### 15 LYNCHERS IN OHIO MAY GO TO CHAIR.

Governor Harmon and Attorney-General After Conference Over Evidence Indicate That Leaders Will Either Go to Penitentiary or to the Electric Chair.

(Special to the Daily Sun.)... By Nat. News Association Service. Columbus, O., July 12.—It is expected that fifteen or more arrests in connection with the lynching of the white detective Etherington here last Friday night will be made before the close of the day. Governor Harmon and Attorney-General Denham held a consultation over the evidence secured last night. The governor will demand that the leaders of the disgraceful scene in Newark must be landed in the penitentiary, if not sent to the electric chair.

### NEGRO WARNED.

High License Negro Abused and Made To Leave Town.

In an article in the whiskey sheet of the Leader, and in a circular, yesterday, the whiskey set come out and try to make it appear that a certain negro brought here by the "rum ring" was "abused and made to leave town" by the local option people.

This is merely a case of the same old dog up to the same old tricks. Here are the facts in the case:

Recently the liquor set of this city employed a colored orator from Bowling Green to come here and deliver to them in the pending election the negro vote. This colored orator came and had his first meeting with his race last Friday night. On Monday night, last, he attended the meeting of the local option people at the colored M. E. church, and there met some of the white local option people and had a plain, frank talk with them. He said that he had been invited here by the so-called high-license folks, that they had written him that nearly all of the business men of this city were in favor of the saloons; that only a few bootleggers were against them, and that these business men joined in the invitation to him to come and deliver to them the negro vote; that he came under that impression to find out that that was not the case, but that about all the business men in the city were opposed to the saloon and that he could not afford to remain that being the case. This colored man was not "abused and made to leave town," and that fact can be established by witnesses innumerable and of the best character in this city. The next day the colored man referred to quietly consulted some of his colored friends and left town.

So this is the situation, and it is plain to all concerned that the whiskey ring is just made, and chagrined, and "blue" and despondent, because they face a defeat even this far from the election. They know they are down and out and they are doing their best to try to rally, but their ship is sinking and there is not the slightest hope for them.

We merely had this to say that the liquor set be not able to mislead any of the rest of our people as they have the colored orator from Bowling Green.

### A Letter.

Fulton, Ky., July 13th, 1910.

It has been reported that I will vote for saloon to come back to Fulton. I emphatically deny having made such a statement. I know the evil of whiskey and can not afford to vote for a thing to come back to our city and surrounding country. Had it not been for whiskey I would, no doubt be throttling an engine up and down the I. C. today. Only 3 drinks was the cause. But it don't bother me now and I am proud to say, I have a little boy and how can I or any other man who has children that will stop and think, vote for that curse to come back here, and know at the same time it has ruined so many young men, and so many happy homes. Just look around us at the effects of whiskey, has done we don't have to call it out, we know it seems to me any man of a fair mind, if he has a thirst for whiskey even would not want it to come back to our town, knowing the evilness of it, the class of people that their return will bring to our midst. ### Hancock County Victory.

June 16, a local option election was held in Hancock county, including Hawesville. The victory was overwhelming. The majority was 835 out of 1,300 total votes cast. Every precinct in the county was carried "dry." One precinct gave 147 "dry" to 6 "wet." Another, 142 "dry" to 20 "wet." The liquor forces did not poll one-half the votes they had on their petition.

The liquor people sent down two orators to make speeches, Messrs. Smith and Story. They did splendid work for the "drys." It would pay the Anti-Saloon League to cover the expenses of these "wet" orators in every local option election. The argument they can put up is just about like this: "The liquor traffic is a bad business, but there is a pile of money in it for us." All the rest of their arguments have been answered so many times that it is a weariness to the flesh to notice them.—The Issue.

### Business Men of Fulton.

In nearly every town where there has been a local option election called for, the liquor forces have made a big "to-do" about the "Business Men's League" or "Club" or some such name, as being for the saloon. On investigation, it is almost invariably found that the said "business men" are liquor men or men who want to rent property for saloon purposes at a much higher rent than they could get for them otherwise. Fulton has a so-called "Business Men's League" who are advocating the return of saloons. The other "business men" of Fulton have just published their names in the Fulton Daily Leader of June 20, which contains the names of seventy-eight of the leading men and firms of that city as being opposed to the saloon.

