### Over 4,600 Votes Cast In Our Most Exciting Primary

The primary election, which had been termed as uninter-  
esting before Saturday, ended in a red hot contest in a ma-  
jority of the races as thousands crowded the court square  
Saturday night to hear the returns. Unlike the previous  
elections the election turned out to be on of the most ex-  
citing in Marshall County history.

A large crowd gathered here  
early Saturday night with the  
expectation of hearing who had  
won by 10 or 11 p. m., but due  
to a jam of some of the  
cars and three delays due to  
the failure of the lights in the  
courthouse, the count was not  
finished until around 1:00 a.m.  
Women brought out quilts and  
blankets, made pallets for the  
youngsters who became sleepy,  
and stuck out the long wait  
with patience.

The climax came after the  
race for Sheriff had been called  
and forth between Arthur  
Darnall, Billy Watkins, and Vol-  
ney Brien. The first precinct  
counted was Ross, but this told  
very little as to the trend of the  
election. The next precinct was  
Brewers and in this precinct  
one observers began to figure  
the race of Arthur Darnall. Wal-  
lace Holmes took the lead at  
this point and amassed 105 votes  
while Darnall garnered 101  
votes. This precinct was be-  
lieved to be one of Darnall's  
strongest.

Other small precincts began  
to trickle in, but there was  
only one thing evident. Holmes  
was bound to fade but he was  
not a contender. Later as oil-  
reports were made Darnall  
was holding his own, but Billy  
Watkins took the lead and Vol-  
ney Brien began climbing to-  
ward the top, but as the count  
reached the last two or three  
precincts, Watkins still held on  
and the last two precincts were  
counted and the election com-  
monly announced over the  
loud speaker system that Brien  
had won by 27 votes.

An interest was not centered  
in the sheriff's race however.  
Reports told that Leonard  
Jones and Harold Holland were  
battling it out for the nomina-  
tion as precinct reports from  
the south and west side of the  
county came in Jones was far  
in the lead, especially when  
the three Benton precinct re-  
ports were made. Later how-  
ever, when reports from the  
east and north sides of the  
county were made known, Hol-  
land began whittling down the  
Jones lead. The last precincts  
were being counted and it look-  
ed as if Holland would overcome  
Jones' early lead, but the final  
count showed Jones winning  
by the narrow margin of 37  
votes. Jack Edwards, former  
sheriff ran far behind both of  
his opponents.

Representatives Run Hot  
Another close race was that  
of Representative, with all  
three of the candidates receiv-  
ing a large vote in this county,  
but with Love emerging the  
winner over his nearest rival,  
Lee Cox. Love won by ap-  
proximately 400 votes. Love carried  
this county by over 300 votes  
to win the nomination.

In the race for County Court  
Clerk, Mark Clayton won re-  
nomination over Charles Totl-  
Jenson by over 400 votes. This  
race was also close at different  
precincts of the county. Jack-  
son, making his first bid for  
public office made a hard fought  
contest for this office.

In the Jailer's race, Prentice  
Thompson ran far ahead of his  
nearest opponent, Jim Barnes.  
Thompson carried 19 of the 20  
precincts, with Ross going to  
Bill Thorn by a large majority.

Magistrate Races Close  
In most of the Magistrate's  
races the vote was also close  
In the first district Jamie Dot-  
son was unopposed for the nomina-  
tion, but will battle it out  
with Rube Burpo in Novem-  
ber. In the second district G.  
T. Fiser won a close race over  
Jack Gray and Trule Wyatt,  
with Gray running second in  
the district. In the third dis-  
trict, three candidates battled  
it out with Aron Barefield being  
re-elected. In the fourth, Ray-  
mond Powell ran far ahead of  
his three opponents, A. T.

### ORDINANCE

An Ordinance relating to traffic and regulating the use of public streets and highways of the City of Benton, providing for the installation, regulation and control of the use of parking meters and parking meter zones. Defining parking meter zones. Authorizing a method of payment for parking meters and the installation thereof exclusively from the receipts obtained from their operation. Providing for enforcement and penalty for violation thereof and providing that invalidity of part shall not affect the validity of remainder. Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Benton, Kentucky:

Section 1. The word "vehicle" as used herein shall mean any device by which any person or property may be transported upon a highway, except those operated upon rails or tracks.

Section 2. That the following described streets in the city of Benton, Ky., are hereby designated and established as parking meter zones, to-wit: All of those streets and parts of city streets upon which limited parking is now permitted under authority, and by virtue of all limited parking ordinances now effective, and the parking limits and restrictions therein provided as hereby incorporated in this ordinance for all uses and purposes applicable to the conditions, terms, and enforcement hereof. Said streets are designated and described as follows:

Main street from 10th to 13th, 12th street from Main to Poplar.

11th street from Main to Poplar street.

Poplar street from 11th street to the center of the block between 12th street and 13th street.

Section 3. The Mayor shall provide for installation of meters, including curb or street marking lines, regulation and operation thereof, and shall cause said meters to be maintained in good workable condition. Meters shall be placed upon the curb next to individual parking places and meters shall be constructed as to display a signal showing legal parking upon deposit therein of the proper coin, or coins, of the United States as indicated by the instructions on said meter, and for a period of time conforming to the parking limits of the city of Benton said signal to remain in evidence until expiration of said parking period so designated, at which time a change of signal or some other mechanical operation shall indicate expiration of said parking period.

Section 4. The City is hereby vested with the authority to enter into a contract for the purpose and installation of parking meters and to provide payment therefor exclusively from

the receipts obtained by the City from their operation and that said means of payment shall be in addition to any other purchasing powers heretofore granted or may be in the future, or by the laws of the State of Kentucky.

