the Administration Building has been completed with the exception of the installation of three windows: one in the President's Office, one in the Business Office and one in the Office of the Director of Public Relations. We hope you will have a chance to inspect the work that has been done on the Administration Building. We believe that a great deal has been achieved with the outlay that has been made. As you will recall, the Kentucky Building Commission allotted \$20,000.00 for this remodeling.

B. <u>Heating System</u>

On the Heating System, I am glad to report that progress is being made on the heat lines; but due to the unusually bad weather, the contractor is behind schedule. The lines will be installed and finished possibly within the next six weeks.

## C. Industrial Arts Building and Maintenance Shop

The Industrial Arts Building and the Maintenance Shop have been brick veneered. There are yet a few brick to be put on the front of the Industrial Arts Building; but we are waiting to add the brick until some remodeling can be done on the entrance to the Industrial Arts Building.

# 14. Additional Requests Which Have Been Made or Will Be Made to the Building Commission

On February 22, I requested the Kentucky State Property and Buildings Commissioner to furnish funds with which to employ an architect to make plans for a new Girls' Dormitory and plans for the expansion of the seating capacity in the gymnasium. No action has been taken yet on my request except to tell me that if we receive an ROTC unit, they would be glad to activate the request.

Also, I am planning to ask the Building Commission for some funds with which to remodel the Training School Building, which is in a bad state of repair, also some funds to assist with remodeling Wells Hall.

In submitting his report of the Thomas P. Norris Student Loan Fund, Mr. J. Matt Sparkman, Custodian, called particular attention to the list of old notes and certain other notes on which the face values have been paid, leaving only a balance of interest due.

Motion was made by Mr. Franklin that the Custodian of the Thomas P. Norris Student Loan Fund be authorized to charge off from the active list of notes for amounts due this fund, all notes that are at least fifteen years old also all notes on which the principals have been paid, even though they are not fifteen years old; and, further, that said notes be kept so that if and when payments are obtainable, they may be credited to such notes. This motion was seconded by Mr. Springer; and the roll was called on its adoption with the following result: Mr. Franklin, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. Winslow, aye.

### Report of Veterans Housing Manager Accepted

Motion was made by Mr. Springer that the report of the Housing Manager be accepted. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin and was carried unanimously.

Application to State Department of Education, Vocational Division, for Reimbursement for Operation of Programs in Vocational Agriculture and Vocational Home Economics Authorized

Motion was made by Mr. Springer that the President be authorized to request reimbursement on the salaries of vocational teachers in the Training School in accordance with their established salaries and the rate of reimbursement available. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin; and the roll was called on its adoption with the following result: Mr. Franklin, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. Winslow, aye.

### Operation of Cannery Authorized

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Motion was made by Mr. Franklin that the continued operation of the cannery be authorized and, further, that the President be authorized to request reimbursement from the Vocational or Veterans' Training funds. This motion was seconded by Mr. Springer; and the roll was called on its adoption with the following result: Mr. Franklin, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. Winslow, aye. **JHSSH** 

## Termination of Testing Service for the Veterans Administration.

Motion was made by Mr. Franklin that the Board of Regents approve the termination of the contract with the Veterans Administration for the Testing Service for Veterans, effective on March 31, 1951, in accordance with the request of the Veterans Administration, as reported by the President. This motion was seconded by Mr. Springer; and the roll was called on its adoption with the following result: Mr. Franklin, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. Winslow, aye.

## Resolution Regarding the Establishment of Fraternities and Clubs Other than Departmental Clubs

President Woods stated to the Board that requests had been received from students for the privilege of organizing a social fraternity; and, in this connection, Mr. J. Matt Sparkman, Dean of Students, was called before the Board to participate in the discussion.

After giving careful consideration to the students' request and appraising the fraternity and sorority situation as it now exists at Murray State College, the Board of Regents took the following action:

Motion was made by Mr. Springer that the Board go on record, as follows: that any fraternity, sorority or club, other than departmental clubs, now established or to be established on the campus of Murray State College should be of an honorary or semihonorary nature and directly under the control and supervision of the school; that any fraternity or sorority now organized or to be organized should require a minimum academic standing on the part of each charter member and/or initiate of 1.5, this not to become retroactive but to become applicable to present and any newly organized fraternities and sororities; that sponsors or advisers of fraternities and sororities must be employees of the college and approved by the Dean of Students and the President and that the President and Dean of Students should charge any committee which may be in existence or appointed to consider the establishment or operation of fraternities or sororities with the responsibility of reviewing carefully the aims and objectives as well as the needs for such an organization before recommending its establishment; and, further, that the President and Dean of Students are herewith authorized to establish further rules and regulations to provide for the constructive and effective operation of fraternities, sororities and/or clubs on the Murray State College campus. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin, and was carried unanimously.

Faculty Members Who Are Heads of Departments To Be Assigned Minimum Teaching Loads

In discussing plans for operating the college with anticipated reductions in enrollment, special consideration was given to the teaching loads of the Heads of Departments.

Motion was made by Mr. Franklin that unless the faculty are assigned other duties by the President, it will be expected that they teach from twelve to eighteen credit hours per semester and, further, that no one but Department Heads with heavy administrative loads should be assigned the minimum. This motion was seconded by Mr. Springer, and was carried unanimously.

## <u>Application for Air Corps ROTC Unit Disapproved; Applications for</u> <u>Army ROTC Unit also for Naval Unit To Be Reactivated</u>

President Woods reported to the Board of Regents that although every effort possible had been made to secure the establishment of an Air Corps ROTC Unit at Murray State College, the Selection Committee had not located one of the units at this institution. It was indicated, however, that other additional units might be established in the future.

Motion was made by Mr. Springer that the President be authorized and directed to reactivate his request for an Army ROTC Unit and that he, also, submit an application for a Naval Unit. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin, and was carried unanimously.

## Social Security for Employees Not Covered in the Teacher Retirement

After discussion of the Social Security Program, Mr. Springer made a motion that Murray State College participate fully in the program and, further, that request be made of the Commissioner of Finance and the Governor for sufficient funds to pay the actual cost to the college for such participation from January 1 to June 30, 1951. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin; and the roll was called on its adoption with the following result: Mr. Franklin, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. Winslow, aye.

## Resolution of Appreciation of Services of Mr. Collus O. Johnson

Motion was made by Mr. Springer that the President be authorized to prepare appropriate resolutions expressing to Mr. Collus O. Johnson, who is severing his connection with Murray State College, the sincere appreciation of all the college officials for his complete devotion to duty and for the valuable service he has rendered while serving as Area Education Coordinator and promoting the interests of the Tennessee Valley Authority and of Murray State College. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin and was unanimously carried.

## Meeting of Board of Regents Recessed Until May 28, 1951

Motion was made by Mr. Springer that this meeting of the Board of Regents be recessed until 3:00 P. M. on Monday, May 28, 1951, Commencement Day, at which time it will be reconvened. This motion was seconded by Mr. Franklin, and was unanimously carried.
