President stated that the ATO Organization plans to build a new chapter house. A swap of their current holdings located on the northwest corner of 16th and Main Streets, consisting of approximately .746 acres, with the University, for a vacant property located at the southwest corner of 16th and Poplar Streets, consisting of approximately 1.7 acres, has been proposed for this endeavor. The University has reviewed this proposed transfer of these properties and considers it to be in the best long-range interest of the University.

Mr. Sanders moved that the Board of Regents, upon the recommendation of the President of the University, approve the dual transfer of property between the Alpha Tau Omega Zeta Lambda Chapter Alumni and Housing association and Murray State University. Mrs. Strohecker stated that the Faculty/Staff Affairs Committee received information on increases in spring break for staff and the sick leave ceiling.

She further stated that the Insurance and Benefits Committee, the Staff Congress, and the administration have been studying for ten months the request for an additional day for the Spring Break vacation for staff.

For the Faculty/Staff Affairs Committee, Mrs. Strohecker moved that the Board of Regents, upon the recommendation of the President of the University, approve the addition of one day (Wednesday) to Spring Break

for the staff at Murray State University, effective September 1, 1991. Mr. Schofield seconded and the following voted: Mr. Akridge, yes; Mr. Butts, yes; Dr. Hammack, yes; Mr. Kendrick, yes; Mr. Osborne, yes; Mr. Sanders, yes; Mr. Schofield, yes; Mrs. Strohecker, yes; and Mr. Harvey, yes. Motion carried.

Mrs. Strohecker further stated that the Insurance and Benefits Committee, the Staff Congress, and the Administration have studied the increase in sick leave ceiling for the last ten months.

For the Faculty/Staff Affairs Committee, Mrs. Strohecker moved that the Board of Regents, upon the recommendation of the President of the University, approve the increase in the current sick leave ceiling of 120 days to 180 days for employees of Murray State University, effective September 1, 1991, to be reviewed at the end of two years. Mr. Kendrick seconded and the following voted: Mr. Akridge, yes; Mr. Butts, yes; Dr. Hammack, yes; Mr. Kendrick, yes; Mr. Osborne, yes; Mr. Sanders, yes; Mr. Schofield, yes; Mrs. Strohecker, yes; and Mr. Harvey, yes. Mrs. Strohecker requested that the Minutes reflect that the Finance and Audit Committee joins the Building and Grounds Committee in the recommendation to ratify the 1992-94 Capital Budget Request.

She further requested that the Minutes reflect that the Finance and Audit Committee joins the Buildings and Grounds Committee in the recommendation on the property acquisitions.

Executive Session

The Board reconvened in Public Session at 12:15 p.m. Chairman Harvey stated that personnel issues were discussed some of which were related to Agenda Item #9 N-P, resignations and terminations, new employment and the salary roster.

Mr. Butts moved that the Board of Regents approve the Salary Roster as of August 1, 1991; the Report of Resignations and Terminations for the period of January 1, 1991, through August 1, 1991; and the Report of

New Employment for the period of January 1, 1991, through August 1, 1991. Effective date of information on all reports is July 10, 1991. Mr. Kendrick seconded and the following voted: Mr. Akridge, yes; Mr. Butts, yes; Dr. Hammack, present, but did not vote; Mr. Kendrick, yes; Mr. Osborne, yes; Mr. Sanders, yes; Mr. Schofield, yes; Mrs. Strohecker, yes; and Mr. Harvey, yes. Motion carried.

Mr. Harvey stated that also discussed in Executive Session was a personnel matter that related to an Affirmative Action complaint that was taken up through the due process procedures available through the University process. There was a special request of the Board to reopen that case or to review the findings in that case.

Mr. Osborne moved the Board to respectfully decline to conduct a hearing on behalf of Dr. Marian J. Fuller as requested by her counsel Raymond M. Burse on the grounds that the University has afforded, through its previously existing written policies and regulations, a full fair due process hearing. Dr. Fuller has been afforded an opportunity to present the case fully and it is not necessary for the Board to entertain a hearing. Mr. Sanders seconded.

Mr. Harvey pointed out that such a hearing would set a precedent which would be very damaging in the future. He further stated that it would open the possibilities of this Board serving as a judicial body to review every tenure, promotion, salary decision, and all kinds of personnel decisions.

Upon call for the vote, the motion carried.

Resolutions, Adopted

Mr. Harvey presented the following resolutions: A resolution in memory of Representative Dick Castleman of Graves County, who served as County Judge in Graves County for many years and in the Kentucky General Assembly and was always very cooperative and supportive in the interest of Murray State University, and resolutions of appreciation for former Regents Robert C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS

August 10, 1991

ENROLLMENT

More than 1,300 incoming freshmen and transfer students participated in the four Summer Orientation sessions held during June and July. These information sessions, which are coordinated by the Office of School Relations under Director Paul Radke, give incoming students a chance to register for classes, find out about MSU services and facilities, meet some of their classmates, and in general begin to feel at home at Murray State. important role that parental support plays in retention, the Office of School Relations in the last five years has placed more emphasis on parent participation in Summer Orientation. number of parents attending has doubled during that period. Members of the Murray-Calloway County Chamber of Commerce and Leadership Murray sponsor one of the most successful events, welcoming the parents to Murray with an ice cream social and a community tour. Both parents and students are enthusiastic in their assessment of the Summer Orientation experience.

Dean of Admissions and Records Phil Bryan now estimates that fall 1991 enrollment will again pass the 8,000 mark, with a slightly smaller freshman class offset by increases in transfers and the resumption of classes at Ft. Campbell.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 1991-92

It is appropriate at the beginning of a new academic and fiscal year to look ahead at major challenges awaiting us.

The 1992 General Assembly will be a major focus of interest during the year. I have made preliminary arrangements to place a Murray State representative in Frankfort during the most productive part of the legislative session. In order to free that representative for calls, the process of tracking legislation and developing university positions will be housed on campus as in previous sessions.

Our priorities for the upcoming legislature are to promote increased general funding for higher education, to seek funding for the capital items submitted on our priority list, and to seek additional funds for the Special Events Center. As I have made clear in correspondence with the Board since the last quarterly meeting, Murray State will suffer at any level of formula funding below 100 percent because of the revised Formula Use Policy, which seeks "equity" for the community colleges, largely at the expense of our institution.

The Strategic Plan adopted in November 1990, will continue to serve as a guide to our endeavors. We have made progress in the areas of our four major goals: baccalaureate excellence, regional service, fiscal responsibility, and personnel satisfaction and involvement. We have also completed the groundwork for additional progress in these areas on the schedule for next year. In preparation for the November 1991 Board meeting we plan to distribute copies of the Strategic Plan which indicate what action has been taken or decided upon in each item of the Plan.

The Murray State Self-Study for reaffirmation of institutional accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) will begin in January 1992; the initial organization for the Self-Study has already begun, as is described below. Our legitimacy as a university in our relationship with other institutions (in such matters as student transfers), with the federal government (in such areas as student financial aid), and with such agencies as professional accreditation bodies is based on institutional accreditation.

The periodic review of our education programs by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) will be completed this year, with a team coming to campus in October. Preparation for NCATE accreditation, which is now mandated by the Kentucky Department of Education, has required intense campus-wide involvement.

