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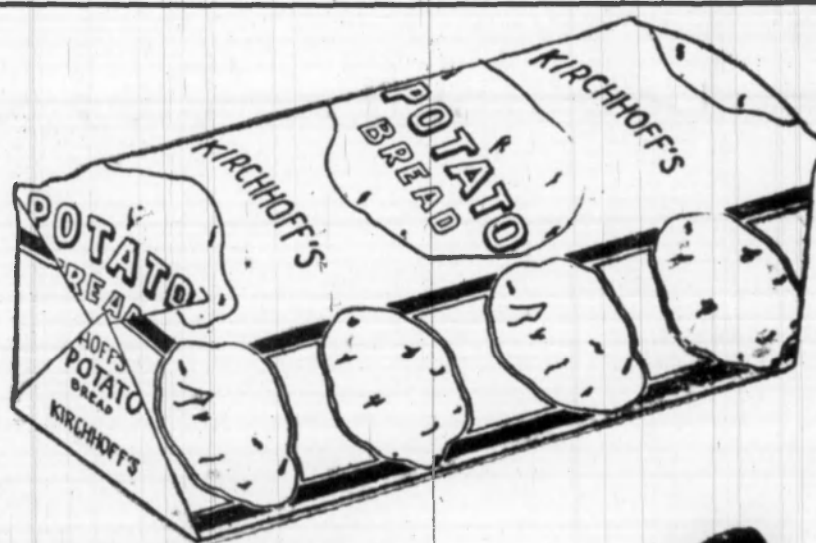

