President's Report

Measuring Up Report Results

The statewide report card on higher education, Measuring Up, has recently been released for the Commonwealth of Kentucky. They have been publishing results for about a decade, but particularly doing it every two years for the last six years. This report will be highlighted at the Governor's Conference on Sunday and Monday, September 19-20, 2004. After analyzing the data and knowing the people who put this together, it receives a lot of attention. It will receive a lot of legislative attention and we should be aware of some of the results. Normally we get grades but grades do not tell much as to where we rank in some areas. There have been some changes but we must examine some of the more significant findings from the results of the most recent statewide report card. There are five categories that are generally used: affordability, preparation, participation, completion and benefits.

1, Affordability

In affordability, as a state we graded a D-. We have talked a little bit about this but there has been a kind of an ebb and flow. We went from 10th in 2000 to 8th in 2002 then to 14th in 2004 mainly due to the tuition increases that we have seen this year. Being 14th is an enviable position by most national standards but we should be very concerned that we have gone from 8th to 14th. The fact that we got a D- is almost irrelevant. In the affordability category, 36 states got F's. Only one state got a B, no states got an A, possibly six to seven states got a C and the rest got D's. The vast majority got F's. In fact, we are above the average grade for the nation on affordability with an F+.

4.

Preparation, particularly based on eighth grade scores in math and science, is another category used to measure our success. We have actually declined quite a bit more in this area. This really refers to test scores measured by fourth graders, eighth graders and students leaving. There are a number of factors, maybe 15 different variables and categories, involved. We have really gone from 30th in 2000 to 42nd in 2004. We graded a C- which is below the national average. We definitely have some work to do in this area.

3. Participation

Significant jumps for the Commonwealth and state higher education as a whole have occurred in this category. To pass three, four or five states is really significant when you are measuring it on a two-year span in a lot of these areas. This is perhaps the most significant thing. Participation in 2000, the number of traditional age students going to college in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, we ranked 44th in the nation. Two years later we made significant strides. In 2002, we were 37th and then another big jump to 25th in 2004. This helps you start to see the results of wider access.

4. Completion

We stayed steady with gradual growth in the statewide completion category. In 2000 we were 42nd in completion, 42nd again in 2002, and 28th in 2004. However, we jumped four states. We received a grade of C, which, once again, is irrelevant. It is more important that we passed four states in completion. The percentage of the adult population that have actually received baccalaureate degrees and higher education degrees has grown. Overall, the trend is quite good.

5. Benefits

This is another really important area. This is how the benefits that our college graduates are putting into the economy, the per capita income growth, the number of B.A.'s that are in the marketplace, the number of students coming to Kentucky with baccalaureate degrees. This is a significant jump in just the last four years alone. In benefits we went from 48th in 2000 to 39th in 2002 to 20th in 2004. Overall you are going to hear a lot about this on Sunday night at the Governor's Conference. These are very important and show what higher education reform is doing for the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Comparisons to a Decade Ago

In these five areas, when compared to a decade ago, the most significant set of findings are as follows:

- Kentucky was one of five states to improve in four of the five categories.

 Tennessee, South Dakota, Arkansas and California were the other four states.

 California was the only state to improve in all five categories. The rest of the states did not make this kind of progress.
- The chance of enrolling, and this is an important statistic, in college by age 19 in the Commonwealth of Kentucky increased by 11 percent compared to a decade ago when the nation fell back three percent. This is very different than what the national statistics are showing on average for other states.
- Attendance is a third important finding. The attendance gap narrowed considerably between white and minority students. In 1994, 15 out of 100 minority students had access and were going to college. Today that figure is 32 out of a 100 students. We are still behind the national trend but we also started low. We are not going to resolve this overnight but we have made significant gains in these areas.
- Lower income students going to college increased from 16 percent to 30 percent in Kentucky. Granted, the nation had an increase in this area but Kentucky had an

even greater increase. This is an important statistic that only recently we have been able to brag about.

- 1,301 more students are entering the state of Kentucky than they are leaving the state to go to college. This is important because it is about KEES. This is the value of having merit-based scholarships and keeping our students in the state. Only 13 percent of Kentucky students go out of state. This is considerably below the national average. What this says is that we are doing a great job and our universities are doing a very job of keeping our best students in the state, but additionally we are doing a good job in attracting and pulling high quality human capital to Kentucky. Murray State is a good example of this. There are a lot a Illinois, Tennessee, Indiana and Missouri students coming to the state.
- Finally, the population aged between 25 and 65 with bachelor's degrees or higher in the general population increased from 17 percent in the last 10 years to 24 percent. This is a significant improvement. Generally these gains are made gradually, one percent at a time. This is at least a 10 percent increase in the number of people with baccalaureate or higher degrees in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This shows that we are part of a really significant reform and we are very much a part of a strong, successful momentum in higher education in Kentucky.

On average we are generally higher than the state average in a lot of these areas and we are part of a much larger state that is moving in the right direction with regard to higher education. Right now the focus is on how to keep this momentum going. The Governor is there to help us and we are doing everything we can to make sure this momentum continues to expand and improve and to help to find the right type of priorities to keep this momentum going. It's been a remarkable decade. That is what this report shows for the state as a whole in regard to higher education.

Enrollment

Particularly relevant is our enrollment in the fall. Overall we are looking at a minimum increase of about 1.25 percent, and again this a minimum and it's a conservative estimate. Right now we are still getting students enrolled as well as filtering out some students that have dropped out. It is conceivable that we could be up maybe 1.9 percent or maybe even 2 percent within the next couple of weeks. By the last estimate we were right at about 2 percent but we have not purged out some of the students that did not come into the system. We are going to have a minimum increase of probably around 1.25 to 2 percent. This is particularly relevant since the environment was so unusual this year. Factors which affected enrollment include the Tennessee's Hope Scholarships, Illinois tuition guarantees that they provided for all Illinois students and parents, the fact that we had to raise tuition considerably higher during the year, and state budget cuts. It is hard enough to predict what is going to happen with enrollment in stable years, let alone with these drastic fluctuations going on all around us.

