7. Recommendation for Chairman, Department of Computer Studies

I recommend the appointment of Dr. Wayne D. Smith as Chairman and Associate Professor of the Department of Computer Studies at an annual salary of \$43,250 effective August 1, 1983.

Dr. Smith holds the bachelor's degree from Auburn, the Master of Science in Information Science from Georgia Tech, and the Ph. D. in Computer Science from the University of Illinois. He is a native of Knoxville, Tennessee, and comes to Murray State from Austin Peay State University.

8. Recommendation for Chairman, Department of Engineering Technology

I recommend the appointment of Dr. William S. Byers as Chairman and Professor of the Department of Engineering Technology at an annual salry of \$37,500 effective July 1, 1983.

Dr. Byers holds degrees from Ohio State, Rollins College, and Pennsylvania State University. He comes to Murray State from the University of Alabama, where he is currently Professor of Engineering Technology and Coordinator of the Electrical Engineering Technology Program.

9. Acceptance of Genevieve Savage Cave

The Archaeological Conservancy of Santa Fe, New Mexico, has acquired title to the Genevieve Savage Cave and five acres surrounding the cave in Logan County, Kentucky, for the purpose of preservation and curation of the site which is on national archaeological and geological significance. The Conservancy has asked Murray State University to serve as the agency to ensure that the Cave is properly maintained, preserved, and researched.

Therefore, I recommend that the Murray State University Board of Regents formally accepts title to the Genevieve Savage Cave to preserve and curate it in accordance with the Management Plan.

10. Consideration of Payment for Accrued Leave to Dr. Curris (Mr. Frymire)

Minutes of the Board Meeting held on May 13, 1983, Approved

Mr. Westberry moved that the Minutes of the meeting of the Board of Regents held on May 13, 1983, be approved as submitted. Dr. Henley seconded. Upon call for the vote, all voted aye and the Chairman stated the Minutes of May 13, 1983, approved.

President Curris reported that the University has received the All-Sports Trophy in the Ohio Valley Conference.

Mr. Westberry presented the following report for the Buildings and Grounds Committee:

The Committee met this morning with the Committee from Western Baptist Hospital Foundation with respect to the transfer of property located in Wickliffe, Kentucky, known as the Ancient Buried City from the Western Baptist Hospital Foundation. There were a few items that needed

to be ironed out in the proposal. We were all striving toward the same goal; it was a matter of the way we were saying it. The Committee unanimously recommends the Board accepts the gift of the archaeological site known as the Ancient Buried City under the following conditions:

- 1. The University would accept the site as is, where is, and in its present condition along with all of its assets with the exception of approximately one-half acre on the other side of the highway which has some commercial-type development.
- 2. The archaeological site itself would be turned over to the University--the grounds, the buildings, everything--with the exception of a tractor and some small hand tools.
- 3. The archaeological people have recommended that it be shut down for a short period of time--3 months to one year--in order that they might rectify what they feel has been some unscientific digging; they do not feel that the exhibitions have been done in a proper and scientific fashion. They want to tailor it more to an attractive museum-type situation.
- 4. The present caretaker would be retained for at least the next year or so.
- 5. Western Baptist Hospital would like a revolving lending arrangement whereby some of the artifacts would be displayed at the Hospital.
- 6. The primary motivation is this particular site be preserved and developed as an archaeological museum, would be run by the University, would be open to the public. We have agreed to keep it open to the public as a museum or tourist-type attraction for a period of no longer than five years. If at that time it proves to be a financial drain on the University, we would no longer maintain it as such and in that event we have two options: a) the property would be sold and whatever proceeds derived would be divided equally between the Hospital Foundation and Murray State, or b) in the event a sale is not desired by either party, we would turn it back to the Western Baptist Hospital Foundation provided we could get approval from the Commissioner of Finance to give away property that belongs to a state institution.

The property is coming to Murray State at no cost. All assets with the exception of souvenirs, inventory, and one tractor are being turned over completely to the University.

