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MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY December 17, 1977

The Board of Regents of Murray State University met December 17, 1977, at 1:30 p.m. in the Board Room of the Harry M. Sparks Hall on the campus of the University. The following members were present: Mr. Steve Bourne, Mr. William Carneal, Mr. Ron Christopher, Mr. Bob T. Long, Dr. S. M. Matarazzo, Mr. Jere McCuiston, Mr. A. B. Mitchell, Dr. Ed Settle, Mr. O. B. Springer, and Dr. Charles E. Howard, Chairman, presiding.

None were absent.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and Dr. Matarazzo led in prayer.

Oath of Office administered to Mr. M. Ronald Christopher

On October 31, 1977, Governor Julian M. Carroll appointed M. Ronald Christopher as a member of the Murray State University Board of Regents to fill the vacancy created by the death of Frank A. Stubblefield and to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term which ends August 8, 1979.

The Oath of Office was administered to Mr. Christopher by Mrs. Patsy R. Dyer, Notary Public.

Chairman Howard recognized Mrs. Christopher and other members of the family and welcomed them to the meeting.

Election of Officers

Dr. Howard appointed President Curris temporary chairman and Dr. Curris called for nominations for Chairman of the Board of Regents. Mr. Long moved that the Board retain the present officers and they be reelected. Mr. Mitchell seconded. Upon call for the question, all voted aye and motion carried. The officers are Dr. Charles E. Howard, Chairman; Mr. Bill Carneal, Vice-Chairman, Mrs. Patsy R. Dyer, Secretary, and Dr. Richard Gray, Treasurer.

Executive Session

Chairman Howard declared the Board in Executive Session for the purpose of discussing an individual personnel item.

The Executive Session terminated and the meeting was opened to the public. Whereupon, President Curris announced that the Board of Regents had authorized the President of the University to offer employment as Football Coach to an individual, that he would make the offer by Monday and would have an announcement next week.

7. Employment of Mrs. Maurice Christopher

KRS 164.360 expressly prohibits the employment of a father, mother, brother sister, husband, wife, son, daughter, aunt, uncle, sister-in-law or daughter-in-law of a Regent except upon written recommendation of the President and confirmation of the other Board Members.

Accordingly I recommend that Mrs. Maurice Christopher, mother of Regent Ron Christopher and an employee at Murray State University for 13 years, be officially reemployed as Secretary in the Department of Agriculture.

8. Appointment of Dean, College of Environmental Sciences

I recommend the appointment of Dr. Gary Boggess, Associate Professor of Chemistry, as Dean of the College of Environmental Sciences effective January 1, 1978 at an annual salary of \$31,250. Dr. Boggess, a 1962 graduate of Murray State University, received his M.S. in Chemistry from Purdue and his Ph.D from the University of Tennessee. In his eleven years at the University, Dr. Boggess has served as graduate coordinator in the Department of Chemistry and Chairman of the Center for the Enhancement of Teaching Effectiveness. He co-authored and directs a \$336,000 NSF grant to strengthen the preparation of math and science teachers.

9. Old Business: Request for the Board of Regents to endorse the establishment of of a Murray State University Credit Union and to provide financial and physical support for a three-year period.

This request was tabled at the last meeting until additional information could be received. The Insurance and Benefits Committee was asked to present a specific proposal. This information has not yet been finalized but the Committee is working on this proposal and it should be ready by the Board meeting. The Board also asked for information on what legal liability the University would encumber by either endorsing or financially supporting the proposed credit union. Mr. Overby's opinion is attached.

10. Authorization for Supplemental Life Insurance

I recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the University to offer supplemental life insurance at group rates to employees of the University, with the full cost of such insurance being borne by participating employees. The University's fringe benefit package currently provides \$5,000 in life insurance (\$10,000 in the event of accidental death) for each full-time University employee. This action on the part of the Board would allow such employees to purchase additional insurance at group rates.

11. Acceptance of Gift

I recommend that the Board of Regents officially accept the invaluable collection of original manuscripts, books, proofs, photographs, correspondence and memorabilia comprising the Jesse Hilton Stuart Collection and any other material Mr. Stuart and his family shall give to Murray State University.

