The 36-year-old minister was enroute to Murray to start a series of revival services in Calloway County, when his car and a truck loaded with railroad ties sideswiped.

The terrific impact sheared away the driver's side of the pastor's car, ripping the steel like a huge cleaver.

Rev. Mr. Waller, with head crushed and other injuries, was rushed to the Murray hospital. He died there at 11:15 a. m. Tuesday.

Driver of the truck, Mason Canady, 28, of New Concord, was not injured in the tragic collision.

## Why Jesus Died

Lesson for June 12, 1949

THE FACTS: Jesus' death was simple. They were told in the Gospels without dramatics and without tears. Yet the drama is there, stark and terrible; and only the hand of heart can read it without tears.

There is a deeper question than that. Why did it happen? The first Christians were forced to look about the crucifixion. They knew it was no legend. It was real. But they were puzzled, as we are, with the question, Why? Here was a man whose teaching was truth, whose touch was healing, whose life was love. You would have thought the world would welcome him. But he was rejected. He was given the highest honors in his power. But instead, all it had for him were thorns and a cross. Why? God, who sees all things, knew even his Son would come to better end than a death of shame. Why did God allow Jesus to be born, much less send him into the world, where the world was waiting?

Other End  
KRE WAS, of course, "historical reasons" why Jesus was killed. If we used the words "murder" or "lynched" it would be true. Jesus' death, in one point of view, was both a tragedy and a crime, and the Gospels show this. Jesus died because Pilate was a spineless man. Jesus died because the priests in Jerusalem saw that if this man was not put to death, they would lose their power and they would commit murder rather than be defeated. Jesus died because the Pharisees had hard hearts and would not listen to the truth if they did not want it.

He died because Judas was a traitor; because his friends were afraid and even the best of them did not show their faces only after he was dead. He died because the man people had their minds set on this sort of Messiah, and when it turned out to be quite another, they would have none of him. He died because the sort of person Jesus was, in that kind of world, at that particular time and place, was not what the world needed. He died, as Jesus himself said, "the Son of Man had to die." (Matthew 16:21) No other end was possible. There was no help for it, except to turn coward and flee, and if he had been capable of that, he would not have been the Son of Man at all.

Plan of God  
KRE was Jesus simply a victim of circumstances? Was he no more than a fly caught in fate's web? Far from it. The Christian church has always believed, and before these stories of the affliction were ever written, that death of Christ was in the plan of God. In fact, it is at the heart of the plan for mankind.

It is by the death of Christ that God reconciles man and brings men back to himself. The Christian church believes that God sent Christ to die for that is, for you and for me. We believe that this was not Jesus' own idea, some-thing God had not thought of till Jesus suggested it.

We believe that this was the plan of God "from before the foundation of the world." The God who is over all, works through all things, even very evil things, to bring his love known.

At The World...  
"Be Saved"  
KRE had long thought of God as living in far-off heaven, seated on a throne, high and lifted up. A God who might be touched with any human mess, a holy and infinite Lord of the universe, such a God men were a race of men who are as of sin, slaves to evil. How could God help such men? Not by laying on his throne and hurling more curses. Only by doing what men would never have done. God would dare to do—into this world, himself as a man, translating himself into the human form, putting his shoulder to the human load, even bearing it in his own body on Father 3:40.