The people in the Archaeological Department feel this is a significant archaeological site. It will be used as a lab facility for archaeological students. The Small Business Development Center on campus has developed a financial projection, and they think it is an economically feasible project or at least self-sustaining. However, we did not feel we wanted to commit the University to keeping it open any longer than five years if it proves to be a financial drain. If approved by the Board, I will get with the University Attorney to work out the Agreement, and title by deed will pass to Murray State University.

Mr. Westberry moved the Board accept the recommendation of the Committee that Murray State University accepts this gift under the above conditions and that we go forward with the project. Mr. Christopher seconded. The Chairman called for discussion. Upon call for the question, all members voted aye, and the Chairman stated motion carried.

E. Development

Mr. Morgan stated he has been in contact with David Johnston and that Mr. Johnston is interested in expanding the position we had earlier discussed with him. He further stated that at his request, Mr. Johnston had written a letter outlining the position for review and discussion. Mr. Morgan requested the Secretary duplicate the letter and forward to each member and stated after the Board reviews the letter--possibly at the next meeting--the Board may want to determine how it will proceed.

F. Finance

Mr. Harreld stated that Don Chamberlain and his staff have resubmitted the Budget and expressed appreciation for their hard work. He distributed the following information to the Board:

Budget Highlights

Total Budget of \$40.1 million - 5.43% increase over last year's total budget - 7.08% increase in E&G areas

Increases in salaries and fringe benefits accounted for 71% of the new E&G expenditures

Tuition rates increased some 15%; however, housing and dining charges remained at last year's levels

Salary increases for faculty and professional staff amounted to 5% plus, an additional 1.5 percent was allocated based on meritorious performance. Classified personnel received 5.5% across-the-board, plus an additional 1.5% will be distributed mid-year based on merit.

Health insurance costs are estimated to increase some 15%, or \$135,000 over the next twelve months.

Mr. Harreld submitted the following report of the Finance Committee and moved that as recommended by the Finance Committee that the resolution to Elect and Delegation of Responsibilities pertaining to House Bill 622 be adopted. Mr. Lawton seconded and all voted aye. The Chairman stated the resolution is adopted.

Report of the Finance Committee

The Finance Committee of the Board of Regents of Murray State University met Tuesday, June 7, 1983, at 9:00 a.m., on the Murray State University campus. Committee Chairman Michael Harreld presided and committee members Robert Lawton, Bill Morgan, and B. M. Westberry were in attendance. Also present for the meeting were Board Chairman Richard Frymire and Board members Melvin Henley and Alan Whitehouse.

The initial topic for the meeting was further consideration of the University Budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984. Since most of that discussion dealt with salary and personnel matters, motion was made by Mr. Lawton, seconded by Mr. Westberry, that the Committee go into executive session in accordance with the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Mr. Don Chamberlain, Director of the Budget, met with the Committee in executive session.

The executive session ended at 11:50 a.m., at which time the Committee convened in public session.

Mr. Lawton moved and Mr. Westberry seconded that the Committee adopt the attached Resolution to Elect and Delegation of Responsibility pertaining to House Bill 622, for recommendation to the Board of Regents at its next meeting.

The Committee ratified the banking services bid for recommendation to the Board.

It was the consensus of the Committee to go forward with the University Budget for 1983-84, for recommendation to the Board at its June 18, 1983 meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.

Dr. Jim Booth and Dr. Senftleber met with the Committee. After consideration of both the merit of what Dr. Senftleber had to say and the procedures in tenure matters, the Committee concluded that the request of Dr. Senftleber should be denied. Therefore, the Committee recommends that the Board take no action in this matter, the case is concluded, and moved that the report of the Academic Affairs Committee be accepted by the Board. Mr. McCuiston seconded and all voted aye. The Chairman stated the motion approved and so ordered.

Mr. Frymire stated that he asked Mr. Lawton to fill out the term of Steve West on the Academic Affairs Committee and that committee assignments have been made and will be distributed later in the meeting.