Activities leading to the renewal of professional accreditation in several disciplines will begin next year, and a new five-year cycle of Council on Higher Education (CHE) program review is now underway. To the extent possible, these efforts will be combined with the SACS Self-Study activities. The thorough review of our academic programs which this will involve will allow us to make needed improvements in support of our goals.

Playing the support role assigned to universities by the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) will continue to be a major undertaking of the University, one that will be a considerable drain on financial resources and faculty/staff time. The CHE is still considering the feasibility of a new funding component that would offset some of this expense. On behalf of the University, I have urged that this step be taken to enhance the chances of success for KERA.

Some additional areas which will require attention during the coming year are (1) the expansion of our off-campus offerings, particularly our proposal to the CHE for an Extended Campus Center linking programs at Ft. Campbell, Hopkinsville, and Madisonville and the continued growth of our ITV network; (2) the continuation of our efforts to focus and render more efficient our regional economic development; (3) review of our campus fund raising activities, with progress toward a more unified approach; and (4) continued review of factors affecting our size and the nature of our student body (demographics, student success, student satisfaction) so that we may determine the best course for addressing such issues as admission and graduation requirements, advising, recruitment strategies, and appropriate fees and services.

We face many challenges in the upcoming year, but we also have new sources of support and strength. Many of the vacancies in key positions that handicapped us in 1990-91 have now been filled. In particular, the contributions of Don Kassing, Vice President for University Relations and Administrative Services, and Don Robertson, Associate Vice President for Student Affairs, will be valuable in meeting the challenges ahead.

PRESIDENT'S ACTIVITIES

During the month of June I revisited the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island, in response to an invitation from my successor as President there. As you know, I led a three-year campaign to have the program of studies at the Naval War College recognized by the New England Association as an accredited master's program. It was therefore especially gratifying to be invited to hand out the first master's degrees awarded by the institution at the spring commencement exercises.

An extended trip of ten days during the month of July allowed me to take part in several activities of interest. I was a special guest at the launching of the U.S.S. Kentucky in Groton, Connecticut. I spent several rewarding days meeting with other presidents at the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) meeting in North Falmouth, Massachusetts. I also spent one day at the Newport Music Festival, taking the opportunity to talk with the Festival's well-known impresario about the quality of the music programs at Murray State. He has agreed to visit our campus to lecture and become acquainted with our music faculty.

Before returning home, I attended meetings of Murray State's New England Alumni Association in Boston and the New York Alumni Association. I met some wonderful alumni in both cities who pointed to their success in the East as proof of the quality of Murray State programs while attesting to their love for their alma mater.

Now that my first year as President of Murray State University has ended, I can update some of the figures included in the report I gave you at the last meeting. I have travelled to Frankfort seven times during the period, in addition to other official visits to Louisville, Lexington, Morehead, and Bowling

Green. My speeches off-campus number over thirty, with numerous talks on campus as well. I have visited alumni groups in five cities and appeared on radio or television at least eleven times. (A full list of my public appearances is included in your folder.)

During the year I have met all the community college presidents and school superintendents in our service area, many in extended one-on-one discussions. The West Kentucky superintendents invited Charlene and me to attend their annual convention, an occasion we enjoyed. I have frequently met with state and local government figures and with the other university presidents. I have become acquainted with members of the community, donors, athletic boosters, faculty and staff representatives, and students. It has been a busy and eventful year, and I am proud of what we have been able to accomplish. I look forward to meeting the challenges which lie ahead.

MEETING WITH COX AND WALKER

On Monday, July 29, 1991, Dr. Gary Cox, Executive Director of the Council on Higher Education, and Dr. Ken Walker, Deputy Executive Director for Finance, came to campus to review with us our Capital Budget Request for the upcoming biennium. In a luncheon meeting with Provost Jim Booth, Vice President for University Relations and Administrative Services Don Kassing, Assistant to the President for Institutional Planning Anita Lawson, Budget Director Paul Bylaska, Physical Plant Director Ed West, and me, they also discussed some other items of interest to Murray State in the upcoming legislative session.

In the review of our priority listing of major capital projects, Dr. Cox and Dr. Walker sought additional information about several of the projects and made some helpful suggestions. For example, they pointed out that funding for the Exposition Center should be requested from the General Fund, not a Bond Fund. The General Assembly may then choose to pool several such campus projects under a bond issue. In summing up, Dr. Cox indicated that all items which were designated as life/safety projects would receive first priority endorsement for funding by the CHE, and that the two renovation projects at the top of our list, Carr Health and Blackburn Science buildings, were also certain to receive CHE support. He indicated that the CHE would be conservative in its formal recommendations but, if given the opportunity, would work with institutions in support of items further down on the priority list.

Conversation during the meeting also touched on several other topics of interest. Dr. Cox indicated his satisfaction with the quality of the education his daughter Dana, a 1991 MSU graduate, received at the University. Calling Murray State the "best kept secret in Kentucky," he asked why we did not do more

advertising, particularly radio advertising, in the central and eastern part of the state. We have already begun to follow up on this suggestion.

We again pointed out that the CHE Formula Use Policy now approved for use in achieving "equity" -- that is, giving the community colleges a much larger proportion of the higher education appropriation -- will hurt Murray State the most. We asked Dr. Cox about prospects for increased funding for higher education in the next legislature; his assessment was not encouraging. In light of this situation, he suggested that universities should consider increasing housing and dining charges and student fees as a possible way to meet fiscal needs. He indicated that Murray State's rates are low compared to most other state institutions.

On a related matter, I explained my conviction that Murray State should maintain a reserve fund to meet unforeseen financial needs. Dr. Walker reminded us that Kentucky Statute sets forth the expectation that each institution will maintain a plan for a 5 percent budget reduction.

PADUCAH MEETING WITH COX AND PCC REPRESENTATIVES

Following our campus meeting, Dr. Cox, Dr. Walker, and I travelled to Paducah to join a meeting that brought together representatives of Murray State University, the Council on Higher Education, the City of Paducah, and Paducah Community College (PCC). Former Senator Helen Garrett, PCC President Len O'Hara, Paducah physician Dr. Robert Meriwether, and two members of the Council on Higher Education, David Denton of Paducah and Jack Rose of Murray, were present. Murray State was also represented by Regent Thomas Osborne, Center for Continuing Education and Academic Outreach (CE/AO) Dean Vi Miller, and CE/AO Assistant Dean John Yates.

The Paducah schedule included an initial meeting in President O'Hara's office, an interview with <u>Paducah Sun</u> reporter Bill Bartleman, the taping of an WPSD-TV "Accent" program with host Tom Butler, and a dinner at Stacey's Restaurant hosted by Mr. A. O. Miller, the owner.

The <u>Paducah Sun</u> story appeared on Tuesday morning, July 30, 1991, and the "Accent" program on Saturday, August 3, 1991. Although the television show presented my viewpoint more fully, both gave a reasonably accurate representation of the position I took on meeting Paducah's educational needs. That position is as follows:

Paducah should recognize -- and should inform potential industries -- that it has a four-year university. Its university is located an easy hour's drive away in a small college town with fewer distractions. Murray must learn to speak in the same terms.

