#### XIII. Enrollment

The total enrollment for the year 1962-63 is 3,609 as compared with 3,681 last year. This resulted from having fewer part-time students. Enrollment of students taking full-time load is 3,209 as compared with 3,147 full-time students in 1961-62. The equated enrollment this year is 3,392 as compared with 3,331 last year. We will endeavor to offer more evening and Saturday classes for people other than teachers in the second semester. One reason for the drop off of part-time students is that a number of teachers who have been working for degrees have completed undergraduate degrees and graduate degrees. It behooves us to extend our graduate program. Also, our selectivity this year was a bit more stringent in that we turned down 140 applicants from out of state students as compared with 70 last year.

- XIV. (A) The Business and Education Building is complete and is one of the most useable facilities for programs in business, education and psychology in the country.
  - (B) Franklin Hall is completed. We were able to use only two and one-half floors at the beginning of school. Therefore, the dormitory is not completely filled at this time, but no doubt men who are living in less desirable facilities will be interested in moving into the dormitory. The sidewalks have been completed.
  - (C) The Cafeteria is a beautiful and spacious building and should serve our cafeteria needs for many years to come.

#### XV. Roads and Drives

The street in front of Wilson Hall and the Administration Building and 15th Street have been completed. The Highway Department marked off the parking area.

This is a distinct addition and I have, for the College, expressed appreciation to the Commissioner of Highways and to the District Highway Engineer. Also, the roads in Orchard Heights are complete through the very able assistance of the Department of Highways.

### XVII. Developing the new 75-Acre Farm

On this farm there is a house that can be used. We have already built a lake that will supply water for hogs, poultry, and other livestock. Half of the cost of this lake was paid by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. It will be necessary to build a hog feeding building which will include facilities for feeding garbage. This appears to be the first building we should build and it will probably require an outlay of \$3,500. Later on, it will be necessary to build a farrowing house, to move the poultry house, and to move the beef cattle barn. As we expand the building program on Orchard Heights, it will be necessary to move the poultry house and the farrowing house from Orchard Heights.

### Project No. Ky-CH-69 (D), 48 Married Student-Faculty Apartments

President Woods stated that he had received a letter from Joseph R. Rubin, Attorney at Law, Louisville, Kentucky, stating that he would serve as bond counsel on Project No. Ky-CH-69 (D), for alfee of \$1,000 plus expenses, such as printing the bonds, publishing the Notice of Bond Sale, and all long distance telephone calls.

Mr. Long moved that the Board employ Joseph R. Rubin, Attorney at Law, Louisville, Kentucky to serve as Bond Counsel for Project No. Ky-CH-69 (D), in keeping with his letter to President Woods dated October 11, 1962. Mr. Doran seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

Mr. Hall moved that the Peoples Bank of Murray, Kentucky, be designated as the local depository and The Kentucky Trust Company of Louisville, Kentucky, be designated as Trustee for Project No. Ky-CH-69 (D). Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

Dr. Woods stated that the plans for Project No. Ky-CH-69 (D), are complete and bids have been called for November 16. One building will consist of twelve 2-bedroom apartments. It is felt that we could let new faculty members move in these apartments for one year. The little houses, 32 of them have been moved to the back side of the Orchard Heights property. We need to get the new apartments built before we tear down any more of the temporary apartment buildings in Orchard Heights. When the new apartments are built, we can tear down three apartment buildings to make room for the dormitories.

Report on plans for Project No. Ky-CH-66 (D)

Dr. Woods stated that we have signed the Loan Agreement for funds with which to finance men's dormitory No. 4 and the women's dormitory. The final plans for the men's dormitory are ready and the plans for the lwomen's the dormitory will be ready by Christmas or the first of the year. It is my feeling that instead of attempting to start one of these dormitories this fall and not get it ready by the beginning of the fall term 1963, that we should wait and offer the bids collectively or individually and not attempt to occupy them until September 1964. We can then give the contractor about 18 months and avoid the trouble we have had with other dormitories not being completed on time. Franklin Hall is complete except for putting the numbers on

the doors. We could not get the dormitories finished by September 1963. We expect our largest enrollment in the fall of 1964.

### Enrollment

Dr. Woods reviewed the statement in Item XIII of the Agenda.

### Business and Education Building, Franklin Hall, and Cafeteria Report

Dr. Woods reviewed the statements in the Agenda, Item XIV, regarding the Business and Education Building, Franklin Hall, and the Cafeteria in Orchard Heights, and further stated that we are not operating the Orchard Heights Cafeteria on weekends as it is more economical to operate only one.