Pursuant to statutory provisions that the President must recommend the appointment of all employees prior to effective action by the Board of Regents, I submitted a proposed personnel roster for the 1983-84 fiscal year, as part of the 1983-84 University Budget.

It is my understanding that in executive session the Finance Committee modified that personnel roster in several ways, the most notable ways being the inclusion of two names not previously recommended by me. Those two names are:

Dr. Gary Boggess, as Dean of the College of Environmental Sciences, and

Mr. Charles Outland, as Director of the Business Office,

Furthermore, it is my understanding that the Budget document to be acted upon by the Board this Saturday includes the two abovementioned appointments.

This letter is to advise you formally and officially, consistent with the provisions of KRS 164.360 as interpreted in the Attorney General's Opinion OAG 75-634, and based upon Smith vs. Beverly Ky., 236 SW2nd 914 (1951), I do not recommend the appointments of Gary Boggess as Dean of the College of Environmental Sciences and Charles Outland as Director of the Business Office. All other appointments and proposed salaries reflected in the Personnel Directory of the proposed Budget are recommended to the Board for approval.

My reasons for not making the recommendation referred to above have been detailed in writing to the Finance Committee of the Board and copies have been made available to all Board members. In the first instance, the question of satisfactory service has been address; in the latter instance, I have made it clear that I cannot recommend action which to me is an undisputable violation of federal regulations prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex.

RESOLUTION TO ELECT

AND DELEGATION OF RESPONSIBILITY

(Pursuant to House Bill 622)

The Board of Regents does hereby elect to perform in all respects as authorized by KRS 164A.550 to 164A.630 regarding the acquisition of funds, accounting, purchasing, and affiliated corporations. A copy of KRS 164A. 550 to 164A.630 is attached hereto for purposes of certainty and clarification as to the nature and extent of the election hereby made. The Board of Regents does not elect to assume responsibilities as to capital construction.

It is further resolved that the Board of Regents pursuant to KRS 164A. 560 (1) does hereby delegate responsibility as follows:

(a) In all instances, wherein delegation of responsibility is authorized (and is not specifically preempted by statutory direction to the contrary i.e. KRS 164A.560 (2) (a) and KRS 164A.570 (12)) the responsibility for the acquisition of funds, accounting, purchasing, and affiliated corporations shall be delegated to the President of the University.

The President of the University is authorized to sub-delegate these responsibilities to the Vice President of Administrative Services or to other appropriate officials of the University. The sub-delegation shall be in writing and filed with the Board of Regents.

- (b) The Treasurer of the University has certain responsibilities set forth in KRS 164A.560 (2) (a). The Treasurer may authorized and direct other officials and employees of the University to act for him in the performance of these services but the Treasurer must ratify each and every act under this authority.
- (c) The Vice President for Administrative Services shall explain in writing the existance of an emergency as

contemplated in paragraph (12) of KRS 164A.575. This explanation must be approved by the President of the University.

The delegation of responsibility as stated in (a) and (b) shall be considered to be a regulation within the intendment of KRS 164A. 560 (1). Additionally, the Board recognizes that additional internal regulations and/or operational manuals of policies and procedures may be necessary to implement the performance of these functions.

- (3) "Affiliated corporation" means a corporate entity which is not a public agency and which is organized pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 273 over which an institution exercises effective control, by means of appointments to its board of directors, and which could not exist or effectively operate in the absence of substantial assistance from an institution.
- (4) "Depository bank" means any bank so designated by the treasurer of the Commonwealth as appropriate for receiving public moneys. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 1, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.555. Transfer of funds to institutions. — The secretary of the department of finance shall issue warrants authorizing the treasurer of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to pay to the treasurer of each institution any amounts due by virtue of the state appropriations for that institution, or transfer the amount due electronically if electronic transfer is authorized by statute. Election by institution to perform in accordance with KRS 164A.555 to 164A.630 — Regulations. — (1) The governing boards of the public institutions of higher education electing to perform in accordance with KRS 164A.555 to 164A.630 regarding the acquisition of funds, accounting, purchasing, capital construction and affiliated corporations shall do so by regulation. The responsibility for this election is vested with the governing boards, any other statute to the contrary notwithstanding. The governing board may delegate these responsibilities by regulation to appropriate officials of the institution. The anticipated investment earnings which have been credited to the general fund and the anticipated investment earnings on funds in the capital construction account, excluding revenue bonds, for fiscal years 1982-83 and 1983-84 may be deducted from the respective institution's trust and agency funds on deposit prior to the issuance of a check or transfer to the governing board.

