The Board of Regents of Murray State University met August 6, 1976, at 9:30 a.m., C.D.T., in the Board Room of Harry M. Sparks Hall on the campus of the University. Springer, Mr. Tim Langford, and Dr. Charles E. Howard, Chairman, presiding.

Chairman Howard called the meeting to order and Dr. Hogancamp led in prayer.

and further appointed Jere Levy McCuiston, Trenton, Kentucky, as a member of the Murray State University Board of Regents, replacing Frank R. Paxton, Paducah, Kentucky, who has resigned, to fill the remainder of an unexpired term ending March 31, 1978.

7. Recommendation for Chairman of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology

I recommend the appointment of Dr. Miles Simpson as Chairman of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology and Associate Professor of Sociology at the rate of \$23,500.00 per year effective August 1, 1976.

Dr. Simpson received his Ph.D. from Michigan State University and comes to Murray State after serving professorships at Stanford and Texas Technological Universities.

8. Appointment of Dr. John Thompson as Interim Dean of the College of Business and Public Affairs

I recommend the appointment of Dr. John A. Thompson, Professor of Accounting, as Interim Dean of the College of Business and Public Affairs at an annual salary rate of \$29,400, effective August 1, 1976.

Dr. Thompson is a native of Brandenburg, Kentucky, has earned advanced degrees in Accounting from the University of Missouri and the University of Arkansas, in addition to his CPA. Dr. Thompson first joined the Murray faculty in 1966 and has served two years as Chairman of our Department of Accounting and Finance.

9. Request for Sabbatical Leave

Upon the recommendation of Vice-President Read and Dean Ken Harrell, I recommend that Dr. Anita Lawson, Associate Professor of English, be granted a sabbatical leave for the period January 1, 1977, through May 31, 1977, at the salary of \$7,325 for the Spring Semester 1977.

10. Appointments to the University Student Appeals Board

Pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statutes 164.370, the Board appoints nine faculty for staggered three-year terms. Three vacancies presently exist. The following appointments are recommended.

Term expiring June 1979 - Professor George N. Britt, Jr.

Term expiring June 1979 - Professor Robert Burke

Term expiring June 1979 - Professor Frances C. Richey

11. Recommendation on the renewal of the Student Health Insurance Policy

I recommend the student health insurance plan be renewed for the 12-month period commencing approximately August 15, 1976, with the Kingden Company, Lexington, Kentucky. The renewal is at the same premium rate with the exception that the "pre-existing conditions" clause be removed from the policy.

12. Fee Increase for high school correspondence courses

In order to maintain our high school correspondence study fee charges at a breakeven level and consistent with other institutions in the state, I recommend that these fees be raised from \$18 to \$22 per one-half unit.

13. Baccalaureate Minor in Advertising

I recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the establishment of an interdisciplinary minor in advertising. In recognition of some of the specific competencies being sought by employers of our students, the advertising minor will be especially attractive to students majoring in general business, journalism, radiotelevision, and graphic arts technology.

14. Amendment to Student Life Policies

After a year of operating under the student life policies adopted by the Board of Regents, two amendments to the operating procedures of the University Judicial Board are recommended. The two affected sections with additions noted are as follows:

Pre-Hearing Procedures

(5) The notice and charges shall either be (a) simultaneously mailed via registered and first class mail to the address last noted on the student's official records at the University or (b) be handed to the accused student. Such service of charges shall not be regarded as defective if the student hides himself, refuses mail, or has failed to notify the University of his current address, and the hearing may proceed without hindrance or delay. Such notice and charges shall be mailed or handed to the student not less than five (5) working days prior to the hearing, unless the student agrees to waive the five (5) day notice requirement.

Hearing Procedures

- (4) A student's character, reputation and prior disciplinary record shall be inadmissible as evidence to prove his guilt. However, the Board may consider a student's character, reputation and prior disciplinary record in determining appropriate disciplinary action after guilt has been determined.

During this fiscal year a definitive master plan for the development of Murray State University will be completed and presented to the Regents for study and formal adoption. This preliminary plan will serve as a working document for the development of an official planning document.

25. Annual Report of the President for 1975

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Regents held on May 8, 1976, Approved

Mr. Long moved the Board approve the Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Regents held on May 8, 1976, as received. Mr. Mitchell seconded. Motion carried.

President's Report

Dr. Curris reported 2876 students enrolled in the summer session.

He stated that we have been notified of the death of Dr. V. D. Bohannon; prior to his death, Dr. Bohannon established a scholarship fund at Murray State for students in veterinary medicine and approximately \$100,000 of his estate will be put into this scholarship fund.

The President reported that agreement has been reached between the University and Department of Finance and Administration in Frankfort regarding the University Center. The building will be approximately 135,000 square feettat an estimated cost of \$7,250,000 - \$7,500,000 over all. Final plans are underway for the renovation of the Waterfield Building into a library and construction will begin this fall. Three tracts of land on Payne Street have been purchased for parking and new tennis courts will be designed to replace those lost with the construction of the University Center.

