X. Military Science Department Social Fee Increase

Request has been made by Col. Lance Booth that the social fee paid by ROTC students be increased from \$2.50 per semester to \$3.50 per semester.

XI. <u>Lease Agreement with Calloway County Country Club for use of the Nine Hole Golf Course.</u>

We have had a lease agreement with the Calloway County Country Club to the end that our golf team may practice and play on this golf course. The cost to the College is \$150.00 per year. I ask your concurrence and approval of this lease agreement.

XIII. Request of Alpha Gamma Rho

For some few years, there has been an Alpha Gamma Rho Colony on the campus of Murray State College. In order to become a full fledged fraternity, the boys are told and I am told that they must serve meals. Their request is to serve two meals per day in the Alpha Gamma Rho house. The other fraternities have not served meals and have not requested permission to do so. If permission is granted Alpha Gamma Rho to serve meals, then it is presumed that if other fraternities or sororities desire to serve meals, the precedent would have already been set.

XVI. Change Department of English.

In our present organization, journalism and speech, including radio, is under the Department of English. It seems wise to make a separate department known as the Department of Communications which will include journalism, speech, radio, and television. I recommend that Dr. William Ray Mofield be appointed Chairman of this Department. It should be understood that he will not be expected to teach more than two classes and the remainder of his time will be in serving as Assistant to the President. I further recommend that his administrative duties as Head of the Department and the establishment of the Department of Communications be effective March 1, 1965, and any teaching assignment be effective June 14, 1965.

XVII. Graduate Degrees

At the present time, Murray State College is offering only the Master of Arts in Education. Several requests from various departments have been made to offer in addition to the Master of Arts in Education, the M. A., the M. S., the Master of Music Education, Master of Business Administration, and the Master of Arts in Teaching Science. Specific recommendations for each degree will be made at the Board Meeting.

XVIII. Biological Station

A road is being built. I ask your authority to proceed with construction on a small concrete block building in keeping with funds available to the College.

XXII. Report on Construction

Elizabeth Hall - Elizabeth Hall is completed. There was some trouble with the terrazzo floor in the lobby and hallways. During the Christmas holiday, this was torn up and completely replaced. On January 9 and 10, we had some heavy rains and apparently water is getting through the brick in certain sections of the building. The architect and engineer are studying this situation. After observing it for one or two more hard rains, it may be necessary to take steps to silicone the outside of the building.

<u>Springer Hall</u> - Springer Hall is completed and fully occupied. It is one of the most attractive dorms in the men's dormitory complex.

Applied Science Building - The construction of the Applied Science Building is moving along approximately on schedule. We may be able to occupy the building between April 1-15.

<u>Child Care</u> - The Child Care Building is complete and it is to be inspected on the 25th of January and occupied at the beginning of the Second Semester 1964-65.

<u>Hart Hall</u> - Construction is proceeding on Hart Hall (Dorm. No. 5); however, it is always difficult to see much progress in the early stages of construction.

XXIII. National Science Foundation Grants for Summer Science Institutes

We received three grants for the summer science programs. One is in the amount of \$64,180.00 for a Summer Institute in Natural Sciences for Secondary School Teachers of General Science. The second one is for \$23,590.00 to support a Secondary Science Training Program (high school students). The third grant is in the amount of \$43,870 for a Summer Institute in Natural Sciences for Secondary School Teachers of Biology, Chemistry and/or Physics.

Mr. Long seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Resolution Approving Revised Loan Agreement for Project No. CH-Ky-81 (DS), Adopted

Mr. Hart presented the following resolution and moved that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, The Board of Regents of Murray State College has authorized R. H. Woods, the President of the College, to sign the Loan Agreement and other necessary documents in connection with Project No. CH-Ky-81 (DS), and

WHEREAS, a Loan Agreement with the Housing and Home Finance Agency on Project No. CH-Ky-81 (DS), Contract No. H-302-2302, was executed on June 26, 1964, and

WHEREAS, said Loan Agreement had to be expanded,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Regents of Murray State College accept the Superseding Loan Agreement, Contract No. H-302-2302, and herewith approve the action of the President of the College in affixing his signature to the Superseding Loan Agreement.