(2) The governing boards of institutions may elect to receive deposit. collect, retain, invest, disburse, and account for all funds received or due from any source including, but not limited to, state and federal appropriations for the support or maintenance of the general operations or special purpose activities of such institutions. In the event of such election by the

governing board.

(a) The treasurer of the university shall deposit on a timely basis all tuition fees, fees for room and board, incidental fees, contributions, gifts, donations, devises, state and federal appropriations, moneys received from sales and services, admittance fees, and all other moneys received from any source, in a depository bank or banks designated by the governing board.

(b) The governing board shall promulgate rules and regulations limiting disbursements to the amounts and for the purposes for which state appropriations have been made, or for which other moneys have been received. All disbursements shall be recorded in a system of accounts as set forth in KRS 164A.555 to 164A.630. The treasurer of each institution shall prescribe forms to be used with the system of accounts, and no treasurer shall approve any disbursement document unless he determines that the disbursement is to satisfy a liability of the institution incurred for authorized purposes and that the disbursement is to be made from the unexpended balance of a proper allotment. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 3, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.565. Accrual basis accounting system — Other records — Annual report. — (1) The governing board of each university making the election authorized in KRS 164A.560 shall as a condition of such election install an accrual basis accounting system conforming with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures established for colleges and universities by the national association of college and university business officers and the american institute of certified public accountants. The accounting system shall include but not be limited to the following fund structure:

(a) An operating fund group (unrestricted current funds), consisting of all moneys not otherwise restricted, available for general operations, including state appropriations, federal funds, and unrestricted institutional recents.

Separate accounting fund groups may be established for auxiliary enterprises, athletics, hospitals, and other similar operations.

(b) A restricted fund group consisting of appropriations and other receipts restricted as to purpose which shall not be included in the operating fund.

(c) A loan fund group consisting of gifts, grants, and other funds provided and available for loans to students.

(d) An endowment fund group consisting of funds, the principal of which is not currently expendable.

(e) An agency fund group consisting of resources held by the institutions as custodian or fiscal agent for individual students, faculty, staff members and organizations.

(f) A plant fund group consisting of:

1. Unexpended plant funds to be used for the acquisition of long lived assets for institutional purposes (capital construction funds);

2. Funds for renewal, maintenance, and replacement of institutional buildings, equipment and other properties; and

Funds set aside for debt service charges and retirement of indebtedness on institutional plant.

(2) A record of each general fund appropriation shall be maintained so as to identify the institutional budgets to which such funds are allotted. Any uncommitted state general funds remaining after the close of business on the last day of the fiscal year shall lapse and be returned to the treasury of the Commonwealth. Each appropriation shall be used for the intended purpose and where questions of intent arise subject to the provisions of KRS 45.750 and 45.800 in the case of capital construction projects and major items of equipment as defined by these sections, the decision of the secretary of finance, based upon budget work papers, shall be final.

(3) A separate account showing sources of revenue and all expenditures shall be maintained for each capital construction project. At the end of each fiscal year, a report containing a listing of all capital construction projects, with sources of funds, expenditures and current status for each, shall be submitted to the capital construction and equipment purchase oversight

committee.

