## City Mail Delivery Is Expected To Start Apr. 1

COLLECTION BOXES TO BE LOCATED AT 3 POINTS ON CITY ROUTES

"Everything is in readiness at the local Post Office for starting city mail delivery and the Postmaster has suggested to the Post Office department that delivery be started on April 1." Postmaster C. B. Cox said today.

He also pointed out that a few of the patrons have not yet provided numbers for their homes that are within the routes already laid out and indicated by the city Board. "This," he said, "should be done immediately." Numbering materials may be obtained from any member of the Lions club.

Mr. Cox also pointed out that patrons are required to provide their homes and business houses with approved delivery boxes. These boxes have also been arranged for by the local Lions club and are on sale at the Fleming Furniture store on Main street here.

Free delivery has been planned for the entire city, with the following exceptions: A street; B street, 1st street; West 9th street from Walnut to Pine; Pine street from 8th to 12th; West 12th street west. Delivery stops on Walnut street at 1600 (Ed Austin's). It stops on Main street at 1508. There will be no delivery on Birch street from 13th to 14th streets, nor on Elm street from 13th to 14th.

## Heavy Rains Cause Clark's River To Flood Lowlands First Of Week

TRAFFIC IS HALTED IN SEVERAL SECTIONS OF WEST KENTUCKY

Trains were held up Monday morning between Murray and Benton because of a washout of the rail lines of the N. C. railroad near Hardin. Rains during the first part of the week, which almost reached flood proportions, halted traffic on the Mayfield highway, when water washed out a bridge near Brewster. Water from Clark's river on highway 88 East of Benton, was up to the level of his road Tuesday morning.

Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Hooper, who reside on North Main and Paducah highway, moved out of their home when water crept under the house, which was caused by backwater from the North part of the Clark's river here. Another nearby house was reported flooded. High water on Clark's river was believed to have reached an all time high record.

The swift headwaters on the West fork of Clark's river also overflowed to cut off travel to Symsonia via the Oaks and Sals roads.

Water was also reported over one of the highways in the vicinity of Hardin.

A bright sunshine and cooler weather Wednesday brought hopes that the rainy season was over.

RIDER STATES THAT A TOTAL OF ONE MILLION RECEIVED SINCE 1940

On Thursday February 24, Marshall county will receive the largest truck load of trees ever shipped into any one county in the state of Kentucky. This load of 337,000 seedlings includes 317,000 pines, 19,000 locust, and 2,000 poplar.

According to Robert R. Rider, county forestry agent, this shipment will send Marshall county's total trees shipped in since 1940, soaring above the one million mark. According to Mr. Rider, farmers should be proud of it.

new inexpensive gadgets known as a Gunner's Guide, a product of the Poly Choke Company. This little device is like a compass but easier to read and follow than the ordinary compass. It fits permanently into the stock of your gun and just by pointing the weapon you can travel a true course back to home base.

Here's how it works: First, you select a starting point your automobile, or any landmark as a cabin, certain spot on a river bank, etc. Then walk a ways in the direction you plan to hunt, but not out of sight of the landmark. Then turn and aim your gun at the landmark, making sure that there is no other gun or iron or steel object near the Gunner's Guide. By holding the gun perfectly level, the needle point will swing freely, then all you have to do is turn the graduated revolving rim of the Gunner's Guide until the white indicator dot is directly over the white end of the needle. This sets the Gunner's Guide for your hunt.

Then, later on, when you want to return to the landmark just start pointing the gun in the general direction and when the white dot and needle point line up, that's the direction to go.

Sounds simple, doesn't it. Well, it is and it'll save you an extra mile of tough, hard walking. And every hunter knows that walking towards the end of a hard hunt is tough.

In wilderness country the Gunner's Guide could prevent serious trouble - and being lost in the vast reaches of the north country or in mountains is serious. Anyway, we're planning on saving those extra steps at the end of each day's hunting for we're one of those individuals who have extreme difficulty in finding the way when the sun's not shining.

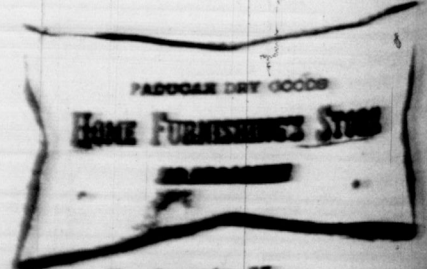

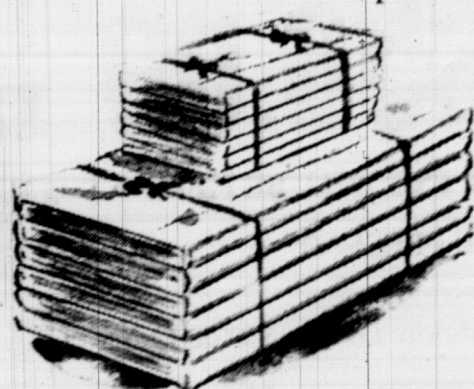