### Roads and Drives

The statements on Roads and Drives in Item XV of the Agenda were reviewed by Dr. Woods. After discussion, Mr. Springer offered the following resolution and moved that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, Murray State College has three dormitories in Orchard Heights and a new cafeteria plus married student housing, and

WHEREAS, plans are under way to build two more dormitories and additional married student housing units in Orchard Heights,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that to relieve the traffic congestion and increase the safety of students and others, we respectfully request the Department of Highways to build a highway from just beyond the west City Limits of the City of Murray in an eastward direction going across the back of the College Farm into 12th Street extended.

Mr. Hall seconded the motion and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

### Application for Federal Grant

Dr. Woods stated that he has received forms on which to apply for a public works grant to assist with the construction of the Maintenance Service Building.

WHEREAS, under the terms of said Public Law 345, as amended, the United States of America has authorized the making of grants to public bodies to aid in financing the construction of specific public projects:

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by Board of Regents of Murray State College

- l. That R. H. Woods, President be and he is hereby authorized to execute and file an application on behalf of Murray State College with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, United States Government for a grant to aid in financing the construction of Maintenance Service Building.
- 2. That R. H. Woods, President, Murray State College be and he is hereby authorized and directed to furnish such information as the Housing and Home Finance Agency may reasonably request in connection with the application which is herein authorized to be filed.

Mr. Hall seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Eong, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

Mr. Long moved that the Board adopt the following resolution providing for increase in planned total expenditure for capital improvement projects.

WHEREAS, under the terms of Public Law 87-658, approved September 14, 1962, the United States of America has authorized the making of grants to aid in financing construction of specific public works projects, provided the proposed or planned total expenditure of the public body for its capital improvement projects is increased by an amount approximately equal to the non-Federal funds required to complete such public works projects:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By Board of Regents

- 1. That as of the date of filing of an application by Murray State College (hereinafter called Applicant) with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, United States Government, for a grant to aid in financing the construction of Maintenance Service Building the Applicant had a capital improvements plan or capital improvement budget for the fiscal year or years during which construction of the proposed project is expected to occur; and that the total expenditure for capital improvements in said plan or budget was \$61,739.50 for the fiscal year ending 6-30-63.
- 2. That in the event that said Federal grant is approved by the United States of America, said capital improvements plan or capital budget will be [is hereby] increased by \$150,000 for the fiscal year ending 6-30-63 for a total increase of \$150,000 in the proposed or planned total expenditure for capital improvement projects (exclusive of Federal funds).

3. That said increase in the proposed or planned total expenditure for capital improvement projects is approximately equal to the non-Federal funds required to complete the public works project for which application is to be submitted.

Mr. Hall seconded and the roll was called on the adoption with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

This resolution is adopted pursuant to the authority provided by KRS 164.350 and KRS 162.350.

### Employment of Dr. Carsie Hammonds

Dr. Woods stated that some time ago he had appointed a Professional Improvement Committee. The Committee met and suggested that we have someone come and make approximately four lectures to the faculty on Teaching and Learning, and further recommended that Dr. Carsie Hammonds of the University of Kentucky be contacted. Dr. Hammonds has been contacted and he will come to Murray and make four lectures to the faculty--one each month January through April, 1963. Dr. Woods requested the Board's authorization to employ Dr. Hammonds for this series of lectures.

Mr. Doran moved that the Board authorize President Woods to proceed with employing Dr. Carsie Hammonds to give a series of lectures—a minimum of four and not to exceed five—to the faculty of Murray State College on Teaching and Learning, and that the Board further authorize the President to pay \$100 per lecture and \$50 for expenses for each trip.

Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

### Tenure Policy, Revised

Mr. Long moved that the Board revise the Tenure Policy to read as follows:

"We, the Board of Regents of Murray State College, shall have full power and authority in the management and control of this institution to appoint, employ and contract with a president, and on recommendation of the president to appoint, employ and contract with professors, associate professors, assistant professors, instructors, and other such employees as may be necessary in the proper operation of this school, and to fix their compensations and their respective terms. A president, professor, or associate professor shall obtain tenure after a period of three years and may be removed by the Board of Regents for immorality, inefficiency, incompetency, or failure to cooperate in the plans and policies of the college, or failure to perform satisfactorily the duties assigned or for conduct that has destroyed his usefulness to the institution. Provided, however, in unusual cases if it appears that a longer period is needed to determine such efficiency of a teachers, then the Board may continue the employment for two years without the employee having attained tenure. If a president, professor, or associate professor is to be removed after having attained tenure, provision will be made for a hearing before the Board of Regents. A notice setting forth inefficiencies or failures will be furnished the person in due written form at least ten days prior to the date set for the hearing. Charges against a president shall be preferred by the Chairman of the Board upon written information furnished to him, and charges against a professor or associate professor shall be preferred by the President."

Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

### Summer Sabbatical Leave Policy, Revised

Mr. Hall moved that the Summer Sabbatical Leave Policy be revised to read as follows:

"Faculty members employed on a full time basis may be off each fourth summer with pay. The person granted the summer sabbatical is expected to return to his position in September. A recipient of sabbatical leave pay will be expected to sign an agreement to refund his sabbatical leave pay if he fails to return to his teaching duties.

A person who does not have a doctor's degree, availing himself of sabbatical leave, must spend a minimum of eight weeks in further graduate study in order to receive sabbatical pay. A person with a doctorate may do further graduate study or engage in such activities as will increase his professional efficiency. The person must present his program for the sabbatical leave period to the president for approval. A report on worthwhile professional experiences during the sabbatical leave period will be expected."

Mr. Long seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; and Mr. White, aye.

### Auditing Murray State College Accounts

Dr. Woods stated that Mr. Joe Schneider, Auditor of Public Accounts for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, advised Mr. Ordway that he did not have sufficient operating appropriation to stand the full cost of auditing and examining the records of Murray State College for the past fiscal year. Mr. Schneider further stated that he had been paying 50% of the auditing cost of the various departments, institutions, and agencies and that the institution, agency or department would pay 50%, and asked that we pay one-half of the cost of auditing our records up to \$1,500 and further advised that if we could not pay half the cost, that he would be unable to do the audit and examination.

In view of the fact that it is necessary to have our records audited each year so that an approved audit can be furnished the various accrediting agencies such as Southern Association of Schools and Colleges, NCATE, and the Housing and Home Finance Agency, it is recommended that we stand one-half the cost up to \$1,500.

Mr. Doran moved that the Board authorize the expenditure of up to \$1,500 to have the Auditor of Public Accounts audit and examine the books of Murray State College for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1962. Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Doran, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye.

#### <u>Fees</u>

Mr. Springer moved that the Board herewith concur with the action of the Council on Public Higher Education in increasing the registration fees as stated below, but that in so doing, for the school year 1963-64, the Board authorize the removal of the general laboratory fee of \$4.00 per semester making a net increase to resident students of \$6.00 per semester.

(1) Four and five-year curricula for preparation of elementary teachers.

- (2) Provisional Certificates based on the five-year programs for principalship, supervision, superintendency, guidance counseling. Provisional Certificate based on five-year curriculum for school psychometrist.
- (3) Four and five-year curricula for preparation of secondary teachers with the following majors, minors and areas of concentration:

Majors: Agriculture, Biology, Business Education (Secretarial Science, Accounting, General Business), Chemistry, English, History, History--Political Science, Home Economics, Industrial Arts, Library Science, Mathematics, Physical Education, Physics, Speech--Dramatics.

Minors: Agriculture, Art, Biology, Business Education (Secretarial Science, Accounting, General Business), Chemistry, Dramatics, Economics, English, French, Geography, German, History, Home Economics, Journalism, Library Science, Mathematics, Physical Education, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Spanish, Speech.

Areas of Concentration: Agriculture, Art, Business Education, English, Home Economics, Industrial Arts, Music, Science, Social Science.

Courses may be selected from the fifth-year programs whereby elementary and secondary teachers, principals, supervisors, superintendents, guidance counselors, and other school personnel who hold the Master's Degree may qualify for Ranksd. Teachers holding Master's Degree and certificate may select courses from fifth-year programs to qualify for the provisional certificate for the principalship, supervision, superintendency, and guidance counseling.

The secondary certificate based upon the program for preparation of secondary teachers may be validated for elementary, or 12-grade teaching upon completion of designated courses. The elementary certificate based on the program for preparation of elementary teachers may be validated for secondary or 12-grade teaching upon

Courses are available whereby high school certificates in Art, Library Science, Music and Physical Education may be endorsed on a 12-grade basis.

WHEREAS, the College needs to expand facilities in the sciences, agriculture, home economics, and industrial arts, and

WHEREAS, the College needs a Maintenance Service Building and to remodel the old Maintenance Shop so that it may be used for laboratories and offices,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the President be authorized to request that the firm of Grafton, Ferguson, and Fleischer proceed with the necessary legal work preparatory to the issuance of Series B bonds for the aforementioned construction in this resolution.
