Orchid Craze.
The sale during the past week of the magnificent collection of orchids, belonging to the late Mrs. Mary J. Morgan, has caused a great furor among orchid enthusiasts. The Morgan collection cost \$200,000, and the entire sale only realized about \$40,000, though individual plants sold higher than at the great Mendel sale a few years ago in England, when the highest price paid for one plant was \$400. The finest collection in this country is found in New Jersey, belonging to Mr. Such. Another very fine collection is in Rochester, N. Y., owned by Mr. Kimball, the greatest collector of orchids. A register is kept at the conservatory, and every week the strange plants are admired by hundreds of people, led there by curiosity and the popular orchid mania.
