**Brien, Jones, Lovett
W. S. 'Billy' Watkins Files
Asking For Recount Of V**

**CLOSENESS OF VOTE IS CAUSE OF HIS DECISION
TO ASK FOR RECOUNT OF PRIMARY VOTES**

W. S. (Billy) Watkins, candidate for Sheriff in Saturday's primary, filed a petition in Circuit court here Wednesday asking that a recount of the ballots in the Sheriff's race be held. Watkins was defeated by Volney Brien by only 27 votes.

The petition points out that Watkins states that he "believes and has good reasons to believe that an error in counting of the ballots was made."

The petition was directed at election Commissioners, Walker Myers, Wm. S. Heath, Elvin Thompson, and his opponent, Volney Brien, seeking to prevent the Commissioners from issuing a certificate of nomination on the above grounds.

LATE NEWS BULLETIN

Circuit Judge Holland G. Bryan was scheduled to be in Benton this (Thursday) afternoon to see the date for the proceeding in the petition for the recount and pass upon the petition.

In a statement to the Marshall Courier Wednesday, Mr. Watkins pointed out that he was not "contesting the election," but was only asking for a recount, that he was not charging anyone with fraud or in any manner accusing anyone of doing in asking that a recount be made. He also pointed out that there was a suspicion of the surmises — and that an error in the way in recording the vote was possible; that the vote Saturday night was counted hurriedly and under such circumstances it was possible that an error could have been made.

Remors have been going about the county that Watkins was contesting the election. The candidate stated that he was not contesting, but merely asking for the recount, which is often done in many races each year.

The petition will be passed upon by Circuit Judge Holland G. Bryan, but no date for the hearing has been set.