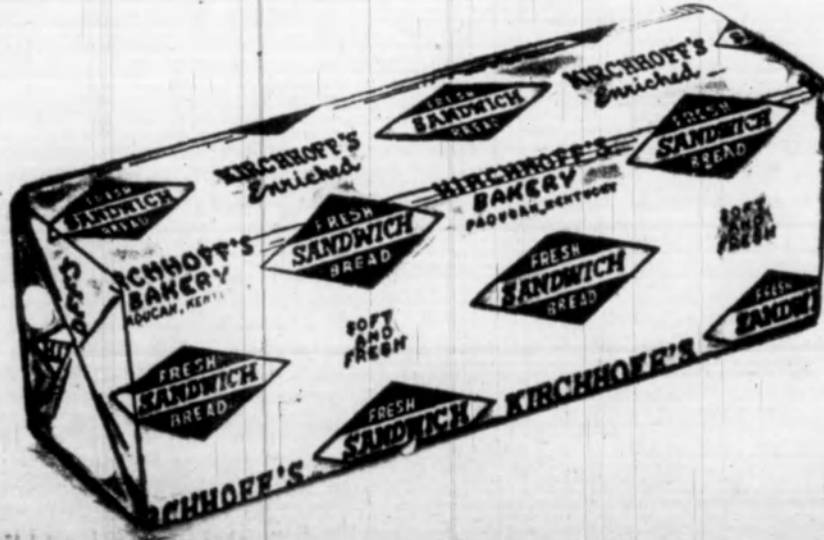

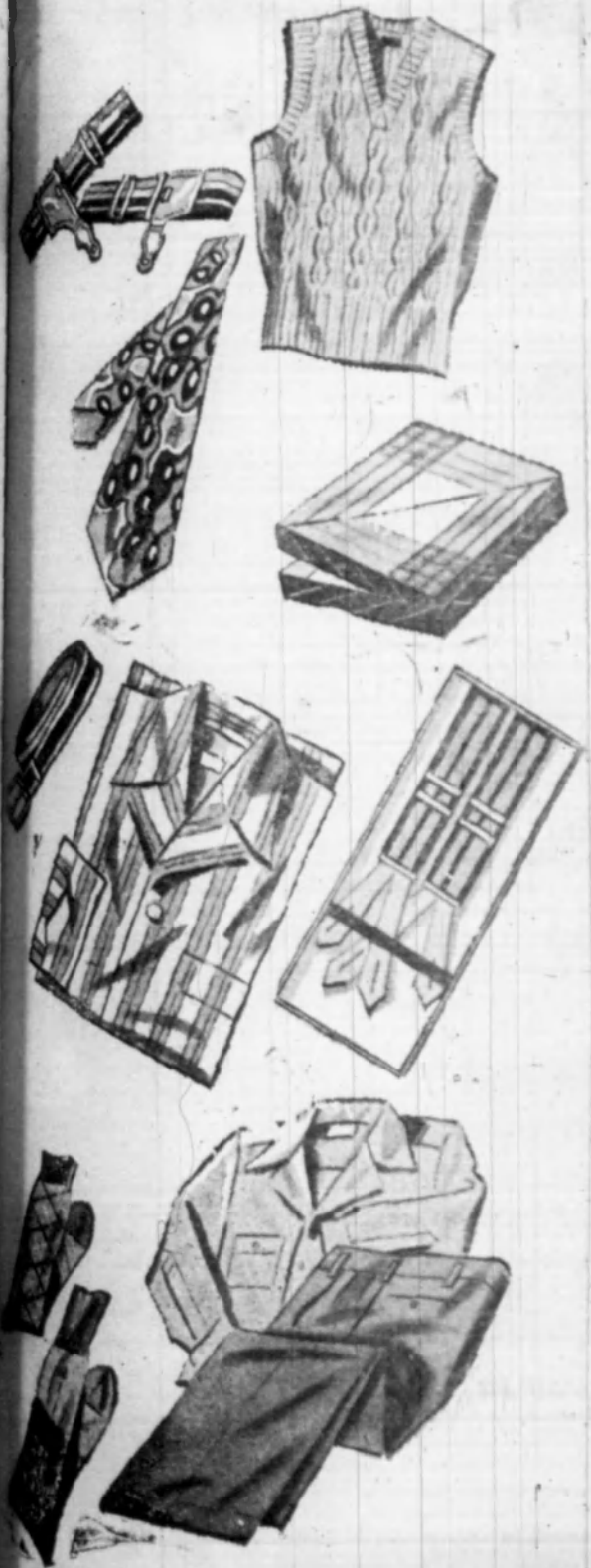

Kesting Reports On Bait Casting Preference

An outdoor magazine with a national circulation recently completed a survey designed to show the preferences of fishermen and we thought you might be interested in comparing your methods against the national average.

For instance, the fishermen polled in the survey reported they favored plugs over spoons for bait casting by rather a large percentage. In fact, plugs were used 69 per cent of the time against 31 per cent for spoons and spinners.

Mid-depth casting lures, plugs and spoons that travel two to five feet beneath the surface proved the most popular, and the survey showed these mid-depth lures were used 47 per cent of the time. Surface lures were used 33 per cent of the time and deep-running plugs and spoons 20 per cent.

It is apparent, too, that more and more fishermen are turning to lighter weights in bait casting lures. The five-eighths ounce lures still are tops and the survey showed this weight is used 61 per cent of the time. However, three-eighths ounce lures were used 32 per cent of the time. A few of the boys found a three-fourths ounce baits suitable for seven per cent of their fishing time.

It was rather interesting to note too the preferences of fishermen regarding what they most liked their artificial lures to imitate. A total of 64 per cent favored lures that appeared as minnows; 15 per cent liked frog imitations.

The crayfish came in for 10 per cent, the mouse five per cent and all others a total of 6 per cent.

That's the national picture on

preferences in bait casting lures. How does your fishing stack up against it? Actually, it makes little difference for all of us who fish streams and lakes have definite preferences in size, weight and imitations of our lures. And those are the lures we will continue to fish with.

Berry Crop In District Is \$750,000

Despite a late freeze and heavy damage by insects, growers grossed approximately \$750,000 from the 1949 western Kentucky strawberry crop, it was announced Monday by Barger and Go-lightly sales agent for the McCracken Strawberry Growers Association.

Checks from the association were mailed to growers Monday afternoon. The three quarters of a million income includes money growers received from processing plants.

The 1949 gross fell more than \$380,000 short of the income shipped and processed berries last year and about \$795,000 below the record gross of 1947—when 484 carloads of berries and a heavy volume of fruit to processors brought \$1,509,284.

Special effort is being made to secure a Coast Guard cutter to patrol the waters below the dam when the gates are open. This safety measure along with warning buoys and other safety devices would greatly reduce the danger of drowning in this particular locality.

Installation of service for the new officers will be held the first Tuesday in July.
