#### Report on the 50th Anniversary Celebration

Mr. M. C. Garrott, Director of Public Relations, reported on the plans for the 50th Anniversary Celebration to take place in March and September, 1972.

Mr. Waterfield moved and Mr. Doran seconded that the report be received and that the Board's appreciation be expressed to the members of the 50th Anniversary Celebration Committee. Motion carried unanimously.

#### Student Organization Resolutions, Denied

#### STUDENT GOVERNMENT BILL NO. 1971-01

- WHEREAS: the duties and services performed by the Student Council do not cease during the summer months;
- WHEREAS: the function of the Student Council necessitates the presence of an undo financial burden on said executive officer;
- WHEREAS: the attendance of said executive officer during the summer semester creates an undo financial burden on said executive officer;
- WHEREAS: the President of the Student Council is the chief executive officer;
- RESOLVED: that the Student Regent be instructed to request of the Board of Regents that one full scholarship, to include tuition, room and board, be provided for the aforementioned President of the Student Council during the summer session;
- RESOLVED FURTHER: that if the action taken by the Board of Regents be favorable, it be made a Constitutional requirement that the President of the Student Council, as chief executive officer, enroll in summer school so that he will be able to perform the duties of his office and maintain the operation of the Student Council during the summer months, with the further stipulation that the Council President be placed on University employment for the summer months.

Mr. Waterfield moved that the Board accept the recommendation of the Office of Student Affairs and that the foregoing Bill be denied. The motion was seconded by Mr. Doran and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Doran, aye; Dr. Howard, nay; Mr. Neale, aye; Mr. Waterfield, aye; and Mr. Whittle, aye. Motion carried 4-1.

#### STUDENT GOVERNMENT BILL NO. 1971-02

- WHEREAS: the aim of the Student Organization is to provide a well-balanced program of activities of a high quality and minimal expense to the academic community;
- WHEREAS: the present level of the activity fee at Murray State University is less than that of other Kentucky colleges and universities;
- WHEREAS: the present level of the activity fee at Murray State University is insufficient to meet the expressed aim of the Student Organization;
- RESOLVED: that the Student Regent be instructed to request of the Board of Regents that the activity fee of Murray State University be raised a minimum of \$17.50 per semester. Of this increase \$15.00 is to be allocated to the Concert, Lecture and Insight fund, and the remaining \$2.50 is to be allocated to the general fund of the Student Organization.

Mr. Waterfield moved that the Board accept the recommendation of the President and that the foregoing Bill be denied. Mr. Neale seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Doran, aye; Dr. Howard, aye; Mr. Neale, aye; Mr. Waterfield, aye; and Mr. Whittle, aye.

#### Student Bill of Rights, Denied

# STUDENT BILL OF RIGHTS Amendments to the Student Government Constitution

#### ARTICLE I

Section 1 (Freedom of Speech)

- 1.1 Students and student organizations shall be free to speak publicly to publicly express their opinions without administrative review or sanction.
- 1.2 Students and student organizations shall be free to invite and to hear any person of their own choosing.
- 1.3 Students and student organizations shall be free to examine and discuss all questions of interest to them, and to express opinions publicly or privately.

Section 2 (Freedom of Press)

- 2.1 Student publications and the student press shall have freedom of expression.
- 2.2 Student publications and the student press shall be free of administrative control and censorship.

Section 3

3.1 Students and student organizations shall be free to peaceably assemble to discuss or express questions of interest to them publicly or privately.

Section 4 (Right to Petition for a Redress of Grievances)

4.1 Students and student organizations shall be free to survey and petition the University community, and to present to the appropriate University official, faculty, or staff any grievances pertaining to the University.

#### ARTICLE II

Section 1 (Freedom from Search and Seizure)

1.1 Students shall be free of illegal searches and seizures.

Section 2 (Protection against Improper Disclosure)

2.1 Students shall have access to and control of any information which shall be part of their permanent educational record, and as to the conditions of its disclosure.

#### ARTICLE III

Section 1 (Freedom from Double-Jeopardy)

1.1 Students shall be free of the danger of double-jeopardy.

#### ARTICLE IV

Section 1 (Rights of the Accused)

1.1 Students shall have the right to be informed of the nature and causes of the accusation.

#### Student Bill of Rights, Denied (Cont'd.)

- 1.2 Students shall enjoy the right to be confronted with the witnesses against him, and to present witnesses in his favor.
  - 1.3 Students shall have the right to counsel.

#### ARTICLE V

Section 1 (Due Process)

1.1 Students shall enjoy the right of due process within the judicial system of the University.

#### ARTICLE VI

Section 1 (Freedom from Intimidation)

1.1 Students and student organizations shall be free from administrative intimidation.

Dr. Hassell moved that the Board deny the Student Bill of Rights. Mr. Waterfield seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

The Board suggested if a Student Bill of Rights is deemed desirable that legal counsel be sought for legality and clarity.

#### Establishment of the "Alben W. Barkley Distinguished Lecture Series," Approved

Dr. Howard moved in keeping with the recommendation of the Faculty-Student Lecture and Concert Committee that the Board establish the "Alben W. Barkley Distinguished Lecture Series." Mr. Neale seconded and the roll was called on the adoption of the motion with the following voting: Mr. Doran, aye; Dr. Howard, aye; Mr. Neale, aye; Mr. Waterfield, aye; and Mr. Whittle, aye.

#### Athletic Ticket Report

Dr. Hogancamp reported that even though our athletic ticket sales were consummated prior to the Wage-Price Freeze, the Internal Revenue Service has ruled that refunds on ticket sales for the amount of the increase must be made because the games were played during the period of the Wage-Price Freeze. He further reported that mechanics have been set up to make the refunds.

#### Dormitory Occupancy Report, Received

Dr. Hogancamp explained the Dormitory Occupancy Report for the Fall Semester 1971. The Board received the Report and ordered it filed with the Board's records, but not incorporated in the Minutes.

President Sparks presented the members of the Board with copies of the Mathis study, "Benefits and Costs of Out of State Students Attending Murray State University." He called special attention to the summary on Pages 48 and 49.

The Board received the report, ordered it filed for the Board's record, and commended Dr. Gilbert L. Mathis, Associate Professor of Economics, Murray State University, for this study.