No private, four-year liberal arts institution in Paducah could match what Murray State offers in terms of baccalaureate quality, range of programs, and low tuition. The MSU Paducah Center offers those programs that are most in demand by place-bound Paducah residents -- education, business, and nursing. Such programs might not be offered by a liberal arts college.

It is important that all of us -- in Murray, in Paducah, in the rest of West Kentucky -- begin to think on a <u>regional</u> basis. A recent study suggests that by the year 2001 34 percent of American households will need at least one member with a baccalaureate degree. Currently the national percentage is 19 percent; for Kentucky it is 10 percent. If Murray State is to play its part in improving this statistic, we must seek to eliminate barriers in our service region.

SACS APPOINTMENTS

Two key positions in the Self-Study for SACS reaccreditation have recently been filled. Dr. Coy Harmon, Dean of University Libraries, will serve as Chair of the Steering Committee for the Self-Study, and Dr. Bill Lalicker, Assistant Professor of English, will serve as Editor and member of the Steering Committee. With Dr. Anita Lawson, Assistant to the President for Institutional Planning, already named as Director of the Self-Study, they will provide the central leadership for the process.

Changes in the SACS Criteria since the most recent Self-Study in 1982-84 have expanded the areas in which compliance must be demonstrated, most particularly in the new Criterion of institutional effectiveness. Fortunately, Murray State has been making progress in this area since the SACS Fifth-Year Report of 1989. Planning for the 1992-94 Self-Study is already in progress, and organizational activities will take place during the fall semester.

Under the current SACS Criteria, the institutional Self-Study is administered through a Steering Committee and five Principal Committees: Institutional Purpose, Institutional Effectiveness, Educational Program, Educational Support Services, and Administrative Processes. The Purpose Committee was organized in 1989 with Dr. James Hammack as Chair; it has already completed its major assignment, the review and revision of the MSU Statement of Mission and Goals which was approved by the Board in May 1990. The Institutional Effectiveness Committee, which includes the College Assessment Coordinators, has already begun its work, although a permanent Chair has not yet been named.

The remaining four Principal Committee Chairs and additional members of the Steering Committee will be appointed before the fall 1991 semester begins so that these officers can begin work

to identify MSU faculty, staff, and students to serve as members of the Principal Committees, including the appointment of subcommittee chairs in fourteen important areas, for example, undergraduate program, faculty, and financial resources.

The calendar for the Self-Study calls for unit self-studies to be completed in 1992, followed by the development of the institutional document in spring and summer 1993. The Reaffirmation Committee visit will be scheduled during spring semester 1994. Full campus involvement is essential to the success of this important undertaking.

ALUMNI EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Murray State University Alumni Executive Council met on Saturday, June 15, 1991. During the meeting the Board:

- * set October 12, 1991, as the date for Homecoming and approved the theme of "A Star-Spangled Homecoming" for the 1991 festivities; and
- * selected four Golden Horseshoe recipients for 1991: Mr. L. J. Hortin, Professor Emeritus of Journalism; Mr. George Long, Benton attorney; Dr. Ray Mofield, Professor Emeritus of Journalism; and Miss Rubie Smith, Professor Emeritus of Elementary Education. The Golden Horseshoe Awards will be presented during Founder's Day ceremonies, scheduled for September 11, 1991.

COLLINS CENTER FOR INDUSTRY AND TECHNOLOGY .

Invitations have been mailed for the Dedication Ceremony for the Martha Layne Collins Center for Industry and Technology to be held September 7, 1991, and other plans are almost complete. Former Governor Collins will be present for the 3:00 p.m. ceremony; Governor Wallace Wilkinson has not yet responded. In addition to the governors and myself, those scheduled to speak at the event include CHE Executive Director Gary Cox, MSU Board of Regents Chairman Kerry Harvey, Dean of the College of Industry and Technology Tom Auer, and the Reverend John Dale, Glendale Road Church of Christ. Other platform quests will include U.S. Representative Carroll Hubbard, Senator Greg Higdon, Representative Freed Curd, Murray Mayor Bill Cherry, Purchase Area Development District Executive Director Henry Hodges, Murray-Calloway Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice President Steve Zea, Architect George Collignon, former College deans Hugh Oakley and Ken Winters; Chairman of the Industry and Technology Advisory Council Dr. Charles Buffington, Provost Jim Booth, Vice President for University Relations and Administrative Services Don Kassing, and the presidents of Faculty Senate, Staff Congress, and Student Government Association. The ceremony, ____ which will last approximately one hour, will be held outside the

building. Tours of the facility will be available. Invitations have been sent to Regents and special guests for a private reception at Oakhurst following the ceremony. Many guests will stay for the 7:00 p.m. football game against Southern Illinois University.

LEGISLATIVE WEEKEND

Members of the Kentucky House and Senate leadership and the West Kentucky Legislative Caucus will be invited to attend the Dedication Ceremony and the game as the last of two events in an extended weekend in this end of the state. In conjunction with a meeting of the West Kentucky Caucus at Lake Barkley on Friday evening and Saturday morning, September 6 and 7, 1991, Murray State and the Murray-Calloway County Chamber of Commerce have invited thirty legislators and their spouses to come to Murray on Thursday. A presentation is planned in the Collins Center that will feature an ITV demonstration and a tour of the new facility. On Thursday evening the group will dine at Oakhurst with the Regents and community leaders. On Friday, various activities have been proposed to the group, including a dove hunt, fishing, On Friday evening Murray State will sponsor a and museum visits. Buffalo Troll dinner for the group at Lake Barkley.

The relaxed social setting of these events will give us an excellent opportunity to become better acquainted with the legislators before the upcoming legislative session. Economic Development Coordinator Buddy Buckingham has coordinated preparations for the special events, working with a committee composed of Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice President Steve Zea, Mayor Bill Cherry, community leaders Harold Doran and Joe Dick, Regent Tommy Sanders, and other MSU staff.

DECISION MAKERS '91

You should receive information soon from the CHE about registration for the Decision Makers '91 Conference, September 15 - 16, 1991, at the Marriott Griffin Gate in Lexington. You register for the Conference directly with the CHE; Sandra Rogers will work with you on travel plans.

The University continues to support the position that, in order to reduce the burden of expense placed on the institutions, the conference should be scheduled only every other year. We do recognize, however, that the conference provides valuable opportunities to consider important topics in higher education and to meet informally with the Council members and other Regents. I urge you to plan to attend this year's meeting, which offers workshops on budgets, rewards for good teaching, and assessment of quality.

The Conference has some added features this year, including a legislative panel which will discuss the upcoming General Assembly and forums with the gubernatorial candidates. In addition, the Outstanding Alumnus of Kentucky (OAK) Awards Luncheon sponsored by the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education will take place at noon on September 16, 1991, as the closing event of the Conference. Murray State has nominated alumnus Robert G. Burton for the 1991 OAK Award; a committee of the Kentucky Advocates will make the final choice.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SUPPORTS WESTERN KENTUCKY DOCTORATE

As you may be aware, this past year Western Kentucky University submitted a proposal to the CHE to offer a graduate program closely modelled on KERA goals that would lead to the Doctor of Education degree. Citing one passage in Kentucky statute, the CHE determined that it had no jurisdiction to approve doctoral programs at regional universities. Pointing out that another passage in Kentucky statute states that the regional universities may offer "programs beyond the master's degree level to meet the requirements for teachers, school leaders, and other certified personnel," WKU requested an Attorney General's opinion. That opinion has been rendered, and we have received a copy. The Attorney General has supported WKU's position, stating that the CHE does have the authority to approve doctoral programs in education at the regional universities.