He called the Board's attention to the time period for tenure decision appeals and stated that one appeal had been filed with the Committee; the Committee has met, considered and denied the appeal.

President Curris read a portion of a letter received from Alan Adams, Executive Director of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Fraternity, stating that 80 members of Phi Mu Alpha performed a musical worship service at New Harmony, Indiana, on July 10. William Warfield was the featured soloist and Bob Baar of our Music Department conducted. Mr. Adams praised Mr. Baar's work with the musicians and further stated that Donald Travis, an undergraduate student at Murray State, has been elected to serve as the first student member of the National Executive Committee.

Dr. Curris stated there is considerable discussion throughout the Commonwealth regarding raising tuition fees, that he strongly feels it is in the best interests of the citizens of the State that Kentucky remain a low-tuition state for its students, that 60% of high school seniors nationwide go to college but only 40% of Kentucky high school seniors go on to college, that he intends to argue that we remain low in tuition. President Curris distributed copies of the Low Tuition Fact Book published by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities to the members.

President Curris stated that Dr. John Lindauer, Dean of the College of Business and Public Affairs, will be leaving Murray State University as he has been selected to serve as Chancellor of the University of Alaska at Anchorage. He stated that we are sorry to lose Dr. Lindauer but congratulate him on his new position.

Dr. Lindauer was present and thanked the Board for the opportunity to participate in what he described as one of the thoroughly dynamic regional universities in the country. He stated that Murray State has made great strides but urged that we continue to expand in quality and service.

Such service of charges shall not be regarded as defective if the student hides himself, refuses mail, or has failed to notify the University of his current address, and the hearing may proceed without hindrance or delay. Such notice and charges shall be mailed or handed to the student not less than five (5) working days prior to the hearing, unless the student agrees to waive the five (5) day notice requirement.

Hearing Procedures

(4) A student's character, reputation and prior disciplinary record shall be inadmissible as evidence to prove his guilt. However, the Board may consider a student's prior disciplinary record in determining appropriate disciplinary action after guilt has been determined.

Report by Dean of the College of Creative Expression

The Board expressed its appreciation for this report.

the board established the Harry Lee Waterfield Governmental Studies Foundation to receive private gifts in support of governmental studies, scholarship and continuing education for local governmental officials. The institute now serves as the organizational vehicle through which the governmental studies program carries out its functions.

In addition, the Center for Innovation and Development has been established to enhance the university's effort to provide services to the public schools of West Kentucky. The ties between the university and the public schools have been strengthened through student teaching and observation experiences. During 1975, over 690 students participated in these off-campus experiences.

The university's Hancock Biological Station on Kentucky Lake is the site of much continuing student and faculty aquatic research. The station's summer program brought visiting professors from Ohio State University and the College of William and Mary in addition to Murray State faculty.

physical plant

Murray State University's Special Education Building, which houses the Department of Special Education, opened for use during the summer of 1975. Located on Sixteenth Street across from the University Laboratory School, the building is designed to serve the two-fold purpose of the department—academic offerings to prepare special education

diagnostic and remedial services for persons from the region. Facilities within the building include offices. classrooms, a lecture hall, an audiovisual center, a duplication center, a library, more than forty-five individual diagnostic and remediation rooms, and numerous special meeting areas. Construction began on the \$1.6 million facility in late 1973. The Department of personnel, and provision of direct Special Education is composed of

three major divisions: 1) the Division of Learning Disorders which prepares teachers in the areas of mental retardation. learning disabilities, and behavioral disorders; 2) the Division of Reading which prepares teachers to work with reading-disabled children as well as normal children; and 3) the Division of Speech and Hearing which prepares speech pathologists to work in public and

The speech and hearing program provides hearing testing services for school children throughout the region.



private schools, hospitals, speech and hearing clinics, and mental health centers. All three divisions offer direct services to students and area residents.

Students began enjoying newly renovated physical education facilities in the Carr Health Building during the fall. The \$830,000 project improved the expanded handball/racquetball courts; renovated gymnasiums, exercise rooms, classrooms, and offices; remodeled locker rooms; provided a sauna bath; and upgraded electrical wiring, plumbing, and fire protection to meet building code requirements.

Also completed in the fall was the Carlisle Cutchin Recreational Complex, a site formally occupied by the old Cutchin Stadium. The late Carlisle Cutchin, a pioneer in athletics at Murray State University who served as coach and athletic director more than a quarter of a century before his death in 1953,

continues to be memorialized in a tree-lined patio overlooking the playing fields, where the original stadium plaque and a new photoengraved plague showing game action in the old stadium are displayed. The new complex consists of playing areas for soccer, softball, football and jogging, and encompasses existing tennis courts. It is in constant use in warm weather (and on sunny days in cold weather) for intramural competition, physical education classes, and informal recreation. Other uses for the area, which is lighted, include band practice and camps for high school athletes, bands and cheerleaders in summer months.