In March 1960 Jesse Stuart placed on permanent loan in the Murray State University Library the manuscripts and materials known as the Jesse Hilton Stuart Collection. On November 21, 1977 Mr. Stuart declared this collection to be a gift, to be held in perpetuity by the University and to be made fully available to scholars for study.

This collection represents the most exhaustive and valuable collection of literary material given to the University. That Murray State University should have been selected as the depository for the original works and memorabilia of Kentucky's most acclaimed author is truly an honor.

13. Naming of the current Library

I recommend that the present Library be named the Forrest C. Pogue Library in honor of Dr. Forrest C. Pogue, a 1931 alumnus of Murray State University, for eight years a member of our faculty, an active, contributing alumnus, and a distinguished historian. Dr. Pogue, the biographer of General George C. Marshall, currently serves as Director of the Dwight D. Eisenhower Institute for Historical Research of the Smithsonian Institution.

The Harry Lee Waterfield Library will serve as the main library on the campus, and will be identified as the Waterfield Central Library. The Pogue Library will house our special collections, including the Jesse Stuart materials, the Frank Albert Stubbelfield and "Fats" Everett papers, and our legal collection. It will be identified as the Pogue Special Collections Library.

14. Supplemental Budget Request

At the October 29, 1977 Board of Regents Meeting, I was authorized to submit a budget request for the Animal Diagnostic Laboratory in Hopkinsville. This request has been prepared with the assistance of the Animal Diagnostic Laboratory Transition Advisory Committee appointed by the Governor and is consistent with the Governor's Executive Order transferring the Diagnostic Laboratory to Murray State University.

The request includes continuation of existing diagnostic services as submitted by the Department of Agriculture earlier. Continuation costs for existing diagnostic services are \$627,436 in 1978-79 and \$640,922 in 1979-80. In addition, we have asked for supplemental funding for the period January 1, 1978 through June 30, 1978. This request includes \$45,692 in transition costs and \$41,140 for planning and pilot research projects. The 1978-80 biennial request for the new food animal research program is \$296,275 in 1978-79 and \$497,862 in 1979-80. This request represents total operating cost of the food animal research program excluding capital construction.

The total capital construction request is \$2,738,148. These funds will provide for a 19,600 square feet research addition to the diagnostic laboratory plus a 2,500 square feet maximum isolation building, and will also provide swine and cattle herd facilities on the Murray State campus for research projects requiring access to large animal populations. The combination of facilities at Hopkinsville and on the University Farm will allow maximum utilization of diagnostic and research personnel.

Minutes of the Meetings of the Board of Regents held on October 1, 1977 and October 29, 1977, Approved

Report of the President

President Curris read a note of appreciation from Mrs. Odessa Stubblefield.

The President reported that Murray State University has been designated by Secretary Russell McClure of the Executive Department for Finance and Administration as the Commonwealth's Transfer Agent for Landsat Satellite Technology from NASA. The Landsat data becomes maps that will allow the Commonwealth to moniter the changes in environment, the impact of pollution on crops, and they can be utilized by the area development districts.

Dr. Curris further reported that Murray State University has been designated as an eligible institution to participate in the Title XII Amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act; colleges and universities with strong agricultural programs will be involved and will lend their efforts to assist other countries in meeting the needs of their agricultural programs.

Dr. Curris reported that since 1973 Murray State University has participated in Eagle University, but the Army has announced that it is terminating the contract and will solicit bids for its higher education needs. Murray State is now in discussion with other regional universities to form a new consortium and submit a bid in January.

