Lynch whose term had expired. On December 17, 1987, Mr. Kendrick was administered the Oath of Office and participated in an orientation session for the new member.

<u>Audited Financial Statements for 1986-87 Presented</u>

Mr. Gerald L. Von Deylen and Mr. Donald C. Moore of Arthur Andersen & Co. of Louisville presented the Audited Financial Statements for 1986-87 and the attached "Discussion Material" including the Management Recommendation Letter.

Mr. Von Deylen and Mr. Moore presented orally highlights of the reports, stating "We have rendered an <u>unqualified opinion</u> on the financial statements of Murray State University as of June 30, 1987 and for the year then ended.

Mr. Taylor congratulated everyone for the success of the audit.

Report of the President

President Stroup thanked the Board for attending the luncheon and discussion yesterday with West Kentucky Legislators and for attending and supporting the Higher Education Rally. She presented the attached report and briefly highlighted it, stating that

On December 10, bids were let on Phase I of the Industry and Technology Building with Crouch Construction Company being the successful bidder and that digging at the baseball field has begun.

- 2. In November, liability insurance coverage was obtained. David Whitmire and Jim Cofer had worked on that for quite some time. You will note the considerable difference in the policy premium before and the present cost. To insure protection, it is important to have all policies and procedures in effect.
- 3. The legal action against Murray State brought by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, which had to do with asbestos removal in Swann Hall, has been dismissed.
- 4. Attention is called to the report of the School University Collaborative Services. There are over 225 individual projects with school systems throughout West Kentucky. All faculty across the University increased efforts to work with the school systems in our area and this report is testimony to the extent to which they perform those valuable services. Please congratulate them; it is above the normal set of responsibilities in a department.
- 5. Regent Bob Carter, Vice President Perrin and I recently met with over 100 University employees in the Hopkinsville area. With the Breathitt Veterinary Center and Fort Campbell program, the University has a large number of employees in Hopkinsville. We had never brought them together and made an extensive effort to make them a part of the campus. We will begin to bring employees who work a distance from the campus to campus. We also have spent time at Fort Campbell in solidifying our relationships there.
- 6. Attachment B in your packet is a statement on the part of the Paducah Leadership group about dreams for higher education in Paducah. Some members of the Board joined the group about two weeks ago for a meeting in Paducah with the leaders of the community, higher education individuals, and a consultant from the Florida State campus in Panama City.
- 7. The Cabinet continued with strategic planning in January. Penny Wade, who is now with AASCU, joined us and we reviewed Murray State's accomplishments against some of the national reports. In many areas that have been recommended for quality institutions, Murray State is in the forefront in initiatives from outcomes assessment to agreements with other universities to off-campus delivery to the adult learner.
 - 8. Enrollment this spring semester is up 4.5%.
- 9. The University has donated the scoreboard from the old baseball field to Murray High School.
- 10. Included in your packet is an outline of activities of the President, the listing of upcoming events for your calendars, copies of editorials and letters regarding the Governor's budget, the publication of the Bicentennial Celebration of the Constitution, recruitment and retention information, and various news clips.
- 11. The Center for Ecosystems Studies has initiated six new Kentucky Lake research projects: a) a joint venture with TVA to control the rapid spread of "millfoil," a fast growing weed found in area lakes and considered a nuisance, b) a project with TVA to determine specific characteristics of populations of channel and blue catfishes in Kentucky Lake, c) an examination of the factors affecting the Lake's production of fishes born within the current year, d) a study of the relationship between freshwater mussel production and varying environmental factors, e) a determination of the lake's redox boundaries (areas near the lake bottom where the concentration level of oxygen in the water changes dramatically), and f) a database management/georeferenced computer system that stores information about the Lake and its surrounding environment.

Report of the Alumni Association

For the President of the MSU Alumni Association. Director of Alumni Affairs Donna Herndon presented the Association's report.

Mrs. Herndon reminded the Regents that the Alumni Banquet is scheduled for April 30, with a reception at 6:00 p.m., and dinner at 7:00 p.m. She stated that Jeff Green of Mayfield was elected Vice President of the Alumni Association for 1988-89, that recipients of this year's Golden Horseshoe Awards will be J. William (Bill) Carneal, Mrs. Lochie Hart, George R. "Scrappy" Sheridan, Dr. Richard H. Stout, and Governor Harry Lee Waterfield, and that this year's Distinguished Alumnus Awards will go to Dr. Wanda Bigham, President of Marycrest (Iowa) College; Dr. Doug Harris, Vice President of Knight-Ridder, Inc., Miami; and Dr. Frank Miller, Professor and Chairman, Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology, University of Arkansas.

Mrs. Herndon stated that President Fred Schultz has sent letters to legislators and alumni regarding the State's revenue shortfall and funding for higher education. She thanked Regent Hurt for his hospitality to the Frankfort Alumni Chapter and the MSU Chamber Choir. She reported that the Association contributed \$1,000 to pay student expenses to the Higher Education Rally in Frankfort and that the Association will be awarding \$80,000 plus in scholarships within the next few weeks.

For the Board, Chairman Beasley thanked the Alumni Association for contributing the \$1,000 for student expenses.

Sandra Rogers appointed Executive Secretary to President

President Stroup introduced Sandra Rogers and recommended her appointment as Executive Secretary to the President. She stated Mrs. Rogers was employed as Executive Secretary to the Vice President for University Relations and Development and she has approximately 20 years experience at Murray State. The President reported that Mrs. Rogers holds the B. S. in Business Education from Murray State and has done graduate work toward the Master's.

Mrs. LaFollette moved that the Board approve the appointment of Sandra M. Rogers as Executive Secretary to the President of Murray State University effective February 8, 1988, at an annual salary of \$21,000. Mr. Nichols seconded and the following voted: Dr. Hammack, yes; Dr. Hurt, yes; Mr. Kendrick, yes; Mrs. LaFollette, yes; Mr. Nichols, yes; Mrs. Strohecker, yes; Mr. Taylor, yes; and Mr. Beasley, yes. Motion carried.

Dr. Lewis L. Bossing appointed Interim Chair of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education

President Stroup stated that Dr. Truman Whitfield, current Chair of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, has requested that he be permitted to step down as chair and return to full-time teaching. She recommended that Dr. Lewis Bossing be appointed Interim Chair of the Department, stating that Dr. Bossing holds the B. A. and M. S. from Kansas

State Teachers College and the Ph.D. in Education and Psychology from George Peabody College of Vanderbilt University and that Dr. Bossing has been a member of the Murray State faculty since 1975.

Dr. Hammack moved that the Board approve the appointment of Dr. Lewis L. Bossing, Professor of Education, as Interim Chair of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, effective July 1, 1988. Mrs. Strohecker seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

President Stroup called for questions on Items 8 C-G.

Policy and Guidelines on Educational Business Activities, Approved

President Stroup stated growing concerns have been expressed that institutions of higher education unfairly compete with the nation's small businesses and that within the past year these concerns have been the subject of congressional hearings by the Subcommittee on Oversight of the House Ways and Means Committee and of meetings of the General Assembly's Special Task Force on Small Business. She added that over the years, Murray State has tried to be sensitive to potential concerns of the neighboring business community. We feel that the University's past record in this regard is a positive one; however, this policy is recommended as further evidence of the University's commitment to recognizing its responsibility when educational business activities are created and operated to serve the campus community.

Dr. Stroup reported that the National Association of College and University Business Officers proposed a similar statement for guidelines, that we have reviewed the U. K. statement, and that this statement has been reviewed by our attorney.

Mr. Nichols moved that the following Policy and Guidelines on Educational Business Activities be approved. Mr. Taylor seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Policy and Guidelines on Educational Business Activities

The mission of Murray State University encompasses, but is not limited to, the functions of instruction, research, and public service. The functions referred to hereinabove necessitate support efforts in varying degrees. University decisions relating to education—related activities are designed to meet the needs of students, faculty, staff, and members of the public. The University often finds it desirable and/or necessary to charge fees in connection with goods and services that enhance, promote or support its activities.

Educational business activities shall be established and carried on pursuant to the policy of the University as expressed in its rules and regulations together with contractual understandings. Further, it is expressly understood that the University operates under the overall guidance of applicable federal and state law.

Each educational business activity shall take into consideration the following:

- The activity is deemed to be directly related to a. the fulfillment of the University's educational research, public service and campus support functions together with any other educational functions not specifically stated. The profit motive shall not be the primary consideration in a decision to engage in an educational business activity.
- b. The activity is needed to provide goods or services deemed necessary and/or desirable by the University at a reasonable price, on reasonable terms, and at a convenient location and time.
- The activity is carried out for the primary c. benefit of the campus community but with sensitivity to the total community.

Report on Possible Earnings Tax in Murray

Committee Reports and Recommendations

Α. Academic Affairs Dr. Booth

Dr. Booth reviewed the requested departmental name changes and stated that each department believes the respective name change will more accurately reflect the departmental course offerings and its service role. President Stroup stated she concurred with the recommendations.

Mr. Taylor moved that the Board approve name changes for the following academic departments effective July 1, 1988:

Department of Sociology and Anthropology be changed to the

Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Social Work Department of Mathematics

be changed to the

Department of Mathematics and Statistics

Department of Political Science and Legal Studies

be changed to the

Department of Political Science, Criminal Justice and Legal Studies

Mr. Nichols seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Athletics -Dr. Perrin

Dr. Perrin reviewed the attached NCAA and OVC legislative programs and reports on Intercollegiate Athletic revenue and expenditures.

Dr. Hurt stated he felt for some reason the NCAA and the OVC skirt the issue of taking a strong position with regard to drugs. NCAA legislation deals with a voluntary program. He asked are there constitutional reasons why the NCAA and the OVC cannot write into its bylaws that upon violation a student would be barred from participating in intercollegiate athletics? If that can be done, he stated he found it difficult to understand why there is a reluctance to do it.

Dr. Perrin responded stating that in his opinion the NCAA has been aggressive in its approach to drug usage by athletes and sited that test results have indicated there is very little drug usage by athletes when compared to the student body in general. He further stated that constitutionally, the problem with Conference rules, institutional rules, and NCAA legislation is anytime one class of people is declared different from the general student body, you are on thin ice. Therefore, institutions and conferences have been reluctant to introduce and implement broad-based mandatory testing programs.

