## DISCUSS UNION

Leaders of Louisville Baptist and Christian Church Talks of Organic Union.

The Louisville Herald of recent date says: Discussion of a possible organic union between the Christian and the Baptist churches will be held this morning at a meeting in the study of the First Christian church, and all of the dozen Christian church ministers in this city will take part in it. On account of the interesting fact that each congregation of both denominations is its own governor, and consequently a union need not be referred to a general body for decision, the discussion has wide interest.

The Rev. Dr. W. N. Briney, pastor of the Broadway Christian church, and one of the leaders in the discussion, admitted frankly last night that he favors union. He said, however, that while the discussion this morning will take up details generally and the advisability of union, he does not believe that coalition will result immediately. "It is, nevertheless, coming in the course of time," he said vigorously.

The principal points of difference between the churches are in regard to the beliefs about the operation of the Holy Spirit in conversion, the Christians favoring the indirect, while the Baptists hold to the direct theory; in the purpose of baptism, the Christian believing that it is a token of the remission of sins, while the Baptist hold that baptism follows remission; and of communion, the Christians favoring open communion, while the other church believes generally in communion among members of individual congregations only.

Unlike the Presbyterian church which has just consummated union with the Cumberland Presbyterian church, submission of the question to the governing bodies of the two churches is unnecessary. For instance, as Dr. Briney pointed out last night, since the individual congregations of the two churches could, if they so desired, coalesce without the necessary action going outside the congregations.

This fact makes the situation have interesting possibilities and indicates that while general union between the two churches may be slow, local union may proceed rapidly. General committees appointed recently by the organizations are working upon a scheme by which it is believed that union may finally be achieved.

## Winter Blizzard Prevailed.

Detroit, Mich., May 27.—Snow is reported from all over the lower Peninsula of Michigan to-day, with a veritable winter blizzard prevailing over the Saginaw valley. Cadillac reports that five inches of snow fell last night, with more coming, and six inches have fallen at Petoskey. Snow fell during the morning at Jackson and Kalamazoo. It is feared that the cold will cause heavy damage to vegetation.

Reading, Pa., May 27.—The thermometer touched close to the freezing point in the Schuylkill valley last night. Flakes of snow fell and residents of Northern Berks county report that a regular snow visitation that section before daylight. Farmers fear that continued wet weather will cause growing vegetables to rot in the ground.

## HE KNOWS

State Fire Marshal Mott Ayres Gives Information to Trigg Grand Jury.

State Fire Marshal Mott Ayres has sent to Trigg county a batch of papers to be presented to the grand jury in its investigation of Col. Ayres' published statement that he knew the man who wrote from Wallonia a threatening letter to Robert Wallis just prior to the burning of Wallis' tobacco barn in Lyon county. The man implicated is said to be a prominent citizen of the Wallonia neighborhood, and sensational developments are expected. Col. Ayres states that his wife's illness has prevented his appearing in person before the Trigg county grand jury, but that he hopes to go to Cadiz this week.

Every plant bed at "Wildwood," the farm of J. W. Hammack, east of Hopkinsville on rural route No. 2, was destroyed Friday night by unknown parties. Mr. Hammack was expecting to raise a large crop of tobacco this year and had sown several beds. He was not a member of the association. It is said that for some time he had watched his beds but relaxed his vigilance and they were destroyed.

A plant bed containing about eight hundred square yards belonging to John M. Rice, of Bluff Springs, was scraped by night riders. Mr. Rice is one of the best known farmers of Christian county and is an officer of the county union of the American society of Equity. This organization has considerable strength in Christian county, operating independently of the dark tobacco association.

## TOBACCO SALES

Number of Hogsheads of Association Tobacco Sold For Good Prices.

Long, Fruitman & Co., of the Peoples warehouse report that the local salesman, John Jones, made another big sale this week, succeeding in selling 135 hogsheads lugs and leaf at prices ranging from \$6 to \$8 for lugs and \$8.50 to \$13 for leaf. On account of desiring to get the money to the people the office force at the warehouse is too busy to give us details, but will always cheerfully give anybody particulars about his crop, though as promised before will get the sales to the people quickly as possible. They now have employed three bookkeepers to get the sales out and will put on more force in a few days, as buyers are wanting more tobacco than they can furnish.

This sale disposes of all the lugs in this warehouse that have been officially graded. The reports current that the fine grades were not selling is refuted by this sale, as a number of hogsheads were sold ranging from \$11 to \$13. These sales of the better grader will be shown regularly in the future.

#### Expert on Tobacco Bug.

Charles H. T. Townsends, the  
 expert from the Department of  
 Agriculture and who was sent  
 here direct from Washington by  
 the United States Government to  
 investigate the insect that has  
 been playing havoc with the to-  
 bacco plant, arrived Tuesday  
 morning and spent Tuesday and  
 Wednesday looking after this  
 pest.

His investigation disclosed the  
 fact that the bug is what is  
 known as the tobacco beetle and  
 is very fatal to the plant that is  
 just starting to grow, but at this  
 time all danger in this insect  
 is past as the plants have reach-  
 ed a stage where they cannot be  
 injured by the beetle.

He calls especial attention to  
 the cut worm which is also com-  
 mitting great depredations to the  
 tobacco and suggests that a  
 poison composed of brown sugar,  
 flour and Paris green be used on  
 the hills made for tobacco, from  
 two to three days before the  
 plant is set out. This will kill  
 all worms in the ground before  
 the plant is transplanted and he  
 thinks will be a solution to the  
 cut worm problem. He says  
 further, that if the poison is used  
 after the plant is set out it will  
 take some time for the poison to  
 reach into the ground in sufficient  
 proportions to kill the worm, and  
 in the meantime the worm will  
 no doubt have cut through the  
 stalk and perhaps killed it.