Graduate Students

Our numbers here represent a very positive sign. We had declining enrollments in graduate students until this year. This is the first year that we turned the trend around on graduate students. Normally undergraduate student numbers have been skyrocketing and graduate students have been on the decline. This year we have about 100 new graduate students so we have reversed the trend on graduate student decline for the first time in three years.

Undergraduate Students

We are up about 31 students from where we were last year, not in the freshman area but primarily in the area of transfer students. We have a lot of transfers. The Kentucky Community and Technical College (KCTCS) system is kicking in. It is starting to reach full momentum and we are getting a lot of students coming to Murray State University from the four community colleges in our region. They are staying in their communities but we provide them with

baccalaureate degree service and some of them are coming here as juniors and seniors.

New Freshmen

There is one reason why we are down in new freshmen and that is Tennessee. However, with the unpredicted new flow of transfers this has kind of balanced itself out. We are roughly down about 30 percent in Tennessee. Jim Vaughan did a very good job of preparing for this. He predicted that we would be about 30 percent down and we are running at about 31 percent down. This is nothing more than the Tennessee scholarship. We did it to other states when we incorporated ours and now it is being done to us out of Tennessee. In Graves County we had a drop of 16 students. This has to do with the fact that the year before we had over half of the Mayfield High School senior class come to Murray so this is the ebb and flow in Graves County. In Daviess County, Owensboro, we are down 10 students. More significant are the areas where we are up in the number of freshmen. There was a big jump in Henderson County and due to our presence with our building and facilities in Henderson, Kentucky. We are also working very closely with Henderson, which is the largest high school in the state of Kentucky. A lot of these students are band students. In Marshall County early estimates showed we were down but we have jumped considerably instead. We are up 18 students in Marshall County since last year. In Oldham County, and these are the students that have choices all over the United States, we are coming in significantly higher, more than double, with an increase of 17 students.

Transfer Students

This category saw a net gain of 112 students, up 12 percent. This in many ways was unanticipated which means really it is unusual from previous years and we make our estimates based on previous years.

9-Month Contract

A year and a half ago in the spring meeting we voted to incorporate the 9-month contract in order to move away from the 10 month contract that we had previously. This was an important issue for our campus and for our faculty and staff. We have gathered data on how well the change has done during our fiscal year to see if we have been able to secure more federal money and to put in more federal applications. We have been able to increase our federal funding, not only since the 9-month contract but also during the last five years, we have more than doubled, with a 123 percent increase in federal funding. Certainly Congressman Whitfield, Senator McConnell and others in our federal legislation and delegation have helped us achieve this. We will continue to work closely to continue these trends.

Perhaps more relevant is our total faculty grant productivity. This includes non-federal and federal grants, Spencer grants and McArthur grants as well as other grants. What you will see is that in money we have increased from about 8.5 in 2000 in federal grants acquired by faculty to about 12.9 in 2003. We have had a slight dip since the 9-month contract to 11.3 in 2004 but we have applied for considerably more grants. In fact, we still have \$10 million pending just because of the overlap for the fiscal year. At June 30 we were not able to count anything in July or August. The fact that we are applying for more is very, very important. The fact that we have \$10 million pending that won't be counted in this total will certainly show up next year in the numbers. So, in fact, the effort has increased. When measuring whether a 9 or 10-month contract has been effective in this area, it is the effort that we should take a look at. It is the effort that gets you grants. You cannot get a grant without the effort. You will notice that last year we applied for 183 grants. We are up to 226 grants that we have applied for this year. We actually had an increase in the number of grants funded. The average grant size was a bit smaller but the number of grants that we had funded increased by 32. Looking at these data objectively, there is greater effort going into grant productivity and there is greater effort in acquiring outside resources. To some extent the 9-month contract certainly plays into this. We will continue to monitor this because it is a performance measurement. It helps show us the productivity of what we predicted would happen if we went to the 9-month contract. Effort is higher than it has ever been in the past.

State Budget

The state budget, as you know, is still out there. There is not a state budget and probably there won't be any movement before the November elections. However, there might be movement after. Most likely we will go into January and the next legislative session without a state budget. We are still holding our cut that we had last year because we know we are going to have to give it back at some point.

SACS Accreditation

The final vote on the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) accreditation will occur in December. SACS will determine whether Murray State has fulfilled all the promises that we made. Drs. Tim Todd, Sandra Jordan and Gary Brockway have been very instrumental in their work with SACS. It has been a very comprehensive effort. Every ten years you are accredited by the Southern Association of College and Schools. This determines whether the University gets federal aid as well as whether it is considered one of the peer institutions. We already have some indications that we will be alright as long as we do what we said we are going to do to make many of the changes.

Fundraising

We are up 324 percent in fund raising but it is only two months into the year. Most of that is from an Implant Technology gift. This will level out and hopefully continue on a much more consistent pattern of increasing 8 to 10 percent.

University Library

The Library Renaissance Funds for Knowledge effort continues. There are plans and blueprints laid out for the Board to see. We are hoping to raise anywhere from \$7 to \$10 million at the end of this effort so that we can really make the Library our foundation for information and the foundation for our campus.

Facilities

- The Recreation and Wellness Center continues to be on schedule and we are anticipating opening it in December. It is coming along well. It is going to be a very important part of student life on our campus.
- The Innovation and Commercialization Center (ICC) Incubator has not received a lot of publicity but it is under construction on the northwest side of campus. This incubator is being funded by federal assistance from the Tennessee Valley Authority, Economic Development Administration, as well as from the State New Economy dollars that provided funding for the \$3 million facility. This will enable new entrepreneur business opportunities to come into that facility and give them one to three years of start-up activity. The best way to describe it is our own mini-research park to help get these organizations kicked off.
- Plans are underway to secure a bid for the Agriculture Equine Classroom Facility. Once we have signed the contract construction should begin within a month or two on the classroom facility. This is Equine Trust money from the state. This fund is completely separate from any other resources. This will give us locker rooms and equine classrooms for our 100 plus equine students that keep their horses out in our agriculture area.
- The Biology Building is open and we have had our Ribbon Cutting. Students are in it, we are learning in it, we are interacting, laboratories are functioning.