Dr. Hammack expressed appreciation for this approach to accounting of expenditures and stated it determines precisely what the cost of athletic programs are. The Athletic Commission did the rational thing when it set up guidelines for athletic expenditures. At the same time, the guidelines have increased dramatically, a big leap in the last couple of years. He stated he thought it is important when the Board makes additions to athletic expenditures that it be fully aware of the impact that has on the guidelines for athletic expenditures. Dr. Hammack recommended that every time recommendations are made to the Board for a new position or funding for new programming in athletics that the Board be given data of what that will do to the guidelines for athletic expenditures.

Dr. Hammack observed that the Board's Athletic Task force looked at two sides of budget problems with athletics. One was expenditures; the other was to emphasize the need to increase athletic revenues. In looking at the athletic revenue for 1985, 1986, and 1987, it appears that efforts have been unsuccessful; it seems greater attention needs to be paid to the revenue side.

Chairman Beasley stated that the recommendation that the Board looks at expenditures on the basis of what the guidelines state is a very good one.

Dr. Perrin stated that we are beginning to use the Commission report more as a proactive rather than reactive document, that when we do bring recommendations to the Board, we do state what impact that would have on the guidelines as well as what impact it will have on expenditures and revenue. He reported regarding the revenue questions that we are hit by declining ticket sales, that we have improved our ticket procedures, that we have not had the attendance we would have liked, and that we are attempting to do a better job of promoting ticket sales. He pointed out that student activity fee revenue for 1984-85 is listed \$166,000. That was what we thought we should be receiving; it drops to \$108,000 in 1985-86. For 1985-86, we reported a lower Activity Fee level due to the difference between what had been approved in 1982-83 and what had actually been implemented. This had nothing to do with student activity fee collections; it simply was our own reporting procedures. In 1987-88, that student activity fee revenue will be approximately \$175,000 because of changes in the fee the Board has made.

Mr. Taylor stated the Board needs to be aware that the Prichard Committee recommended that athletics stand on its own and that if this recommendation surfaces, it should be made known that Murray State is not in a major metropolitan area as is U.K. and the University of Louisville.

c. Finance/Audit - Mr. Nichols

For the Finance/Audit Committee, Mr. Nichols recommended the Board accept the Audited Financial Statement for 1986-87, and that the Minutes so reflect the acceptance.

Mr. Nichols moved that the Board engage Authur Andersen and Company as auditors for the 1987-88 fiscal year financial statements, provided the President of the University and Arthur Andersen and Company can reach

agreement on the fees, work schedule, and approach for this audit. Mr. Taylor seconded and the following voted: Dr. Hammack, yes; Dr. Hurt, yes; Mr. Kendrick, yes; Mrs. LaFollette, yes; Mr. Nichols, yes; Mrs. Strohecker, yes; Mr. Taylor, yes; and Mr. Beasley, yes. Motion carried.

Mr. Nichols moved that the Board approve the expenditure of \$139,300 from the University's Consolidated Education Repair and Renovation (CERR) Fund, so that work on the projects listed below may be undertaken on a priority basis before the end of fiscal year 1988:

Mrs. LaFollette seconded.

Mr. Nichols stated that several years ago the Board established the CERR Fund to repair and renovate facilities on campus and that it is expected between \$450,000 - \$500,000 depending on interest rates will be generated this year. He reported that the Governor's budget for 1988-90 does not include any state funding for the Capital Construction projects approved by the Board on June 22, 1987, and that the University will proceed with these projects based on urgency and availability of CERR funds.

Upon call for the question, the following voted: Dr. Hammack, yes; Dr. Hurt, yes; Mr. Kendrick, yes; Mrs. LaFollette, yes; Mr. Nichols, yes; Mrs. Strohecker, yes; Mr. Taylor, yes; and Mr. Beasley, yes. Motion carried.

Resolution of Appreciation to Wendell A. Lynch

Mr. Nichols moved and Dr. Hurt seconded that the following resolution of appreciation be printed and sent to Wendell Lynch. Motion carried.

WHEREAS, Wendell A. Lynch served as a member of the Murray State University Board of Regents from August 1983 through December 1987, and as Vice Chairman of the Board 1986-87 and 1987-88, and

WHEREAS, his dedicated service to the Board materially contributed to the improvement and advancement of the University in its efforts to serve the educational needs of the citizens of West Kentucky and the Commonwealth, and

WHEREAS, this service often required the sacrifice of valuable time and the contribution of many hours of difficult work, and

WHEREAS, he undertook significant responsibilities as Chairman of the Finance, Athletic, Faculty/Staff Affairs, and the ad hoc Insurance Committees, and

WHEREAS, his work as a leading citizen of Kentucky has brought honor to him and to the University he has so faithfully served.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the citizens of the Commonwealth through the Murray State University Board of Regents hereby express their grateful appreciation to Wendell Lynch for his dedicated service to the University and its students.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board wishes him continued prosperity, good health, and happiness in the coming years.

Robert C. Carter elected Vice Chairman

The Chairman reviewed nomination procedures for the office of Vice Chairman, and according to the Bylaws, the Secretary alphabetically called the roll for nominations. Mr. Nichols nominated Robert C. Carter for Vice Chairman of the Board of Regents. All other members passed. Dr. Hurt moved that the Board accept and approve the nomination of Robert C. Carter for Vice Chairman. Mrs. LaFollette seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Discussion of State's Revenue Shortfall and Biennial Budget Projections

The attached documents were presented to the Board.

President Stroup presented the following analysis of the Governor's budget recommendation for Murray State University for 1988-89:

She stated that this provides no increases for utility or fixed costs—social security, insurance programs—and no salary increases.

She further stated that the 20% increase in appropriation reported in the last biennium included everything, and that by the time budget reductions were made, there was only 11%. For Murray State in 1986-87, the difference between our base budget and our appropriation was 5.4%. With the budget reductions, Center of Excellence, and special mandated programs, in 1986-87, there was 2.7% for salary increases. That was the year we gave 7.7% to faculty and 7% across the entire institution. When the Governor talks about tightening our belt, reordering priorities, and reallocations, that was done in 1986-87. Everything went into faculty and staff salaries. 2.7% stretched into 7% is a lot of belt-tightening and reordering, and that does not address fixed costs. 1987-88 is the same picture. Look at the original increase, take away the budget reductions and fixed costs, mandated

programs, then for discretionary use there is 2.7%. Murray State had to address fixed costs that year and still averaged across the entire system 4% in salary increases.

Since 1980, we have had no operating increases in any department. Since 1980 we have had \$5.5 million in reductions in our budgets. The State appropriated and then the State took away because the revenue was not there—\$5 million reduction in a State appropriation of between \$22 and \$27 million annually. Of that, \$3.9 million is recurring; permanent cuts; funds that we will never see again. We have been operating at a flat level since 1980. The General Assembly in the last session did give us a boost; we do not want to be unappreciative. But since that appropriation, was made we have had four budget reductions at Murray State. I think the University should be congratulated for management during these revenue shortfalls. The General Assembly appropriates based on projected revenue and when that revenue does not materialize, we do not receive the dollars.

The presidents have appeared before the House Appropriations and Revenue Budget Review Subcommittee and testified for almost four hours. Last week, we appeared before the Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee, and tomorrow, we will be meeting with the Governor.

Suggestions made included a) take the message to Lions Clubs, Rotary Clubs, Chambers of Commerce, and other civic organizations, b) the Advocacy group who does not have a vested interest will be effective, c) write letters to local newspapers, and d) each Regents needs to see his/her representatives in the General Assembly.

Dr. Hammack stated that Board members certainly can contact individual legislators, but many legislators have told us that they are not going to the public to say money should be spent on higher education. It is up to us to convince the public of the University's needs. He added the best board in the world does not have the capability of doing that on a broad, public basis. However, every university in the State has a public information office and/or Department of Journalism and Communication. Each of those units has channels of forwarding information to the news media. There should be some way to enable Board members and supporters of higher education to get the message out.

Chairman Beasley pointed out that if Murray State's employees receive no salary increase and if the City of Murray passes an earnings tax, employees will have a net reduction in salary.

It was pointed out that a special legislative session was expected.

President Stroup and Chairman Beasley presented a draft resolution to the Board for consideration. Mr. Taylor moved that the resolution be refined and that the original be sent to the Governor with copies to members of the General Assembly, the Budget Director, and members of the Board of Regents. Mrs. Strohecker seconded and the motion carried.

Report on Desegregation Goals

Dr. Lewis Liddell, Assistant to the President and Affirmative Action Officer, distributed copies of the attached report and presented highlights of the report.

A. Auditors' Opinion

We have rendered an unqualified opinion on the financial statements of Murray State University as of June 30, 1987 and for the year then ended. This opinion was reached after our evaluation of the internal system οf University's accounting control, the University's response during 1987 to the weaknesses noted in our prior examination, and the results of the completion of audit tests to certain procedures applied recorded transactions occurring during the year. See Section II for additional comments on our 1987 audit approach.

B. Audit Adjustments

Two audit adjustments were proposed and discussed with management. Management agreed with these adjustments and they have been included in the financial statements and accounting records.

One adjustment was to record an investment in current funds at yearend in the amount of \$900,000. As discussed in our

management letter, this entry resulted from the combined effect of complicated accounting and recordkeeping and the failure to reconcile investment accounts to statements received from the depository at monthend.

The other adjustment was to increase the allowance for doubtful loans in loan funds by \$145,000. This refinement of the reserve for uncollectible loans resulted from a different approach in estimating the required reserve than that used in the past. Management agrees that this new approach is more appropriate and will follow it in future years.

C. Management Recommendation Letter
In accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we performed a study and evaluation of existing internal accounting controls of Murray State University for the purpose of providing a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing, and

extent of the audit tests to be applied in connection with our work.

Our memorandum on accounting procedures, internal controls and other matters, dated January, 1988, has been delivered to the Board under separate cover.

In 1986, we reported that the University's system of internal accounting controls contained material errors with respect to the integrity of the general ledger and safeguarding of cash. We are pleased to report that our 1987 memorandum noted improvement in these areas.

During the past year, the University has continued its efforts to strengthen internal controls and improve financial reporting.

Although progress has been made, the benefits of the planned enhancements have not yet been realized and considerable effort is necessary to realize these benefits.

