#### MOULDERS OF PUBLIC OPINION

Not long ago a Bentonian said to the publisher of this newspaper that he'd like to edit a newspaper and enjoy the knowledge that he would be helping to mould public opinion.

We, of this newspaper have been taught right the opposite — that we should not try to mould public opinion. Why? Simply because we are human and as human beings, we are bound to make errors — many errors of judgment. Therefore we should not try to mould or change the opinion of anyone. Each individual is entitled to an opinion of his own and without any moulding done by another. Our spiritual leaders "mould public opinion." Look how far wrong somebody must be — look what trouble is caused by the many different opinions and beliefs that have been moulded by leaders in the spiritual field. No, we do not desire to mould public opinion. We only desire to speak our piece and at the same time grant others the same privilege — after all truth and facts will govern in the end anyway.

Many young men enter the newspaper business unqualified, biased, and downright stubborn in their efforts and hopes to "mould public opinion." Some begin by having no regard whatever for truth, believing that they have been granted some certain privilege to plunder the minds and hearts of good American citizens. We must have pity on this type of person. He has granted no special permission to anyone to take charge of the mind and heart of anyone. We have never been a believer in hypnotism and neither do we believe that just any old thing should "mould public opinion" without first obtaining the right through our Master.

In many colleges today the athletic field is a good place to teach a young capitalist to take the thing at any old price — knock down, slug, and if needs be — kill in order to reach the goal. So it could be possible that as human beings and moulders of public opinion, we of the newspaper fraternity could, steal and perhaps murder in order to "mould public opinion." No, we dare not — Facts and truth still stand in the way.

#### Observations

To me it seems sort of a sacrilege to use the names of former publishers of newspapers in this county. . . . They were Democrats, and were gentlemen, too. Look what you have to put up with now.

Every so often a squirt blows into town and among one of the first things he or she starts is proving what a genius the town and county has gained. Since 1937 our drawers (desk drawers, that is), has become well filled with this type of self-praise, self publicity.

Some men and women are their own publicity agents and bull shooters. In many instances they play the public as if everyone was in the numbskull class. For my two readers I have had too much respect to place them as members of the dunce class. I judge this by the simple fact that subscribers to the Marshall Courier are not placed on the free circulation list or crammed down their throats at any old price.

One such instance happened several months ago when the business agent of a newspaper made a sworn report on circulation that made the figure 2,783. An old established advertising concern challenged the statement and an investigation was made, which turned out that the circulation was about half that sworn to. The newspaper still has the same business manager and about all the changes made is a louder horn which "can be heard at midnight."

I believe it was the late C.P.J. Moon, beloved editor of the Commercial Appeal, who once said: "When a newspaper is continually boasting about circulation, that is the time when it's most likely slipping to a new low." Why is it that some folks are always trying to prove

themselves a genius in any undertaking? Isn't it a natural fact that the public will find it out sooner or later anyway? Is such an act aided by a desire for attention? I have pointed out in this column that psychiatrists have said that ego was "caused from a lack of attention," so it may be that these gentlemen, specialists of the brain — have something there.

In almost every town in the country that I know of, there are from one to a half dozen persons that have a sort of self advertised idea that they are the town's only genius; that everything their magic touch comes in contact with, it is of the super-duper type and in most cases they play the public for a bunch of suckers. I have pointed out here time and again that the Tater Day herbs, juices, and barks man uses the same methods.

And, every so often a new genius is born in the newspaper racket and usually the first thing that happens is that old, old story and plain bull, about circulation. It pops up in the amateur's mind every time the moon changes. It is as uncertain as the weather, because you can never tell when nor how it will come out, nor in what manner FREE circulation is obtained. There is another old story however — and here it is:

This is a simple but harsh remedy, prescribed for the sole purpose of curing a case of bullitis — if the Big Wind newspaper has one (1) more bonafide circulation (Post Office Department's definition) than the Marshall Courier has, we'll close up, sell out, and leave town. If the big wind does not have one (1) more, they are to do likewise.