(4) Within thirty (30) days after July 15, 1982, the secretary of finance shall submit to the capital construction and equipment purchase oversight committee a complete record of all funds and project records transferred to institutions under the provisions of KRS 164A.555 to 164A.630.

(5) Within thirty (30) days after July 15, 1982, the governing boards shall submit to the capital construction and equipment oversight committee a report containing a complete list of capital construction projects and unexpended plant funds in existence on July 15, 1982. The source of funds,

expenditures and current status of each project shall be shown.

(6) State general funds appropriated by the general assembly for capital construction projects and equipment purchases as defined in KRS 45.750 through 45.800 shall not lapse at the end of a fiscal year. They shall be carried forward until the project is completed. Any such unexpended funds remaining after acceptance of the project as complete shall be returned to a surplus account of the capital construction fund for investment until appropriated and allotted as provided in KRS 45.750 through 45.800.

164A.570. Annual audit. — The governing board of any university making the election prescribed in KRS 164A.560 shall engage a qualified firm of certified public accountants experienced in the auditing of institutions to conduct an annual examination of the institution's financial statements in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards for the purpose of submitting an independent opinion, and preparing a report of findings and recommendations concerning internal accounting controls and procedures, and compliance with KRS 164A.555 to 164A.630. The secretary of finance may prescribe the minimum scope of any such audit. The opinion, with the findings and recommendations, shall be forwarded to the governor, the secretary of the department of finance, the auditor of public accounts, the director of the legislative research commission, the executive director of the council on higher education, and members of the governing board. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 5, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.575. Purchasing — Inventories — Sales of surplus property — Bidding procedures. — (1) The governing boards of each institution may elect to purchase interest in real property, contractual services, rentals of all types, supplies, materials, equipment, printing, and services, except that competitive bids may not be required for:

- (a) Contractual services where no competition exists, such as telephone service, electrical energy, and other public utility services;
- (b) Food, clothing, equipment, supplies, or other materials to be used in laboratory and experimental studies;
 - (c) Instructional materials available from only one (1) source;
 - (d) Where rates are fixed by law or ordinance;
 - (e) Library books;
 - (f) Commercial items that are purchased for resale;
- (g) Professional, technical, scientific or artistic services, but contracts shall be submitted in accordance with KRS 45.700 and 45.720;
- (h) All other commodities, equipment and services which, in the reasonable discretion of the board, are available from only one (1) source; and
 - (i) Interests in real property.
- (2) Nothing in this section shall deprive the boards from negotiating with vendors who maintain a general service administration price agreement with the United States of America or any agency thereof, provided, however, that no contract executed under this provision shall authorize a price higher than is contained in the contract between general service administration and the vendor affected.

(3) The governing board shall require the institution to take and maintain inventories of plant and equipment.

(4) The governing board shall establish procedures to identify items of common general usage among all departments to foster volume purchasing. It shall establish and enforce schedules for purchasing supplies, materials, and equipment.

(5) The governing board shall have power to salvage, to exchange, and to

condemn supplies, equipment, and real property.

(6) Upon the approval of the secretary of finance, the governing board may purchase or otherwise acquire all real property determined to be needed for the institution's use. The amount paid shall not exceed the appraised value as determined by a qualified appraiser or the value set by the eminent domain procedure.

(7) The governing board shall sell or otherwise dispose of all real or personal property of the institution which is not needed or has become unsuitable for public use, or would be more suitable consistent with the public interest for some other use, as determined by the board. The determination of the board shall be set forth in an order, and shall be reached only after review of a written request by the institution desiring to dispose of the erty. Such request shall describe the property and state the reasons why nstitution believes disposal should be effected. All instruments required aw to be recorded which convey any interest in any such real property so disposed of shall be executed and signed by the appropriate officer of the board. Unless the board deems it in the best interest of the institution to proceed otherwise, all such real or personal property shall be sold either by invitation of sealed bids or by public auction, provided, however, that the selling price of any interest in real property shall not be less than the appraised value thereof as determined by the department of finance or the department of transportation for such requirements of that department.