GOVERNOR'S SCHOLARS

Murray State University received notification on August 2, 1991, that our proposal to host the Governor's Scholars Program on campus next summer had been accepted. It will be the fourth time we have served as hosts; only Centre College has been a host more often. The Governor's Scholars Program provides us with outstanding statewide recognition and underscores our commitment to baccalaureate excellence. Not only does it bring to campus 350 of the top 700 high school juniors in the state, but it also brings outstanding high school teachers and counselors, who then take back to their schools a new awareness of what Murray State offers Kentucky's young people. Campus administration of the program will be handled by the Center for Continuing Education and Academic Outreach.

STUDENT LOAN DEFAULT RATE

An official communique from the United States Department of Education informs us that Murray State's official guaranteed student loan default rate for fiscal year 1989 was 6.2 percent. Of the 1,044 students enrolled at Murray State that year who used the Stafford Loan or Supplemental Loans for Students (SLS) programs, only 61 are currently in default. The federal government requires no specific action from institutions whose rate is below 20 percent. Murray State has reason to be proud of our excellent record.

INTERACTIVE TV PARTNERSHIP WITH DIGITAL

The interactive television network which already connects Murray State University with the campuses of Paducah Community College, Madisonville Community College, and the Fulton City and Fulton County school systems has received an innovative new component.

Through a partnership with Digital Equipment Corporation which has provided \$700,000 worth of equipment, the network can now be used to link up existing computer resources on the sites — both IBM compatible units and Apple McIntoshes — as well as to exchange two-way audio and video transmissions. This new capability will be extended as soon as possible to the other five schools which are members of the West Kentucky Educational Technology Cooperative.

Murray State is also committing substantial funding to the project, which is one important component of Murray State's efforts in support of the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA).

At two demonstrations held on May 21 and August 2, 1991, MSU personnel and representatives of the school systems demonstrated some of the many applications of the technology now possible among the sites. The two simulations attracted over two hundred representatives of schools, local and state government offices, and other interested quests.

Four school superintendents located in two sites demonstrated the use of the network for meetings of their group. Not only were the superintendents able to hear and see each other through the interactive television, but they also transferred documents through the computer hookup and edited a computer file document from both sites.

A school teacher in Hickman conducted a class in genetics for students located in Fulton and in Murray, and the students were not only able to see the teacher's demonstrations and be seen by her, but also took part in class activities by drawing on a special screen which transmitted their work immediately to the other two sites.

An MSU faculty member in the College of Industry and Technology demonstrated how the network could be used in support of economic development initiatives. In the simulation he was able to provide advice for a plant manager in Madisonville after the network had been used to transfer documents and a videotape demonstrating a problem in transporting supplies in a factory. Other simulations demonstrated additional uses for the computer/ITV linkup. An MSU faculty member worked with a school teacher on specific computer materials to help a handicapped student, and an MSU education student tutored a school child in another city.

The use of the ITV network to offer Murray State classes to distant sites is growing. This summer five ITV courses were offered. For fall 1991, eight courses have been scheduled, including four in nursing, and one each English, journalism, education, and speech communication. Each of the fall 1991 courses will be offered in Madisonville as well as in Paducah and Murray.

Murray State and the University of Louisville have been involved in discussions to create a link between the MSU interactive television network and the University of Louisville Technology Research Center to support telecommunication-based economic development.

ADDITIONAL GRANTS

The Department of Biological Sciences at Murray State University has been awarded two grants by the National Institutes of Health (NIH). The first, a \$96,945 research grant, will fund a three-year study to research "Molecular Characterization of Bacterial Luciferase." Dr. Tim Johnston, Associate Professor in the department, submitted the proposal for the grant, which includes support for one undergraduate and two graduate research assistants. This is the second grant Dr. Johnston has received from NIH.

A second NIH grant of \$95,771 has been awarded to the Department of Biological Sciences for a proposal submitted by Dr. Edmund J. Zimmerer, Assistant Professor in the department. The grant will fund a three-year study to identify "Characteristics of a Murine MHC Hotspot of Recombination," including support for three graduate research assistants.

A one-year \$90,000 grant from the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) will allow Dr. Leon Duobinis-Gray, Assistant Professor of Biological Sciences, in conjunction with Dr. David Owen, Associate Professor of Chemistry; Dr. William Maddox, Professor of Physics; and Dr. James Sickel, Associate Professor of Biological Sciences, to conduct an investigation of manganese in the Kentucky Reservoir. The study will also involve six student research assistants.

Dr. David White, Associate Professor of Biological Sciences, has been awarded a \$25,00 grant from TVA in order to hold an exposition and public forum at the Hancock Biological Station in October. The project will bring together representatives of government agencies from Kentucky and Tennessee that are engaged in studies of Kentucky Lake.

Dr. White, in conjunction with Dr. Joe King, Chair of the Department of Biological Sciences, has also been awarded a two-year \$60,000 grant. The grant will allow Dr. White and Dr. King to examine the chemistry and biology of the coves of Kentucky Lake to see what their chemistry is in relation to the lake itself.

Dr. Oliver Muscio, Professor of Chemistry, will direct a \$20,000 grant from the American Chemical Society Petroleum Research Fund for organic chemistry research. Undergraduate students will take part in the study of basic reaction processes of compounds associated with certain herbicides and pharmaceutical agents.

Dr. Tom Timmons, Associate Professor of Biological Sciences, has been awarded a one-year \$10,000 grant from the Tennessee Wildlife Resource Agency. The grant will allow Dr. Timmons and a graduate student to study paddlefish in Kentucky Lake.

A grant of \$4,620 has been awarded to the Murray State College of Fine Arts and Communication by the Kentucky Arts Council to help underwrite a fall conference on the role of higher education and Kentucky Education Reform. The conference, scheduled for September 1991, will bring leaders in the arts in Kentucky together with educational personnel to examine such topics as pre-service training in the arts for public school teachers, cooperation among arts professionals and the schools, and the assessment of arts skills. Bellarmine College and the Kentucky Arts Administrators are also participating in the conference.

RECOGNITION OF MSU STAFF

The 1991 Staff Excellence Awards Ceremony was held May 6, 1991, in the Wrather West Kentucky Museum. Eight Murray State employees were presented with awards of \$500 each in recognition of their outstanding contributions to the University. Recipients included: Jeanie Morgan, Administrative Secretary, Student Activities; Mildred Nichols, Assistant Coordinator, Adult Learning Center; Edward Schnautz, Manager, Hancock Biological Station; Bart Toth, patrol officer, Public Safety; Sherrill Hicks, Custodian, Physical Plant; Kenny Gibson, moving crew foreman; Harry Milton, Chief Engineer, Physical Plant; and Johnny McDougal, Director, Student Financial Aid. In addition, 17 staff retirees were recognized, and service awards for 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, and 30 years of service were presented to 116 Murray State staff members.

Also during the ceremony, Associate Director of Public Safety Joe Green was recognized by the FBI for 25 years of service to various federal law enforcement agencies.

