# VIII. New Dormitory

The new dormitory is complete with one or two minor exceptions, namely the basement door in the west end of the southwest wing, the black-topping of the parking areas, and some additional work on the ventilation system for the clothes dryers. 818 \$1,000 bonds have been delivered to the Housing and Home Finance Agency. There are certain closing papers that are necessary, one is a resolution regarding the cremation of Bonds numbered 819 through 840. A second resolution has to do with the maximum occupancy of the new dormitory, which means that the new dormitory must be filled before girls can be housed in other dormitories on the campus.

## IX. Status of Student Union Building Project

Since the last meeting of the Board, the Governor and the Department of Finance have committed \$250,000 to aid in the student union building project at Murray State College A preliminary application has been submitted to the Housing and Home Finance Agency originally in the amount of \$600,000, later amended by letter to \$670,000. The plans are progressing satisfactorily. I have been informed over the telephone that an order from the Commissioner of Finance authorizing Murray State College to proceed has been prepared and may be received at any time. I ask your authorization to proceed with the final application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency in keeping with the approval of the plans by the Division of Engineering of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and upon receipt of the order anticipated from the Commissioner of Finance.

#### X. Parking

Some two months ago I appointed a committee of the faculty and staff of the college to recommend a solution to the parking situation at Murray State College. The recommendations from the committee is to the effect that parking areas be designated by zones, that all cars of students, faculty, and staff be registered and that registrants needing parking space be given a number and a parking permit to park in the zone most suitable to the needs of the registrant in keeping, of course, to the space available. The committee further recommends that decal stickers be purchased for use on cars to be parked on the campus. It is anticipated that a registration fee of \$2.00 will be charged per student per academic year. The faculty seems to be of the opinion that the parking plan can work only if there is a day policeman assigned to the campus checking on parking violators and other matters. The committee recommends that offenders be fined \$1.00 for the first offense, \$2.00 for the second offense, and \$5.00 for the third offense. The supervision of this parking situation is to be handled by the Office of the Dean of Students. Fines might be put in a scholarship fund. More work on details need to be done. I ask your concurrence in inaugurating this or a similar plan to control parking on the campus.

# XI. Contracts with Calloway County Board of Education

Last year a contract was made with the Calloway County Board of Education involving the transportation of pupils to the Murray State College Training School. The contract specifies that Murray State College will transport the pupils who live a mile or more from school for a nine months period and that Calloway County will pay Murray State College \$20.00 for the nine months period for each pupil transported a mile or more to the Training School. This agreement was for July 1, 1956 until June 30, 1957 and had a clause stating that the contract would be continued unless notification was

made 90 days prior to termination of said contract. A second contract or agreement between Murray State College and Calloway County Board of Education regarding the operation of two elementary units of instruction was entered into on June 8, 1956. The agreement provides that Calloway County will pay Murray State College \$500 per unit or \$1,000 for two units which is a rental for space utilized by the Calloway County Board of Education

It is satisfactory with Calloway County to continue the contracts as is and I ask your approval of the continuence of the contracts as negotiated on June 8, 1956.

# XII. Contracts with the Murray College School Company

The Murray College School Company now has title to the Golf Club property which was deeded to the Murray College School Company by Dr. John W. Carr, This college uses this entire 51 acres, but according to the agreement we are to pay \$184.50 to the Murray College School Company, who in turn pays Dr. John W. Carr the \$184.50. This is to be paid as long as Dr. Carr lives.

The Baptist Picnic Ground was purchased a few years ago and the rental on the plot of ground is \$744 a year. This is really a means of amortizing the cost of this property. I ask your authorization to continue the contracts with the Murray College School Company for the above two pieces of property.

#### XIII. Contracts with the Division of Vocational Education

Murray State College has been operating for many years a Department of Agriculture and a Department of Home Economics in the Training School and also has been operating Veterans farmer training, including instruction in food processing in the cannery. I ask your concurrence in making the necessary contracts with the Division of the Vocational Education of the State Department of Education.

