VII. Social Security Payments

On October 8 a referendum is to be conducted on the campus of Murray State College to determine whether or not the faculty members who are now under Teachers' Retirement will also participate in Social Security. It has been determined that the payments should be made retroactive to January 1, 1955. I have a letter from James W. Martin quoting the Attorney General that it is legal for us to pay the college's part not only currently, but retroactive to January 1, 1955. Not all the people will be eligible to start Social Security as of January 1, 1955, but will start on the date of their employment. I ask authority to make these Social Security payments provided the referendum is passed.

The enrollment as of this date is 2095. We also have enrolled in the Training School 403 students, and 64 students in the two rooms operated by Calloway County.

VIII. SWIMMING POOL FILTRATION SYSTEM

It was necessary to purchase a new filtration system for the swimming pool at the Health Building. The filtration system was purchased from the Wilsha Corporation of Memphis, Tennessee, for \$4,200.00 and the equipment has been installed and is in operation.

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IX. IRRIGATION WELL AT COLLEGE FARM

The well for irrigation purposes on the college farm has been drilled and cased. The well was completed on September 5, 1956 and the cost is as follows:

The well pump, motor, irrigation main pipes and laterals have not been purchased and the cost for additional equipment to complete the irrigation project will cost between \$7,500.00 and \$8,500.00

Motion was made by ^Mr. Price that the Board accept and approve the report of the Business Manager. This motion was seconded by Mr. Blackburn and was carried unanimously.

Resolution on the Road Bond Issue Adopted

Motion was made by Mr. Blackburn that the Board of Regents adopt the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, the Board of Regents of Murray State College are cognizant of the great need for improvement of our road system, realizing that this is a vital part of our state's economy and of utmost importance to the entire school system of the State of Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, the people of this Commonwealth will be asked to vote upon a road bond issue at the next coming general election on November 6,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Regents of Murray State College that we hereby endorse the road bond issue and urge that faculty, students, alumni, and all friends of public education actively support and vote for the passage of the road bond issue.