END OF THE YEAR ACTIVITIES

Over 130 Murray State University students who have distinguished themselves through academic achievement and leadership were recognized at the annual Honors Day Ceremony, May 10, 1991. Recognition was in the form of grants, cash awards, certificates and citations by the University and various scholastic and honorary organizations.

Dr. William B. Lalicker, Assistant Professor of English, was also announced as the recipient of the Max G. Carman Outstanding Teacher Award during the ceremony. The award, created by the Student Government Association, honors a faculty member for teaching excellence as evidenced by effectiveness and ability to motivate and inspire students in the classroom and out of the classroom.

More than 1,300 degrees were conferred during Murray State's 68th annual spring commencement exercises May 11, 1991. The Outstanding Senior Man and Woman for 1991 delivered the valedictions and six Regents Awards for Teaching Excellence were presented.

RECENT CAMPUS PROGRAMS

Murray State's Upward Bound program celebrated 25 years on the MSU campus with a reunion held June 28-29, 1991. 165 alumni of the program attended. Upward Bound provides academic and personal support services for high school students who are economically disadvantaged, physically disabled, or firstgeneration students to enhance the likelihood that they will finish high school and enroll in college.

CAMPUS COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Murray's 1991 Freedom Fest was held on the Murray State campus on July 4, 1991. The event featured the MSU/Community Band and Choral Union, local boy scout units, and a fireworks display. All armed forces veterans were recognized, with particular expressions of appreciation and good will directed to the men and women who served in Operation Desert Storm.

ACTIVITIES FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Murray State hosted approximately 350 high school juniors from throughout the Commonwealth for the 45th annual Kentucky Girls State on June 9-14, 1991. Sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, Kentucky Girls State is designed to offer a comprehensive view of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities in American citizenship training in the national government. This is the second year that Girls State has been held on the Murray State campus.

FACULTY/STAFF ACHIEVEMENTS

Dr. Kenneth Carstens, Professor of Sociology, Anthropology and Social Work, and T. M. McNally, Assistant Professor of English, have each been awarded a \$5,500 Presidential Research Fellowship for the 1991-92 academic year. These awards are provided to outstanding Murray State faculty each year.

Dr. Roger Reichmuth, Assistant Dean, College of Fine Arts and Communication, has been appointed Province 15 Governor of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia music fraternity. Province 15 consists of chapters in West Kentucky and West Tennessee.

Dr. Nancy Nygaard, Chair, Department of Nursing, has been selected to serve a two-year term as President of the Kentucky League for Nursing (KLN). KLN is a state affiliate of the National League for Nursing (NLN), which serves as the accrediting agency for nursing education. Dr. Nygaard also serves as president-elect of the Kentucky Association of Baccalaureate and Higher Degree Nursing Programs.

Celia Wall, Acting Director of the Center for International Programs, has been elected vice president of the Kentucky Council for International Education. Founded in 1973, the Council is dedicated to strengthening the international dimension of education and public life in Kentucky by promoting opportunities for students and faculty, raising the awareness of international issues, and sharing resources.

An article by Dr. Kenneth Tucker, Professor of English, was published in the March 1991 issue of the <u>Journal of Evolutionary Psychology</u>.

ATHLETICS

Murray State University athletics closed out the 1990-91 season with a league championship, five NCAA appearances in track, and a recognition as the top men's athletic program in the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC).

The Murray State baseball team won a pivotal season-ending three-game series from second-place Middle Tennessee to clinch the OVC regular-season championship and the right to host the post-season conference tournament. Though the Thoroughbreds were unable to win the OVC Tournament, they did gather their share of individual awards.

Head Coach Johnny Reagan was selected OVC Coach of the Year, his 10th such honor, after leading the 'Breds to a 24-10 record. Junior pitcher Kirk Rueter was named OVC Baseball Player of the Year after fashioning one of the finest seasons in team history. Rueter established a school record with his 10-2 pitching log,

and his 1.20 earned run average ranked second in the nation. Rueter was one of six 'Breds to make the league's all-conference team. Junior pitcher Kent Wallace, senior catcher Jon Grzanich, senior first baseman Jason Haner, and senior outfielder Danny Alfeldt made first-team all-conference, and junior shortstop Shane Witzel made second team.

In track and field, men's sprinter Seibert Straughn, a junior, earned All-America status with his reaching the finals of the NCAA 400-meter dash. On the women's side, the team of sophomore Felicia Upton, senior Crystal Roberson, sophomore Anna Cherry, and senior Stephanie Saleem competed in the NCAA 4x400-meter relay championship event.

At the end of the sports season, Murray State was awarded the OVC Men's All-Sports Trophy, giving the University the honor of having the top overall men's athletic program among all conference schools. The MSU women made a strong showing as well, finishing third in the women's all-sports standings. The award marked the third consecutive year that either the MSU men or women won an OVC all-sports award. Post-season honors continued for the Racer men's basketball squad. Junior center Popeye Jones was selected OVC Male Athlete of the Year, the third time in four years a Racer has been so honored.

The Murray State volleyball team saw three players named pre-season All-OVC. Senior Jill Doty and junior Belinda Rubio were selected First-Team All-OVC, while sophomore Denise Donnelly was named to the second team.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting Basis

The annual financial statements of Murray State University are prepared on an accrual basis of accounting except for depreciation on physical plant and equipment.

Tuition and fee revenues for a semester are recognized upon recording the receivable, normally before or shortly after the semester begins. Revenues of summer school academic terms are reported in the fiscal year in which the programs predominately fall. Therefore deferred tuition revenues are recorded for terms which have not begun at fiscal year-end. State appropriatons revenues are recognized upon receipt.

Expenditures are generally recognized, for interim reporting, in the period expended rather than the period incurred. Some liability accounts on the Balance Sheet are not adjusted until year-end, at which time all expenditures are accrued.

Fund Accounting

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various activities are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified.

Current funds are used primarily to account for the transactions affecting the general operations of the University. These resources are expendable for performing the primary and support objectives of the University. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like is accounted for in the fund owning such assets.

Note 2. Deposits and Investments

The University currently uses commercial banks and the Commonwealth of Kentucky for its depositories. Deposits with commercial banks are covered by Federal depository insurance or collateral held by the bank in the University's name. At the state, the University's accounts are pooled

Note 2. Deposits and Investments (cont.)

with other agencies of the state. These state pooled deposits are substantially covered by Federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the state in the state's name. The investments of the University not held in the state investment pool are insured or registered, or are held by the University or by an agent in the University's name.

Note 3. Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, using first-in-first-out valuation, or market.

Note 4. Murray State University Foundation, Inc.

Murray State University Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) is a Kentucky not-for-profit corporation formed to receive, invest and expend funds for the enhancement and improvement of the University.

The Foundation prepares and issues its own financial statements.

Note 5. Prior Year Carryovers and Encumbrances

Budget Revisions for Prior Year Carryovers and Prior Year Encumbrance Carryovers are based on actual balances brought forward to date from fiscal year 89/90.

Carryovers at June 30, 1990 have been adjusted by \$450,348 to incorporate the reclassification of Athletic deficits from a reduction of Carryovers to a reduction of Unallocated Fund Balance.