II. MATTERS CONSIDERED DURING THE AUDIT

Notes

A. Audit Approach

The overall objective of our examination is to issue a report expressing our opinion on the fairness of presentation of the financial statements taken as a whole.

In accumulating the support which is the basis of our conclusion as to the fairness of presentation of the financial statements, we must consider the potential for material errors or material irregularities in the financial statements.

In this process, we use a "risk oriented" approach that results in our emphasizing areas or accounts that we believe are more susceptible to misstatement, or are more significant than others.

Our approach begins with an assessment of the results of the prior year examination. Next, any new facts and circumstances at the University which may require additional emphasis in our audit are considered.

In this regard, the following matters were considered for additional emphasis in this year's audit:

Material Weaknesses in Internal Controls

Because of the types of weaknesses noted in the prior year, and the fact that improvements in internal accounting controls were implemented over time during 1987, we specifically considered controls over cash and the propriety of recorded transactions during the 1987 audit.

With respect to the weakness related to cash noted in the prior year, bank account balances were confirmed at and reconciliations were yearend reviewed, evaluated and traced to the general ledger. Inquiries were made of University personnel to assess of cash understanding their evaluate accounting and to adequacy of the internal controls over cash and cash accounting.

Relationship of the University and Murray State University Foundation

For 1987, we were named auditors of the foundation. This was our first audit of the Foundation. Because the University and Foundation are "affiliated" (at least from the perspective of generally accepted accounting principles), the Foundation's financial position and results of activities must be included in the University's basic financial statements. The University has elected to present this information in the notes to financial statments. Because this information is significant to the of the statements financial University, we were required consider the appropriateness of the recorded balances.

B. Materiality

Audit tests are applied selectively to recorded transactions and do not cover every transaction. Accordingly, judgement is exercised in the selection of accounts and transactions to be tested. Judgement considers the pervasive effect of the overall control environment as well as the sensitivity or susceptibility of an account or transaction to error or omission that would be "material" to the financial statements taken as a whole.

In the context of the financial statements, "materiality" or "significance" would be an omission or misstatement of accounting information that would have an effect on the decisions of users of the financial statements.

Although there are no quantitative standards, uncorrected errors or omissions amounting to 3% of consolidated fund balance would require close scrutiny before we would issue an unqualified opinion. Further, given the differences among "funds", we believe adjustments affecting "current funds" have a lower threshold than adjustments affecting plant or endowment funds. This focus on "fund groups" affected our consideration scope discussed in the following paragraph.

Because we want to reduce the risk that a series of errors or omissions could occur that would aggregate to a "material" amount, we summarize and consider errors or omissions of 10%-20% of the established "materiality threshold". During 1987, our consideration scope for the current funds

was \$100,000. Our consideration scope for the plant funds was \$200,000.

In addition to quantitative factors, qualitative factors also affect our assessment of "material" items. Qualitative factors include "who" relies upon or uses the financial statements, trends, the "nature" of the error or other special circumstances.

III. RECOGNITION OF DEPRECIATION BY NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

Notes

A. Audit Approach

In August, 1987, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Statement No. 93, which requires financial statements for not-for-profit organizations issued for fiscal years beginning after May 15, 1988 to recognize and reflect depreciation on their long-lived tangible assets.

Governmental February, 1988, the In Standards issued Accounting Board Statement No. 8, entitled "Applicability of FASB Statement No. 93 to Certain State and Local Governmental Entities". standard states that a college university which is also a government should not follow FASB No. 93, pending the conclusion of the GASB's own project to consider depreciation by not-for-profit governmental entities.

Because Murray State University is an agency of the state, the University is impacted by the actions of the GASB as well as the FASB.

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Because the GASB pronouncement prohibits the application of FASB No. 93, comparability between public and private institutions' financial statements will be affected.

This will confirm our understanding of the arrangements made with you covering the examination you wish us to make of the financial statements of Murray State University for the year ending June 30, 1987.

Our work is to consist of an examination of the balance sheet at June 30, 1987 and of the related statements of changes in fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes for the year then ending in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, including such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we consider necessary to enable us to express our opinion on the financial statements.

Our examination is to include a review and evaluation of the existing system of internal accounting control to provide a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing, and extent of selective audit tests to be applied to recorded transactions and data for certain periods of the year. Primary reliance for the prevention and detection of errors or irregularities must be placed on such system of internal accounting control because it is in constant operation and covers all periods and transactions. Such a system cannot eliminate, however, the possibility that errors or irregularities may occur. While there can be no guarantee that such errors or irregularities will be detected by us, we will plan our examination to search for errors or irregularities that would have a material effect on the financial statements.

We also understand that we are to be responsible for the preparation of the Federal and Kentucky tax returns for the Foundation for the year ending June 30, 1987.

Our fees for the examinations of the financial statements and preparation of tax returns of the Foundation, and the Bookstore and Golf Course, including out-of-pocket expenses are estimated to be \$10,700. Billings will be submitted on a monthly basis as our work progresses. We will, of course, endeavor to keep our charges as low as possible. If our actual fees and expenses are less than the amount anticipated, we will, of course, bill the lesser amount.

We certainly appreciate this opportunity to be of service to Murray State University and the Foundation and assure you this work will receive our close attention.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT TO MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF REGENTS FEBRUARY 17, 1988

GOVERNOR'S ADDRESS/BUDGET

Higher Education was the hardest hit in the Governor's proposal for the 1988-90 state budget (See attachment A for my testimony to House Subcommittee on Education, February 3 and Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee, February 11.) The executive budget for Murray State includes funding already earmarked for specific use such as existing debt service (payment on bonds sold for campus improvements), a recurring base cut of \$389,900, new debt service for project to remove asbestos from the campus, and state contributions to the Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System (KTRS), at the 1987-88 level, an expenditure for retirement benefits covered by state appropriations in previous years, and no dollars for operating increases, fixed cost increases or faculty/staff salary increases.

This budget proposal for Murray State University means:

"No dollars for faculty/staff salary increases for 1988/89

"Only 3.5% salary increase for 1989/90

"No funding for increases in fixed costs such as utilities, benefits
"No operating and equipment funding

The impact of the budget on MSU will mean:

°Libraries and accreditations threatened
°Tuition and enrollment increases-money will be needed to cover fixed cost increases in health insurance and utilities in the first year. Approximately \$116,500 in additional dollars will be needed in the second year above tuition increase money.
°No Commonwealth Work Study dollars for students (92 students benefitted from this program this year)

Should the proposed budget be enacted, the reduced funding would be detrimental to our programs and the students we serve. Every one of us must make our case. It seems unfair for university employees to be the <u>only</u> state employees without any salary increases next year. This is the first time since the Depression that the University will receive no increase in appropriation.

INDUSTRY AND TECHNOLOGY CONSTRUCTION

On December 10, bids were received on Phase I, Storm and Sanitary Sewer Construction, of the Collins Center for Industry & Technology. Crouch Construction Company of Mayfield was the successful bidder, and we were pleased with the amount of the bid, \$172,480.

LIABILITY INSURANCE

Last summer we advised you that our board liability insurance coverage would expire on November 15, 1987. This was a three-year policy with annual premiums of approximately \$2,200.00. We asked for quotes from providers of this kind of insurance. Four (4) proposals were received and evaluated. International Surplus Lines was selected as the best quote. The coverage provided by International Surplus Lines is called "Educators' Legal Liability Coverage" and includes the employees of the University in addition to the

Directors and Officers. The other quotes were for Directors and Officers Liability with extensions or modifications to cover the employees. There is also some advantage to keeping the provider. The proposals were evaluated by David R. Whitmire, Director of Accounting and Financial Services, and John Fitzgibbon, Director of Purchasing. The new coverage is on an annual basis and the current year cost is approximately \$22,000.

STATUS OF LEGAL ACTION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

I am pleased to report that the legal action against Murray State University brought by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection concerning asbestos removal on Swann Hall has been dismissed.

REPORT OF SCHOOL-UNIVERSITY COLLABORATION SERVICES

The attached Report of School-University Collaborative Services for Fall 1987 has been submitted to the Council on Higher Education. The report includes a brief description of programs and services provided by each college to school systems in the state, primarily in Western Kentucky. Service activities of Murray State University faculty and staff span a wide range of programs kindergarten through grade 12 in the schools and other agencies in our region. Our faculty and staff are to be congratulated for their extensive work with the school systems.

FORT CAMPBELL/HOPKINSVILLE

Funding for the Basic Skills Education Program, BSEP, recently scheduled for termination at Fort Campbell, will be continued for the remainder of the fiscal year at 50 percent of the FY87 level, resulting in elimination of 13 staff members. MSU is prepared to respond to the shifting emphasis at Fort Campbell to post-secondary education programs. Our BIS and MBA programs which are already delivered by flexible scheduling, are ideally suited to respond to needs of the military through extended campus programs.

Vice President Perrin, Regent Carter and I met with the 100 MSU employees in the Hopkinsville and Fort Campbell area at the Breathitt Veterinary Center in December. Murray State serves the agriculture and food animal industry through the Breathitt Veterinary Center, offers a variety of services through the Small Business Development Center, and provides extended campus classes and our programs at Hopkinsville and Fort Campbell. We appreciate MSU employees at Hopkinsville and Fort Campbell who extend our academic service mission to that area. Colonel J.H.T. Denney, Garrison Commander at Fort Campbell and his wife were our guests for the Austin Peay game.

PADUCAH COMMUNITY COLLEGE OFFERINGS

Tuesday, February 9, members of the Board of Regents (Beasley, Nichols, Hurt, LaFollette, Hammack, and McNeill), several deans, Vice President Booth and I joined educators from Lambuth, Belmont, SIU-Carbondale, UK, and PCC to discuss educational opportunities in Paducah. Mayor Gerry Montgomery and members of Leadership Paducah are asking educators to respond to their need for greater educational offerings. We are presently offering 22-25 courses a semester with a total enrollment of approximately 325-350. We are committed to providing the BIS and MBA degrees in Paducah.

Attachment B gives the background and lists their goals.

STRATEGIC PLANNING/AASCU

The latest report from the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), <u>We Accept the Challenge</u>, summarizes responses to recommendations from AASCU's Report of the National Commission on the Role and Future of State Colleges and Universities. Murray State was recognized several times in a national report for the programs we have implemented, including the BIS degree, Task Force on Outcomes Assessment, Cooperative Agreements with other colleges and universities, the Honors Program, and the Office of Training Services.

