NEW MAYOR NOW IN CHARGE OF NEWARK'S AFFAIRS

Had Been in Office an Hour When He Had Removed Police Chief and Captain of Police. Lawless Element Will be Brought Under Subject

Newark, O., July 11.—Before he had been in office an hour this evening, J. N. Ankle, the vice Mayor elevated to the office of chief executive of Newark following the suspension of Mayor Herbert Atherton by Gov. Harmon, and summarily removed Chief of Police Zerbe and Police Captain Robert Bell.

He gave as his grounds for removal the non-enforcement of the county option law, which resulted in the lynching of Detective Carl Etherington Friday night.

He appointed in their stead Chas. Hindel a former Deputy Sheriff as chief and patrolman Charles Swann as captain. He gave them orders to commence the immediate enforcement of all laws to the letter.

As soon as the new police officials had assumed office they caused the arrest of a second negro, who is held in connection with the Friday riots. "Vance" Moore, of Zanesville, is alleged to have struck Carl Etherington, the detective who was lynched, just prior to the fatal shooting of William Howard. Moore is the second colored rioter arrested, Levi Valentine, a colored mute, having been arrested in the afternoon.

Mayor Atherton upon receipt of a telegram from Gov. Harmon late this afternoon, immediately turned over his office to Ankle. "I will, of course, put up a defense," he declared. "I have a witness who will testify that the local 'dry' leaders refused point blank to file charges against the 'speak eases' with me because they did not want me to have the credit of cleaning up the town. I will not step down tame-

ly. Levi Valentine, a colored mute, was arrested today and charged with being one of the rioters who mangled the telegraph pole used in battering down the jail doors Friday night. This is the first arrest since the lynching of Carl Etherington, the "dry" detective. The warrant was issued by Prosecuting Attorney Smythe and the arrest was made secretly as trouble was feared if it became known to the general public.

Formal Charges Against Sheriff
Formal charges against Sheriff Linke, of Licking county, for failure to stop the lynching of Detective Etherington last Friday night, were made today, the paper being signed by Common Pleas Judge Chas. W. Seward and other prominent people of Newark. These charges were immediately forwarded to Gov. Harmon.

Judge Seward has issued a venire for a special grand jury to meet next Monday to investigate the lynching. "This city has been for years in the hands of lawbreakers," said Judge Seward today, "and the high officials of the city and county openly connive at violations of law and have defied the courts. The tragedy of Friday night has aroused the city and the law abiding element is determined to see that the lynchers are punished."

Over Two Thousand at Etherington Funeral
Springfield, Ky., July 11.—The funeral of Carl Etherington, the young man who was so brutally murdered at Newark, O., Friday night, took place from the Christian church at Willsburg at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The body of the boy reached the home of the boy's parents at midnight last night.

At the Etherington home there were between 1,500 and 2,000 people extending sympathy to the bereaved parents. Mrs. Etherington was in a serious condition, and Dr. W. W. Hiatt, of Willsburg, the family physician, who was with her all night,

advised that it was best for her not to attend the funeral, but in spite of all she was present.

Various parties estimated the crowd to be between 2,500 and 3,000 from this and adjoining counties. The funeral was preached by the Rev. Jesse Grubbs, of the Christian church. He spoke of the untimely death of young Etherington, and stated that he died the death of a hero performing his duties.

The minister read a letter addressed to Hartwell Etherington, father of the boy, from W. B. Wheeler, superintendent and attorney for the Ohio Anti-Saloon League, which is as follows:

"Ohio Anti-Saloon League, Columbus, O.—Mr. Hartwell Etherington, Willsburg, Ky.—Dear Sir: As I understand, you are the father of Mr. Carl Etherington, who was lynched last night at Newark, O. A great many conflicting statements have gone into the papers concerning what your son is supposed to have said just before he was killed. The men who were nearest to him give the information that makes me believe that he died a hero rather than a coward. I hope you will not consider the services in which he was engaged as unworthy of a son of yours."

Died Doing His Duty.