Note 6. Tuition and Fees and Scholarships

Incentive Grants of \$1,657,128 have been included as both tuition revenue and as scholarship expenditures. The amounts are \$30,558 for Summer II 1990, \$837,601 for Fall 1990, \$747,253 for Spring 1991, and \$41,716 for Summer I 1991.

Note 7. Unrestricted Expenditures

In addition to expenditures, outstanding encumbrances as of June 30, 1991 are \$701,864 for Educational and General and \$34,407 for Auxiliary Enterprises. These totals include no prior year encumbrances.

- Note 8. Other Changes

Note 1. BASIS OF REVENUE RECOGNITION

Accrual basis accounting is used to recognize interest earnings on the Investment Report.

Note 2. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

The University currently uses commercial banks and the Commonwealth of Kentucky for its depositories. Deposits with commercial banks are covered by Federal depository insurance or collateral held by the bank in the University's name. University funds deposited with the State Treasurer are pooled with funds from other state agencies. These state pooled deposits are substantially covered by Federal depository insurance or by collateral held by the state in the state's name. The investments of the University not held in the state investment pool are insured, registered, or held by the University or by an agent of the University.

Below is a summary of investments held by the University.

Note 3. CURRENT FUNDS - LOCAL BANK ACCOUNT

Per banking contract with People's Bank, interest earnings are based on 100% of the overnight federal funds rate.

Interest earnings may be expended in Current Fund.

Note 4. CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL BUILDING AND REVENUE BOND FUND (CEBRB)

This fund was created, as result of the trust indenture established when the first Consolidated Educational Building and Revenue Bonds were sold in the 1960's, to deposit tuition and fees in order to provide funds to service the principal and interest debt requirements of each series of aforementioned bonds. The fund also supports the Educational and General Fund operations.

The University Finance and Administrative Services personnel have the authority to instruct the Commonwealth of Kentucky Office of Financial Management and Economic Analysis to invest available funds of the CEBRB into government securities and/or Repurchase Agreements for a particular term.

All interest earnings are transferred to Consolidated Educational Renewal and Replacement (CERR) at the end of each fiscal year according to Board of Regents policy dated March 1982. The earnings are then used according to the Board's approval for renewal and replacement projects.

Note 5. AUXILIARY FUNDS - HOUSING AND DINING REVENUE FUND

This fund was created, as a result of the trust indenture established when the first Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds were sold in the 1960's, to deposit all auxiliary income in order to provide funds to service the principal and interest debt requirement of each series of aforementioned bonds. The fund also supports the Auxiliary Fund Operations.

Invested earnings may be expended in Current Unrestricted Auxiliary Fund.

Note 6. ENDOWMENT FUND INVESTMENTS

During 1987, the University was awarded \$500,000 by the Commonwealth of Kentucky for an Endowed Chair for Eco-Systems Studies. One of the requirements of the award was that the University secure \$500,000 in matching funds from private sources. In order to meet this requirement on a timely basis, the MSU Foundation pledged the investment earnings from \$500,000 in their Current Unrestricted Funds until such time as private funds are raised for this purpose.

University discretion, within the Board policy, is used to invest these funds. The earnings are matched by the Murray State University Foundation. Ten percent of the total earnings are returned to the investment pool. Ninety percent of the earnings are transferred to the Endowed Chair grant for program expenditures.

Note 7. CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL RENEWAL AND REPLACEMENT (CERR)

As established by the Board of Regents in March 1982, CERR provides a plant fund sub-group so that funds transferred from CEBRB could be accumulated for future projects of repair and renovation.

Note 7. CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL RENEWAL AND REPLACEMENT (CERR) (cont.)

The University invests the proceeds in the same manner as CEBRB in Note 4.

Interest earnings remain within the fund for future projects.

Note 8. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - SERIES G REVENUE BOND

This capital construction clearing account holds the proceeds from the University's Series G bond sale until such time as they are needed for specific capital construction projects.

The University issued \$14,785,000 in Series G revenue bonds dated December 1, 1987. The proceeds are to be used to pay costs of repair, renovation, construction or addition to buildings on the campus of Murray State University that are and shall be a part of the Consolidated Educational Building Project. This project was established and created by the Board of Regents on April 20, 1961.

The University invests the proceeds in the same manner as CEBRB in Note 4.

Interest earnings on Series G can be spent on the Industry and Technology Building project or any other Educational and General project the Board and State approves.

Note 9. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - PCB/ASBESTOS REMOVAL

In December 1988, the University received the partial proceeds of state-issued bonds for the purpose of funding the removal of asbestos and polychlorinated bipheynols (PCB's) from University property. Cash and bonds payable in the amount of \$1,660,000 were assigned to the University. The University is required to make semi-annual payments of principal and interest in varying amounts through August 2008.

The State invests these proceeds without input from the University.

Interest earnings can be spent on the Abatement Project.

Note 10. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - LIFE SAFETY PROJECTS

In February 1991, the University received the partial proceeds of state issued bonds, State Property and Buildings Commission Project 50 Revenue Bonds, for the purpose of funding the installation of sprinklers in educational and general buildings, removal of polychlorinated bipheynols (PCB's) from university property, and construction of a hazardous waste material storage building. Cash and bonds payable in the amount of \$875,445 were assigned to the University. The University is required to make semi-annual payments of interest and annual payments of principal in varying amounts through February 2010.

Note 10. UNEXPENDED PLANT FUNDS - LIFE SAFETY PROJECTS (cont.)

The State invests these proceeds without input from the University. As of June 30, 1991, no investments have been made.

Interest earnings can be spent on the Life Safety Projects.

Note 11. RETIREMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS - CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL SINKING FUND (CESF)

This fund was created, as a result of the first trust indenture established when the Consolidated Educational Building and Revenue Bonds were sold in the 1960's, to provide a sinking fund to pay debt principal and interest expense on all related CEBRB bonds.

The trustee invests the funds in money market, government securities and, occasionally, repurchase agreements. The trustee determines the investment policy for this fund.

Interest earnings are used to reduce the amount of semi-annual debt service transferred from University Unrestricted Educational and General Fund to this sinking fund. Bond requirements mandate a minimum reserve of \$3,243,241.

Note 12. RETIREMENT OF INDEBTEDNESS - HOUSING AND DINING SINKING FUND

This fund was created, as a result of the establishment of the trust indenture in Note 5, to provide a fund to pay for extraordinary repairs, not paid from the Auxiliary Fund, to the Housing and Dining System buildings.

The trustee invests the funds in the same manner as CESF in Note $10. \,$

Interest earnings are retained in the fund for future use. Bond requirements mandate a minimum reserve of \$550,000.



PART I INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

Murray State University (the "University"), founded in 1922, is a tax-supported regional university with an enrollment of approximately 8,000 students for the 1989-90 year. The University is composed of six colleges offering Associate, Baccalaureate, and Master degrees. In addition, the University operates two agricultural farms, a biological research center, a veterinary center, and other cultural and recreational/preservation centers.

Administratively, the University is organized into the areas of Academic Affairs, Finance and Administrative Services, Student Development, and University Relations and Development.

The University has grants, contracts and agreements with federal, state, local and private agencies or organizations. The activities are classified and accounted for in the current restricted fund of the University. For the year ended June 30, 1990 the University had total restricted expenditures of \$6,993,062, of which \$5,189,795 was federal dollars.