(8) Real property or any interest therein may, subject to the provisions of KRS Chapter 45A, be purchased, leased, or otherwise acquired from any officer or employe of any board of the institution, based upon a written application by the grantor or leasor approved by the board, that the employe has not either himself or through any other person influenced or attempted to influence either the board requesting the purchase of the property. In any case in which such an acquisition is consummated, the said request and finding shall be recorded and kept by the secretary of state along with the other documents recorded pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 56.

(9) For capital construction projects, the bidding may be on a total design-bid basis, a package system commonly referred to as "turnkey," or construction management, whichever in the judgment of the board offers the lowest real cost to the taxpayer. Bids shall be reviewed by the institution's engineering staff to assure quality and value, and compliance with bid redures. All specifications shall be written to promote competition.

(11) The governing board shall have control and supervision over all purchases of energy consuming equipment, supplies and related equipment purchased or acquired by the institution, and shall designate by regulation the manner in which an energy consuming item will be purchased so as to promote energy conservation and acquisition of energy efficient products.

(12) The governing board may negotiate directly for the purchase of contractual services, supplies, materials, or equipment in bona fide emergencies regardless of estimated costs. The existence of the emergency must be fully explained, in writing, by the vice president responsible for business affairs and such explanation must be approved by the university president. The letter and approval shall be filed with the record of all such purchases. Where practical, standard specifications shall be followed in making emergency purchases. A good faith effort shall be made to effect a competitively established price for emergency purchases. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 6, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.580. Management of capital construction projects. — Subject to the provisions of KRS 45.750 through 45.800 and KRS 56.870 to 56.874, the governing board of each institution may provide for the management and administration of capital construction projects authorized for such institution including, but not limited to:

- (1) The procurement of necessary consulting services:
- (2) The supervision and control of the making of all contracts for building projects, renovation projects, repair projects, and supervision of same:
- (3) The prescription of the amount and form of evidences of indebtedness submitted in connection with bids and contracts when not otherwise provided by law;
- (4) The preparation of plans and specifications for any construction, alteration, or enlargement of buildings, structures, and other improvements:
- (5) The advertisement of bids and the awarding of contracts in connection with such projects;
 - (6) The supervision and inspection of all related work;
 - (7) The approval of changes in plans or specifications; and
- (8) The acceptance of such improvements when completed according to such plans and specifications. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 8, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.585. Contracting for capital construction projects. — (1) Subject to authorization by the general assembly, the governing boards may make plans and specifications, advertise for bids, let contracts or incur any financing commitments, either in the way of a charge against institution funds or in the way of negotiations for issuance of revenue bonds, for any capital construction projects involving the improvement of lands or the construction, alteration, reconstruction, or major repair of any building or other structure, or sewage disposal, water supply system or other utility system.

(2) Review of construction plans for conformance with the uniform state building code shall be conducted by the department of housing, buildings

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and construction. The board shall not approve any such project requiring its approval in any instance where it finds that the project is not needed, or that the proposed method of financing is not sound, or in cases where the project will exceed the amount of the funds available therefor, or the work contemplated will be insufficient to accomplish the purpose of the project, or that after providing for the ordinary recurring expenses of administration and debt service and for payments under existing allotments for extraordinary expenses and capital outlay, cash will not be available in the treasury to promptly pay for the work or that the work is to be done by employes of the institution.

- (3) Any capital construction project, except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, shall be contracted for on a competitive bid basis, and the execution of such contracts shall be approved and authorized by the board. When a capital construction project has been approved as provided in this section, in whole or in part, the board shall prepare the plans and specifications, advertise for bids, award the contracts, supervise the construction and handle the financial negotiations.
- (4) A capital construction project, the total cost of completion of which will not exceed seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), may be performed by the employes of the institution or by individuals hired specifically for the project. Necessary materials and supplies shall be procured in accordance with the standard purchasing procedures and policies of the board as defined in KRS 164A.575. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 9, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.590. Contracting for architectural and engineering services. — (1) In the procurement of architectural and engineering services, the governing board of the institution shall encourage firms engaged in the lawful practice of their profession to submit an annual statement of qualifications and performance data.