The President's Cabinet which reviews and makes revisions to the MSU Strategic Planning Document semiannually held a discussion in December which focused on how MSU has responded to recommendations in AASCU's "To Secure the Blessings of Liberty." Penny Wade, an alumnus of MSU and now a staff member with AASCU in Washington, conducted a planning session to assist the Cabinet in evaluating our programs in relationship to other universities.

After the day's review, it is apparent that we are implementing or are initiating programs in all the areas suggested in the national reports. We are pleased with the progress we have made in achieving the goals you have set for us.

GOVERNOR'S SCHOLARS AND VISITING TEACHER INSTITUTE

For the second year, Murray State will host the Governor's Scholars Program. A five-week program involving approximately 300 of the highest-achieving Kentucky students who have completed the junior year in high school, will be held on campus June 19 - July 23, 1988. The Governor's Scholars Program is a living/learning program which serves approximately the top two percent of Kentucky students preparing to begin the senior year.

Held in conjunction with the Governor's Scholar Program, the 1988 Visiting Teachers Institute, a two-week experience, also is scheduled for Murray State. Dean for the GSP on campus is Dr. Ken Wolf, Associate Professor of History. Dr. Milton Reigelman of the English faculty at Centre College, is dean of the companion program which is scheduled for Centre College, Danville, June 26-July 30.

Classroom work in major interest areas such as biology, philosophy, literature, history, mathematics, language and culture, is augmented by out-of-class activities such as field trips, lectures, film presentations, computer use, seminars and other non-traditional methods of instruction.

MSU TITLE II AWARD

The Council on Higher Education, at its January meeting, formally awarded MSU \$29,732 for its proposal "Science Teaching Institute/Physics and Astronomy."

The program is funded by the CHE through Title II of the Education for Economic Security Act. The specific intent of the institute is to expand the pool of qualified middle school science teachers by providing incentives and opportunities for additional training in science.

CENTER FOR ECOSYSTEMS STUDIES RESEARCH PROJECTS

The recently funded Center for Ecosystems Studies at Murray State has already initiated six new Kentucky Lake research projects. They are: (a) a joint venture with TVA to control the rapid spread of "millfoil," a fast-growing weed found in area lakes and considered a nuisance to residents and visitors alike; (b) a project with TVA to determine specific characteristics of populations of channel and blue catfishes in Kentucky Lake; (c) an examination of the factors affecting the Lake's production of young-of-the-year fishes (fishes born within the current year); (d) a study of the relationship between freshwater mussel production and varying environmental factors; (e) a determination of the lake's redox boundaries (areas near the lake bottom where the concentration level of oxygen in the water changes dramatically); and (f) a database management/georeferenced computer system that stores information about the lake and its surrounding environment.

Dr. G. Richard Marzolf has accepted the Endowed Chair in Ecosystem Ecology. Dr. Merzolf holds the Ph.D. from the University of Michigan and is the author of numerous monographs on water quality. The Endowed Chair for Ecosystems Ecology will catalyze research efforts throughout the university and will have the specific charge to developing the Ecosystems Studies Center into a nationally prominent research/teaching unit.

ADVISORY BOARD FOR CENTER FOR ROBOTICS AND MANUFACTURING SYSTEMS

The University of Kentucky Board of Trustees has established an advisory board for the Center for Robotics and Manufacturing. This advisory board will consist of 14 members representing higher education, business and industry, and state government and shall serve in an advisory capacity to President Roselle. One member of this board will represent the regional universities and will be appointed by the Chairman of the Council on Higher Education.

Chairman Michael Harreld has appointed Dean Kenneth Winters of our College of Industry and Technology as the representative of the regional universities.

HAZARDOUS WASTE GRANT

The National Institute of Environmental Health and Safety has awarded a \$791,505 grant, "Hazardous Waste Worker Health and Safety Training," to the Midwest Consortium of which Murray State is a member. Murray State will serve as the region's only training site for hazardous waste workers. Other members of this Consortium include the University of Wisconsin, the University of Illinois, Michigan State University, the University of Michigan, Purdue University, the University of Cincinnati, the University of Kentucky, the Southeast Michigan Consortium of Occupational Safety and Health, and the Greater Cincinnati Occupational Health Clinic.

ENROLLMENT

Overall enrollment is up 4.5 percent from Spring, 1987. This is the first Spring semester since 1984 that we have had an increase in full time students (1.7 percent) and an increase in total full-time equivalency (2.1 percent).

STUDENT ACT SCORES

Of the group of 1027 students who took the ACT examination and enrolled at Murray State University last Fall, 585 were women and 442 were men. The average composite score for this group was 19.1, the highest composite score for a MSU class since 1974. This composite score compares very favorably to the Kentucky Average (18.3) and the national norm (18.7).

Significant gains in the component ACT scores in the last few years have been made in English (19.3, highest ever), Math (17.3, highest since 1977), and Natural Science (21.5, highest ever). Social Science scores have also shown considerable improvement since their low point in 1980-81. MSU Freshmen scored above state and national averages in all components of the ACT.

MSU STUDENT LOAN_LOW DEFAULT RATE

The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority has released figures which show Murray State with a student loan default rate of 7.98 percent in the Guaranteed Student Loan Program and 5.8 percent in the Perkins Student Loan Program. Student borrowers at Murray State University have established themselves as responsible to their creditors with one of the lowest default rates among Kentucky's regional universities. Both rates are below state and national averages.

GOVERNOR HERE

Governor Wallace Wilkinson was a guest of the City of Murray in January to announce the expansion of four local industries. While on campus for a luncheon, he recognized Murray State's contributions to the success of the local economic development efforts.

ATHLETICS

We recently hired Stanley Scott Narewski as the Men's Track Coach/Instructor effective January 4, 1988. Mr. Narewski holds the B.S. in Business Administration and Economics from Livingston University, Livingston, Alabama; Teaching Certification and Bachelor's Degree from University of Alabama; and Master's Degree from Auburn University. He has served as Head Track and Cross Country Coach at Clemson University and Coach at Furman University, and Assistant Track Coach at the University of Kansas.

DONATION TO MURRAY HIGH SCHOOL

Consistent with the Board of Regents' Delegation of Authority to the Vice—President for Finance and Administrative Services and Treasurer of the Board on September 7, 1985 "to review and approve disposition of surplus personal property" under the procedures outlined in KRS 164A.575, Interim Vice President Ramsey has approved, on your behalf, the donation of the Fair-Play Score Board from the old Baseball Field to Murray High School. Since this property is no longer needed, our feeling was that this use is more suitable and consistent with the public interest. You may recall that two years ago Murray State University donated the old football score board in Stewart Stadium to Calloway County High School.

To highlight our achievements during the past two years and describe what we have done with funding from the General Assembly, the President's Report was mailed along with the Economic Impact Brochure to the 138 members of the General Assembly, the Governor and the Governor's Cabinet. A brochure describing the Center for Ecosystems Studies, an example of the General Assembly's funding priorities, was also included. Other mailings included the Alumnus and a cover letter from Alumni President Fred Schultz appealing for continued funding for higher education.

CONGRATULATIONS

Pat Spurgin received one of six of the first annual Woody Hayes Academic All-American Awards in Columbus, Ohio, on January 22. Criteria for the award include excellence in academics, athletics, community service and leadership, and high moral character. In addition to the recognition Pat received for this award, Murray State will receive a \$1,500 contribution to its scholarship fund in the name of Coach Woody Hayes.

An open letter to the faculty and staff:

The Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education are staunchly supporting increased funding for higher education. Our goals are to move the level of higher education funding for your institution to one that is comparable to similar institutions in surrounding states; to see centers of excellence and endowed chairs retained and expanded; and to increase state support for student financial aid programs. These goals, if achieved, provide the opportunity for fair and just faculty and staff salaries, for adequate classroom support, better working conditions, and equitable student access.

If you have been following events in Frankfort, you know that the executive budget recommendation, for the two years beginning next July 1, treats higher education harshly, yes, even meanly. As a former member of the Council on Higher Education, and through my role as Chairman of the "Advocates", I have had a singular opportunity to be exposed to the realities of higher education's financial condition in this state. my opinion, beginning July 1, 1988, there will be essentially no increase in state funds to meet increased operating expenses or to provide any kind of significant increase in faculty salaries overall. The Kentucky Advocates are convinced of the value of your teaching and research efforts and we are pushing as hard as we can for an increase in higher education funding. If you want to join us in this effort, there are several meaningful and important things you can do.

First, identify your state representative and your state senator in the General Assembly. If you are uncertain, call the County Clerk's office in your county of residence, give your name and address and ask them to help you identify your representative and senator.

Second, you can take a moment to make two calls, one to your Senator and one to your Representative at 800/372-7181 and leave a message that you are calling in support of increased funding for higher education. It is a toll-free call which is very, very important that you make.

Third, you can write your Senator and Representative a brief letter indicating your support for increased funding for higher education. If you have an example of how funding problems are limiting your effectiveness, or if you have taken on extraordinary duties such as assisting with economic development efforts or with supporting the public schools, you can state that effort. Simply address the letters to your Senator and Representative, by name, c/o Kentucky General Assembly, State Capitol, Frankfort, KY 40601.

Fourth, you can address another letter to the Governor with your concerns. Address the letter to Governor Wallace Wilkinson, State Capitol, Frankfort, KY 40601. You can also write Lt. Governor Brereton C. Jones, same address.

Personal letters can be effective. They should be objective, concise, to the point, but not personally critical - otherwise, they will be counterproductive. It would be most helpful if you would provide copies to the Advocates of letters you write, but, of course, that is up to you.

I hope you have heard by now that the Advocates are having a statewide rally for quality higher education. The event will be held in Frankfort on February 16 beginning at 3:30 p.m. EST. That rally will be preceded by a march to the Capitol beginning at 1:30 p.m. sponsored by Student Advocates for Higher Education. You can join us for the march and rally. The Student Advocates are inviting all friends of higher education to participate in their march. I will be marching with the students and urge you to join them and, also, to join us for the rally at the Dudgeon Civic Center Arena. More information about these events will be available on your campus. Contact your university Public Information office for additional details.

MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY 1988/90 Governor's Budget Effects of Implementation

Salary and Wage Increases

- There will be no discretionary dollars available for faculty or staff salary increases in 1988/89.
- In 1989/90, new dollars will be allocated for faculty and staff salaries once fixed cost increases have been covered. When these costs are coupled with the University's new responsibility for covering KTRS increases, we estimate the remaining dollars will fund a salary increase of only 3.5 percent.

Long-Range Effect on Faculty and Staff

- Projected faculty losses are a continuation of a long line of faculty departures that have occurred in the current biennium due to inadequate salary dollars. Murray State University has lost 38 (11%) of our faculty over the current biennium to higher salaries in other institutions. Those faculty leaving Murray State have received increases from \$3,000 to \$13,000 at other institutions.
- We are also currently conducting national searches for Deans of Continuing Education and of the College of Fine Arts and Communication and for a Vice President for Finance and Administrative Services. When most of our competitor states are providing annual salary increases, even one year without them puts us farther behind and makes it very difficult to recruit the people we need in order to offer and sustain quality programs.
- Faculty and staff take home pay has already been reduced by the January 1, 1988 increase in Social Security taxes. Murray State employees face a further potential reduction if the City of Murray imposes a one percent payroll tax, as it is being encouraged to do by the Mayor. (These tax increases, coupled with the effects of inflation and zero percent salary increases, effectively send real salary dollars back to 1986 levels.)
- This budget offers little hope for University staff at the lower end of the pay scale. Murray State University currently has 112 full-time hourly employees with annual salaries below the poverty level for a family of four (\$11,230).

In order to control escalating health costs, we had to reduce health care benefits for our employees in 1984. This program of reduced benefits and higher employee contributions had to be implemented in a year of only 2 percent salary increases.

- As the demands to deliver education and services to industry, small business, and school systems increase, we ask our faculty and staff to do more and more with less and less.
- Enrollments have increased both on-campus and off-campus without additional funding.

Effect on Quality of Programs

- Lack of funding for salaries will spur further faculty losses in programs where accreditations are already at risk, and may, in fact, prompt the loss of one or more accreditations. If no raises are given in 1988/89, the total faculty loss in the first year of the biennium could be as many as thirty, with almost half of these departing from the College of Business and Public Affairs.
- Continued accreditation of our College of Business and Public Affairs is especially threatened, as the faculty who will leave are the most active publishers and researchers. The Engineering Technology program's accreditation may also be threatened, due to the loss of faculty holding the terminal degree. These are the areas which contribute significantly to economic development in the region.
- During the current biennium, our Colleges of Business and Science alone had a total of thirty faculty offers refused because of inadequate salaries. As the proposed salary increases of zero and 3.5 percent in the 1988/90 biennium become known, we anticipate the rejection of currently outstanding offers to prospective faculty and foresee incredible difficulties in attracting other desirable faculty members.

Operating and Equipment

- The lack of available dollars to match externally funded equipment projects means we cannot take full advantage of our Center of Excellence and highly competitive Engineering Technology programs.
- The University's operating budgets have not been increased since 1980. The earlier 1987/88 permanent budget reduction of \$389,500 and the additional reduction of \$136,800 have severely tested our ability to manage and continue to deliver our programs. Operating budgets are closely monitored by the Vice Presidents to hold personal service contracts, equipment purchases, travel, and other expenditures to a necessary minimum. With Murray State's distance from the Capital, travel expenditures for University personnel are necessarily higher, with an average one-night trip costing approximately \$177.

- The University library, whose budget was strained before the 1987/88 reductions, has had its book budget seriously eroded just to sustain its periodicals base. Last year \$48,000 was needed from the book budget just to maintain its 2,100 periodical titles, whose costs increased 17 percent in one year. As a result of these budget restrictions, Murray State is falling farther behind in the materials needed by programs and cannot meet the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' expectations for collections development. Other accreditations as well are threatened by this lag in library growth; the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business cited lack of adequate library support as an area of concern in the most recent College of Business re-accreditation review.
- Murray State has, for the past several years, imposed a 90-day freeze on filling vacant positions. This accomplishes two goals: it enables the administration and departments to examine the necessity of each position, and it generates operating dollars which are badly needed by the departments.

Fixed Costs

- Increases in tuition revenue should cover fixed cost increases in health insurance and utilities in the first year of the biennium. To cover fixed cost increases in the second year, approximately \$116,500 of general fund dollars would be needed in addition to increases in tuition revenue.
- New debt service for asbestos removal will be provided by the Governor's Budget in addition to increases necessary for existing debt obligations.

Student Impact

- Almost 23 percent of all Murray State students who are enrolled half-time or more rely on University or Federal College Work-Study programs as a primary source of income. Changes in the availability of Federal College Work-Study dollars, plus the internal reallocation of Murray State dollars to meet departmental operating needs, will restrict work-study dollars available to students. The number of students who will be able to depend on these dollars to help cover their college costs can be expected to drop two to three percent in the coming biennium.
- With zero funds proposed in the Governor's 1988/90 Budget for the Commonwealth Work-Study Program, Murray State students stand to lose a great deal. In 1987/88, 92 students are earning \$122,887 working for regional businesses subsidized by this program.

Programs

- Murray State continually monitors its program offerings and has dropped or suspended twenty-six programs since 1980/81. Any further program cuts would be detrimental to the students we serve.
- We have not added any new programs with the exception of the Bachelor of Independent Studies program, which was accomplished through the reallocation of existing resources.

Impact of Governor's Proposed Budget on Murray State University Student Financial Aid 1988/90

The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) received a slight increase in state funding in 1988/89, but no increase in 1989/90. These tight dollars, combined with a marked decrease in the KHEAA's anticipated agency receipts, have prompted cuts and reallocations in aid program priorities. The emphasis in the Governor's budget is being placed on need-based programs.

Anticipated impacts on Murray State University:

State Student Incentive Grant (SSIG) Program

MSU is expected to receive the same (or slightly greater) funding level in the coming biennium. In 1986/87 there were 818 MSU students who received approximately \$362,880 from this program.

Math/Science Incentive Loan and Teacher Scholarship Programs

These programs will probably be combined, with an increase in the individual award amounts. If this merger occurs, MSU will only receive funds for current recipients. In 1987/88 there were 14 students who received \$34,812 from the Math/Science Incentive loan, and 18 who received \$43,300 from the Teacher Scholarship Program.

Commonwealth Work-Study Program

With zero funds proposed in the Executive Budget, MSU students stand to lose a great deal. In 1987/88, MSU had 92 students who earned \$122,887 working for regional businesses who were being subsidized by this program.

Kentucky Distinguished Scholars Program

Lack of any state funding for this program will prompt the loss of about \$7,000 for five MSU students. It should be noted that these are the top-ranking students in the state on ACT exams.

BACKGROUND

Paducah, Kentucky, is the primary regional center for the extreme western portion of Kentucky and for a portion of extreme Southern Illinois. The primary institution of higher education serving the Paducah area is Paducah Community College which is affiliated with the University of Kentucky Community College System. Shawnee College-Metro Center serves Metropolis-Massac County, Illinois.

Employing the definition of "urbanized area" as designated by the United States Bureau of the Census, it is estimated that the population of the urban area of Paducah-Lone Oak-Reidland-Woodlawn/Oakdale-Concord-Ledbetter in Kentucky, and Brookport and Metropolis in Illinois, will be 58,000 persons. Research indicates that the Paducah Urban Area is the largest urban area in the United States not being served by a baccalaureate degree granting institution or center of such institution within the urban area or within 25 miles of the urban boundaries.

Paducah is easily the largest population center in the Commonwealth of Kentucky not served by a baccalaureate program. The situation is further compounded by the fact that Paducah and McCracken County tax themselves for higher education, unlike most other local governmental units in the Commonwealth.

An investigation by a group of participants in the Leadership Paducah Program resulted in the discovery of Paducah's position as the largest area without a baccalaureate program in the nation. The economic development of the area and the fact that a major regional health care service industry has developed with the expansions of two hospitals and the opening of a substance

abuse hospital made the need for the availability of a four-year degree and additional graduate programs apparent. Paducah area residents could with easy access to baccalaureate degrees increase the percent of the total population over 25 with "four year degrees" and thus stimulate economic development and growth in the urban and constituent areas. (1980 census indicated approximately 11% over 25 with baccalaureate degrees). Paducah area residents are currently served by the Murray State University (48 miles from Paducah) and Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (65 miles from Paducah).

PROPOSAL

A. "Two plus Two"

The Committee on Higher Education examined the delivery systems employed in other areas of similar size without "four-year colleges" and determined how baccalaureate degrees were being offered in these communities. The Committee proposes a similar format for Paducah as the ones employed in Panama City, Florida, Rochester, Minnesota, and Caspar, Wyoming, which involves the "Two plus Two" concept.

This proposal would involve the two junior level institutions presently serving the Paducah Urban Area (Paducah Community College and Shawnee College-Metro Center) to continue to offer freshman and sophomore transfer courses in addition to technical degrees. A senior level institution would then provide all necessary junior and senior level courses in the community to complete the degree combining academic work from the junior and senior colleges.

This would allow for students who are place bound, work bound, or economically disadvantaged to have access to higher education on a level not previously offered. The committee conducted a survey to determine levels of interest and degrees desired and it is recommended that the following degrees be offered as part of the two plus two agreement:

Business Administration
Management
Marketing
Accounting/Finance

Paducah Community College and Shawnee College transfer students should be accorded favorable transfer agreements as part of the program, and coordination of courses and scheduling is essential to the success of the program.

The Committee further proposes that the Paducah Junior College board employ a coordinator to work with the senior level institution and to assure that the community's best interests are being served. The coordinator should be independent of the community college system and the senior level institutions providing the baccalaureate degree.

The baccalaureate degree granting institution should have a Paducah field office staffed by a resident coordinator (or dean) and should have financial aid and academic advisement personnel. The office would also serve as a liaison office between the institution and the community at large.

An initial commitment of several years to the concept is desirable to allow for continuity in the program to allow enrollment to generate. Adequate marketing efforts should be conducted to properly inform prospective students of course offerings. Limited social, cultural, and athletic events from the main campus of the senior level institution should be imported to generate additional community interests.

B. Telecommunications Access

Within an approximate one year span, all Kentucky universities will be linked by fiberoptics, allowing for additional instructional telecommunications. Because the Paducah Community College facility is already capable of high-tech access, and because of its urban location, Paducah should be the site

for another fiberoptic link to allow its populace to access graduate and post-graduate telecommunications courses.