### ORDER OF ELECTION

Regular June Term—Judge W. A. Naylor, the Regular Judge, Presiding.

Fulton County Court, June 13, 1910.

John Melton, et al,

vs.

Order of Election.

Whereas, at a special term of the County Court of Fulton County, Kentucky, held by the regular Judge, of said Court, on the 18th day of May, 1910, an application by written petition signed by a number of legal voters of the City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, equal to twenty-five per cent of the votes cast in the last city election held in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, before said date, was presented and considered, petitioning the Judge of the County Court of Fulton County, Kentucky, to make an order on his order book directing that an election be held in said City of Fulton, Kentucky, on the 21st day of July, 1910, which order shall direct the sheriff, or other officer of the said county who may be appointed to hold said election to open a poll at each and all of the voting places in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, on said date for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal voters of the last named city who are qualified to vote at an election for county officers upon the proposition whether or not the local option law now in force in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, shall become inoperative, and John Melton, &c.

vs.

Petition.

In this proceeding came W. A. Hall, A. J. Burrow, R. T. Rudd, and other citizens of Fulton, Ky., by their attorney, T. N. Smith, and announced before the court that they as representatives of the local option people, had no objections to these proceedings and moved the court to order the election prayed for in the petition heretofore filed and that same be held on the day named in said petition, as the proper manner to test the will of the people on the question, presented by said petition, and thereupon, and on motion of John E. Melton and the other petitioners, the court being duly advised and satisfied that sufficient names of legal voters in the said City of Fulton, equal to twenty-five per cent and more of the number of votes cast at the last city election, held in and for said City of Fulton, Ky., in November, 1909, are signed to said petition, the court is hereby ordered upon the payment into court of the sum of \$110.00 to defray the expenses of holding said election, the said sums being fixed as the proper amount by said court.

Whereas, said application by written petition was at said special term of the Fulton County Court, held on the 18th day of May, 1910, in open court received by the Judge thereof, and was filed and made a part of the record herein and entered upon the order book of said court.

Now, on this, the 13th day of June, 1910, at the regular June term of said court, it appearing to the satisfaction of the court from the said petition filed (no objections being made thereto), that the signatures of said petition are genuine and that said petitioners are residents of the City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, and legal voters therein, and that they are equal in numbers to twenty-five per cent of the votes cast at the last city election held in and for said City of Fulton, Kentucky, before said petition was filed as aforesaid, and the court being advised, adjudges any orders that an election be held at the time, to-wit, on the 21st day of July, 1910, and for the purpose stated in the petition, and that Gualder Johnson, Sheriff of Fulton County, Kentucky, open a poll at each and all of the voting places in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, on the 21st day of July, 1910, for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal voters of said City of Fulton, Kentucky, who are qualified to vote at an election for county officers upon the proposition whether or not the local option law now in force in the City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, shall become inoperative.

It is further ordered by the court that the 14th day of July, 1910, be fixed as a day for registration of those persons entitled to vote at such election whose names have not been recorded on the registration book at the last regular registration in said City of Fulton, Kentucky, and the County Board of Election Commissioners will provide for and hold the same held as required by law and will further provide for the holding of said election on the 21st day of July, 1910, as required by law.

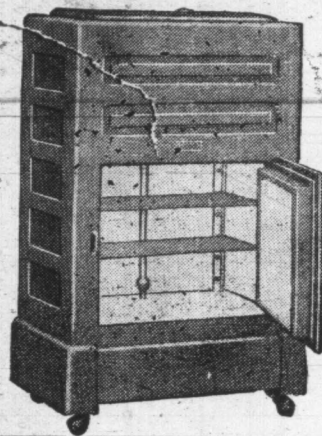

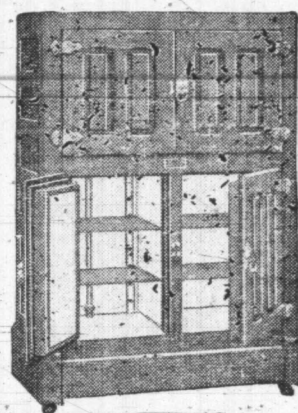

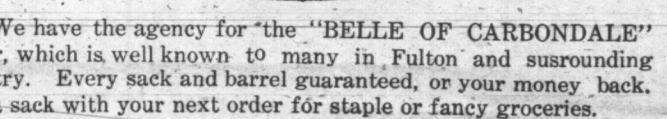