With regard to residential colleges, President Alexander asked Oliver Muscio, head of the Residential College Association, to comment on the progress of our residential college effort this year. For the new members of the Board, Dr. Muscio gave a brief overview of the Residential

College system at Murray State University. President Alexander thanked Dr. Musico for providing an update and added that the most important part of this system is the fact that the residential college system has played a significant role in our graduation rate growth. Early estimates show that we will probably grow again this coming year in our graduation percentage. How much we are still waiting to see.

Dr. Don Robertson, Vice President for Student Affairs, introduced S. G. Carthell who is our new Director of African-American Student Services and Ethnic Programs and Director of the Multicultural Center. After conducting a national search S. G. Carthell was hired. He is from Miami University in Ohio with over 13 years of experience there. We were also able to hire his wife in our Housing Office as one of our professional staff there. Mr. S. G. Carthell addressed the Board, stating that he is excited to be on campus and that there is a wonderful group of students at Murray State University. He promised that the Board could expect some very exciting things that everyone can be proud of. Dr. Alexander welcomed S. G. to Murray State, adding that during the two weeks that he has been on campus there is an energy and enthusiasm and professionalism that we all very much appreciate. Dr. Alexander also pointed out that Miami University in Ohio has a residential college system. Therefore, S. G. knows our system very well and brings a great deal of ideas about how we can make our residential college system better.

Report of the Chairman

Chair Sparks welcomed the three new members to the Board of Regents, stating that he feels they are already a part of the Board because they attended the Retreat. He introduced Alan Stout from Marion, Kentucky; Vickie Travis from Murray, Kentucky; and Jessica Reed from Grand Rivers, Kentucky. One thing he is particularly pleased about is the fact that Mr. Stout and Mrs. Travis are Murray State alumni. He feels that brings a certain feeling to the University and when you make decisions you have a little background to base those decisions on. Mr. Sparks also mentioned that he thinks as the Board interacts this weekend with the other boards at the Governor's Trusteeship Conference that it will become evident that the Murray State Board has a little better relationship than some of the other boards. Some of them are like Murray used to be some years ago and they are aloof and cold. This concluded Mr. Sparks' report.

Report of the Treasurer

Treasurer Tom Denton presented and reviewed the financial and investment reports for the period of July 1, 2003, through June 30, 2004. Following a brief discussion, Mrs. Buchanon moved, seconded by Mr. Miller, that the Treasurer's Report be accepted. Motion carried.



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Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The University prepares its financial statements as a business-type activity in conformity with applicable pronouncements of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

For financial reporting purposes, the University is considered a special-purpose government engaged only in business-type activities. Accordingly, the University's financial statements have been presented using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis, revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recorded when an obligation has been incurred. All significant intra-agency transactions have been eliminated.

Significant accounting changes made during the 2002 fiscal year in order to comply with the reporting requirements include (1) adoption of depreciation on capital assets; and (2) reporting summer school revenues and expenses between fiscal years rather than in one fiscal year.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The University considers all highly liquid investments that are immediately available to the University to be cash equivalents. Funds held by the Commonwealth of Kentucky are considered cash equivalents.

The University currently uses commercial banks and the Commonwealth of Kentucky as depositories. Deposits with commercial banks are covered by Federal depository insurance or collateral held by the banks in the University's name. At the Commonwealth level, the University's accounts are pooled with other agencies of the Commonwealth. These Commonwealth pooled deposits are substantially covered by Federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the bank in the Commonwealth's name.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, using first-in-first-out valuation, or market.

Investments

The University accounts for its investments at fair value. Changes in unrealized gain (loss) on the carrying value of investments are reported as a component of investment income in the statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets.

Assets held by the Murray State University Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) represent those gifts and donations made directly to the University, which are held by the Foundation for investment purposes. The net appreciation and income of donor restricted endowments are available to the University for expenditure to the extent permitted by Kentucky law and Foundation spending policy. The recognition of gifts, donations, and endowment pledges are accounted for by the University in accordance with GASB Statement No. 33, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Non-exchange Transactions.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable consists of tuition and fee charges, other operational activities, and auxiliary enterprise services. Accounts receivable also include amounts due from the Federal government, state and local governments, or private sources, for non-exchange type agreements defined in accordance with GASB No. 33 or in connection with reimbursement of allowable expenditures made pursuant to the University's grant and contracts. Accounts receivable are recorded net of estimated uncollectible amounts.

Capital Assets

All capital assets, as defined by University policy, are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition, or, if donated, at fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset and is not allocated to functional expense categories. Outlays for construction in progress are capitalized as incurred. Routine repairs and maintenance are charged to operating expense in the year in which the expense was incurred.

The University owns historical collections housed throughout the campus that it does not capitalize, including artifacts in Wrather Museum. These collections adhere to the University's policy to (a) maintain them for public exhibition, education, or research; (b) protect, keep unencumbered, care for, and preserve them; and (c) require proceeds from their sale to be used to acquire other collection items. Generally accepted accounting principles permit collections maintained in this manner to be charged to operations at time of purchase rather than capitalized.

Compensated Absences

Employee vacation pay is accrued at year-end for financial statement purposes. The liability and expense incurred are included at year-end with accrued payroll, and as a component of compensation and benefit expense. Sick leave benefits expected to be realized as paid time off are recognized as expense when the time off occurs and no liability is accrued for such benefits employees have earned but not yet realized.

Restricted Cash and Investments

Cash and investments that are externally restricted are classified as restricted assets. These assets are used to make debt service payments, maintain sinking or reserve funds, purchase or construct capital or other noncurrent assets, or for other restricted purposes.

Net Assets

The University's net assets are classified as follows:

Invested in capital assets, net of related debt: This represents the University's total investment in capital assets, net of outstanding debt obligations related to those capital assets. To the extent debt has been incurred but not yet expended for capital assets, such amounts are not included as a component of invested in capital assets, net of related debt.

Restricted net assets – expendable: Restricted expendable net assets include resources in which the University is legally or contractually obligated to spend in accordance with restrictions imposed by external third parties.

Restricted net assets – nonexpendable: Nonexpendable restricted net assets consist of endowment and similar type funds in which donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition of the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may either be expended or added to principal.

Unrestricted net assets: Unrestricted net assets represent resources derived from student tuition and fees, state appropriations, sales and services of educational departments, auxiliary enterprises, and other sources. These resources are used for transactions relating to the educational and general operations of the University, and may be used at the discretion of the governing board to meet current expenses or for any purpose. These resources also include auxiliary enterprises, which are substantially self-supporting activities that provide services for students, faculty, and staff.