## XIV. Policy Regarding Retirement Age for Janitors and Workers Other than Professional Staff

All members of the professional staff are members of the Teachers' Retirement System and retirement is compulsory at age 70. The College has a number of janitoral and maintenance employees who are past 70. All employees are on Social Security and the majority of our employees, other than the professional staff, are members of the Kentucky employees' Retirement System. Our information a year ago was that any one on the payroll, regardless of age, could become a member of the Kentucky Employees' Retirement System. However, in the Information Bulletin put out on the retirement system, we find on page 8, the following statement: "You may retire on your 'normal retirement date' which is age 65 or after 10 years of service, whichever occurs later, but in no case later than 75."

In the budget to be presented to you there are a number of positions now filled by persons over 70 years of age. We have not listed their names in the present budget pending a policy on retirement by the Board. The initial retirement date of people participating in the KERS is July 1, 1957. Those who have participated for one year are eligible to retire. It seems necessary for the Board to establish a policy regarding retirement age for workers other than the professional staff.

# Resolution Regarding Cremation of Dormitory Revenue Bonds 819 through 840 Adopted

Mr. Price introduced the following resolution:

WHEREAS by resolution adopted February 1, 1956 by the Board of Regents of Murray State College at Murray, Kentucky, and the Trust Indenture referred to in said resolution entered into as of December 1, 1955, with the Kentucky Trust Company, as

Trustee, there were duly authorized to be issued by said Board of Regents Dormitory Revenue Bonds of 1955 to the amount of \$840,000, dated December 1, 1955, of the denomination of \$1000, and numbered consecutively 1 to 840 inclusive, all of which bonds were executed and deposited with said Trustee for sale and delivery to Housing and Home Finance Administrator of the United States of America from time to time as directed, and of which bonds to the amount of \$818,000 number 1 to 818, inclusive, have been so delivered and paid for; and

WHEREAS the project for account of which said bonds were authorized has been completed and paid for, thus making it unnecessary to issue, sell and deliver the remaining bonds numbered 819 to 840, inclusive;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Regents of Murray State College at Murray, Kentucky, hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. That the authorization for the issuance of Dormitory Revenue Bonds of 1955 to the amount of \$22,000, consisting of bonds number 819 to 840 inclusive, as referred to in said resolution adopted by the Board of Regents of Murray State College at Murray, Kentucky, and in the Trust Indenture dated December 1, 1955, between said Board of Regents and the Kentucky Trust Company, is hereby revoked and rescinded, and said Trustee is hereby authorized and directed to cremate said bonds numbered 819 to 840, inclusive, together with all appurtenant interest coupons and to file with this Board of Regents and with said Housing and Home Finance Administrator certificates of such cremation. The secretary of said Board of Regents is hereby authorized and directed to file a certified copy of this resolution with said Trustee and with said Housing and Home Finance Administrator in evidence of revoking the authorization of said Bonds numbered 819 to 840, inclusive, and to authorize the Trustee to cremate the bonds referred to in this section.

Section 2. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption.

#### Resolution Regarding Maximum Occupancy of New Dormitory Adopted

Mr. Blackburn introduced the following Resolution:

WHEREAS the Board of Regents of Murray State College at Murray, Kentucky, under date of November 1, 1955 entered into a certain Loan Agreement with the United S ates of America acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Administrator (hereinafter called the "Government"), pursuant to which said Board of Regents authorized the issuance and sale of its Dormitory Revenue Bonds of 1955 for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of approject consistingeofoansadditionalodorm tory pounding with appurtenant facilities on the campus of said college, designed to accommodate approximately 430 female students; and