The University participates in several of the Office of Education's Student Financial Assistance Programs including Perkins Loan (Perkins) Nursing Student Loan (NSL), College Work-Study Program (CWSP), Pell Grant (Pell) and Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG). The University also participates in the Stafford Loan Program (Stafford). Loan and financial assistance programs under the sponsorship of the federal agencies included the following expenditures for the year ended June 30, 1990:

During the period covered by the audit, the accounting function for all programs was managed by the Accounting and Financial Services Area.

SCOPE OF AUDITS

In connection with our audit of the general purpose financial statements of Murray State University for the year ended June 30, 1990, we performed the additional auditing and reporting procedures set forth in the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Guidelines for Audits of Federal Awards to Educational Institutions (Guidelines) dated November 1984. It is our understanding that such an audit satisfies the requirements of Attachment F(h) of the U. S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-110 for a periodic audit of nonFederal auditors of Federally-sponsored activities. Our audit was conducted in accordance with:

- Generally accepted auditing standards;
- . The standards for financial audits contained in the U.S. General Accounting Office, <u>Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations</u>, <u>Programs</u>, <u>Activities and Functions</u> (1988 Revision); and
- Audit Guide for Student Financial Assistance Programs, dated March 1990. We also performed the additional auditing and reporting procedures set forth in the U.S. Department of Education Audit Guide.

To meet the above requirements our audit included:

- Expressing an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of Murray State University, the Schedule of Changes in Federal Award Fund Balances and the Statement of Changes in Student Financial Assistance Program Fund Balances for the year ended June 30, 1990.
- Evaluating the University's internal control structure established to ensure proper accountability of Federal funds and adherence to the uniform administrative requirements of OMB Circular A-110;
- . Commenting on compliance with certain specific terms and conditions of Federal awards set forth in Section 3.6 of Guidelines, and applicable cost principles of OMB Circular A-21: and related Department of Education regulations, policies and procedures;
- Commenting on certain other matters, namely financial reporting to Federal agencies and resolution of prior audit findings and recommendations; and
- Reconciliation of the information reported on the University financial statements with amounts reported to the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Education.

PART II FINANCIAL SECTION

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON SUPPLEMENTARY SCHEDULES OF FEDERAL FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Board of Regents Murray State University

We have audited the financial statements of Murray State University (an agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky) for the year ended June 30, 1990, and have issued our reports thereon dated August 31, 1990. These financial statements are the responsibility of the University's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. (See appendices.)

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and the standards for financial audits contained in the U. S. General Accounting Office Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions, (1988 revision), Guidelines for Audits of Federal Awards to Educational Institutions, (November 1984) and the U. S. Department of Education Audit Guide for Student Financial Assistance Programs, (March 1990). Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Changes in Federal Award Fund Balances (p. 4) and Schedule of Changes in Student Financial Assistance Program Fund Balances (p. 7) are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements of Murray State University, and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO SCHEDULE OF CHANGES IN FEDERAL AWARD FUND BALANCES

1. Basis of Presentation:

The accompanying Schedule of Changes in Federal Award Fund Balances has been prepared following the instructions of the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services as set forth in Guidelines. The purpose of the schedule is to present a summary of the financial activities of Murray State University for the year ended June 30, 1990, which have been financed by the U. S. Government (Federal awards). It includes all Federal assistance and procurement relationships (excluding Financial Assistance Awards) entered into directly between Murray State University and the Federal Government and identified subgrants from nonFederal organizations made under Federally-sponsored agreements. Because the schedule presents only Federal fund activities of the University, it is not intended to and does not present either the financial position, changes in fund balances or the current fund revenues and other additions, expenditures, transfers and other deductions of the University.

2. Significant Accounting Policies:

The accounting and reporting principles followed by the University in each of these areas and used in preparing the accompanying schedule are as follows:

Federal Awards - Expenditures for direct costs are recognized as incurred using the accrual method of accounting and the cost accounting principles contained in the U. S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-21, Cost Principles for Educational Institutions. Under these cost principles, certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement. Moreover expenditures include a portion of costs associated with general college activities (indirect costs) which are allocated to Federal awards under negotiated formulas commonly referred to as indirect cost rates. Revenues, in turn, are recognized in amounts equal to direct costs incurred and related indirect costs recovered.

Indirect Costs - Indirect costs are charged to Federal and other programs at fixed rates at the time direct costs are incurred. Indirect cost rates are determined by contractual agreement with the sponsoring agency.

<u>Direct Costs - Equipment</u> - Only equipment charged directly to grants and contracts is included as a direct cost; the use of other college-owned equipment is allocated as indirect costs.

NOTES TO SCHEDULE OF CHANGES IN FEDERAL AWARD FUND BALANCES, Continued

2. Significant Accounting Policies, continued:

<u>Fringe Benefits</u> - The University charges allowable retirement expenses, social security taxes, employer paid health insurance and life insurance, worker's compensation and disability insurance as direct costs to sponsored projects based on the salaries and wages. Compensated absences, including vacations, are charged to the appropriate contract when expended.

3. Indirect Costs:

Indirect cost rates applied to grants and contracts are negotiated in the original contract. Certain contracts have different indirect cost rates which have been specifically agreed to by the sponsor.

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NOTES TO STATEMENT OF CHANGES IN STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FUND BALANCES

1. Basis of Presentation: The accompanying Statement of Changes in Student Financial Assistance ("SFA") Program fund balances for the Pell Grant, SEOG, CWS, and Perkins Loan programs has been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and the format as set forth in the publication, Audit Guide for Student Financial Assistance Programs, March 1990. The purpose of the statement is to present, in summary form, SFA activities of the University for the year ended June 30, 1990 which have been financed by the U. S. Department of Education. Except as described in the following paragraph, generally accepted accounting principles are in agreement with the accounting practices prescribed for such programs by the Department of Education's fiscal control and fund accounting procedures.

The prescribed practices for the Perkins Loan program do not provide for accrual of interest on student loans receivable or for a provision of allowance for doubtful loans. Accordingly, interest on loans is recorded as received; uncollectible loans are not recognized until the loans are cancelled or written-off in conformity with Perkins Loan program requirements. These practices do not conform to generally accepted accounting principles.

Because the statement presents only a selected portion of the activities of the University, it is not intended to and does not present either the financial position, changes in fund balances or the current funds, revenues, expenditures, and other changes in fund balances of the University.

2. Significant Accounting Policies:

Student Financial Aid - Expenditures are recognized on the accrual basis for awards made to students and allowable administrative expenses of running such programs. Revenues, in turn, are recognized in amounts equal to such expenditures.

<u>Perkins Loan Program</u> - The Perkins Loan program is funded by the Federal government under the Perkins Loan program.

Activity related to this loan program in the accompanying statement includes capital transactions such as Federal and University contributions, loans cancelled, and changes in the allowance for uncollectible loans. It also reflects operating items, e.g., revenues arising from interest earned on loans and expenditures for administrative and collection costs.