After the first of July the De-  
 partment will send a man here  
 to act in conjunction with the  
 expert that will be sent by the  
 United States experiment station  
 at Knoxville and they will devote  
 several weeks in looking after  
 the tobacco pest in this county.

Mr. A. B. Porter has agreed to  
 set aside two acres of tobacco  
 himself for the use of these ex-  
 perts and will ask that different  
 sections of the county do the  
 same.

Mr. Townsend left here for  
 Clarksville, and from there re-  
 turns to Washington.—Robertson  
 County News.

Canton, Ohio, May 27.—Mrs.  
 William McKinley died at 1:05  
 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The  
 transition from life to death was  
 so peaceful and gradual that it  
 was with difficulty that the vigi-  
 lant physicians and attendants  
 noted when dissolution came.

There was no struggle, no  
 pain. Mrs. McKinley never  
 knew of the efforts made for  
 days to prolong her life, nor of  
 the solicitous hope against hope,  
 of her sister and other relatives  
 and friends, for her recovery.

Mrs. McKinley's last words  
 were for death. An attendant  
 said:

"Mrs. McKinley would say,  
 'Why should I linger?' Please,  
 God, if it be thy will why defer  
 it?' She would also say, 'He is  
 gone and life is dark to me now.'  
 Other kindred expressions fell  
 from her lips."

 ley home to-day that details of  
 the funeral plans were not ready  
 to be announced. The strong de-  
 sire of Mrs. Barber to have the  
 services as simple as possible are  
 being complied with by those in  
 charge as far as possible.

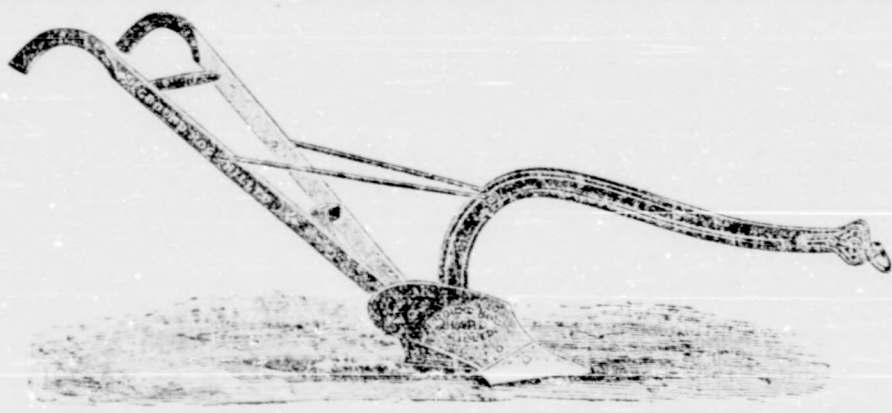

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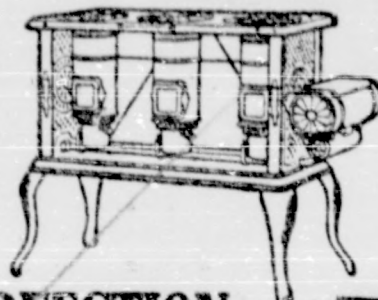

Sioux Chief in Farewell.

Omaha, Neb., May 27.—Red Cloud, the famous old chief of the Sioux, who, blind and decrepit is spending his last days quietly at Pine Ridge agency, a few days ago dictated a curious letter to "Buffalo Bill."

The letter was delivered to Colonel Cody by William McCune, who was at Pine Ridge engaging Indians to go out with a wild west show.

Following is the letter: Pine Ridge, S. D., April 6, 1907.—Buffalo Bill, Pe-ha-ha-ka: Tell my friend Re-ha-ha-ka, that it is Red Cloud that talks to him by one of his people who knows the white man, ensign will talk what I say to him with my tongue and send by paper. Old Ogallala chief, last chief soldier of Sioux, talks from heart to the White Eagle of great father's warriors.

I want tell him old chief soon go to Manitou hunting grounds, never see Pe-ha-ha-ka more. I say we fight—then smoke pipe—shake hands—bury hatchet—live same tepee. My people follow white man's road.

You always good after fight to red brother—I speak you to be always friend my people. You good; you show my young men heap big village, heap things I never see. Old Indian, more old than you, hope tell Great Father old than you, hope tell father's head man take care my people—all want to be good.

I like you come—I no see you, but I could hear you talk. Shake hands—make good-by friend—my eyes water—but Red Cloud soon go. Talk straight; my people give their ears to Pe-ha-ha-ka—he friend to Sioux.

White man rich, Indian poor. Tell white man help Indian. I talk you last time. Heart down—if black robe speak straight, meet you in hunting ground in sky. Tell Scarface brother goodby, too—good man! friend of Sioux last war. Pine Ridge. RED CLOUD. Red Cloud is now a very old man, his health and spirits are broken and it is believed by the physician who is attending him that he can not live much longer. He is lonely and sad and has no desire to live.

The old chief was a great fighter in his earlier years, but there is none of the war spirit in him now. He has buried the hatchet and has persuaded his people to bury theirs.

The farmers are busy planting corn and fixing tobacco ground. The tobacco crop will be very small. But very few are expecting to have plants enough to set their crop.
