Observations

Candidates of the county voted not to have speaking this year. We do not have any apologies, nor do we have to hunt excuses because of this. It was strictly the business of the candidates to decide not ours.

One thing was certain, they used the Democratic method of determining whether they would speak—it was over 3 to 1 against speaking—25 to 8 according to reports. What little I noticed on the subject, there was but very little interest either way and since the decision was made not to have speaking, it is about the same way—very little interest.

Candidates have a right to want to speak or not to speak and they should have the question settled amongst themselves, just as other groups should settle their own problems. We still have those who like to test out their influence (and the other fellow's pocketbook), and we hope that some have found out.

Speaking for ye old koder only, it made no difference if candidates spoke or did not... there are several ways of looking at the question from a pro and con standpoint, but it is my belief that it was the candidates' own business, not mine nor the public's business. A fellow knows whether he wants to speak or not and either way he sees it, is his right to decide.

I forgot to tell you in the beginning that we DO have an election coming off on August 6, and you are going to help hire some officers for four years. It is my guess that some will want to hire one man and some will want to hire another. Some will want to hire kinsfolk and some will choose a fellow because he "needs it" or because one fellow kissed more babies than the other fellow did.

No farmer or businessman of good sound judgment would do a thing like that, but often we hire our public servants not because of qualifications and worthiness, but for many funny reasons—and some very flimsy reasons at that. Already we are

Sports Afield

By TED KESTING

If the success of a fishing season can be measured by the number of participants, 1949 unquestionably will be the most successful fishing year ever. Every stream and lake I have visited, with the exception of a few of off-the-way bodies of water in Canada, literally has been crowded with anglers. But not once have I heard a complaint from the fishermen about the crowds.

On the opening day of the trout season in a state I normally visit each summer, I counted 112 fly fishermen in a stretch of water no longer than a quarter of a mile. In previous years this particular stretch of stream had been an excellent trout producer and it was not uncommon on opening day to see a dozen or so fishermen—but this year there were 112.

I opened the bass season in another state on a lake of some two miles in length and a half a mile or so across. I didn't count all the boats and shore fishermen, but I'll wager there were at least four times as many fishermen as last season on the initial day of the season.

On the trout stream and bass lake, the fishermen were taking fish—not as large as normally but fish that would look mighty good sizzling in the old frying pan.

These "crowded" conditions are worrying some of the fish experts. And probably rightly so for it is almost an impossible task keeping waters productive under such tremendous pressure. I don't believe, however, that it is anything to worry about. First, the fellow who goes fishing, finds the stream or lake crowded and doesn't like it can hang up his rod and quit the sport. He can take up golf or horseshoe pitching.

But the fellow who truly loves the sport of fishing will accept the crowded conditions as a challenge to try to outwit the funny gamesters that are having more than twice the number of artificial lures or live bait tossed their way. A fisherman will have far more to brag about with one nice fish taken under these adverse conditions than a boat load of junkies hauled from a virgin lake filled with fish.

Actually, it boils down to the sport of fishing vs. fishing for meat. And, unquestionably, fishing for meat is a thing of the past, but fishing for sport is becoming more tempting all the time. For a change, the odds are stacked in favor of the fish and that's good, I think!

TONS OF MATERIAL ARRIVING FOR NEW TEXAS GAS PIPE LINE

SHIPMENTS ROUTED TO AVOID CONFUSION IN ON-LINE CITIES



Tons of valuable material for Texas Gas Transmission Corporation's new natural gas pipe line—everything from giant steel pipe to welding rods—are now arriving in increasing quantities at railroad sidings.

To handle the supplies and direct shipments, there is a new type of efficiency expert at work in the community—a man in charge of deliberately seeking delays to avoid confusion. He is the Texas Gas agent who sees that trainloads of supplies roll smoothly and without confusion to dozens of unloading points along the route of the 800-mile line.

His planning started two years ago, long before construction

crews, now hard at work, were in the field. Since 1946 this particular area has been one of the locations under his constant study. He and his men have mapped the local terrain and charted transportation and storage facilities here to be sure that everything needed for the project should arrive on time, and without taxing the facilities of any one area.