#### You and Your Share

If ever this nation needed an economy-minded Congress, it is now. The cost of government has shot up all out of sight. Current high costs of government represent more than just dollar inflation. What we have had, without clearly realizing it, is a boom in government. This boom has flourished until there is danger of collapse from the very size of the superstructure itself. Our ship of state, is indeed top-heavy.

Lumping all government together — federal, state, local — tax collections for the 1948 fiscal year came to 36 per cent of the national income. Perhaps you can see it better if we should divide up that \$53.3 billion of tax collections to find what was your part. It amounts to \$177 for each man, woman, and child in the nation. You didn't pay that much? Brother, your share was tucked away in the price of everything you spent your money for!

Government is taking more and more. If you compare the above figures with those for 1940. Then tax collections were \$14.4 billion, or 18.9 per cent of national income. The amount for each person in 1940 was only \$106. In eight years, therefore, we have more than tripled our taxes. A lot of it results from the war. We're spending a lot in Europe, certainly. But let us not use that as an excuse for lack of vigilance about the rest of it.

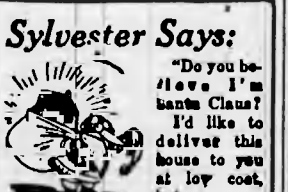
We are inclined to justify boom government and resulting high taxes in a number of strange ways. In depression times, we call for more and more spending. That means taxes, but we put them off until later. Then in times of plenty, we think up more things that government can do better than we can. At the same time, we ignore war-time debt and forget that we ever did any "deficit" spending! Must we dedicate ourselves to "unlimited government?"

What Are Taxpayers Knowing that "power to tax is power to destroy," the founding fathers placed tax power upon Congress. This power was not meant to be abused. But when we were aware that government was meant to serve them, not they to serve the government. That is the viewpoint of taxpayers.

But times have changed. Nowdays Americans (through their be taxpayers to the tune of billions) look upon themselves first as receivers of government benefits, last as payers of tax. Our federal government is now making payments direct to 18,000,000 persons. Some of these are necessary. But too many of us, far too many for the good of the nation, have a personal interest in seeing government expenditures continue. Will any of these is million bite the hand that feeds them?

You see, this is the way we ourselves can undermine the cornerstone of freedom. Almost without knowing it, we have created a high central government, then given it power to perpetuate itself. If big government can minimize the dangers of entrenched bureaucracy, keep public waste and extravagance out of sight, and go on taxing — then this thing will continue regardless of the party in power. When big government sells people on the idea of lavish handouts which they themselves pay for by high taxes, you can call this bribing people with their own money!

Have you heard Dr. Benson and the public drama "Land of the Free" which your local station is showing?

## HEALTH HINTS for LIVESTOCK

**SWINE DYSENTERY  
A DEADLY DISEASE**

Dysentery in swine is a deadly, treacherous, hard-to-control disease. Yet, by correct sanitation and other precautions, swine producers can do a lot to reduce the heavy losses caused by dysentery. This contagious swine ailment is thought to be due to a germ much like that causing human cholera and is now recognized as a specific disease. Infection spreads fast, killing as many as 60 percent of affected swine in a stricken herd. Hogs may die suddenly after two or three days' illness, or they may linger on for two weeks or longer. Those that recover are stunted and usually, are not immune against later attacks and may act as "carriers."

One type of control plan may be effective on one farm, while some other type may be required on another farm. The veterinarian's advice should be obtained on the best program, and in setting up an adequate scheme of sanitation. Certain general preventive measures are advisable in all cases.

Great care should be taken, for example, in bringing in pigs from sale barns or public stockyards. Such newcomers should be isolated for at least two weeks.

Frequent cleaning and disinfecting of quarters is always advisable. Clean water, good feed, and good methods of feeding, all help to guard against swine dysentery.

Symptoms of dysentery include bloody scouring and a rise in temperature. If suspicious symptoms develop, the ailing pigs should be separated from the healthy ones and examined by a veterinarian at once.