Release of Restricted Net Assets

When an expense is incurred for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available, the University's policy is to allow each departmental unit the flexibility to determine whether to first apply restricted or unrestricted resources based on the most advantageous application of resources in the particular circumstances.

Classification of Revenues

The University has classified its revenues as either operating or nonoperating revenues according to the following criteria:

Operating revenues: Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of exchange transactions, such as (1) student tuition and fees, net of discounts and allowances, (2) sales and services of auxiliary enterprises, net of discounts and allowances, (3) Federal, state and local grants and contracts, and (4) interest on institutional student loans.

Classification of Revenues (cont'd)

Nonoperating revenues: Nonoperating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of nonexchange transactions. In a nonexchange transaction, the University receives value without directly giving equal value back, such as a gift or grant for which there is no return requirement. Additionally, certain significant revenues relied upon for operations, such as state appropriations, investment income and endowment income, are recorded as non-operating revenues, in accordance with GASB Statement No. 35.

Tuition Discounts and Allowances

Student tuition and fee revenues, and certain other revenues from students, are reported net of discounts and allowances. Discounts and allowances are the difference between the stated charge for goods and services provided by the University, and the amount that is payable by students. Certain governmental grants, such as Pell grants, and other Federal, state or nongovernmental programs, are recorded as either operating or nonoperating revenues in the University's financial statements. To the extent that revenues from such programs are used to satisfy tuition and fees and other student charges, the University has recorded a discount and allowance.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to use estimates and assumptions. The accompanying financial statements include estimates for items such as allowances for doubtful accounts and loans receivable, self-insurance liabilities and other accrued liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board recently issued its Statement No. 39, Determining Whether Certain Organizations are Component Units, an amendment of GASB Statement 14. The new statement provides additional guidance to determine whether certain organizations for which the University is not financially accountable should be reported as component units in the University's financial statements based on the nature and significance of their relationship with the University. It generally requires reporting, as component units, organizations that raise and hold economic resources for the direct benefit of the University. The University expects to first apply the new statement during the year of June 30, 2004. The impact of applying the new statement has not yet been determined.

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board recently issued its Statement No. 40, Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosures, and amendment of GASB Statement No. 3. This Statement provides guidance in common deposit and investment risks related to credit risk. The University expects to first apply the new statement for the year ended June 30, 2005. The impact of applying the new statement has not yet been determined.

Investments in U.S. government securities and the collateral for repurchase agreements are registered in the name of Murray State University or held in the University's name by its agents and trustees.

The University may legally invest in direct obligations of and other obligations guaranteed as to principal by the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agencies and instrumentalities and in bank repurchase agreements. It may also invest to a limited extent in equity securities.

Investments held by the Murray State University Foundation are comprised of private donations received directly by the University and consist of expendable restricted funds as well as endowments. Assets held by the Murray State University Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) are invested primarily in an investment pool managed by the Foundation and are carried at fair value. As of June 30, 2003, the assets in the pool are invested as follows: securities of the U.S. government and its agencies, 1%; mutual funds invested in equity securities, 45%; mutual funds invested in fixed income securities, 47%; certificates of deposit, 1% and other 6%.

Note 3. Prior Year Carryovers and Encumbrances

Budget revisions for prior year carryovers and prior year encumbrance carryovers are based on actual balances brought forward to date from fiscal year 2002-03.



Note 1. BASIS OF REVENUE RECOGNITION

Accrual basis accounting is used to recognize interest earnings on the Investment Report.

Note 2. INVESTMENT POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

POLICIES

<u>Scope</u>: This investment policy applies to activities of the University with regard to investing the financial assets of all funds, including those maintained by:

- I. the Commonwealth of Kentucky's treasury,
- II. local depositories, and
- III. external trustees and investment managers.

Written procedures will indicate which funds are covered under each of the previously mentioned investment structures.

Goals: Consistent with state statutes and administrative regulations, the goals of the University's investment program are:

- preservation and maintenance of the real purchasing power of the principal in the portfolios,
- maintenance of sufficient liquidity to meet normal and foreseeable expenditures, and
- attainment of the greatest possible dollar return to the University while observing statutory and policy constraints.

<u>Investment Objective</u>: The investment objective is to produce a yield that when compared to the current marketplace, would be described as competitive by investment managers.

Strategy: The University's investment strategy is designed to match the life of the assets with the date liability occurs.

Delegation of Authority:

General: The Treasurer is responsible for investment decisions and activities, under the direction of the Board of Regents. The Treasurer shall develop and maintain written administrative procedures for the operation of the investment program, consistent with these policies. Such procedures shall include explicit delegation of authority to persons responsible for investment transactions. No person shall engage in an investment transaction except as provided under the terms of this policy and the procedures established by the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be responsible for all transactions undertaken and shall establish a system of controls to regulate the activities of subordinate investment personnel.

Bond Funds: With regard to bond funds, the investment/reinvestment (on instruments authorized by the bond indenture and resolutions) by the trustee(s) shall be directed from time to time by the Treasurer.

Note 2. INVESTMENT POLICIES AND PROCEDURES (cont'd)

<u>Minimal Non-Cash Investment Transactions</u>: In order to correct stock transfer errors or dispose of small non-cash investments, the Treasurer is authorized to sell or otherwise dispose of items less than \$25,000.

<u>Reporting</u>: The Treasurer and the Vice President for Finance and Administrative Services shall submit quarterly investment reports to the President and Board of Regents. These reports will include investment data for investment securities held at the end of the reporting period.

PROCEDURES

Specific investment procedures are contained within the full "Investment Policies and Procedures" as approved by the Board of Regents on May 14, 1994, and last revised on June 18, 2004.

Note 3. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

The University currently uses commercial banks and the Commonwealth of Kentucky for its depositories. Deposits with commercial banks are covered by Federal depository insurance or collateral held by the bank in the University's name. University funds deposited with the State Treasurer are pooled with funds from other state agencies. These state pooled deposits are substantially covered by federal depository insurance or by the collateral held by the bank in the state's name. The investments of the University not held by the state investment pool are insured, registered, or held by the University or by an agent of the University.