"He was deputized as a special officer, and was killed while doing his duty. I believe the outcome of it all will be a better law enforcement and a better condition of affairs in this part of the State. Kindly express to Mrs. Etherington my deepest sympathy in the loss which you have sustained in his death. You will both have the satisfaction HRDL will both, however, have the satisfaction of knowing that he died in an effort to do his duty, and to have the laws of the State of Ohio enforced. "Friends View the Body.

At the conclusion of the services the friends of the deceased came forward and viewed the body.

Many messages of sympathy, and condolence have been received at the Etherington home today, one being a telegram from the Licking County Law and Order League of Newark, O., which is as follows:

"Newark, Ohio, July 11.—Mr. and Mrs. Etherington, Willsburg, Ky.: Licking County Law and Order League, representing thousands of our best citizens and recognizing the great service rendered by your son, Carl Etherington, in the interest of law and order in the county, express their profound regret at his tragic death and tender their sincere sympathy to you in this hour of your sorrow."

Will Help Business.

If any class of men should welcome local option it should be the business interests of Fulton. They may be told that local option will retard the growth of the city but don't believe it. Other counties and cities which are "dry" in Kentucky do not report that to have been their experience.

The business men may be old that when the city is "dry" people from the surrounding towns and farms will not come here to trade because they cannot get anything to drink. The argument is not a weighty one. Your man who comes to Fulton just for a drink don't spend much of his money in the stores after he gets here.

When Mr. Citizen is not spending his money for liquor he is buying more groceries and meats.

When Husband is not giving the saloon man a share of his money every week he is buying more shoes for the boys and girls and keeping wife and mother better dressed. He even buys more toys for himself.

When the man of the house is not pouring a share of his salary into the lap of the saloon man he is giving mother that carpet she has wanted for the house or the new bedroom suit.

Your drinking man is not thinking much about building new houses or buying real estate but let him cut it out for awhile and see how quick he begins to struggle up to the idea of a new home or taking a little flyer in dirt.

Even the theatres feel the "dry" influence. They may lose a dollar or

two from the reason that some may not come to this city attracted by the glittering of the bar. But home folks are going to have more coin to spend on legitimate amusements.

It is the real beauty of the whole thing is the fact that people are going to do business on a cash basis. They are going to pay for what they buy and are going to settle up a lot of old scores.

The majority of business men of Fulton are local optionists. Why? Because they are far sighted enough to see that it will be of real benefit to the city of Fulton, Ky.

FAMOUS VIOLINIST DIED IN HELENA.

Pallas Brown, Of Clinton, Died in Helena, Mont., of Complication of Diseases.

A telegram from Helena, Montana, received by the family in Clinton, Wednesday afternoon announced the serious illness of Pallas Brown, a famous violinist there. Thursday morning another message was received that the musician could hold out no longer and his recovery, and yesterday a third message came stating that he died last night at the Helena hospital.

His death was a complication of diseases following an attack of measles.

His brother, Prof. H. S. Brown, left for Helena, yesterday morning but has not had time to reach there. It is the purpose to have the body sent to Clinton, but it will hardly reach there before next Wednesday or Thursday as it is a long journey from Montana to Kentucky.

As our reader of this paper knows, Pallas Brown had an almost world wide fame as a violinist and at the time he was stricken down he was touring the Northwest under the direction of a Lyceum bureau. He was a Clinton boy in whom all took a pride, and his death falls upon the community as a blow we were ill-prepared for.

His mother and brothers, whose home is in Clinton, have the sympathy of everyone in their great sorrow.

PARALYTIC STROKE PROVES FATAL.

Mrs. Jimmons Dies at Dukedom and Buried Friday at Eleven O'clock.

The wife of Dr. J. E. Simmon, of Dukedom, who died Thursday, was buried at eleven o'clock Friday morning in the Dukedom cemetery. She was one of the best known women in that section and was beloved for her kindness and truly Christian character. She had been ill but a few days, having been stricken with paralysis a few days ago while attending the burial of a friend. The sudden stroke rendered her speechless and she was never able to utter another word. The case is indeed a lamentable one and the husband has the sympathy of that section in his loss. Besides a devoted husband the deceased is survived by six children, five girls and one boy.

MAYOR FALL IS FOR HIGH LICENSE

Sets to Rest All Idle Rumors as to His Position

SID DODDS KILLS WHITE MAN IN HICKMAN

Leslie French Alleged to Have Threatened Mr. Dodds Because Latter Had Caused His Arrest.