Post graduate study, particularly in engineering and the sciences, might be offered both as a classroom experience sponsored by regional institutions and by long distance electronic linkage. The Paducah program might negotiate with regional colleges and universities for actual on-campus instruction in various fields known to be of interest to the local student. Such contractual arrangements may be made with one or many different institutions, depending upon a local needs assessment.

Paducah will also seek graduate and post-graduate opportunities for local students through state-of-the-art technologies, including, but not necessarily limited to, teleconferencing and interactive long distance learning systems. Immediately available for utilization are two-way audio capabilities which, within the year, should be expanded to include two-way video (interactive). One model for consideration has been put forth jointly by IBM and NEC, and is called the "Interactive Video Education Network". Here the classroom situation is maintained long distance, utilizing satellite linkage. It includes a special student response unit that provides two-way communication between the student and instructor, allowing interactive dialogue. It is unique in that it gives immediate response to questions and permits an instructor to monitor individual and class progress.

Ancillary to its other goals, the Paducah effort will explore graduate level offerings from other technically prominent universities. Of interest is the National Technological University (NTU) delivery system through which courses are transmitted through satellite networks to various downlink locations. Based in Colorado, NTU currently offers some 150 classes covering five engineering disciplines. There are 103 participating locations, including

not only colleges and universities, but many corporate entities. The merits of this system are apparent; one can provide local industry with a choice of opportunities for continuing education and post graduate study for its employees.

C. Facilities

Capital facilities that could be used to house classes and administrative offices include: Paducah Community College, West Kentucky State Vocational—Technical School, Paducah Tilghman High School, the Jetton School building, Lone Oak High School, Saint Mary High School, Shawnee College Metro Center, and the old Sears-Woolworth complex. Library facilities are available at Paducah Community College, Paducah Public Library, and through computer networking.

D. Funding

Currently the Paducah City and McCracken County tax bases raise approximately \$350,000/year for use by the Paducah Junior College Board. In addition, cable provides another \$80,000.00 in annual revenues, from which \$30,000.00 may be used to assist in campus funding. The Paducah Junior College Board could provide funding for the coordinator and defray administrative, staff and other expenses. Various technical grants are available for video conferencing and other technical equipment.

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Possible Earnings Tax in the City of Murray

For the past several months the Mayor and City Council of Murray have been discussing possible ways of offsetting the loss of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. According to the City's present financial estimates, new revenues must be found to cover projected deficits of \$255,540 in fiscal 1989; \$425,948 in fiscal 1990; \$538,486 in fiscal 1991; \$621,854 in fiscal 1992; and \$753,917 in fiscal 1993.

Last fall, Mayor Holmes Ellis appointed a 24-member Blue Ribbon Committee to study the City's need for additional revenue. In addition to myself, the following members of the University community are serving on the Committee:

Frank Adelman - Associate Professor, Industrial Education and Technology

Bob Etherton - Chair, Department of Physics and Astronomy

Ken Harrell - Dean, College of Humanistic Studies

Bob Ramsey - Interim Vice President, Finance and Administrative Services

George Stockton - Director, Personnel Services

To date, the Blue Ribbon Committee has met twice. At these meetings the Mayor and other officials have presented information about the City's budget outlook for 1988-93, showing a revenue shortfall beginning in 1989; the operating cost of city government; meeting the budget shortfall from present revenue tax sources; revenue funds held in reserve by utilities; and potential new revenue sources.

On October 8 of last year, Mayor Ellis, in a formal statement to the City Council, encouraged it to "commence its study of the need for an earnings tax." As reported in the Murray Ledger and Times for the following day, the Mayor went on to explain that a one percent earnings tax would yield the City additional revenue of approximately \$500,000 to \$600,000 a year. The Mayor noted that every city surrounding Murray has such a tax, and he has also stated that Murray is the only University community in the state without an earnings tax. According to our information, Highland Heights, home of Northern Kentucky University, also has no earnings tax. Current taxes (percent) on payroll earnings of those who work in other University communities are: Bowling Green (students exempted), 1.5; Frankfort, 1.0; Lexington, 2.0 (city-county merged); Louisville, 1.8; Morehead (students exempted), 1.25; and Richmond (students exempted), 2.0.

Before the City Council last October, Mayor Ellis observed that "the City, for all practical purposes, has exhausted all other available forms of revenue in the form of business license, franchise tax, insurance premium tax, and city auto stickers." In the Blue Ribbon Committee's two meetings to date, however, several of its members have questioned this conclusion and have requested specific information about the potential for increasing dollars from present sources (through rate increases and improved collections), as well as possible revenues from new sources other than an earnings tax.

An earnings tax can be imposed by vote of the City Council. While the Mayor has not yet proposed a specific ordinance on this matter, some Council members (and several members of the Blue Ribbon Committee) have already expressed concern about the equity of provisions (such as the following) that might be part of any such ordinance:

- 1. Persons who live outside of Murray but work in the City would have their payroll earnings taxed.
- 2. Persons who live in Murray but work outside the City (e.g., employees of Fisher Price, Vanderbilt Chemical, etc.) would not have their payroll earnings taxed.
- 3. Payroll earnings at all levels would be taxed at the same rate.
- 4. The earnings of Murray State students who work part-time to help defray college costs would be taxed at the same rate as all others who work in the City.
- 5. Most non-payroll income of individuals who live in Murray would not be taxed.

In addition to members of the Blue Ribbon Committee from the University, several others from the campus, particularly representatives of the Staff Congress, have been active in generating interest in this issue and in suggesting various alternative sources for the needed revenues.

The NCAA meeting in Nashville in January was not as eventful as the previous two, but some legislation was passed which will impact on Murray State. Some of the major legislation that is important to Murray State is outlined here:

- 1. <u>Junior College Transfers</u>. Effective August 1, 1988, Junior College transfers must have a grade point average of 2.00 to transfer.
- 2. Pell Grants. Effective August 1, 1988, student-athletes on full athletic scholarship will be entitled to \$1,400. The current limit is \$900. While helping the individual student, this has the potential to mean a loss of \$12,000-\$14,000 in income for the university.
- 3. Maximum Awards I-AA Football. Effective August 1, 1988, the number of initial athletic grants that can be awarded by a I-AA school has been increased from 25 to 30. The total number of grants remains at 70 (65 for the OVC).
- 4. <u>Charitable Appearances</u>. Effective immediately, student-athletes are allowed to be involved in promotional activities for charity when their activity will be a direct benefit to the charity.
- 5. Off Season Drug Testing. Effectively immediately, there is a voluntary off-season testing program for anabolic steroids in the sport of football (cost borne by the NCAA).
- 6. I-AAA Football. A resolution was passed allowing for the development of legislation for 1989 to establish a I-AAA football division. Ideas discussed include need-based aid, reduction of coaching staff and elimination of spring practice. This is of concern to I-AA leagues like the OVC because of the proliferation of divisions and the potential loss of I-AA members.
- 7. Restricted Membership. Effective immediately, failure to meet NCAA Division I sponsorship (participants or events) requirements will result in an institution being placed in a "restricted" membership category. Translated, this means that an institution would become ineligible for all NCAA postseason competition for one year if it falls below the 6 men's, 6 women's sports sponsorship requirements.
- 8. Olympic Waiver. Effective immediately, to permit the academic requirements related to satisfactory progress to be waived for any participant in the Olympic Games who, because of such participation, may lose eligibility for practice and intercollegiate participation. This, of course, is good for Murray State in the event we have a member of the Rifle Team on the Olympic Team.

There was other legislation passed, much of it technical in nature related to recruiting periods, staff size, seasons of competition and enforcement regulations. As stated above, the NCAA took stock this year and stayed away from major changes in order to give the changes of the past two years time to be evaluated.

OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE

The Ohio Valley Conference has made the following changes in either the By-Laws or the Athletic Directors Administrative Agreements during the Movember and January meetings. One should note that there are four new Athletic Directors out of seven.

- (1) Point Distribution for All Sports Trophy. Beginning with the 1988-89 school year, the point distribution will be structured to reflect a more equal distribution of points for all sports rather than the weighted scale for certain sports that currently exists. This should work to the advantage of a well rounded program and should be an asset for Murray State.
- (2) <u>Ineligible Player in Conference Tournament</u>. A change in the By-Laws now allows for the disqualification of a team from a team championship for using an ineligible player even though individual athletes may still compete for individual championships.
- (3) Change in Conference Shared Distribution. The league has adopted a new distribution formula for NCAA money that will allow each member school to receive more income from the Conference share. This will help Murray State whether we are in the tournament or not. This is in effect this season.
- (4) NCAA Grant. The Conference, like all others, will be eligible for a grant of \$120,000 from the NCAA to use in the areas of officiating, rules compliance, and drug education. A committee appointed by Dr. Stroup, as President of the OVC, is preparing a report now for the Conference Presidents' consideration.

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A REPORT ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETIC EXPENDITURES MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY

January 27, 1988

Introduction

The "Report of the Board of Regents Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics at Murray State University" was accepted by the Board at its meeting on November 5, 1985. One of the charges to the Commission was to "suggest a level and source(s) of financing a total athletic program consistent with the statement of role and scope of athletics at Murray State University and the mission of the University." In response to that charge, the recommendations of the Commission included three guidelines which established levels of funding for intercollegiate athletic expenditures. These guidelines (actually short restatements of the recommendations) are:

- 1. Personnel costs should be in accordance with University budget guidelines and personnel policies (Recommendation No. 7).
- 2. State-appropriated expenditures for grants-in-aid may be increased only by increases in charges for tuition, room, board and books (Recommendation No. 10).
- 3. Reginning in 1985-86, operating expenditures are limited to a base rate established by averaging such expenditures for the 1983-84 and 1984-85 fiscal years (Recommendation No. 11).

 Note: This recommendation specifically excluded from the expenditure limitations funds 1) received from guarantees paid to MSU by other institutions, and 2) expended from the Athletic Endowment (MSU Account #4-15002).

Observance of Funding Guidelines

In accepting the Commission report, the Board of Regents set general guidelines designed to contain athletic expenditures with specific action based on the Report to go back to the Board for implementation. Data relative to the observance of the funding guidelines are summarized in the table below and a discussion and explanation is presented in the next section of this report. More detailed financial reports are attached for the fiscal years 1984-85, 1985-86 and 1986-87. Additional detail is available from the Office of the Vice President for University Relations and Development.