Beginning July 1, 2002, the University determined that the private donations received by Murray State University Foundation on behalf of the University were not to be recorded as assets of the University. The University will continue to report as assets those private donations received directly by the University and held by the Foundation for investment purposes. The University posts its investment earnings from the Foundation pool on an annual basis, at June 30 each year. Therefore, the MSU Foundation Investment Pool earnings reflected in this report will appear in fourth quarter, June 30, financial reports.

Note 4. CURRENT FUNDS - LOCAL BANK ACCOUNT

Effective June 1, 2001, the University entered into a banking contract with Firstar Bank, NA of Bowling Green, Kentucky, currently US Bank. This contract stipulates that interest earnings will be based on the Federal Funds target rate less .25%.

Interest earnings may be expended in the Current Fund.

Note 5. CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL BUILDING AND REVENUE BOND FUND (CEBRB)

This fund was created as a result of the trust indenture established when the first Consolidated Educational Building Revenue Bonds were sold in the 1960's, as a depository of tuition and fees in order to provide funds to service the principal and interest debt requirements of each series of aforementioned bonds. The fund also supports the Educational and General Funds operations.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky Office of Financial Management invests available funds of the University's CEBRB fund in the State's investment pool.

All interest earnings are transferred to Consolidated Educational Renewal and Replacement (CERR) fund at the end of each quarter according to the Board's approval for renewal and replacement projects.

Note 6. AUXILIARY FUNDS - HOUSING AND DINING REVENUE FUND

This fund was created, as a result of the trust indenture established when the first Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds were sold in the 1960's as a depository of all auxiliary income in order to provide funds to service the principal and interest debt requirement of each series of aforementioned bonds. The fund also supports the Auxiliary Fund operations.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky Office of Financial Management invests available funds of the University's housing and dining fund in the State's investment pool.

ote 7. ENDOWMENT FUND INVESTMENTS

REGIONAL UNIVERSITY ENDOWMENT TRUST (RUETF)

As of June 30, 2004, the University has been awarded a total of \$8,490,787 by the Commonwealth of Kentucky for endowed faculty positions and scholarships. These funds were awarded based on the University meeting the matching requirement with private funds. The proceeds were deposited with the Murray State University Foundation for investment purposes. Earnings are transferred to the University's Restricted Fund for program expenditures.

Note 7. ENDOWMENT FUND INVESTMENTS (cont'd)

ENDOWED CHAIR

During 1987, the University was awarded \$500,000 by the Commonwealth of Kentucky for an Endowed Chair for Eco-Systems Studies. University discretion, within the Board Policy, is used to invest these funds. Ten percent of the total earnings are returned to the Endowment investment pool. Ninety percent of the earnings are transferred to the University's Restricted Fund (Endowed Chair Grant) for program expenditures.

Note 8. CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL RENEWAL AND REPLACEMENT (CERR)

As established by the Board of Regents in March 1982, CERR provides a plant fund sub-group so that funds transferred from CEBRB could be accumulated for future projects of repair and renovation.

The University invests the proceeds in the same manner as CEBRB in Note 5.

Interest earnings remain within the fund for future projects.

Note 9. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - SERIES G REVENUE BOND

This capital construction clearing account holds the proceeds from the University's Series G bond sale until such time as they are needed for specific capital construction projects.

The University issued \$14,785,000 in Series G revenue bonds dated December 1, 1987. The proceeds are to be used to pay costs of repair, renovation, construction or addition to buildings on the campus of Murray State University that are and shall be a part of the Consolidated Educational Building Project. This project was established and created by the Board of Regents on April 20, 1961.

The University invests the proceeds in the same manner as CEBRB in Note 5.

Interest earnings on Series G can be spent on the Industry and Technology Building project or any other Educational and General project the Board and State approves.

Note 10. RETIREMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS - CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL SINKING FUND (CESF)

This fund was created, as a result of the first trust indenture established when the Consolidated Educational Building and Revenue bonds were sold in the 1960's, to provide a sinking fund to pay debt principal and interest expense on all related CEBRB bonds. The amount of interest earned is part of the formula for annual funding of CERR projects. (See Note 5)

Interest earnings are used to reduce the amount of semi-annual debt service transferred from University Unrestricted Educational and General Fund to this sinking fund. Bond requirements mandate a minimum reserve of \$1,977,108.

Note 11. RETIREMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS - HOUSING AND DINING SINKING FUND

This fund was created, as a result of the trust indenture established when the first Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds were sold in the 1960's, to provide a sinking fund to pay debt principal and interest expense on related Housing and Dining Revenue Bonds.

Interest earnings are retained in the fund for future use. Bond requirements mandate a minimum reserve of \$1,153,896.

Note 12. HOUSING AND DINING REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE RESERVE FUND

This fund was created, as a result of the establishment of the trust indenture in Note 6, to provide a fund to pay for extraordinary repairs, not paid from the Auxiliary Fund, to the Housing and Dining System buildings.

Interest earnings are retained in the fund for future use. The use is determined by Board of Regents resolution and the indentures. Current bond requirements mandate a minimum reserve of \$1,115,250.

Note 13. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - SERIES N HOUSING AND DINING REVENUE BOND

This capital construction clearing account holds the proceeds from the University's Series N bond sale until such time as they are needed for specific capital construction projects.

The University issued \$6,370,000 in Series N revenue bonds dated April 1, 1999. The proceeds are to be used to pay costs of certain fire safety and maintenance improvements to buildings on the campus of Murray State University that are and shall be a part of the Housing and Dining System. This system was established and created by the Board of Regents on September 1, 1965.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky invests the proceeds in a pooled account with other state agency bond proceeds.

Interest earnings on Series N can be spent on fire safety improvements and maintenance of certain housing facilities as approved by the Board and State.

Note 14. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - SERIES O HOUSING AND DINING REVENUE BOND

This capital construction clearing account holds the proceeds from the University's Series O bond sale until such time as they are needed for specific capital construction projects.