- (2) When the need for architectural and engineering services arise for specific projects, the governing board shall evaluate current statements of qualifications and performance data on file with the Commonwealth, together with those that may be submitted by other firms and shall conduct discussions with no less than three (3) firms regarding anticipated design concepts and the relative utility of alternative methods of approach for furnishing the required services, and shall then select therefrom, in order of preference, based upon criteria established and published, no less than three (3) of the firms deemed to be the most highly qualified to provide the services required.
- (3) The governing board shall negotiate a contract with the highest qualified firm for architectural and engineering services at compensation which the governing board determines in writing to be fair and reasonable to the Commonwealth. In making this decision, the governing board shall take into account the estimated value of the services to be rendered, the scope, complexity, and professional nature thereof. Should the governing board be unable to negotiate a satisfactory contract with the firm considered to be the most qualified, at a price it determines to be fair and reasonable to the institution, negotiations with that firm shall be formally terminated

164A.595. Carrying out of capital construction projects. — Capital construction projects shall be carried out as follows:

(1) Subject to the provisions of KRS 45.750 through 45.800, the governing boards of the institutions may acquire, erect, construct, reconstruct, improve, rehabilitate, remodel, repair, complete, extend. enlarge, equip, furnish, and operate any buildings, structures, improvements, or facilities, including any utilities, other related services and appurtenances and land required as the respective governing boards shall deem necessary for carrying on the educational, research or public service programs or discharging the statutory responsibilities of the universities and colleges and various divisions under the jurisdiction of the boards, or for the management, operation, or servicing of the universities and colleges.

(2) The governing boards may acquire real or personal property, by purchase, lease, sublease, condemnation, trade or exchange, gift, devise, or otherwise, and improve such property whenever in the judgment of the governing board it shall be necessary. The title to any real estate acquired under this section shall vest in the Commonwealth for the use and benefit of the appropriate institution. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 11, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.600. Procedures and limitations of KRS 45.750 through 45.800 apply — Projects limited to scope authorized by general assembly. — (1) The procedures and limitations related to capital construction and equipment purchases set forth in KRS 45.750 through 45.800 shall apply to the governing boards. The governing boards shall establish a contingency fund and an emergency repair, maintenance and replacement fund in their plant fund records. Transfer and use of these funds shall be governed by the provisions of KRS 45.770 and 45.780, as appropriate, except that the governing boards of each university shall perform the functions assigned to the department of finance in KRS 45.770 and 45.780.

(2) Capital construction and equipment purchase projects established by the governing boards shall be limited to the scope authorized by the general assembly, and the total costs of each project shall not exceed the appropriation; except for emergency projects that may arise. In such instances, the governing boards may transfer funds from other projects or from operating funds; however each emergency project that is authorized by the board and sources of funds shall be promptly reported to the capital construction and

equipment purchase oversight committee. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 12, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.605. Issuance of bonds. — Subject to the provisions of KRS 45.750 to 45.800 and KRS 56.870 to 56.874, the governing boards may issue, under the provisions of KRS 162.340 to 162.380, consolidated educational building revenue bonds, housing bonds, or bond anticipation notes. The board of the institution shall submit to the state property and buildings commission a request for approval of the project before any financial commitment of any sort may be made in connection therewith, including employment of architects, engineers, fiscal agents or attorneys. Personal service contracts for fiscal agents and bond counsel shall be subject to KRS 45,700 to 45,720 and architects and engineers shall be selected as provided in KRS 164A.590. After approval by the commission, the governing board shall appoint fiscal agents, bond counsel and architects and engineers as may be required to make plans and specifications or financial arrangements for the project. The date of sale on such issues shall be coordinated with the department of finance to avoid a conflict with other state bond issues. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 13, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.610. Organization and operation of affiliated corporations.