Change Department of Health and Physical Education to Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Approved

Mr. Springer moved that the Board authorize the expansion of the Department of Health and Physical Education to Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Mr. Blythe seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Change Department of English, Approved

President Woods reviewed the Statement in Item XVI of the Agenda.

Mr. Long moved that the Board approve and authorize a new department be organized and be known as the Department of Communications which will include journalism, speech, radio, and television, now a part of the Department of English, and that Dr. William Ray Mofield be appointed chairman of this department, and that his administrative functions be effective March 1, 1965, and teaching assignment be effective June 14, 1965.

Mr. Blythe seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Change in Department of Social Sciences, Approved

In keeping with the recommendation of Dr. Lowry and the recommendation of the President, Mr. Hart moved that the Board approve and authorize History be made into a separate department and that Frank Steely be designated Chairman of the Department effective with the beginning of the fiscal year, July 1, 1965, and that James P. Matthai be elevated to the position of chairman of the Department of Social Sciences, exclusive of History.

Mr. Springer seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Graduate Degrees, Authorized .

President Woods reviewed the statement contained in Item XVII of the Agenda.

MASTER OF SCIENCE

WHEREAS, Murray State College and the other state colleges in Kentucky were given authorization to offer the degree of Master of Arts and the degree of Master of Science in addition to the Master of Arts in Education at a meeting of the Council on Public Higher Education in April 1963, and

WHEREAS, there appears to be an acute need for such a degree for students at Murray State College, and

WHEREAS, the Dean of Graduate Studies, the Graduate Council, and the departments concerned have requested authority to offer the degree of Master of Science,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Board of Regents of Murray State College in session the 6th day of February, 1965, authorize and approve the granting of the degree of Master of Science in biology, chemistry, and physics in keeping with the pattern herewith presented:

Students who wish to be considered for admission to graduate study leading toward the degree of Master of Science must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college and have completed an undergraduate major or the equivalent in his graduate field with an overall standing of at least 2.75. In exceptional cases, a student with a lower point standing may be admitted on probation and after completion of one semester's work he may be admitted to full standing upon recommendation of his advisory committee. These requirements are in addition to the general requirements of the Graduate School, with the exception that teacher certification is not required.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF SCIENCE. Each candidate will be required to meet the following requirements for the degree of Master of Science:

I. Meet the general requirements of the Murray State College Graduate School.

- II. Complete at least 18 semester hours in the major field.
 Other work must be in fields related to the major, or,
 in some cases, may be additional hours in the major field.
 Each individual program must be approved by the major
 department adviser.
- III. Complete a thesis, evaluated at three to six semester hours. The thesis will consist of the results of a scholarly investigation approved by the major department. An oral examination will be given over the thesis.
 - IV. Pass a reading examination in one of the following languages: Russian, German, or French. A degree of proficiency in reading, satisfactory to the major department, must be attained.
 - V. Satisfy all examination requirements of the department.

MASTER OF ARTS (English) (History)

WHEREAS, the Council on Public Higher Education authorized Murray and the other state colleges to offer the degree of Master of Arts, and

WHEREAS, there is an apparent need and demand for such a degree, and

WHEREAS, the Dean of Graduate Studies, the Graduate Council and the departments of English and history have recommended that the Master of Arts Degree be offered,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Murray State College is herewith granted authority to offer the degree of Master of Arts in English and in history in keeping with the specifications herein submitted.

Students who wish to be considered for admission to graduate study in English must have an undergraduate major or minor in English, with at least a B average in English courses as well as an overall B average. They must also submit evidence of at least two years of college study of a foreign language with a C average or better, or, they must pass a qualifying examination in a foreign language during the first or second semester of graduate work. These requirements are in addition to the general requirements of the Graduate School, with the exception that teacher certification is not required.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS IN ENGLISH

Each candidate will be required to meet the following requirements for the degree of Master of Arts in English:

- I. Meet the general requirements of the Murray State College Graduate School.
- II. Pass a qualifying examination in language and literature during the first or second semester of graduate work. This examination will be a comprehensive test of the candidate's knowledge of literature and related subjects and of his ability to write clearly and coherently.
- III. Complete 24 semester hours of graduate course work in English, or related subjects, with selection of courses subject to approval of student's adviser.
- IV. Complete a thesis, evaluated at six hours.
- V. Engage in a reading program guided by his adviser.
- VI. Satisfy all examination requirements of the department.

Students who wish to be considered for admission to graduate study in History must have an undergraduate major or minor in History, with at least a B average in History courses. They must have had a least 12 semester hours in a modern foreign language with a C average or better,

or, they must pass a qualifying examination in a modern foreign language, given by the Language Department, during the first or second semester of graduate work. These requirements are in addition to the general requirements of the Graduate School, with the exception that teacher certification is not required.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS IN HISTORY. Each candidate will be required to meet the following requirements for the degree of Master of Arts in History:

- I. Meet the general requirements of the Murray State College Graduate School.
- II. Spend one year in residence at Murray State College.
- III. Complete 24 semester hours of graduate course work in History, or related subjects, with selection of courses subject to approval of adviser.
 - IV. Complete a thesis, evaluated at six hours.
 - V. Satisfy all examination requirements of the department.

MASTER OF ARTS IN TEACHING SCIENCE, MASTER OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION, MASTER OF MUSIC EDUCATION

WHEREAS, the need exists for additional masters degrees,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Murray State College be authorized to formulate programs leading to the degree of Master of Arts in Teaching Science,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the College be authorized to confer the degree of Master of Arts in Teaching Science in keeping with the specifications herein submitted:

Students who wish to be considered for admission to graduate study leading toward the degree of Master of Arts in Teaching Science must have had a basic undergraduate preparation in Physics, Chemistry, and Biology.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS IN TEACHING SCIENCE. Each candidate will be required to meet the following requirements for the degree of Master of Arts in Teaching Science:

- I. Meet the general requirements of the Murray State College Graduate School.
- II. Complete a minimum of 21 semester hours in the sciences beyond the basic year courses in Physics, Chemistry, and Biology. The program must be arranged with the approval of each of the science departments involved.
- III. Complete 9 semester hours in professional education: Education 641, Secondary Curriculum; Psychology 687, Guidance; and Education 630, Methods of Research.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that programs leading to the degree of Master of Business Administration be authorized and the authority be given to grant the degree of Master of Business Administration in keeping with the specifications herein submitted:

The graduate program leading to the degree of Master of Business Administration is designed for graduate students who wish to prepare for responsibile executive positions in business. Primary emphasis is placed upon the analysis of business problems, the determination of business policies, and the development of skills and judgment necessary for competent management.

Unconditional admission to the MBA program may be granted only to those applicants who have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution with a program which includes satisfactory completion of not less than 27 semester hours credit in business administration and economics as outlined below. All candidates are required to take the Admission Test for Graduate Study in

Business given by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New Jersey. These admission requirements are in addition to the general requirements for all Masters degree candidates, with the exception that teacher certification is not required.

Applicants who present fewer than 27 semester hours credit in business administration and economics will be required to complete courses from the undergraduate program or from advanced courses in business administration and economics, as approved by the adviser.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS. A minimum of 27 semester hours of undergraduate work in business administration and economics must be completed as follows:

MBA DEGREE REQUIREMENTS. Each candidate will be required to meet the following requirements for the degree of Master of Business Administration:

- Meet the general requirements for the master's degree at Murray State College.
- II. Complete a program of 30 semester hours of course work. This program is as follows:

III. Complete successfully a comprehensive written examination covering the student's entire graduate program.

The maximum student load in the MBA program is twelve hours per semester and six hours in the summer session. A downward adjustment is recommended for students with limited time available for study.

Candidates will be advised individually. The work experience, undergraduate preparation, personal and professional objectives, and academic potential will be evaluated carefully.

The final criterion for degree certification will depend on the competence of the candidate rather than on specific course coverage. Candidates will be required through case problems to demonstrate a familiarity with the management decision process and to apply professional knowledge in the solution of problems of business firms.

*Upon approval of the student's adviser, a maximum of six semester hours may be taken outside of business and economics in fields such as Psychology, Sociology, and Mathematics, whenever graduate prerequisites can be met.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Murray State College be authorized to provide courses leading to the degree of Master of Music Education and that the College be authorized to grant the degree of Master of Music Education in keeping with the specifications herein submitted:

Students who wish to be considered for admission to graduate study leading toward the degree of Master of Music Education must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college and have completed an undergraduate major.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF MUSIC EDUCATION.

Each candidate will be required to meet the following requirements for the degree of Master of Music Education:

- I. Meet the general requirements of the Murray State College Graduate School.
- II. Complete a minimum of 21 semester hours in music. The program must be arranged with the approval of the Department of Music.
- III. Complete 9 semester hours in professional education: Education 641, Secondary Curriculum; Education 630, Methods of Research; and, Psychology 687, Guidance.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President in cooperation with the Dean of Graduate Studies and the departments involved be authorized to submit to the Council on Public Higher Education a request that authority be given to grant the degree of Master of Arts in Teaching Science, the degree of Master of Business Administration, and the degree of Master of Music Education.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the pattern of offerings leading to the degree of Master of Arts, the degree of Master of Science, the degree of Master of Business Administration, the degree of Master of Music Education be presented to the Council on Public Higher Education and any other organizations and agencies needing this information.

Mr. White moved that the foregoing resolutions regarding the Master of Arts, the Master of Science, the Master of Music Education, the Master of Business Administration, and the Master of Arts in Teaching Science be adopted.

Mr. Springer second and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Biological Station

Mr. White moved that President Woods be authorized to proceed with the construction of a small concrete block building at the site of the biological station in keeping with funds available. Mr. Blythe seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Application for Federal Grant for Addition to Education Building, Approved

Mr. Springer, presented the following resolution and moved that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, there is a need for expanded facilities in education, especially graduate education, and

WHEREAS, there may be a possibility of getting assistance from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE'IT RESOLVED that we herewith authorize President R. H. Woods to make application for needed grants and further authorize President Woods to sign any and all necessary documents in connection with this grant for construction and furnishings.

Mr. Long seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Application Authorized for Men's Dormitory No. 6

Mr. Long presented the following resolution and moved that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that it will be necessary to house three men to the room in the dormitories effective September 1965, and

WHEREAS, the completion of Hart Hall, a dormitory for 552 men which is expected by September 1966, will help the situation but not solve it, and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that another dormitory for men be started at once if we are to alleviate this situation, and

WHEREAS, the President has already contacted the Department of Finance and an architect has been employed to program the building,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board authorize President R. H. Woods to proceed with the application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency to the end that a dormitory for men may be constructed at the earliest possible date.

Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Request for Long-Range Plan

Mr. Long moved that the Board request the assistance of the Division of Engineering of the Department of Finance in securing an outside firm to make a long-range plan of future development of Murray State College.

Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Establishment of a Student Judicial Board

The following proposal was submitted by the Student Organization:

Amendment I: Judicial Amendment

Section I. The Judicial power of the Student Organization of Murray State College shall be vested in one Judicial Board.

- A. The Judicial Board shall be composed of a Chairman and eight associates. At least two members of the Judicial Board must be women and at least two members must be men. Two members must be appointed for two yearsterms.
- B. At the beginning of the Spring Semester the President of the Student Council shall, with the approval of the Student Council, appoint five students not on academic or disciplinary probation to serve on a screening committee along with the three Student Council Faculty Advisors to review applications for the Judicial Board. At least one member of the screening committee shall have previous Judicial experience. The screening committee shall recommend to the President of the Student Council twice the number of students as there are positions on the Board. From these recommendations the President shall appoint students to the Judicial Board with the approval of a majority of the legal votes cast by members of the Student Council in attendance. These appointees will not assume the responsibility of office until May 1, of that same Spring Semester.
- C. To be eligible for appointment to the Judicial Board, a student must have completed two full semesters as a full time student and be neither an officer nor representative of the Student Council nor a class officer. To be eligible for appointment and service on the Judicial Board, a student shall have attained and shall maintain an accumulative standing of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 system and shall not be on academic or disciplinary probation. If a member of the Judicial Board withdraws from school or fails to meet the qualifications for service on the Judicial Board, he shall be dismissed from the Judicial Board by the President of the Student Council. A replacement for a dismissed Board Member shall be appointed from the recommendations under Section I. B., by the President of the Student Council with the approval of the majority of the legal votes cast by the members of the Student Council in attendance.

- D. The President of the Student Council shall be the only ex-officio member of the Judicial Board.
- E. Upon appointment, the members of the Judicial Board shall select one faculty adviser, and one alternate faculty adviser.

Section II. The function of the Judicial Board shall be to provide a fair hearing and a decision by students in cases involving the infraction of college rules.

- A. The Judicial Board shall be a Board with the authorization to recommend sentences to those invested with the power to enforce appropriate discipline, suspension, or expulsion.
- B. The Judicial Board shall have complete jurisdiction over student constitutional interpretation and all student election disputes.
- C. Any member of the Board who is a candidate for officer or representative of the Student Council or class officer shall not vote in the settlement of any election disputes arising out of that election. By a majority vote of the Board, a member of the Board accused of election irregularities shall be deprived of his or her vote in the settlement of said election dispute.

Section III. A. Rules of Conduct approved by the Board of Regents shall be provided by a committee comprised of members of the student body, members of the faculty, and members of the Administration.

- B. Rules of Procedure shall be provided by the Judicial Board for acceptance by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Student Council.
- Mr. Hall moved that the Board of Regents not approve the establishment of a Judicial Board as recommended by the Student Organization.
 - Mr. White seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Report on Construction

Dr. Woods reviewed the statements in the Agenda regarding the construction under way on campus and added, concerning Hart Hall, that in general the bearing quality of the soil will be satisfactory but in some cases it is possible that we will have to drive pilings.

- 1. Each person who rents rooms is asked to contact the Housing Office in Clark Hall, Telephone 762-3811, indicating what facilities are available to Murray State College students at a given address or residence.
- 2. The personnel in the Housing Office will visit the room or rooms listed for rent and along with the owner or renter make an appraisal of the adequacy of the house.
- 3. If the house, rooms and/or apartments, meet minimum standards an approval sticker will be provided along with a set of standards for the students and householders.
- 4. Each householder will be asked to furnish the Housing Office with a list of students in their property.
- 5. Householders are urged not to permit students to live on their property without supervision. Property owners are requested to contact and consult with the Housing Office regarding provisions that may be made for supervision. There must be effective cooperation between the householder and the College to assure proper conduct on the part of the students. The College will not permit students to live in off-campus housing without supervision.

Many colleges require students to live in approved housing only and set strict standards which must be met for this approval. Some universities make the assignments. Murray State College does not wish to interfere in the selection of rooms by the students, or the right of the householder to exercise his judgment in choosing tenants, but for those who may be considering the building of new rental units or the improvement of older property, the following check list is offered as indicating desirable facilities:

- a. Applicable City-County-State codes should be consulted for minimum standards in wiring, lighting, heating, ventilation, fireproofing, and protection, sanitation, and safety. Particular attention is called to State Fire Marshall regulations on fire escapes and the number of doors.
- b. Hot and cold water should be available at all times.
- c. A telephone should be available for emergency use.

- 6. To keep down misunderstanding, the College recommends that the householder outline what he will supply the student, and what the student is expected to do. This might include such things as the use of the telephone, keys, laundry and ironing privileges, cooking privileges, care of the student's room, quiet hours, house hours, inviting guests, and when and how rent is to be paid. These things should preferably be in writing. It is a good rule to have written receipts for rent.
- 7. Householders who cooperate with the College Housing Office by listing their property and providing lists of students living with them will receive College help in collecting accounts due by students.

For the benefit of both the householder and the student renter, here is a list of some of the things the College expects of those students living in private housing. These are primarily student responsibilities but the College solicits the cooperation of the householder in carrying out these rules. The Murray State College Housing Office will try to help maintain the same standard of propriety in off campus housing that it endeavors to enforce in its own facilities.

- a. Rental arrangements must be clearly understood and observed. Students under 18 must have parental approval of contracts.
- b. Agreed upon quiet hours must be observed.
- c. Guests shall not be lodged in student's room without the approval of both householder and student. Guests will be subject to the same regulations as college students. The student renter will be held accountable for any violations. The householder should be paid for overnight guests unless he agrees otherwise.
- d. Women guests, other than the student's immediate family, are not permitted in housing for men. The same restriction would apply to men visiting housing for women.
- e. The use of alcoholic beverages in student rooms is not permitted.
- f. Firearms, fireworks, ammunition, or explosives are not permitted in student living quarters.
- g. Gambling is not permitted, in fact is prohibited by State Law.
- h. Automobiles owned or operated by students, must be registered with the Office of the Dean of Students.
- i. Students must notify the Housing Office of their current residence. Notice should be given within three days of any move.

Mr. Hart moved that the Board adopt the foregoing policy on Off-Campus Housing. Mr. Long seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Additional Serving Lines in Winslow Cafeteria, Approved

Mr. White moved that President Woods be authorized to proceed with the installation of two additional serving lines in the Winslow Cafeteria in keeping with plans of the architect.

Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Increase Student Employment Rate

Mr. Hall moved that the Board increase the student employment rate of pay to \$.80 per hour for freshmen and sophomores, \$.90 per hour for juniors and seniors, \$1.10 per hour for graduate students, and \$2.00 per hour for graduate assistants effective June 14, 1965.

Mr. Blythe seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Two-year College Level Programs, Approved

Mr. Hart moved that the following resolution be approved:

WHEREAS, Murray State College strives to serve the higher education needs of the area, and

WHEREAS, there is a need for two-year college level programs to supplement and compliment the four year programs provided by Murray State College,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Murray State College establish a twoyear college program leading to the Degree of Associate in Arts and Degree of Associate in Science,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the initial programs provide for the training of landscape foremen, and a two-year program for the training of herdsmen be approved. These programs are to be operated as a part of the Department of Agriculture.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Industrial Arts be authorized to establish and provide programs providingg for the degree of Associate of Science in the following areas: Industrial Electronics, Drafting and Design, and Graphic Arts and Printing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Business be authorized to provide programs leading to the Degree of Associate Arts in Business. The initial programs will be in Secretarial Science and General Business Administration.

Mr. Springer seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Degree of Bachelor of Science in Recreation and Park Administration, Authorized.

Mr. Long moved that a curriculum leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Recreation and Park Administration be given jointly by the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Biological Sciences, and the Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation be authorized; and that the Board further authorize the conferring of the Bachelor of Science in Recreation and Park Administration.

Mr. Hall seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Deed of Easement, Approved

Mr. White moved that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the City of Murray proposed to widen Payne Street in keeping with a survey made by Roy Rudolph of Paducah, Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, the matter of widening and improving the street will be of benefit to Murray State College,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that a deed be drawn to the City of Murray, Kentucky, encompassing the following legal description of the property involved,

Commencing at the intersection of the centerline of Chestnut Street, a 70.0 ft. st., and the centerline of N. 12th St., has a varing right-of-way width,: thence Southerly and along the centerline of said N. 12th St. for a distance of 656.08 ft. to a nail in concrete at the Point of Beginning, said Point of Beginning being the intersection of the centerline of said N. 12th St. and the centerline of Payne St., to be a 40.0 ft. st.; thence from said point of beginning with an interior angle of 93 degrees 38 minutes to the West and along the centerline of said Payne St. for a distance of 1460.0 ft. to a nail set in the intersection of said centerline of said Payne St. and the centerline of N. 14th St., a 30.0 ft. st., said nail being the end of this particular survey; also this said point lies a distance of 713.75 ft., with an interior angle of 67 degrees 05 minutes to the North, to a nail set in concrete on the centerline of said Chestnut St.;

Thence from the above described line of survey this legal description shall be for a strip of land 20.0 ft. North of said line and 20.0 ft. South of said line onto and including all properties presently owned by Murray State College and/or the Commonwealth of Kentucky. These properties are recorded in D. B. 112, Page 454; D. B. 114, Page 449, D. B. 114, Page 615; D. B. 114; Page 616; D. B. 114, Page 502; D. B. 116, Page 403; D. B. 98, Page 255, and this Right-of-Way Widening is shown by Plat in P. B. _______, Page ________.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT in case this land thus granted ceases to be used for a street that the said land will revert to the grantor, Murray State College and/or the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President of the College be authorized, and the Commissioner of Finance and the Governor be requested, to sign the deed of easement.

Mr. Long seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following members voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Change in ROTC Program

President Woods read the following statement for the Board's consideration:

REVISION IN THE , ROTC PROGRAM

Congress has changed the law effecting ROTC in the various colleges. We are permitted to continue with a four year program as we have had since 1952; or, we could limit our program to the third and fourth years only; or a combination of both. If the program is limited to the third and fourth years only, a cadet would have to attend an eight weeks summer program at Fort Knox or a comparable training center between the sophomore and junior year and also would have to attend a six weeks training program at Fort Knox or some comparable training center between the junior and senior year.

I am informed that the number of people desiring to take advanced training without having had the first two years of Military Science have been relatively few, not over one-half dozen and all these people have been transfers from regular four year colleges not offering Military Science or from a Junior College.

The greatest change in the new contract is the amount that can be paid an advanced Military Science student. This has been increased from \$27.00 to \$40.00 a month, and there is also a provision for scholarships but the details of how these will be administered or made available has not been specified.

My feeling is that we should proceed with the four year program as we have it making Military Science required of all able bodied men during the first two years and that we should add the two year program which offers an opportunity to third and fourth year people who may have gone to a school not having Military Science. The actual class program on the campus will be the same for all third and fourth year students.

If you concur with the continuation of the program as is at Murray State College and the addition of the two year program, I shall appreciate it if you will pass a motion authorizing the President of the College to sign the new agreement with the Department of the Army providing for the above mentioned programs.

Mr. Springer moved that the Board authorize the continuance of the 4-year ROTC program with the first two years required for all able-bodied men, the establishment of a two-year program for third and fourth year students who have transferred to Murray State College and have not had Military Science during their first two years, and that all able-bodied men enrolling for the newly established two-year college level programs be required to have two years of Military Science; and further authorize the President of the College to sign the agreement with the Department of the Army providing for said programs.

Mr. White seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Married Student Housing

In view of the fact that the loan in the amount of \$512,000.00 with which to construct 48 married student apartments has been approved, Mr. Hart moved that, confirming the Board's previous action, President R. H. Woods be authorized to sign the Loan Agreement and any other forms in connection with this project.

Mr. Blythe seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following members voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Adult Education Program

Mr. White moved that the Board authorize the President, R. H. Woods, to sign necessary contracts with the Department of Education of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and/or the U. S. Office of Education providing teacher training for teachers selected to conduct classes in adult and basic education programs.

Mr. Springer seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Millie Ward, Employed

Mr. Springer moved that Mrs. Millie Ward be employed and included in Item VII of the Agenda as a substitute teacher at College High effective February 8, 1965, at the rate of \$450.00 per month.

Mr. White seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following results: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Additional Space for the Fine Arts Department and Additional Locker and Classroom Space for Physical Education.

Mr. White moved that President Woods proceed with the construction of an addition to the Fine Arts Building and an addition to the Health Building in keeping with the need and funds available for such construction.

Mr. Blythe seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Blythe, aye; Mr. Hall, aye; Mr. Hart, aye; Mr. Long, aye; Mr. Springer, aye; Mr. White, aye; and Dr. Sparks, aye.

Meeting Adjourned

Motion was made by Mr. Springer, seconded by Mr. Hall, and unanimously approved that the meeting be adjourned.