Section 5. When any vehicle shall be parked next to a parking meter the owner or operator of said vehicle shall park within the area designated by the curb or street marking lines as indicated for parallel or diagonal parking and upon entering said parking space shall immediately deposit in said meter one or more five cent coins of the United States, and/or one or more one cent coins of the United States as indicated by instructions on said meter. It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to park within said designated area, or fail or neglect to so deposit the proper coin, or coins. Said parking space may then be used by such vehicle during the legal parking limit and/or when said parking meter displays a signal showing such illegal parking.

It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or permit any vehicle registered in his name to be unlawfully parked as set out in this section.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, or cause to be deposited in a parking meter, one or more five cent coins and/or one or more one cent coins for the purpose of extending the parking time beyond the maximum time fixed by the ordinance of the City of Benton.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any device or a metallic substitute for a coin of the United States.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to tamper with, open, willfully break or destroy any parking meter.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of traffic officers so instructed to take the parking meter, and the State vehicle tag number of all persons violating the provisions of this ordinance and make complaint therefor in the Municipal or Police court of the city of Benton.

Section 10. Any person, firm, corporation who shall violate or permit or allow anyone to violate Section Five (5) or Section Six (6) of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than Fifty to One Hundred Dollars (\$50 to \$100), and costs.

Section 12. The fee required to be deposited in said meters is hereby levied as a Police regulation and inspection fee to cover

Section 13. If any section, provision or part thereof in this ordinance shall be judged invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any section, provision or part hereof not so adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

## Sports Afield

By TED KESTING

With the peak of the summer heat playing havoc with fishing in general, it takes a lot of experimenting to land a decent stringer of bass or other fresh water baitfish. And you can bet your bottom dollar that the boys who come in with the best catches are the ones who have some special tricks for outwitting finny gamesters during the hottest days of summer.

I've learned two things about hot weather fishing. First, you've got to know the water you are fishing like your own living room; and, second, it takes a lot more arm power and work on most fishing jaunts to make a fair catch.

When fishing lakes this time of the year that I also fished early in the season, I go to the same spots that produced well on early trips—certain shore lines, brush piles or other cover and then move out into deeper water from these areas for heat-of-the-day fishing. Seldom do game fish in lakes move far away from their choice hiding spots but as the water warms they will seek cooler places—and the closest places that are available. That's why I always fish the deep water that is adjacent to the spots that produced when the water was cooler early in the season.

Frequently early in the morning or late evening you will find the gamesters feeding in the shallows for food most always is more abundant in this water. But you'd better try the deep holes when the sun is high overhead.

I've found, too, the artificial lures that produce early in the season often are a complete bust in hot weather. Why I don't know, but in August I carry a tackle box loaded with new lures and if 10 or 15 minutes of fishing in a good spot

Singing Holidays

Lesson for August 14, 1949

A CITIZEN of the U.S.A. observes all the holidays that are officially counted as legal, some where in his wide country, he would have 43 days off every year. Holidays are a national habit in all countries. Not content with what the law gives us, we take our personal vacations besides. But how many holidays do we sing about? (One might even dare to ask, how many are worth singing about?) In the United States, there are known to this writer no New Year songs, none for Decoration day or Labor day, none for Armistice day, none for the various birthdays celebrated hither and yon. (Who ever heard of a song to commemorate Thomas Jefferson?) We may not even sing on our personal vacations, we are too busy working up a sur-tan. On the other hand, we could hardly think of Independence day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter without being reminded of the songs that go with them—The Star Spangled Banner or America the Beautiful for the Fourth of July, New Thank We All Our God in November, and all the Christmas and Easter carols.

God and Country

It looks as if some kinds of holidays produce songs and others don't. It appears to be a general rule: If the holiday is specially patriotic or religious, then people sing; otherwise they don't. God and country, in short, arouse emotion and enthusiasm which (despite the memory even of a great man like Jefferson, or the planting of a tree, does not. This is generally true throughout the world. It was true in ancient Israel, for many of the Psalms are holiday hymns, festive songs. Some years ago a religious demonstration leader, a hymn book. One minister roundly denounced the book because it had introduced a few patriotic hymns. "My Country, 'tis Thee" has no place in public worship, he said.

If that man had been a closer student of the Psalms, he would not have made such a criticism. Most patriotic hymns are really prayers for one's native land; Psalms 103 and 106 are only two of a number of Psalms which are really prayers of the word patriotic.

If the reader will look through the Psalms for himself, noting all the references to God and to Israel, remembering that Israel was the name of the post's country, he will be convinced that in those times as in these, love for God and love for country are singable.

Hallelujah

Our word "Hallelujah" is Hebrew, and comes from the Psalms. It means "Praise ye the Lord." Incidentally, it is a religious word, and should not be used, as it so often is, irreverently or lightly. Psalms 111-118 in our Bibles were sung as a group, and the Hallel, or the Praise. The Hallel was sung regularly at the three great holiday festivals: Passover (near our Easter time), Pentecost (in early summer, ancestor of our Whit Sunday), and Tabernacles (in the fall).

When our Lord had his "Last Supper" he and his friends would sing these very Psalms. The "hymns" they sang before they went out was very probably the latter part of this group, 116-118, always sung at the end of the Passover meal.

The note of praise in these Psalms is very strong. They are not in a minor key.

Parodies

A SAD FACT today is that the un-Christian world, which does not understand religion at all, has taken over our religious holidays but leaves the religion out. The result is a parody, something without rhyme or reason. Take a look, next winter, at Christmas greetings cards for sale. You will find scotchy pups, all sorts of things, more easily than you will find true Christmas messages.

For people who are not Christians, Christmas is only Xmas, a time for exchanging useless presents, a time for shopkeepers to make money.

And as for Easter, there are cities where the big items are only the bunnies and the parade, neither of which has the slightest thing to do with the real Easter.