Leslie French, white, age about 30 years was instantly killed today at Hickman by Sid L. Dodds, a wealthy citizen of the Fulton county capital.

Soon after the tragedy a representative of this paper got into communication with Mr. Dodds and asked for his version of the tragedy. In reply to queries Mr. Dodds said he preferred to not give out any statement previous to his examining trial. He referred the reporter to a Mr. Walker at the Mengel Box Factory, whom he said could give us a history of the trouble. When interviewed over the telephone Mr. Walker also refused to give us any information, but promised to tell the story later, after he had a chance to consult with Mr. Dodds.

According to the best information obtainable the facts in this deplorable tragedy are as follows: Several days ago Mr. Dodds caused a warrant to be sworn out for Leslie French and three other men who, it is alleged, mistreated a negro employed upon the Dodds farm in the bottom. The four men were arrested and cited to trial today before Judge Naylor.

The white men, it is claimed were angry with Mr. Dodds for having them arrested and it is further alleged, threatened him with violence. This morning Mr. Dodds, in his automobile, started out to his farm. The engine was working imperfectly and Mr. Dodds stopped the car to ascertain the trouble. While he was thus engaged French and his three companions approached. It is alleged that the four men advanced upon Mr. Dodds in a threatening manner where upon he snatched up a shot gun from the floor of the automobile and fired point blank at French, who was in front.

The entire load of shot struck French in the forehead and tore a great gaping hole in his skull. Death was instantaneous.

After the killing Mr. Dodds returned to town and surrendered to Sheriff Goadler Johnson. As no warrant was sworn out for him he was permitted to go to his home pending his preliminary trial, which has not yet been set.

Sid Dodds is one of the wealthiest citizens of Fulton county and numbers his friends by the thousands. He is a public spirited citizen and is one of the greatest boosters Hickman has. His friends are sorry for the part Mr. Dodds played in this tragedy but they believe it was forced upon him.

Leslie French, the man killed had been residing in or near Hickman for the past five years. He was unmarried. He formerly worked for the Mengel Box Factory but for the past few months he had been working on a farm in the bottom.

"I have in no way changed my position on the high license question," said Mayor Fall at a meeting of the general committee of the Business Men's League at their headquarters in the Usona Hotel at two o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Then turning to a newspaper man who was present Mayor Fall said:

"You can write an article touching on my position which can once and for all settle any doubt as to how I stand on this question of high license. I signed the petition to have an election on the local option question. I have no hesitancy in saying I FAVOR THE HIGH LICENSE SYSTEM OVER THE PRESENT DISTRESSING BOOTLEG REGIME. Conditions are different in Fulton now from what they were four years ago when I favored local option. This should set at rest once for all all idle statements attributed to me and MY FRIENDS SHOULD PAY NO ATTENTION TO STREET RUMORS."

At the committee meeting at which the mayor boldly reiterated his position for high license some of the best business men of Fulton were present. Among those in attendance were E. M. Brown, Chas. Binford, W. H. Powers, Lon Jones, Frank Carr, R. M. Chowning, E. C. Reeds and many others.