— (1) An institution may organize and operate one (1) or more affiliated corporations to assist it in carrying out its programs. missions or other functions. A qualified firm of certified public accountants experienced in the auditing of colleges and universities and their affiliated corporations shall be engaged to conduct an annual examination of the corporation's financial statements in accord with generally accepted auditing standards for the purpose of rendering an independent opinion thereon and preparing a report of findings and recommendations concerning appropriate accounting controls and compliance with applicable statutes. The affiliated corporation shall adhere to the principles of accounting and purchasing used by the institution with which it is affiliated.

(2) The affiliated corporation shall provide the institution with an accounting at least quarterly, of all income and expenditures of said corporation in connection with contracts or grants with entities external to the institution and the corporation, for the conduct of research or other projects carried out, in whole or in part, through the use of institutional facilities or personnel.

(3) The affiliated corporation shall pay to, or for the benefit of, the institution any and all funds received by it from any person, corporation, association or governmental agency external to the institution and the affiliated corporation as reimbursement for indirect expenses incurred by the institution in carrying out research or furnishing other goods or services, deducting from such payments only the expenses attributable to the procurement and performance of research grants and contracts and other contracts for the provision of such goods and services and such sums as may be essential to meet contractual obligations incurred at the request of the institution's governing board (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 14, effective July 15, 1982)

Acceptance of gifts — Awarding of scholarships, grants, etc. — Nothing contained in KRS 164A.555 to 164A.630 shall be construed to prevent an institution or an affiliated corporation from enforcing or carrying out the bona fide terms of any gift, grant, conveyance, devise or bequest from any private person, corporation, foundation, estate or other entity contributing funds or any other thing of value to the institution or affiliated corporation, nor shall same be construed to prevent an affiliated corporation from awarding athletic scholarships or other scholarship, fellowship, assistantship or similar grants, loans or awards to students, faculty or other employes of an institution, or from performing such other functions as may be assigned by the institution's governing board. 164A.620. Fund for excellence. — The governing board is authorized to establish a "fund for excellence" trust fund into which gifts, grants, and special appropriation by the general asembly intended for such purpose may be deposited. Investment income from moneys in this fund shall be used only to enhance academic programs of the institutions. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 391, § 17, effective July 15, 1982.)

MINING AND MINERALS TRUST FUND

164A.800. Creation of fund. — There is hereby created a mining and minerals trust fund, hereinafter referred to as the "fund." (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 260, § 1, effective July 15, 1982.)

Powers.—(1) There is established a mining and minerals trust fund at the University of Kentucky under the control and direction of a board of trustees. The board of trustees shall consist of three (3) members of the university board of trustees appointed by the chairman of that board; two (2) members appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives of the Kentucky general assembly; and two (2) members appointed by the president pro tem of the senate of the Kentucky general assembly. For the first term, one (1) appointment each shall be for one (1) year. All other appointments and all subsequent appointments shall be for two (2) years.

(2) The members shall select from themselves one (1) member to serve as chairman. The members shall serve without pay but shall be entitled to reasonable expense reimbursement from the fund.

(3) The board may receive and accept for deposit in the fund bequests, gifts, grants and any appropriations by the general assembly and shall have the power to make decisions regarding disbursal of those funds consistent with the provisions of KRS 164A.800 to 164A.840. (Enact. Acts 1982, ch. 260, § 4, effective July 15, 1982.)

164A.810. Funds — Deposit — Investment — Purpose. — (1) All moneys received by the mining and minerals trust fund shall be deposited in the state treasury in a separate account entitled "mining and minerals research." The treasurer of the Commonwealth shall, by the 10th day of each month, issue a check to the trustee of the mining and minerals trust fund in an amount equal to the balance of funds in the account at the close of business on the last business day of the preceding month. Idle funds in the account shall be invested, consistent with disbursement requirements, by the treasurer and investment earnings shall accrue to the state general fund.