Renovation of the Carr Health Building and the Cutchin Recreational Complex has allowed a major expansion of the campus intramural sports and recreation programs. Over 2,300 campus students now participate in these programs.

Murphy's Pond, the cypress swamp abounding with wildlife in Hickman County, was formally acquired by Murray State

The new central Learning Center for university students was established during the fall semester. Located in the new Special Education Building, the center offers reading help, study skills development, and a tutorial service—all free of charge.



Student intramural sports activity has dramatically increased—the number of students participating increased 270 percent this year—since the renovation of the Carr Health Building and the Cutchin Recreational Complex.

regional services

One of the university's three statutory missions is public service. In order that the university's educational expertise can be brought to bear upon the problems facing our region, the Board of Regents established in 1974 the Center for Regional Services.

Last spring the Center for Regional Services was recognized by the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) as having the nation's outstanding program for assisting local governments through its "Pilot Project for Provision of Supplemental Assistance to Local Governments," funded through the Kentucky Office for Local Government. Services offered through the project supplement the work of the Purchase, Pennyrile and Green River area development districts. Local governments contact the university through the Center for Regional Services, and the center then gathers together individuals or groups possessing the appropriate expertise to assist in solving the problem the requesting local government faces. The university has assisted communities to solve problems involving tax assessments, funds analyses, centralized purchasing, recreation planning, cost analyses, personnel administration, tourism promotion, water quality analyses, budgeting, health planning, codification of city ordinances, and many others.

The university's Speakers' Bureau, 100 speakers in twenty-nine separate categories ranging from "agriculture" to "travel" with over 300 individual topics,

continued to meet a strong demand for speakers in West Kentucky. Civic, service, academic and other groups, clubs, and societies have found the bureau to be a valuable service.

Two recent developments will further enhance the university's regional services program.

In spring 1975 the Board of Regents authorized the establishment of the Harry Lee Waterfield Institute for Local Government. Two years previously

residence hall population, the amount of subsidization will be reduced and possibly eliminated.


While on-campus enrollment increased significantly, the most noteworthy progress came through extended programs in West Kentucky. Nearly 1,500 of the university's 8,238 students are enrolled in classes away from the main campus-in Mayfield. Benton, Cadiz, Paducah, Fulton, Princeton, Marion, Henderson, Hopkinsville, Owensboro, Louisville, Paris, Hickman, and many others. The university now maintains the largest off-campus M.B.A. (Master of Business Administration) program in the commonwealth with over 300

students enrolled in off-campus centers at Hopkinsville, Owensboro and Paducah. These students will complete the M.B.A. degree in their home communities.

The university serves 362 soldiers and civilians at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, through evening classes taught as part of the Eagle University consortium. An additional 177 soldiers are working toward a high school diploma through the Fort Campbell PREP (Pre-Release Education Program). Thirty students are pursuing an associate degree in general studies as prisoners at the Kentucky State Penitentiary. Murray State has taught 300 West

Kentucky students paramedical skills in 1975 through the Emergency Medical Technicians Program.

Eighty percent of Murray's students are native Kentuckians, fifteen percent come from West Tennessee, Southeast Missouri and Southern Illinois, while the remaining five percent come from throughout the nation and twenty five foreign nations.

Using its own physical plant personnel, the university renovated the Student Health Services facility in 1975. The new quarters in Wells Hall enable the university to provide more efficient service to students.




University during 1975. Murphy's Pond has remained in its pristine state for nearly two centuries. The earthquake that formed Reelfoot Lake in 1811 also formed Murphy's Pond, disrupting the normal drainage structure of the land and creating an enclosed natural area of woods and water, providing a habitat for all Kentucky's native wildlife, including its renowned cottonmouth population.

For this acquisition the university is grateful to the Nature Conservancy, a nonprofit organization based in Washington devoted to wilderness preservation, the U.S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, and the heirs of George Allen Courtney who resisted the temptation to drain and clear the land and use it for agriculture purposes.

Nineteen seventy-five also marked intensified planning for the construction of a new university center, conversion of the Waterfield Student Union Building into a centralized library facility, and the replacement of the antiquated (and polluting) steam plant with a new Central Heating and Cooling Plant.

Efforts were also begun to renovate Wrather Hall into a regional museum and Wells Hall from a dormitory to a classroom and office building.



