## Observations

The late Irvin S. Cobb said in  
his "exit laughing" that he be-  
lieved the Elks club ritual need-  
ed re-editing. I'm not making  
my exit laughing or crying, but  
I think our election laws need  
a revision.

Or we need to pay more atten-  
tion to what laws we have con-  
cerning elections. Some time ago  
it was pointed out here how in-  
different we are toward the en-  
forcement of election laws, and  
possibly to other laws that we  
ought to take a little more seri-  
ously. Many persons through  
ignorance of laws or unthought-  
edly handle the sacred duty of  
voting according to rules in a  
very careless manner.

It would be my guess that if  
our right to vote was taken away  
from us, these careless ones  
would howl the loudest. It is true  
we have the mugwump voter  
who doesn't know which paw he  
belongs in, but helps to select a  
preacher for all pews or get rid  
of one he doesn't like. This poor  
lost goslin takes the sacredness  
of the ballot as a child would a  
toy.

It is my belief there has been  
many LEGAL elections, but since  
1912 I don't recall ever seeing or  
knowing of a FAIR election, and  
I do not mean my own personal  
definition of what FAIR means.  
Each year we seem to grow more  
careless as to how we treat that  
right to vote. It is true that it  
is just a little X mark, made  
with a cheap rubber stencil, but  
let that right to make the little  
mark be taken from us and we  
would howl louder than a coyote.

There wasn't anything unusual  
about our August primary. It  
was carried on about normal, but  
like hundreds of other elections,  
there was that haphazard way  
of doing it like we have been do-  
ing for years. Some day some  
candidate is going to contest an  
election and it will be thrown out  
which will give our county an-  
other black eye. I saw several  
candidates soliciting votes in and  
within only a few feet of elec-  
tion booths on election day. One  
candidate reached inside the vot-  
ing room, pulled a voter out by  
the arm, and said: "Don't for-  
get me when you vote." I think  
the law says that no one is al-  
lowed within 15 feet of the poll-  
ing place.

That same kind of law gives us  
the right to vote. But, on elec-  
tion day that 15 feet means noth-

ing to many, and our booths and  
voting lines are jammed. One  
female voter was half-way in my  
booth before I made the last X.  
Probably a lot of this comes  
from the fact that election offi-  
cers not being properly instruct-  
ed concerning the holding of an  
election, and it may come from  
the Sheriff of the precinct not  
seeing that the rules are obeyed.

A lot of gossip was created on  
account of the light failure in the  
Courthouse election night. I  
happen to be one of those who  
know there was nothing crook-  
ed about the failure. It has hap-  
pened many times before when  
the light system became over-  
loaded at other times. Most of  
any election irregularities are  
caused by negligence, but all of  
the irregularities are not caused  
by light failure, but do add up  
to cause a belief that something  
was wrong.

It is true that our ways of  
holding elections have improved  
within the past 50 years, but  
many voters have not kept up  
with the improvement offered by  
our legislators, or we take the  
right to vote too lightly and do  
not realize what it could lead us  
into. The right to vote is the  
right of expression and if we lose  
one we lose both. I tried to point  
out here a few weeks before elec-  
tion day that we do not want the  
time to come when our offices are  
put up and sold to the highest  
bidder for cash.

Our is one of the very few  
countries where a person is al-  
lowed to express his wishes by a  
method that is legal whether it  
is just a little X mark, made  
with a cheap rubber stencil, but  
let that right to make the little  
mark be taken from us and we  
would howl louder than a coyote.

## What Is Justice?

Lesson for September 4, 1949  
EVERYBODY is in favor of jus-  
tice but not everybody knows  
what justice is. Justice is more  
fundamental than democracy. If  
we believe that democracy is the  
best form of government, it is only  
because we believe that justice can  
be better secured in this way than  
in any other.

Justice is as old as God.  
Since for at least 3,000 years his-  
torians, politicians, philosophers  
and theologians have been wrang-  
ling over the meaning of justice,  
you won't learn the last word about it  
merely by studying one  
Sunday school lesson. But this is the  
place to remind ourselves that jus-  
tice as an ideal, Dr. Foreman  
and democracy as a means of reaching that ideal,  
were not born yesterday.

Labor Day will recall the  
great services rendered to de-  
mocracy by the organized  
workers of the world, for ex-  
ample, in the push they have  
given to free and universal  
education. But democracy is older  
than the labor movement. It is  
older than July 4, 1776, is older  
than the Magna Charta, is older  
than the Roman empire, in which  
one of many injustices was  
"Let justice be done even if  
the sky caves in!"  
Justice and democracy go back  
to the ancient Hebrews, the people  
who wrote the Old Testament. It  
was written in their laws, preached  
by their prophets, sung in their  
Psalms. But of course they did not  
invent it. They proclaimed it; but  
justice is older than the human  
race. The whole Bible and not only  
the Old Testament teaches that jus-  
tice is rooted in the nature of God  
himself. No unjust person can be  
called godly.

**Songs of Justice**  
OUR Psalms for this week give  
us some valuable light on what  
justice is. Some people think that  
if everybody were rich, that would  
be justice. Psalm 49 shows how  
foolish that notion is. It says in al-  
most so many words, "You can't  
take it with you."  
Riches do not spell happiness.  
Making everybody rich might  
mean making many people  
miserable. Money by itself does  
not cure the ills of life, it may  
make them worse or even  
create new ones. Many a fam-  
ily in the "upper brackets" has  
troubles that would vanish if  
they had less money.  
Psalms 72 and 82 give us more  
positive suggestions. Psalm 72 sees  
it as the king's main duty to judge  
the people with righteousness and  
justice. The king was the govern-  
ment, in those days; he was the  
executive and the legislative and  
the judicial branch of government  
all rolled into one. In modern  
terms, the business of government  
is something more than furnishing  
police to lock up and punish wrong-  
doers after they have been found.  
The welfare of the people is the  
concern of government. When pub-  
lic officials take any other view of  
their job, they are off the beam.  
In a democracy, the government is  
the people, that is to say, ourselves.  
If things are bad we are to blame  
for it; if they are going to be any  
better, we shall have to work for  
it. Every appeal to a king, in the  
Old Testament, when translated  
into terms of a democratic coun-  
try, means an appeal to the peo-  
ple.

**The Little People**  
JUSTICE always has to be con-  
cerned with the little people. It  
was true in the simple little world  
of the ancient Hebrews; it is just  
as true in our global complex  
world, that the strong will always  
exploit the weak if there is not a  
hand to stop them.  
God is always for the "poor,"  
the "children of the needy,"  
and he is always against the  
"oppressor." In ancient Israel  
the oppressor was usually the  
big land-owner who treated his  
slaves with cruelty or under-  
paid his workers. Nowadays  
the oppressor is any exploiter,  
any man or group of men who  
will use power to squeeze out  
or crush down the little man.  
But justice is positive, not nega-  
tive, prevention and not cure only.  
Concern for social justice includes  
taking care of people laid low by  
an epidemic or made homeless by