The University issued \$1,610,000 in Series O revenue bonds dated June 1, 2001. The proceeds are to be used to pay costs of replacement of water supply lines, replacement of a heating boiler, and installation of electrical tap connections for fire pumps for certain buildings on the campus of Murray State University that are and shall be a part of the Housing and Dining System. This system was established and created by the Board of Regents on September 1, 1965.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky invests the proceeds in a pooled account with other state agency bond proceeds.

Interest earnings on Series O can be spent on improvements and maintenance of certain housing facilities as approved by the Board and State.

Note 15. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - SERIES P HOUSING AND DINING REVENUE BONDS

This capital construction clearing account holds the proceeds from the University's Series P bond sale until such time as they are needed for specific capital construction projects.

The University issued \$2,500,000 in Series P revenue bonds dated June 1, 2003. The proceeds are to be used for the renovation of Winslow Cafeteria on the campus of Murray State University that is and shall be a part of the Housing and Dining System. This system was established and created by the Board of Regents on September 1, 1965.

The Commonwealth of Kentucky invests the proceeds in a pooled account with other state agency bond proceeds.

Interest earnings on Series P can be spent on improvements and maintenance of certain housing facilities as approved by the Board and State.

Note 16. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - WELLNESS CENTER

This capital construction clearing account holds the proceeds from the City of Murray's Wellness Center bond sale until such time as they are needed for specific capital construction projects.

The City of Murray issued \$10,000,000 in general obligation bonds on December 1, 2002. On December 30, 2002, the University entered into an agreement with the City of Murray to pay all debt service on this issue from pledged student fees.

The University has invested the funds in a restricted account within the Commonwealth of Kentucky investment pool, which combines the investments of other state agency bond proceeds. Interest earned on this issue can be spent on the Wellness Center facility, as approved by the Board, State, and City.

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MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY ENDOWMENT MATCH PROGRAM 2003-04 Summary Report

This report summarizes the programmatic and financial results of the Endowment Match Program at Murray State University. During Fiscal Year 2003-04, Murray State University submitted requests for \$3,259,000 in state matching funds to expand two scholarship endowments that had previously received state matching funds (James M. and Mary Moore Lassiter) and sixteen scholarship and two mission support endowments that had not been previously matched with state funds.

Endowment Activity

Since the Endowment Match Program's inception in 1998, two endowed chairs and four professorships have been established. During 2003-04, the Arthur J. Bauernfeind Endowed Chair in Business was occupied by Dr. David Durr, who has an excellent record in teaching, research and service and who brings significant expertise to the area of financial planning. Dr. Durr has had an immediate impact in the Economics and Finance Department by successfully developing and receiving approval to establish the Certified Financial Planning Program (CFP) at Murray State University. Expectations are that this will enhance the reputation of the College and University in the broader business community.

Although no other endowed chairs or professorships were filled during 2003-04, two professorships were filled for the 2004-05 academic year which will be reflected in next year's annual report. Daniel Anderson will fill the Rayburn and Nancy Spann Watkins Endowed Visiting Professorship in Creative Writing. Mr. Anderson is considered to be one of America's foremost young poets and has published two books of poetry, four anthologies, over thirty poems in literary journals and reviews and seven articles and reviews in prominent literary journals. Veronica Russell, an African American elementary teacher on memorandum of agreement from Christian County Schools, will fill the Ashland Oil College of Education Professorship. The other endowed chair and the professorships will be advertised on a case by case basis as soon as sufficient earnings have accumulated.

A total of twenty-one endowed scholarships and three mission support endowments have also been established. These results are summarized in Table 1.

Demographic Information

Because only one endowed faculty position was occupied during 2003-04, reportable demographic data are limited as indicated in Tables 2 & 3 below. However, every effort is being made to assure that qualified female and minority candidates are given due consideration for these positions once adequate earnings have accumulated. A highly focused plan has been implemented to assure that qualified minorities are aware of the opportunity to fill these positions once they are advertised. The recent filling of the Ashland Professorship by an African American female (2004-05), as mentioned above, demonstrates the early success of these efforts. Major elements of this plan include the following.

- A member of the MSU Affirmative Action Office will serve on search committees.
- African Americans will be actively recruited through the Southern Regional Educational Board - Minority Recruiting Office.
- Personal contacts will be used to promote the positions at historically Black institutions.
- Advertisements will be placed in the African American Register and <u>Black Issues in Higher Education</u>.

Although the number of scholarships awarded to minorities continues to represent a small number of the total awards, their share of the total has increased from about 2% in 2002-03 to just over 4.5% in the current year. In addition, more than twice as many awards were made to African Americans compared to the prior year. As mentioned in last year's report, the small number of awards given to minority recipients from these scholarship endowments likely resulted from the availability of two other major scholarship funds devoted to minority students. Scholarships from these other funds totaled \$254,858 and were awarded to 41 males of the following ethnicity; 38 Black, 2 Hispanic and 1 other and 63 females of the following ethnicity; 58 Black, 1 Hispanic, 1 White, and 3 Other totaling 104 awards during 2003-04.

Sources of Funds, Earnings and Expenditures

During fiscal year 2003-04, Murray State University received \$3,259,000 in state matching funds to expand 18 endowed scholarships and two mission support endowments (Table 6). None of these newly matched endowments were specifically established to support the Telecommunications Systems Management (TSM) program, Murray State's Program of Distinction. However, five of the newly matched endowed scholarships: Adams (nursing, health sciences, engineering), \$40,000; Anderson Home Economics (nutrition and wellness) \$142,549; Pittman (biology and chemistry) \$20,000; Morgan Sisk (aquatic and fishery study) \$75,209; and Witter (nursing) \$50,000 are concentrated in studies related to new economy categories. These endowments represent approximately 10% of the total amount appropriated.

As of June 30, 2004, the total market value of the 30 endowment accounts established under the Endowment Matching Program was \$17,943,770 (Table 7). Total State Funds received equals \$8,490,787 of which \$3,259,000 was received during 2003-04. Total private gifts received equal \$7,696,334. Foundation records show an outstanding balance of \$794,453 in unpaid pledges on these accounts, or approximately 9.4% of the total amount pledged.

Murray State University filled one of its endowed chairs and had expenditures of \$47,967 supporting that endeavor. As indicated above, two of the available professorships have been filled in fiscal year 2004-05. Scholarship awards totaled \$227,677.