Discussion and Explanation of Expenditures

MSU athletic expenditures have increased since the Commission Report was accepted by the Board of Regents. However, over the two-year period, total expenditures are within \$8,978 (.4%) of the guidelines derived from the recommendations in the Report. An explanation of how the guidelines were calculated follows.

- Additional salary funds of 3% were provided throughout the University for 1985-86. The 1985-86 budget which was approved by the Board prior to acceptance of the Report included increases of \$14,400 to hire a volleyball coach and to pay a summer stipend (\$2,700) and associated fringe benefits (\$540) to the faculty athletic representative. 1.03 (\$653,516) + \$14,400 + \$2,700 + \$540 = \$690,761.
- b) Additional salary funds of 4% were provided throughout the University for 1986-87. An assistant athletic director was hired for one year with funding (\$46,902, salary and benefits) from the Athletic Endowment. On retiring from the U.S. Army, Mr. Elvis Green was employed part-time to coach the rifle team (\$5,184). These hirings were approved by the Regents as part of the 1986-87 budget, and thus, are included in the guideline. 1.04 (\$690,761) + \$46,902 + \$5,184 = \$770.477.
- c) Tuition, room and board increased by approximately 6.89% for 1985-86. 1.0689 (\$564,732) = \$603,642.
- Tuition, room and board increased by approximately 6.47% for 1986-87. A charge-back system was initiated for student-athletes housed during the preseason and vacations. In essence, this was an offsetting revenue and expenditure of \$17,235 to the University. The expenditure appeared in athletic grants-in-aid. 1.0647 (\$603,642) + \$17,235 = \$659,933.
- e) Expenditures as reported by Office of Accounting and Financial Services plus current athletic revenues to the MSU Foundation. Reports on athletic expenditures did not include private funds during these years. This calculation assumes that all private donations were spent.
- Average of operating expenditures for 1983-84 and 1984-85 (base rate) plus increase in guarantees earned (\$45,033) which is excluded from expenditure limitation. (\$650,589 + \$615,905)/2 + \$45,033 = \$678,280.
- g) Base rate (\$633,247) minus decrease in guarantees earned (\$14,582), plus implementation of University charge-back system for postage (\$11,119) and price increase for on-campus printing (\$6,867), transfer of rifle team from ROTC (\$5,800), purchase of OVC championship rings (\$21,854), additional football team travel to University of Central Florida, funded by guarantees, and Division I-AA playoff game, reimbursed by NCAA (total of \$31,400), and funding from Board of Regents to maintain men's track and meet Title IX guidelines (\$50,000).

To the Board of Regents of Murray State University:

We have examined the balance sheet of Murray State University as of June 30, 1987 and the related statements of changes in fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We have previously examined the financial statements for the preceding year and our report thereon, dated December 10, 1986, was unqualified with respect to the balance sheet but disclaimed an opinion on the changes in fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of Murray State University as of June 30, 1987 and the changes in its fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements referred to above. The data contained in pages subsequent to page 17 of this report are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. This information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 1987

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual basis

The financial statements of Murray State University have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting except for depreciation on physical plant and equipment. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) transfers of a nonmandatory nature for all other cases.

Revenues of Summer School academic terms are reported in the fiscal year in which the programs predominantly fall. Therefore, deferred tuition revenue is recorded for terms which have not begun at fiscal year end.

Fund accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various activities are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined and reported as four balanced fund groups: current funds, loan funds, plant funds and agency funds. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the University's Board of Regents. Externally restricted funds may be utilized only in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the University retains control to use in achieving its institutional purposes.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Cont.)

Current funds are used primarily to account for the transactions affecting the general operations of the University. These resources are expendable for performing the primary and support objectives of the University; e.g., instruction, research, operation and maintenance of plant, student financial aid and auxiliary activities. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating expenses.

Loan funds, primarily financed by the Federal government, are used to account for loan programs available to students.

Plant funds are used to account for the transactions relating to investment in University property. They include (1) unexpended plant, (2) renewals and replacements, (3) retirement of indebtedness, and (4) investment in plant subgroups. The unexpended plant subgroup consists of funds to be used for the acquisition and/or construction of physical properties for institutional purposes but unexpended at the reporting date. The renewals and replacements subgroup consists of funds to be expended for renewals and replacements of plant fund assets, including some renewals and replacements of a type not ordinarily capitalized in the investment in plant subgroup. The retirement of indebtedness subgroup consists of funds set aside for debt service reserves and charges, and for retirement of indebtedness on institutional properties. The investment in plant subgroup consists of funds expended for and thus invested in institutional properties and the bond indebtedness incurred to finance plant acquisitions and construction. Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at the date of acquisition or at fair market value at the date of donation for gifts. In accordance with generally accepted college and university accounting practices, depreciation on physical plant and equipment is not recorded.

Agency funds are used to account for assets held by the University as custodian or fiscal agent for others and used for certain organized activities.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like is accounted for in the fund owning such assets.

Other significant accounting policies

An appropriation for the Murray State University's portion of the contributions for teachers' retirement is made directly to the Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System by the state; however, to reflect the total resources of the University, \$1,630,799 and \$1,554,145, respectively for June 30, 1987 and June 30, 1986, have been included as both revenue and expenditures in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Cont.)

Note 11 to these financial statements includes a summary of certain financial information of the Murray State University Foundation, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation affiliated with the University but not consolidated in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 2. Deposits and Investments

The University currently uses commerical banks and the Commonwealth of Kentucky for its depositories. Deposits with commercial banks are covered by Federal depository insurance or collateral held by the bank in the University's name. At the state, the University's accounts are pooled with other agencies of the state. These state pooled deposits are substantially covered by Federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the state in the state's name. Investments as of June 30, 1987, for the University are summarized below. The investments of the University are classified as to credit risk by the three categories described below:

Category 1: Insured or registered, or securities held by the University or by an agent in the University's name.

Category 2: Uninsured and unregistered, with securities held by the counterparty's trust department or agent in the University's name.

Category 3: Uninsured and unregistered, with securities held by the counterparty, or by its trust department or agent, but not in the University's name.

Note 5. Bonds Payable

The Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A through E and F Refunding, were sold to construct or renovate certain academic and service buildings on campus. Series A matured May, 1986; Series B, C, D, E, and F Refunding bonds mature in varying amounts through May 1, 2000, with interest payable at rates ranging from 3.0% to 5.875%. Student registration fees are pledged for debt service on these bonds. Note 13 provides information on Consolidated Educational Building Revenue Bonds Series G issued subsequent to June 30, 1987.

Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds, Series A through L, were sold to construct or renovate certain housing and dining facilities on campus. The bonds mature in varying amounts through September 1, 2008, with interest payable at rates ranging from 2.75% to 3.75%. Revenues from student housing and dining facilities and other auxiliary services as well as student fees are pledged for the retirement of the bonds.

Note 7. Employee Benefits

Substantially all employees of the University are covered under one of two defined contribution pension plans:

- A. Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System Under KTRS the employee's contribution is 5.905% of gross salary and the State contributes 10.335%. The State's contribution is paid directly to the system by the State, and as explained in Note 1, this contribution is included in the accompanying financial statements.
- B. Kentucky Employees' Retirement System Full-time service personnel are covered under KERS. The employee's contribution is 5% of gross salary and the State's contribution is 7.45%. The State's contribution is funded from the budget of the University and is included in the accompanying financial statements.

The University maintains a self-insurance program for employees' health and accident insurance. The University funds the entire plan for all permanent full-time employees and their families. The estimated amounts of claims incurred but not paid are \$246,270 and \$150,000 as of June 30, 1987 and June 30, 1986 respectively. These amounts are reflected in the "Other Liabilities" amounts in the current unrestricted funds in the accompanying balance sheets.

Expenditures for all employee benefits are included as expenditures within the appropriate functional area.

Note 8. Litigation

The University is a defendant in various lawsuits. The University attorney has advised that at this stage in the various proceedings, the probable outcomes are uncertain. Although collectively claims for damages are significant, management believes individual lawsuits are without merit, and ultimate damages, if any, assessed against the University will be insignificant.

Note 9. Investment in Foundation Bookstore

In September, 1979, the University transferred operation and control of the University Bookstore to Murray State University Foundation, Inc. The University made available to the Foundation at the time of transfer inventories, cash funds, and receivables, net of liabilities in the amount of \$486,159. The University reflects this amount as "Investment in Foundation Bookstore" in the accompanying balance sheets at June 30, 1987, and June 30, 1986.

Since the operation of the bookstore is, by transfer, a function of the Foundation, the bookstore's results of operations and assets, liabilities, and fund balance are excluded from the accompanying financial statements.

As further explained in Note 11, the Murray State University Foundation, Inc. University Bookstore, operates as an autonomous entity and issues its own financial statements.

Note 10. Leases

The University leases a telephone system and various items of machinery and equipment. Most leases are written for one year with an annual renewal. The majority of leases are considered to have terms of three to ten years, as it is the intent of the University to renew annually most leases written for one year terms.

At June 30, 1987, assets acquired under capital leases totaled \$2,340,254. The following is a schedule of future minimum lease payments under capital leases together with the present value of the net minimum lease payments:

Note 11. Murray State University Foundation, Inc.

Murray State University Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) is a Kentucky not-for-profit corporation formed to receive, invest and expend funds for the enhancement and improvement of the University.

The Foundation operates the University Bookstore and the Miller Memorial Golf Course and manages certain endowments and investments on behalf of the University. The Foundation has a Board of Trustees separate from that of the University, however, the President of the University is also the President of the Foundation. Certain officers of the University are also officers of the Foundation.

Note 11. Murray State University Foundation, Inc. (Cont.)

The University provides office space and pays certain operating expenses of the Foundation at no charge to the Foundation. The Foundation prepares and issues its own financial statements.

A summary of significant financial information of the Foundation as of and for the year ended June 30, 1987, not consolidated in the accompanying financial statements, is presented below.

Note 13. Subsequent Events

The University issued \$14,785,000 in revenue bonds dated December 1, 1987, with stated interest rates ranging from 5.75% to 8.00% due serially from 1989 to 2007. The proceeds are to be used to pay costs of repair, renovation, construction or addition to buildings on the campus of Murray State University that are and shall be a part of the Consolidated Educational Building Project established and created by the Board of Regents on April 20, 1961.