We have audited the basic financial statements of Murray State University (the "University") for the year ended June 30, 1990, and have issued our report thereon dated August 31, 1990. part of our audit, we made a study and evaluation of the University's internal control structure used in administering federal financial assistance programs to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the systems as required by generally accepted auditing standards, the standard for financial audits contained in the Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions issued by the U. S. General Accounting Office (1988 revision); the 1984 provisions of OMB Circular A-110, Grants and Agreements with Institutions of Higher Education, Hospitals, and Other Nonprofit Organizations; the U.S. Department of Education Audit Guide for Student Financial Assistance Programs (March 1990) and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Guidelines for Audits of Federal Awards to Educational Institutions (November 1984). For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal accounting and administrative controls used in administering federal financial assistance programs in the following categories:

The management of the University is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure for use in administering federal financial assistance programs. In fulfilling that responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of internal control systems used in administering federal financial assistance programs are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that, with respect to federal financial assistance programs, resource use is consistent with laws, regulations and policies; resources are safeguarded against waste, loss and misuse; and reliable data are obtained, maintained and fairly disclosed in reports.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting and administrative controls used in administering federal financial assistance programs, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the systems to future period is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study included all of the applicable control categories listed above. With respect to internal control systems used in administering major programs, our study and evaluation included considering the types of errors, irregularities, and noncompliance that could occur, determining the internal control procedures that should prevent or detect such errors and irregularities, determining whether the necessary procedures are prescribed and are being followed satisfactorily, and evaluating any weaknesses.

With respect to the internal control system used solely in administering certain other nonmajor Federal assistance programs of the University, our study and evaluation was limited to a preliminary review of the systems to obtain an understanding of the control environment and the flow of transactions through the accounting systems. Our study and evaluation of the internal control systems used solely in administering these certain other nonmajor programs did not extend beyond this preliminary review phase.

Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the internal control systems used in administering the Federal financial assistance programs of the University. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the internal control systems used in administering the Federal financial assistance programs of the University.

Also, our audit, made in accordance with standards mentioned above, would not necessarily disclose material weaknesses in the internal control systems used solely in administering the certain nonmajor programs. However, our study and evaluation and our audit disclosed no conditions that we believe to be a material weakness in relation to Federal financial assistance programs of the University.

This report is intended solely for the use of Murray State University, the U. S. Department of Education and the cognizant agency, the Department of Health and Human Services and should not be used for any other purpose. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report, which, upon acceptance by the University is a matter of public record.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON MATTERS FOR OMB CIRCULAR A-110 ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS AND DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS

Board of Regents Murray State University

We have audited the financial statements of Murray State University (the "University") for the year ended June 30, 1990 and have issued our report thereon dated August 31, 1990. audit was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards for financial audits contained in the Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions, issued by the U. S. General Accounting Office (1988 revision); and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. Our audit also included tests of controls to ensure compliance with the provisions of certain major compliance features identified in OMB Circular A-110 and Section 3.1.2 and 3.1.3 of the Guidelines for Audits of Federal Awards to Educational Institutions, (November 1984) and Section II of the Audit Guide for Student Financial Assistance Programs, (March 1990).

In connection with the audit referred to above, we selected and tested transactions and records of those programs on the List of Projects Sampled (page 21). The purpose of our testing of transactions and records from the major and other nonmajor programs was to obtain reasonable assurance that the University had, in all material respects, administered the major programs and executed the tested nonmajor transactions, in compliance with laws and regulations, including those pertaining to financial reports and claims for advances and reimbursements, noncompliance with which we believe could have a material effect on the allowability of program expenditures. Based on our audit, we found that for the award items tested, the University complied with the material terms and conditions of the Federal award agreements.

The management of the University is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure which ensures the University's compliance with laws and regulations. Our testing of transactions and records selected from the major programs noted above disclosed instances of noncompliance with those laws and regulations, none of which we believe is material to the individual program. All instances of noncompliance that we found and the programs to which they relate are identified in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Recommendations.

Continued

In our opinion, for the year ended June 30, 1990, the University administered each of the major programs, in compliance, in all material respects, with laws and regulations including those pertaining to financial reports and claims for advances and reimbursements, noncompliance with which we believe could have a material effect on the allowability of program expenditures.

The results of our testing of transactions and records selected from the other nonmajor programs indicate that for the transactions and records tested, the University complied with those provisions of laws and regulations referred to in the above second paragraph of our report, except as noted in the accompanying Schedule of Findings. Our testing was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on whether the University administered those other nonmajor programs in compliance in all material respects with those laws and regulations noncompliance with which we believe could have a material effect on the allowability of program expenditures; however, with respect to the transactions and records that were not tested by us, nothing came to our attention to indicate that the University had not complied with laws and regulations other than those laws and regulations for which we noted violations in our testing referred to above.

This report is intended solely for the use of management of Murray State University, the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Education and other associated Federal organizations, and should not be used for any other purpose. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report, which, upon acceptance of the University, is a matter of public record.

We noted no matters as a result of our audit which are required to be reported as findings or recommendations.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

SCHEDULE OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Wrong Estimated Cost of Education Recorded on Guaranteed Student Loan Application:

During our review of the Guaranteed Student Loan/Stafford Loan Program we noted that from a sample of 25 students, the estimated cost of education was recorded wrong on one student's Guaranteed Student Loan Application. This error did not result in the wrong calculation of student need, as that amount was recorded correctly on the GSL application.

<u>University Response</u>

The University feels this was an isolated incident, and, as described above, the S.A.F.E. system is an adequate control to ensure correct calculation of student need.

Notice not Given at Required Times During Grace Periods:

During our review of the Perkins Loan Program we noted that notices are not mailed to borrowers at proper times during the six- and nine-month grace periods. Currently, for six-month grace periods, the University mails notices at 90 and 150 days on loans paid in monthly installments and at 45 and 120 days on loans paid in quarterly installments. For nine-months grace periods, notices are mailed at 120 and 240 days on loans paid monthly and at 90 and 180 days for loans paid quarterly. Federal regulations require contact at 90 and 150 days for all loans with six-month grace periods and contact at 90, 150 and 240 days for all loans with nine-month grace periods.

We recommend that procedures be put in place in order to ensure compliance with Federal regulations.

University Response

The mailing of the above notices has been corrected to conform with the Federal Regulations for six-month grace periods and nine-month grace periods. The change was implemented in August 1990.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

SCHEDULE OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS, Continued

Final Demand Notices Are not Mailed at Proper Times:

During our review of the Perkins Loan Program we noted that from a sample of two past due accounts examined, neither borrower was mailed final demand notices at the proper time. Currently, the University mails the final demand notice 30 days after the second overdue notice is mailed. Federal regulations require the final demand notice be sent within 15 days after the second overdue notice is mailed.

We recommend that the University reorganize their current schedule for mailing notices in order to conform to Federal requirements.

University Response

The mailing of the final demand notice has been changed to 15 days after the second overdue notice to comply with Federal Regulations. The change was implemented in August 1990.

Late Charges Are not Assessed on Past Due Accounts:

During our review of the Perkins Loan Program we noted that from a sample of two past due accounts examined, neither account had late charges assessed as required by Federal Regulation 674.43(b)(2).

We recommend the adoption of sufficient controls in order to ensure the proper assessment of late charges as prescribed by Federal regulations.

University Response

Late charged are now being assessed on all past due accounts of the Perkins Loan Program. The change was implemented in February 1991. Coopers &Lybrand