Table 5 was not included because none of the current endowments are dedicated to Murray State's Program of Distinction (TSM) and the first paragraph above (Sources of Funds, Earnings and Expenditures) summarizes the scholarship endowments that address new economy initiatives.

THE TOM W. HUTCHENS ENDOWED PROFESSORSHIP

DESCRIPTION

Established: October 20, 1999

Purpose: As the first named professorship in the College of Business and Public Affairs, this endowment will provide a small salary stipend and supplemental program support for an individual with both national and international teaching experience and a good publishing record to bring scholarly recognition to Murray State in general and to the AACSB – accredited College of Business and Public Affairs in particular.

The activity associated with this endowment will be located in the College of Business and Public Affairs.

The Professorship was vacant during the reporting period, but the search for a suitable candidate has begun, and it will be filled, depending on the state budget and the level of available earnings in the endowment.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

The Professorship will lead and enhance existing efforts of the College of Business and Public Affairs in various entrepreneurship/partnership areas. These include:

- Executives on Campus Program: where business owners and managers from area businesses are invited to speak to students on campus on business and industry realities.
- 2. Faculty Externships: under which the Hutchens Professorship will lead and coordinate efforts for faculty short-term attachments to companies in an effort at bridging the gap between what they teach and corporate realities, thereby ensuring that our college continues to fulfill the needs of business by graduating students with the requisite diagnostic, communications, technology and cross-cultural skills that are relevant to success in the business world.

It is anticipated that these initiatives will not only lead to innovative business practices but also to a closer working relationship with existing area businesses and entrepreneurs. This, in turn, will lead to enhanced opportunities for job creation, revenue growth, and an improved standard of living for West Kentuckians.

The holder of the Tom W. Hutchens Professorship will be expected to help enhance Murray State University's reputation in intellectual contributions. This will be accomplished by developing a solid record of peer-reviewed publications, publishing in reputable journals and successful membership on the editorial boards of leading national

and international journals and involvement in the maintenance of AACSB – International accreditation.

It is anticipated that the innovative programs that are expected to result from this professorship will help in the recruitment and retention of both graduate and undergraduate students, who aspire to identify with reputable business programs. As part of an already well established foundation and reputation for high quality instruction and research in the College of Business and Public Affairs, the Tom W. Hutchens Professor is expected to assist in student recruitment and retention via the Road Scholars and Residential College programs at Murray State University, accreditation efforts, and direct contact with alumni and friends of the College.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

There were no expenditures recorded in this account during 2003-04. A formal budget will be established as soon as someone is appointed to the Professorship. Expenditures will likely be split between instruction and academic support activities and be allocated for a small salary stipend for the professor plus funding for an upper-level student assistant or a graduate research assistant. Additional funding would go to travel, computer facilities and other supplemental support. Total cumulated earnings available for the operating budget as of June 30, 2004 equaled \$13,949.

RAYBURN AND NANCY SPANN WATKINS ENDOWED VISITING PROFESSORSHIP

Established: October 4, 1999

Purpose: The purpose of this endowment is to establish an Endowed Visiting Professorship in Creative Writing to be housed in the Department of English and Philosophy in the College of Humanities and Fine Arts. The position is competitive and is designed to bring faculty of national scholarly recognition to Murray State University. The ideal candidate will hold an MFA or equivalent degree and will be an emerging, published and nationally respected author, poet or playwright who has teaching experience.

The Professorship was vacant during the 2003-04 reporting period. This Professorship was created as an endowment and added to an existing position in the Department of English and Philosophy. A search was completed in spring 2004, and Daniel Anderson was hired to fill the Professorship for the 2004-05 academic year.

Professor Anderson received his advanced degree at John Hopkins University. He has published two books of Poetry (<u>Drunk in Sunlight</u> and <u>January Rain</u>), and edited <u>The Selected Poems of Howard Nemerov</u> (a New York Times 2003 "Notable Book"). He has published over thirty poems in literary journals and reviews, and his creative works have been included in four published Anthologies. Additionally, Professor Anderson has published seven articles and reviews in prominent literary journals. He is considered to be one of America's foremost young poets.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

The Nancy and Rayburn Watkins Endowed Visiting Professorship will be used to augment and support the department's Creative Writing Program. Currently, the university provides excellent support for the program through the support of a reading series and the Jesse Stuart Writer's Symposium. The individual appointed to this professorship will be responsible for enhancing these series with additional programming. The long-range plans for the program include the development of a MFA that will be delivered as a low-residency program. Thus, the endowment interest will also support graduate student research and development.

The Nancy and Rayburn Watkins Endowed Visiting Professor will be an active author, poet or playwright whose creative works will be broadly disseminated through publication lecture venues and workshops. While there may be an expectation for participation on editorial boards or with scholarly organizations, such as the Kentucky Humanities Council, such connections will be determined by the specific appointments.

In conjunction with the MFA program in creative writing, increased funding to support graduate students is anticipated. This would include funding for recruitment, graduate stipends and scholarships, stipends for faculty directing thesis projects and support for graduate student research, and dissemination of scholarly productions. It is hoped that these initiatives will have a positive effect upon recruiting and retaining students, on the development of a distinctive program in creative writing, and on the attainment of goals in research/publication productivity.

A well-educated workforce and quality of life available to employees are two significant criteria used by companies and industry to determine suitable sights for relocation. The development of a distinctive program in creative writing helps to address both of these criteria. Chief Executive Officers across the United States recognize the importance of employees who can make connections between disciplines and cultures, solve problems creatively, clearly articulate their ideas, and have a broad literacy and understanding of the past. The improvement of the "quality of life" within a region or town assists growth and economic development. One measure of a state's 'livability' is the availability of intellectually stimulating, entertaining, and/or enlightening activities.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

There were no expenditures recorded in this account during 2003-04. A formal budget is being established since the Professorship has been filled for the 2004-05 academic year. The broad bulk of the endowment earnings are expected to support instructional activities. This would likely consist of operating funds to support travel and programming costs and to underwrite publications and presentations to communities and schools. Total cumulated earnings available for the operating budget as of June 30, 2004 equaled \$26,524.