WHEREAS by subparagraph (c) of Section 6 of said Loan Agreement it is provided that the college will establish and maintain throughout the life of the loan such parietal rules as may be necessary to assure maximum occupancy and use of said project and such rental rates and charges as may be necessary (l) to provide debt service on the Bonds and (2) to provide the required debt and Service and Depreciation Reserves; and pursuant to said subparagraph (c) of Section 6, the Government has requested and the Board of Regents of said College are desirous of implementing and specifying the manner in which said covenants and obligations of the College willbe carried out and performed;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Regents of Murray State College at Murray, Kentucky, hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. That so long as any of the aforesaid bonds remain outstanding and unpaid it shall be the duty of the Officers of the College, and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to assign full-timesstudents of the Colleges to the occupancy of said project dormitory to the end that maximum occupancy of said dormitory shall be maintained at all times during the College sessions, and such assignments shall take precedence over similar facilities of the College so long as any of the Bonds issued for financing the said dormitory remain outstanding and unpaid.

Section 2. That the initial schedule of rental rates and charges for the occupancy and use of said project dormitory are hereby established and made effective immediately, said rates and charges being \$63.00 per student for each regular College semester and \$28.00 per student for each regular College summer session, said schedule to be adjusted from time to time as may be necessary to comply with the covenants and undertakings as set forth in the resolution and Trust Agreement securing said Bonds.

Section 3. That the administrative officers of the College are further authorized, empowered and directed to make and enforce such rules and regulations and directives as shall be necessary or expedient to insure full occupancy and maximum use of the aforesaid project dormitory, and to insure full compliance with the above cited provisions of said Loan Agreement.

Section  $\mu$ . That this resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption.

# Budget for 1957-58 Approved

President Woods presented the Budget for 1957-58 and recommended that it be approved and that the members of the staff and faculty be employed at the salaries and for the positions as indicated in the Budget:

# MURRAY STATE COLLEGE 1957-58 BUDGET

The following budget is submitted for your consideration. This budget proposal is based on the following:

- 1. That we receive our full Legislative Appropriations of \$897,750.00 for the 1957-58 fiscal year.
- 2. That we have an enrollment of 1850 full-time students for the 1957 Fall Semester, 1800 full-time students for the 1958 Spring Semester, and 1000 full-time students for the 1958 Summer Session.
- 3. That we have a balance of \$38.000.00 in our Revolving Fund to bring forward from the 1956-57 fiscal year and that the Department of Finance permits this amount to be used for ordinary recurring expenses for the 1957-58 fiscal year.

If we do not receive our full Legislative Appropriations and do not have as many stark students enrolled as listed above, and do not have \$38,000.00 in the Revolving Fund to bring forward from the 1956-57 fiscal year, it will be necessary to reduce the proposed expenditures listed in this budget in order to operation within the funds actually received.

# VI. PEOPLES BANK SECURITIES PLEDGED TO SECURE DEPOSITS

The U. S. Treasury Bonds which the Peoples Bank of Murray had pledged to secure the deposits of Murray State College were called for redemption in March, 1957, and it was necessary for the bank to replace these bonds with other U. S. Treasury Bonds.

On March 13, 1957, the Peoples Bank of Murray pledged \$55,000.00 in U. S. Treasury Bonds to secure deposits as listed below:

Bond #7075 - \$10,000.00 - maturing February 14, 1958. Bond #7076 - 10,000.00 - maturing February 14, 1958. Bond #27660 - 10,000.00 - maturing November 15, 1961. Bond # 27661 - 10,000.00 - maturing November 15, 1961. Bond #7428 - 5,000.00 - maturing August 15, 1963. Bond #25674 - 10,000.00 - maturing August 15, 1963.

These bonds are deposited with the First Nationa Bank of Louisville, Kentucky. We have a non-negotiable and non-transferable receipt from First National Bank of Louisville, Kentucky, which is made jointly to the Peoples Bank of Murray, Kentucky, and Murray State College certifying that the bonds are held for safekeeping and are pledged to secure deposit of Murray State College.

The receipt numbers from the First National Bank of Louisville, Kentucky are #22946, #22948, 22950, and #22999.

This exchange of securities was completed on March 13, 1957.

# VII. AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS
