# Policy on Use of University Facilities, Adopted

The following policy was presented for the Board's consideration:

## POLICY ON USE OF UNIVERSITY FACILITIES

The facilites of Murray State University are intended for the primary use of faculty, students, and other educational groups—be they local, State, or Federal. Use of facilities must be properly scheduled and coordinated with all campus functions.

The University encourages its students to take part in church and religious activities, but it cannot permit the use of University facilities for revivals or a continuing series of meetings by any one religious group or organization. This does not preclude the occasional use of these facilities on Sunday by religious organizations.

For political meetings, equal opportunity shall be given to Democrats and Republicans. However, political appearances should be limited to major candidates.

Local civic and fraternal organizations desiring to use facilities for profit-making purposes may do so if approved and coordinated by the Administrative Council of the University and provided the profits go for civic, charitable, or educational purposes.

The University reserves the right to charge an equitable amount for the use of its facilities.

Mr. Hall moved that the foregoing policy on use of university facilities be adopted. Mr. Springer seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

## Contract with Paducah Laundry and Cleaners

President Woods read the following letters from the Paducah Laundry and Cleaners:

December 12, 1966

Dr. R. H. Woods, President Murray State University Murray, Kentucky

Dear Sir:

Effective September 1, 1964 and expiring August 31, 1968, Paducah Laundry and Cleaners were awarded a contract to provide linen service for Murray State University students at a cost to them of \$7.90 each for the spring and fall semesters, and \$4.00 for the summer sessions.

As part of our proposal, we request the right to increase prices if and when we became subject to the Federal Wage & Hour Law. On February 1, 1967 all laundries come under the provisions of that law and our minimum wage will increase from .75¢ an hour to \$1.00 an hour for a fourty-four hour  $\nu$  work week. We also employ 25 students to issue linens, whose wages have risen from .70¢ to \$1.00 an hour and all wages will continue to escalate as provided in the law.

Under the stipulation in our contract we propose, with your permission, to increase our price to \$10.00 each semester and \$5.00 for each summer session for the remaining term of our contract. Please note this is an increase of approximately twenty; (20%) percent, while our labor cost alone has increased over 30%. All other terms and conditions of the contract to remain the same.

We hope you will consider the requested increase reasonable and justified, and that we may have an early reply so we can furnish the University with printed material to be forwarded to students applying for admission for the forthcoming sessions.

## Request to build dormitories by Private Investors

Dr. Woods stated that he had received an inquiry from Senator Richmond at Owensboro relative to private investors building dormitories for Murray State.

Mr. Powell moved that the Board receive the report and request Dr. Woods to get further information and place the matter on the Agenda at a later date.

Mr. Blythe seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

# Fraternity Housing Off-Campus

Mr. Hart presented the following resolution and moved that it be adopted:

WHEREAS, Murray State University has had national fraternities for a number of years, and

WHEREAS, we have continuing requests for fraternities to rent or buy houses for use of the fraternity, and

WHEREAS, some of the meeting rooms occupied by fraternities are needed for classrooms,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the President, Dean of Students, with advice and counsel of other faculty members be authorized to approve the renting and/or purchasing of a house by a fraternity providing the rules and procedures including house mothers or supervisors along with proper house management are definitely approved by the proper authorities at the University.

Mr. Powell seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

#### Alexander van der Hart

Dean W. G. Nash was called in before the Board and discussed some of the problems in connection with the teaching of Mr. Alexander van der Hart. The Board requested that Dr. Woods talk with Mr. van der Hart regarding the effectiveness of his instruction.

## Kenlake Amphitheatre

Dr. Woods stated that he had talked with P. J. Cole of Kenlake regarding our dramatics division having plays at the Amphitheatre during the summer. He further stated he has talked with Mr. Farrell and Mr. Johnson regarding the matter. The Board suggested that Dr. Woods contact the Commissioner of Parks to determine if the Department of Parks will underwrite the project.