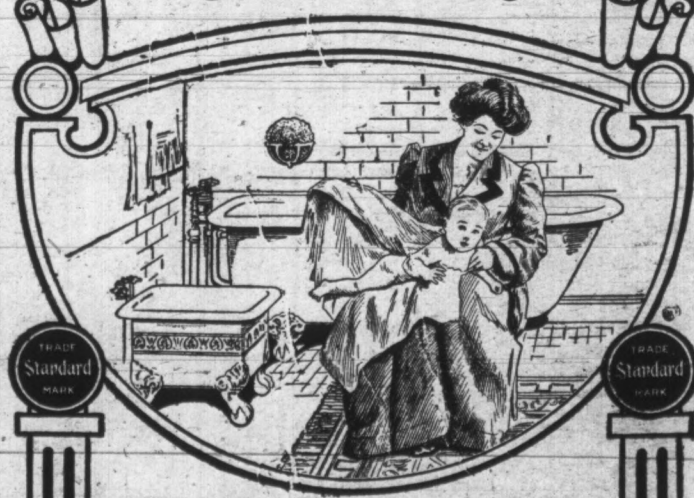

Whereas, at a special term of the County Court of Fulton County, Kentucky, held by the regular presiding Judge of said Court, at the Court House in Hickman, Kentucky, on the 18th day of May, 1910, an application by written petition signed by a number of legal voters in the City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, equal to twenty-five per cent of the votes cast in the last city election held in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, before said date, was presented and rendered, petitioning the Judge of the County Court of Fulton County, Kentucky, to make an order on his order book directing that an election be held in said City of Fulton, Kentucky on the 21st day of July, 1910, which order shall direct the sheriff or other officer of the said county who may be appointed to hold said election to open a poll at each and all of the voting places in said City of Fulton, Kentucky, on said date for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal voters of the last named city who are qualified to vote at an election for county officers upon the proposition whether or not the local option law now in force in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, shall become inoperative, and John Melton, &c.

Petition.

In this proceeding came W. K. Hall, A. J. Burrow, R. T. Ridd, and other citizens of Fulton, Kentucky, and their attorney, T. N. Smith, and announced before the court that they as representatives of the local option people, had no objections to the proceedings and moved the court to order the election prayed for in the petition heretofore filed and that same be held on the day named in said petition, as the proper manner to test the will of the people on the question, presented by said petition; and thereupon, and on motion of John E. Melton and the other petitioners, the court being duly advised and satisfied that sufficient number of legal voters in the said City of Fulton, equal to twenty-five per cent and more of the number of votes cast at the last city election, held in and for said City of Fulton, Kentucky, November, 1909, are signed to said petition, the following order was made upon the payment into court of the sum of \$110.00 to defray the expenses of holding said election, the said sums being fixed as the proper amount by said court.

Whereas, said application by written petition was at said special term of the Fulton County Court, held on the 18th day of May, 1910, in open court received by the Judge thereof and was filed and made a part of the record herein and entered upon the order book of said court;

Now, on this, the 13th day of June, 1910, at the regular June term of said court, it appearing to the satisfaction of the court from the said petition filed (no objections being made thereto), that the signatures of said petition are genuine, and that said petitioners are residents of the City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, and legal voters therein, and that they are equal in numbers to twenty-five per cent of the votes cast at the last city election held in and for said City of Fulton, Kentucky, before said petition was filed as aforesaid, and the court being advised, adjudges and orders that an election be held at the time, to-wit, on the 21st day of July, 1910, and for the purpose stated in the petition, and that Goalder Johnson, Sheriff of Fulton County, Kentucky, open a poll at each and all of the voting places in said City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, on the 21st day of July, 1910, for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal voters of said City of Fulton, Kentucky, who are qualified to vote at an election for county officers, upon the proposition whether or not the local option law now in force in the City of Fulton, Fulton County, Kentucky, shall become inoperative.

It is further ordered by the court that the 14th day of July, 1910, be fixed as a day for registration of those persons entitled to vote at said election whose names have not been recorded on the registration books at the last regular registration in said City of Fulton, Kentucky, and the County Board of Election Commissioners will provide for and have the same held as required by law, and will further provide for the holding of said election on the 21st day of July, 1910, as required by law.

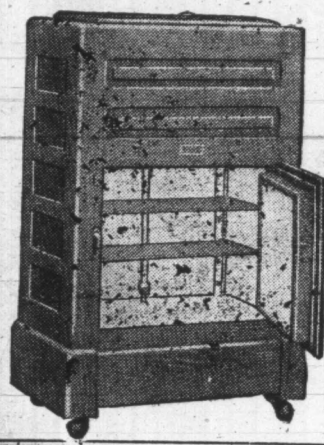

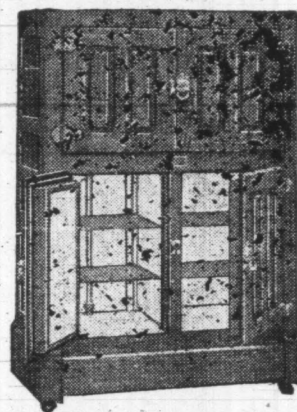