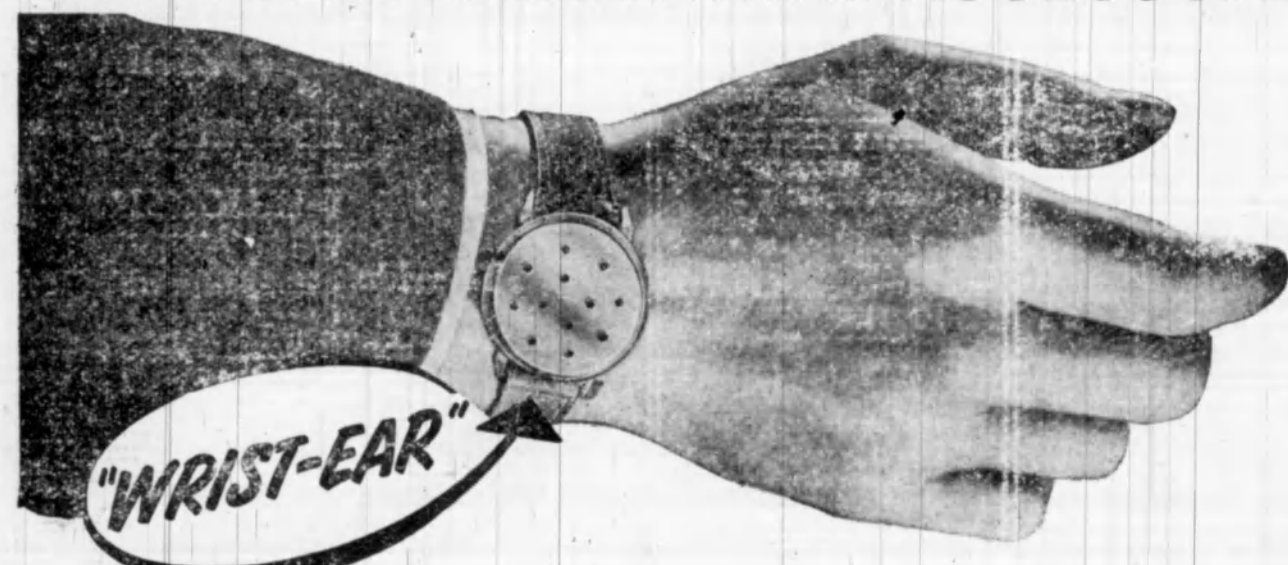

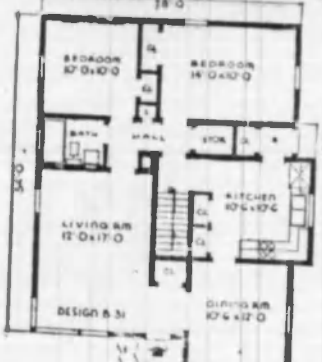

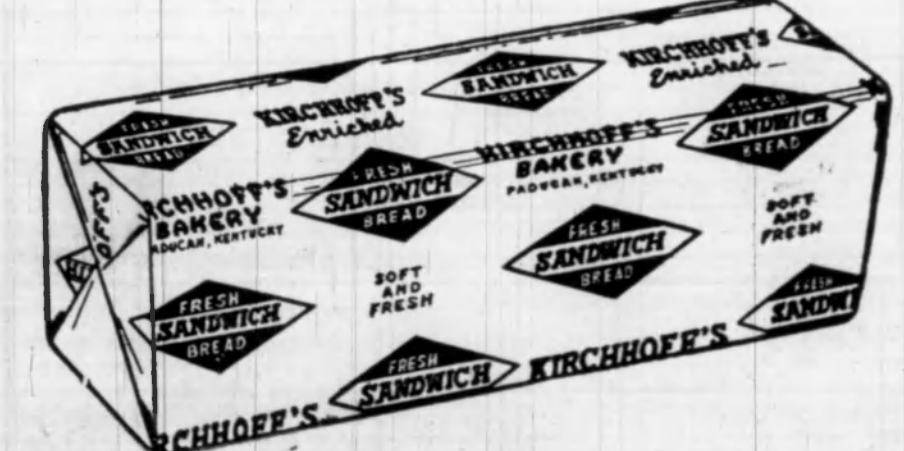

which recently completed a detailed interview with 4,562 persons in 137 cities, towns and rural areas.

It also was interesting to learn more about these 17 million shooters. For instance, it is apparent that gunning is a "start early" sport for more than 60 per cent of those interviewed started shooting before they were 20 years of age. At least another 20 per cent took up shooting in their twenties.

The small town and rural areas showed the highest percentage of shooters. That's only natural, however, for in the small towns and rural areas a kid can start hunting by just walking a short ways from home. This youngster also has more free time to learn the sport and to develop his gunning ability.

Actually the survey disclosed that 29 per cent of those interviewed in the urban areas were shooters, with 46 per cent of those living in small towns interested in gunning as a sport. Fifty per cent of the farm persons contacted used firearms for sport.

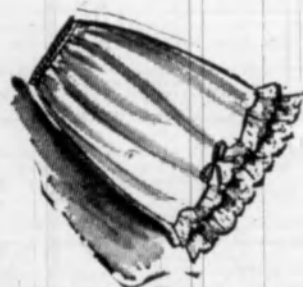