ASHLAND OIL COLLEGE OF EDUCATION ENDOWED PROFESSORSHIP

Established: December 3, 1999

Purpose: The purpose of this endowment is to establish an Endowed Professorship in the College of Education. The professorship will be designed to enhance collaboration with the public schools in elementary, middle and/or high school education.

The professorship was vacant during 2003-04. The College of Education is using the Endowed Professorship funds to create the Ashland Oil College of Education Distinguished Practitioner/Lecturer position to augment and support the salary and activities of a position within the College of Education to attract qualified African American candidates from the public schools. If the candidate does not hold a terminal degree, the funds could be used to support a person in pursuit of such a degree, supporting the university's desire to enhance the number of minority faculty on campus. During 2004-05, the position will be filled by Veronica Russell, an African American elementary teacher on a memorandum of agreement from Christian County Schools. In addition, funds may be used to support professional development activities to enhance the recipient's skills.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

The primary focus of the professorship is to facilitate university faculty and public school teachers and administrators to explore collaborative partnerships and relationships to enhance teacher-training quality. Current demands and legislation such as No Child Left Behind underscore the need for such collaboration. With this in mind, the recipient of the Ashland Oil College of Education Endowed Professorship (Distinguished Practitioner/Lecturer) will be responsible for participating in the planning and development of programs which will afford teacher education candidates experiences in programs demonstrating current best practices at both the university and the public school levels. Research has shown that undergraduate students do benefit from such programs and experiences derived from collaboration between the public schools and colleges.

It is recognized that an educated populace is necessary to sustain economic growth and a high standard of living in a society. A cadre of highly qualified public school teachers and administrators trained in current best practices of the profession will contribute to the achievement of this goal in Kentucky. This endowed professorship will contribute to the College of Education's efforts in this endeavor.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

There were no expenditures recorded in this account during 2003-04. A formal budget will be established as soon as someone is appointed to the professorship. The plan is to use the endowment earnings for instruction by augmenting and supporting the salary of the endowed professor to attract the highest quality candidate for the position. The recipient of the professorship will be placed in an existing unit and will be provided clerical support, a computer and computer support services as well as travel funds to assist in public school collaboration. Total cumulated earnings available for the operating budget as of June 30, 2004 equaled \$22,846.

The Center for Banking and Finance

DESCRIPTION

Established: October 16, 1996

Purpose:

The endowment for the Center for Banking and Finance, located in the Department of Economics and Finance in the College of Business and Public Affairs, will provide funding for the following:

- An endowed professorship to supply a salary supplement and related expenses such as travel and other professional expenses for the Center Director/Endowed Professor.
- Scholarships and other expenses such as the bank simulation game, financial data bases, etc., for students majoring in banking and finance.
- Speakers on current financial topics, training for financial professionals and/or sponsoring financial educational classes in conjunction with the Kentucky Bankers Association.
- Increasing the number of internships and co-op opportunities for MSU students as the Center strives to develop stronger relationships between MSU and financial institutions.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

Dr. Steve Lacewell, Associate Professor of Finance, has been selected as Coordinator/Director of the Center for Banking and Finance. A proposal to a major private donor has been made to turn this into a named professorship. This has not yet been finalized with negotiations to continue in 2004-2005.

During the reporting period 2003-04, the Center Director (Dr. Lacewell), the College Dean (Dr. Harrison), and MSU's SBDC Director (Mr. Johnson) met with approximately 180 bankers throughout West Kentucky, Southern Illinois, and West Tennessee to share information regarding the Center and the SBDC and internships and permanent employment opportunities for MSU students/graduates. A number of "Let's Keep Them at Home" internship programs for Murray State students have been established resulting in a number of internships/co-ops being filled.

The Center Director, along with a number of students, is working in one major city in West Kentucky on an "Opportunity Loan Fund Committee" and is in the process of establishing another such committee in another location. These committees will review

applications for loans from a special pool of money for minority business ventures. This provides Murray State University students an excellent opportunity to obtain real-world experience while also helping the local business community.

Additional activities of the Center this year have included management training programs to local financial institutions; a bank management simulation program; and the purchase of financial information and banking data for use by faculty and students in research and the classroom. The above-mentioned activities will continue during 2004-2005 as well as research/publications by the Center Director and possibly host seminars by industry experts for area bank executives, employees, students, and faculty.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Center activities for 2003-04 were funded from non-endowment sources as the endowment funds were not established in time to post earnings for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2004.

- Recipients shall have and maintain a minimum 3.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale.

Awarding of scholarships will be the responsibility of the University Scholarship Office in accordance with recommendations made by the MSU Foundation Scholarship Committee subject to the qualifying criteria detailed above.

During 2003-04, thirty-two scholarships were awarded from this endowment fund.

PROGRAM INFORMATION

The Mary Moore Lassiter Scholarship recipients are expected to be actively involved in industry-college linkages that have been developed in the College of Business and Public Affairs including the Executives on Campus Program and visits to area businesses to familiarize themselves with emerging business practices in the area and region. They are also encouraged to consider student internships as well as international exchange programs.

As students in good academic standing, recipients of the Mary Moore Lassiter Scholarship are encouraged to pursue graduate studies at Murray State University, whereupon they may become graduate research assistants. In this role, they will be expected to help faculty in their research, thereby raising the number and quality of faculty peer-reviewed publications in reputable journals. Specific acknowledgement will be made by the respective professors of the scholarship recipients' role in these intellectual contributions.

Increasing the number of endowed scholarships will also assist the university in its efforts to increase enrollment and retention in accordance with Commonwealth goals.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

During the reporting period, scholarship awards totaled \$35,825. The size of the endowment was increased by a total of \$890,004 during the year. However, the funds were received too late to generate additional earnings for scholarship awards in 2003-04.

While scholarship is important, determination, need and motivation of the applicant should take precedence in this evaluation.

Recipients of the scholarship may reapply during the period they are earning their undergraduate degree. Previous recipients of the scholarship will have priority over new applicants if they are successfully pursuing a degree in preparation for a career in the mining or quarry industries. To be eligible for subsequent years, recipients must have and maintain a minimum of a 2.0 G.P.A. on a 4.0 scale. Two scholarships were awarded during 2003-04.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

In order that the Fund shall continue to grow, a portion of the endowment earnings shall be added to the principal of the endowment each year.