Slow Freight Theory

As one example, the Texas Gas agent and his fellow expeditors worked out the "slow freight theory" when it came time to bring in 175,000 tons of pipe. Trainloads of pipe, usually 80 cars long, are snipped periodi-

cally from a mill in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. If such an 80-car train were to appear here or at other places along the route, it would interfere with railroad travel and tie up highways and sidings for days before the pipe could be unloaded and stored.

Many Railroads Do It

To prevent this, the expeditors split the shipment in half and schedule two different 40-car sections to arrive days apart. The first section comes direct; the second is routed over as many as six different railroads between here and Milwaukee. (Shipping freight over many railroads is more expensive if it stays in one freight rate zone.)



This entire operation has been called for the most careful planning. Like Army major officers, the Texas Gas expeditors must have every detail ready for action when each section of the pipe reaches each section of the right-of-way. The work is one illustration of the care taken behind the scenes by Texas Gas to avoid confusion in any one area as the big project moves ahead.

cally from a mill in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. If such an 80-car train were to appear here or at other places along the route, it would interfere with railroad travel and tie up highways and sidings for days before the pipe could be unloaded and stored.

Many Railroads Used

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Stored carefully along the route, pipe for the line is ready for immediate use.

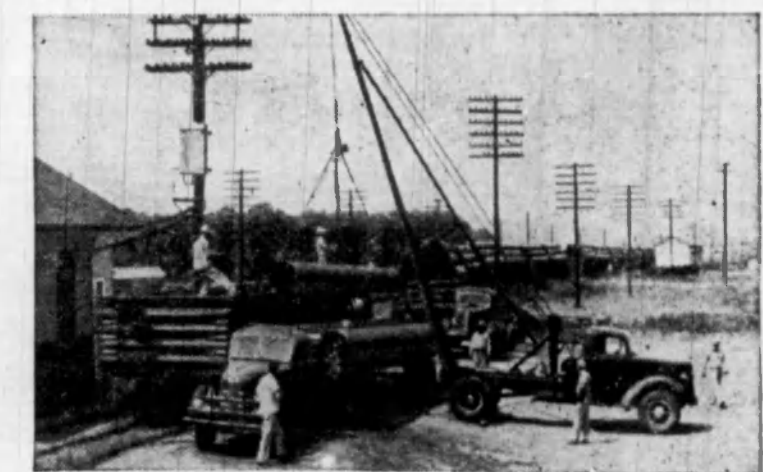

TONS OF MATERIAL ARRIVING FOR NEW TEXAS GAS PIPE LINE

SHIPMENTS ROUTED TO AVOID CONFUSION IN ON-LINE CITIES



Tons of valuable material for Texas Gas Transmission Corporation's new natural gas pipe line—everything from giant steel pipe to welding rods—are now arriving in increasing quantities at railroad sidings. To handle the supplies and direct shipments, there is a new type of efficiency expert at work in the community—a man in charge of deliberately seeking delays to avoid confusion. He is the Texas Gas agent who sees that trainloads of supplies roll smoothly and without confusion to dozens of unloading points along the route of the 800-mile line. His planning started two years ago, long before construction crews, now hard at work, were in the field. Since 1946 this particular area has been one of the locations under his constant study. He and his men have mapped the local terrain and charted transportation and storage facilities here to be sure that everything needed for the project should arrive on time, and without taxing the facilities of any one area.

Slow Freight Theory

As one example, the Texas Gas agent and his fellow expeditors worked out the "slow freight theory" when it came time to bring in 175,000 tons of pipe. Trainloads of pipe, usually 80 cars long, are shipped periodically from a mill in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. If such an 80-car train were to appear here or at other places along the route, it would interfere with railroad travel and tie up highways and sidings for days before the pipe could be unloaded and stored.

Many Railroads Used
To prevent this, the expeditors split the shipment in half and schedule two different 40-train sections to arrive days apart. The first section comes direct; the second is routed over as many as six different railroads between here and Milwaukee. (Shipping freight over many railroads is no more expensive if it stays in one freight rate zone.)

This entire operation has called for the most careful kind of planning. Like Army supply officers, the Texas Gas supply experts must have everything ready for action when construction crews reach each section of the right-of-way. Their work is one illustration of the care taken behind the scenes by Texas Gas to avoid confusion in any one area as the big project moves ahead.