During 1975 the Murray State baseball team became champions of the Ohio Valley Conference for the ninth time, compiling a 40-7 record and representing the conference in the 1975 National Collegiate Athletic Association regional championship tournament. The Thoroughbreds led the nation in slugging percentage.

student body


Murray State University enrolled 8,238 students for the fall, 1975 semester. This represented the largest headcount enrollment in the university's history, and at 5,850, the largest number of full-time students since 1971. Undergraduates numbered 6,554, while 1,684 were graduate students.

Especially encouraging were increases in the number of

residence hall students. The university, based upon rapidly expanding enrollments prior to the end of the draft and without anticipating the imposition of quotas for out-of-state students by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, overbuilt its residence halls. For several years public funds have been subsidizing the Housing and Dining Bond System. If the university can sustain an increased

During the new college's first year, enrollment has increased twenty percent with a spectacular seventy percent increase in new freshmen.

The university is very fortunate to receive the continuing assistance of business and industrial leaders throughout West Kentucky. The Industry and Technology Advisory Council, the Advisory Committee for Electrical Engineering Technology, and the Advisory

Committee for Construction Technology (representing the Associated General Contractors of West Kentucky) all assist the College of Industry and Technology in developing its educational programs and in keeping those programs relevant to the needs of business and industry.

Nearly 1,200 students are enrolled in the ten programs offered by the College of Industry and Technology. Here a hydraulics class conducts an experiment in the fluid power laboratory.

Professor Emeritus Clifton
Sigsbee Lowry, a teaching legend
on the Murray State University
campus, was honored in the winter
of 1975 through the establishment
of the annual Clifton Sigsbee
Lowry Distinguished Lecture in the
Humanities. The inaugural speaker
in the lecture series was Dr. Forrest
C. Pogue, eminent historian and
biographer of General George C.
Marshall. During his forty-three

years of teaching Dr. Lowry inspired several generations of Murray State students, and now his teaching career will be continually honored in the most appropriate way—that of continuing lectures by distinguished scholars visiting the campus.

Dr. Pogue himself also was honored by the university in 1975. Official biographer of General Marshall; official historian of the Supreme Headquarters, U.S. Forces European Theater of World War II; director of the George C. Marshall Foundation and Library; and director of the Dwight D. Eisenhower Institute for Historical Research in the National Museum of History and Technology, Smithsonian Institution, is Murray State's most distinguished alumnus academician. He advised and assisted the university in its

pioneering efforts to record Kentucky governmental history through the first-hand recollections of those who made that history, and in recognition of his help and his eminence in the field, Murray State has established the Forrest Carisle Pogue Oral History Institute of the College of Humanistic Studies.

Murray State again honored Jesse Stuart, Kentucky's greatest poet and author, through the

college of industry and technology

Concerted efforts to strengthen academic programs were emphasized during 1975. These efforts will continue, receiving additional emphasis in the coming years.

Highlighting the past year was the establishment of the sixth college of the university, the College of Industry and Technology. A growing national need for professional technical manpower is evident in Kentucky. Manufacturing, mining, business and service concerns are experiencing manpower shortages in engineering technology and related areas. Students are responding to these shortages by enrolling in these career studies in increasing numbers.

The College of Industry and Technology has expanded its program offerings to include several new degree programs: construction technology, manufacturing technology, graphic arts technology (printing management), electrical engineering technology, civil engineering technology, occupational safety and health, drafting and design, as well as traditional programs in industrial education, military science, and vocational teacher education.

The five departments of the College of Industry and Technology are Engineering and Industrial Technology, Graphic Arts Technology, Industrial Arts Education, Vocational-Technical Education, and Military Science. Here a technology student conducts an experiment in the metallurgy laboratory.

educational opportunity

To insure equal educational opportunity the university has expanded its workship and scholarship programs. Nearly 1,450 students were employed on campus, both providing the university with needed services and students with the opportunity to work in order to pay their college expenses.

The Murray State Alumni Association's scholarship program has been expanded in order to aid outstanding and deserving students throughout West Kentucky. This scholarship program, funded by annual giving to the Century Club program and through the development of honorary and memorial perpetual scholarships, aided fifty-nine students in 1975.

The Presidential Scholars Program, unique to Kentucky and this region, was established to recognize outstanding academic achievement, high school leadership, and character. Annually twelve Presidential Scholars are chosen for this honors program, which entails a full, renewable scholarship. The university strives to recognize academic excellence and leadership as we have long recognized athletic performance.

budget report

The university ended the 1974-1975 fiscal year in a firm financial position. Even though expenditures were greater than the year before, the general income, primarily from student fees and state appropriations, increased sufficiently to provide a balanced budget and a small balance to carry forward to the 1975-1976 fiscal year.

The single most significant increase in the cost of operating the university was the rapid escalation of utility costs and particularly, electricity. Energy conservation efforts were instituted in order to hold utility costs as low as possible.

Actual

Even though much progress was made, the university continued to experience problems in maintaining a competitive position in the job market for capable faculty, administrators, and support personnel.