Regarding the capital construction projects on campus, Dr. Curris reported ---

- a) Overpass--is 80% complete. Handrails must be installed before the students can use and the installation is expected in January. Project will not be complete until the excavation of the University Center provides the dirt for the fill.
- b) University Center--specifications have been released and the bid opening is set for January 20. We are hopeful bids will be favorable and construction can commence in late February.
 - c) Library--is nearing completion.
- d) Heating and Cooling Plant--is behind schedule. Original completion was November 1977 and is now June or July 1978. Our new electric boiler has been malfunctioning and the breakdowns have damaged some of our computers. We are working with the Division of Engineering and the company that made the boiler, but if satisfactory adjustments are not made, we will ask the Division of Engineering to reject that boiler as well as the other two that have been ordered.
 - e) Wells Hall--contractor has started on Wells.
- f) Wrather Hall--renovation of Wrather Hall awaits funding from the Governor's Office.

Mr. Christopher named to Committee

Chairman Howard appointed M. Ronald Christopher to the Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Board.

Mr. Bourne moved that the Board officially accept the collection of original manuscripts, books, proofs, photographs, correspondence and memorabilia comprising the Jesse Hilton Stuart Collection and any other material Mr. Stuart and his family shall give to Murray State University.

Mr. Mitchell seconded and the motion carried.

WHEREAS, Frank Albert Stubblefield served as a member of the Murray State University Board of Regents from August 1, 1975, to the end of his life on October 14, 1977; and

WHEREAS, his service to the Board was dedicated to the improvement and advancement of the University in its efforts to serve the educational needs of the citizens of West Kentucky, the Commonwealth, and this region; and

WHEREAS, as a member of the Board of Regents he served as an advocate of the University's needs and programs; and

WHEREAS, his work as a leading citizen of West Kentucky, having served as Congressman from the First Congressional District from 1958 to 1974, and as a community leader and businessman in the City of Murray has brought honor to him and to the University; and

WHEREAS, his leadership in the development of national agricultural policy contributed materially to the economic growth and prosperity of West Kentucky and the Commonwealth; and

Procedures for Implementing the "Policy on Academic Promotion and Appointment," Adopted

Upon review of the procedures, Dr. Matarazzo moved that the following procedures for implementing the Policy on Academic Promotion and Appointment be adopted:

Request for consideration of promotion in academic rank shall be initiated by individual faculty members and shall be based upon criteria delineated in "Policy on Academic Promotion and Appointment." Requests for consideration of promotion in academic rank will be accompanied by documentation of the qualifications as outlined in the current "Policy on Academic Promotion and Appointment."

In consideration of such request, promotion recommendations will be initiated by the department chairman or appropriate departmental committee in departments where such committees exist, and be forwarded to the dean of the college by October 15; the Vice-President for Academic Programs by November 15; and the Leave, Tenure and Promotion Committee by December 15. The Committee's recommendations will be forwarded by February 15 to the President who shall then make recommendations to the Board of Regents.

The complete folder of each promotion applicant, along with the recommendations and rationale of each office and committee shall be forwarded to each recommending office and committee and to the President. However, the faculty member seeking academic promotion may ask at any time that his request for promotion not receive further consideration.

Notification

It is the responsibility of the deans of colleges annually to notify all faculty members of the provisions of the promotion policy.

When promotions are granted by the Board of Regents, notice of such action will be sent to the individual, the respective department chairman, collegiate dean, and Vice-President for Academic Programs.

At the time a promotion is not recommended, the office or agency first to recommend disapproval of the request is responsible for informing the faculty member of such action and the reasons for the disapproval recommendation. Under such circumstances the faculty member will have the privilege of reviewing his promotion folder.

Reconsideration

The faculty member, his chairman, his dean, the Vice-President for Academic Programs or the President may ask the Leave, Tenure and Promotion Committee to reconsider its recommendation to the President. This request shall be in writing and based on a belief that the Committee's decision resulted from improper procedure, or was predicated upon grounds which clearly violate academic freedom, Constitutional rights, or the "Policy on Academic Promotion and Appointment." In such a request for reconsideration, the burden of proof rests on the individual submitting the request. The Leave, Tenure and Promotion Committee may, at its option, grant a hearing and report its findings and recommendations to the President.

Such a written request for reconsideration must be directed to the Chairman of the Leave, Tenure and Promotion Committee no later than thirty (30) days after the Committee forwards its recommendations to the President.