Note 14. Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications were made to the June 30, 1986 financial statements to conform with the June 30, 1987 presentation. The changes had no effect on the previously reported total fund balances.

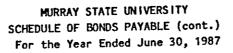

IMPACT OF GOVERNOR'S 1988-90 BUDGET

- No discretionary dollars for faculty or staff salary increases in 1988-90.
- In 1989-90, after fixed costs and KTRS are covered, remaining dollars will fund a salary increase of no more than 3.5 percent.
- Increasing numbers of MSU faculty will leave for positions at institutions with higher salaries.
- Recruiting new faculty and administrators will become even more difficult, with more and more offers declined because of inadequate salaries.
- Attracting and retaining hourly employees will be a greater challange, with the growing disparities in pay scales between MSU and the region.
- Accreditation of programs, particularly in Business and Engineering Technology, areas of great significance for economic development in the region, will be threatened through the loss of faculty members with terminal degrees and through inadequate support of library resources.
- External grants toward funding for needed equipment cannot be accepted, due to loss of state matching funds.
- Services to industry, small businesses, and school systems will face curtailment.
- Murray State will become less accessible to promising young Kentuckians, with fewer dollars available for Federal, University, and Commonwealth Work-Study programs.

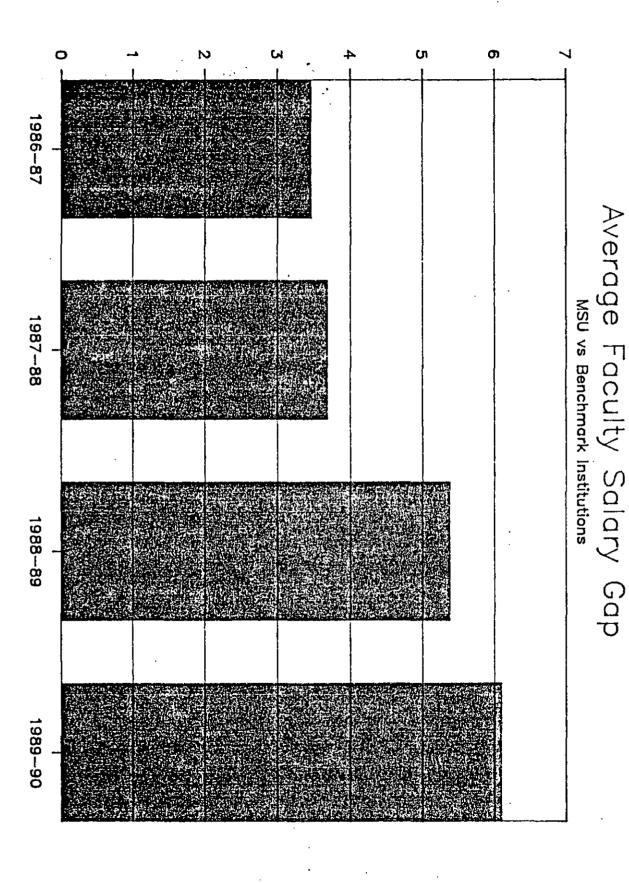

An Overview

This report represents an overview of the operations of affirmative action and the extent to which the University has achieved its basic desegregation goals.

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Affirmative Action Report

I. Introduction

Murray State University has formally declared its commitment to laws mandating affirmative action and equal opportunity regulations, together with all valid state and federal regulations enacted pursuant thereto. The policy of the University is to guarantee freedom from discrimination in its operation and administration of its programs, services, and employment practices; in its relationships with students, faculty, and staff; and in its interactions with the community which its serves.

II. A Historical Perspective

The concepts of affirmative action and equal opportunity are related. However, there is a major distinction between the two concepts. The concept of equal opportunity mandates that all individuals be given an equal opportunity in employment and other areas of the University. The concept is primarily concerned with equal opportunity and equal access. However, equal opportunity does not take into account pass discrimination. This is where the two concepts differ. Affirmative action reaffirms the concept of equal opportunity in addition to initiating steps to rectify pass discrimination.

The concept of Affirmative Action is rooted in constitutional provisions, as well as federal and state statutory requirements prohibiting discrimination based on race, sex, color, age, religion, national origin, handicap, or status as a disabled veteran of the Vietnam Era. Specifically, the concept is rooted in the following:

Executive Order 11246: Prohibits discrimination in employment.

Equal Pay Act of 1963: Prohibits discrimination in salary and fringe benefits, as amended by the Education Amendments of the Higher Education Act in 1972.

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964: This Act further prohibited discrimination based on race.

Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964: This Act as amended by the Equal Employment Act of 1972, further prohibited discrimination in employment.

Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967: Prohibits discrimination based on age.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972: Prohibits sex discrimination against students or others participating in educational programs and activities.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973: Prohibits discrimination of the handicap.

Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974: This Act require federal contractors to take affirmative action to employ and advance in employment disabled veterans of the Vietnam Era.

The Adams Desegregation Case: Of all the Acts and cases, the Adams case is viewed as having the most significance to higher education in Kentucky.

A brief history of this case is listed below:

Oct. 19, 1970: The NAACP file suit against the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), charging the department's Office For Civil Rights with "general and calculated default" in its enforcement of federal school desegregation guidelines. The suit accuses HEW of dragging its feet instead of cutting off federal school funds for districts not in compliance with the law.

Nov. 16, 1972: U.S. District Court ruled that HEW has unlawfully refrained from cutting off funds to school districts not in compliance with the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

Feb. 16, 1973: HEW was ordered to begin proceeding to cut off federal funds to school districts and state college systems not complying with desegregation requirements.

March 14, 1975: HEW was ordered to act swiftly to enforce desegregation guidelines in 125 school districts in 16 southern and border states. The courts also sets up procedure for handling future complaints of noncompliance.

Dec. 29, 1977: The court issues a broad decree that orders review of HEW enforcement activities in all 50 states and sets down procedural steps to be used when complaints against school systems are received.

March 24, 1983: The court ordered the Department of Education, which now oversees the Office For Civil Rights, to demand new plans from Florida, Georgia, Oklahoma, and North Carolina, state where desegregation had not moved ahead quickly enough. If the states do not comply, the department is ordered to begin formal enforcement proceedings against them by September, 1983.

The state of Kentucky was included in the Adams case because the State was unable to prove that it was not operating a dual system of higher education. Subsequently, Murray State and the other state universities were required to submit plans of intervention to rectify a history of racial and sex discrimination.

III. Affirmative Action Plan (Plan of Intervention)

Murray State's plan of intervention covers a broad range of areas, articulating the role(s) of affirmative action in all aspects of the University. A major component of the plan was centered on the University's admission policies and other factors relating to student matriculation at the University. Another major component was centered around conducting a detailed analysis of the workforce to determine its characteristics and composition in relation to race and sex. These two components are presented below:

IV. Admission/Minority Student Recruitment and Retention

The University has indicated that it will make a special effort to recruit minorities. To facilitate minority recruitment the University has a Minority Admission Counselor and maintains an Office of Minority Student Affairs. It is the intention of these offices to recruit and retain minorities.

During the 1987 Fall semester 467 minority student were enrolled at Murray, about eight (8) percent of the total student enrollment. This indicates that the University has done a fair job in the recruitment of minority students. However, the greatest challenge is in the area of retention. Of the 300 plus minority students enrolled during the 1987 Spring semester, 112 did not return for the 1987 Fall semester. Many of these students had grade point averages that exceed 2.00, indicating that other extraneous variables were responsible for these students not returning to Murray.

It is generally concluded that campus life and the overall campus environmental influences are the principal causes of minority student attrition. However, a scientific study needs to be conducted to better determine the actual causes of minority student attrition at Murray.

V. Workforce Analysis

Under the Adams case the University was mandated to recruit and employ qualified blacks in all equal opportunity categories. An analysis of the availability of blacks in each equal opportunity category resulted in the following: (1) the percentage of blacks that should be employed in each budgetary unit was determined and (2) each budgetary unit set annual goals to increase black employees to the appropriate percentage.

A breakdown of the stated goals and the number of minority employees in each equal opportunity category is displayed below:

Based on the above data it may be inferred that Murray State has experienced some degree of success in minority recruitment. However, it must be pointed out that minorities represent less than four percent of a total workforce of 1,170 employees.

Moreover, a recent analysis of the workforce revealed that the following colleges or units have not achieved their stated goals: Academic Affairs, University Relations and Development, College of Fine Arts, College of Science, College of Education, College of Humanistic Studies, and the Waterfield Library. VI. Measures to Achieve the Established Goals

As noted in Murray State's Affirmative Action Plan, the University has instituted the following measures to achieve established goals:

The University has a Minority Admissions counselor. The Counselor's duties center on increasing minority student enrollment.

Scholarships and grants have been specifically designated for minority students.

The University has a Coordinator of Minority Student Affairs with specific responsibilities directed toward improving minority life at Murray.

In conjunction with Paducah Community College and Western Kentucky University, Murray State sponsored the Governor's Minority Student College Preparation Program, a cooperative program for early intervention for potential minority college students.

Student recruitment and retention programs are monitored and reviewed by the Affirmative Action Office.

The initial advertisement for all vacancies and the hiring process is strictly monitored by the Affirmative Action Office.

The University has initiated steps to hire that are consistent with affirmative action and equal opportunity guidelines.

In addition to the responsibilities stated above, the Affirmative Action Officer reports directly to the President and functions in conjunction with the Affirmative Action Committee coordinating and monitoring all employment practices of the Vice Presidents, Deans, Department Chairs, and Directors and coordinates efforts with the Director of Personnel Services.

The Affirmative Action Officer also serves as Director of Minority Faculty Recruitment and Retention with the primary responsibility of assisting the various units of the University in the recruitment and retention of minority faculty.

VII. Summary

The University desegregation goals (affirmative action plan) although modest, represents a systematic approach for rectifying pass discriminatory practices at Murray State. The extent that these goals are achieved is contingent to a large degree on each administrative head working aggressively to increase minority representation and to remove discriminatory practices with in their shops. In addition, the University needs to institute programs to improve campus life and the overall environment; an environment that recognize cultural differences and stimulates social and intellectual growth.

In summation, racial and sexual discrimination is incompatible with the concepts of wisdom and learning; therefore, having no place in higher education.
