Sharpe Agriculture Class Puts New Look To Bradley Farm

Ten veterans of the Sharpe agricultural classes met on the Bradley farm at Palma on September 20 and gave a rolling, broomage, bush grown field a quick new look. Working together as a community group they pooled their equipment and prepared a seedbed for eight acres of Ky. 31 Fescue. The land was both disced and seeded on the contour.

Twelve to fifteen pounds of fescue per acre was sown and fertilized at the rate of 300 pounds of 47 per cent phosphate and 50 pounds of ammonium nitrate.

Bradley, a cooperator of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District, is making rapid progress in the establishment of a complete soil and water conservation farm plan. Other practices besides pasture improvement and seeding have been established to date.

Public Service Commission Asked To Meet At Calvert City To Hear Power Arguments

The Kentucky Public Service Commission has been asked to hold a hearing at Calvert City at which the community's desires might be expressed in the current power argument there.

A "Calvert City Committee" Monday wrote the commission chairman suggesting the move to help settle whether the city's power distribution facilities should be sold to Kentucky Utilities Company or to the Jackson Purchase REA.

The committee said it has reviewed copies of a recent petition filed by L. A. Solomon, owner of the system, in which it was asked he be allowed to sell to KU. The petition was signed by 224 persons. Mr. Solomon filed another petition bearing 204 names of persons who had previously asked for a sale to REA.

"It is our feeling," the committee said, "that nothing could be accomplished by our securing a countering petition bearing the same names that our original petition contained, and that now appear on Mr. Solomon's paper," he "original petition" mentioned asked that the system be sold to REA.

The letter was signed by M. B. Stice, T. T. Mauer, C. H. Hall, Clarence Fowler, R. D. Smith, G. L. Draffen, Carl Seay, and Othel Smith.

The two petitions filed by Mr. Solomon delayed a decision expected last week in the case. The dispute arose four months ago when it became known K U sought PSC sanction of an agreement to buy the facilities from Mr. Solomon for \$78,000.

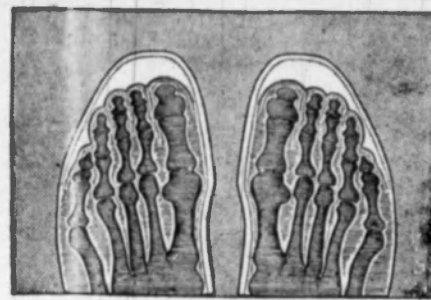

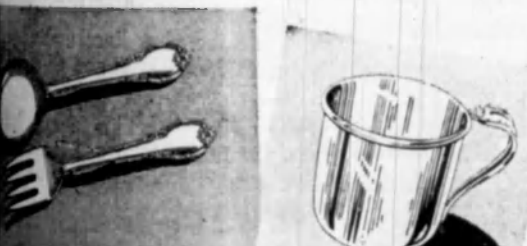

MEN WORK 10 TO 12 HOURS A DAY ON 800-MILE PROJECT SCHEDULED FOR COMPLETION THIS YEAR

Eight rugged crews of pipe liners—hundreds of specialists who are working 10 to 12 hours a day under the summer sun—have passed the half-way mark in building Texas Gas Transmission Corporation's new 800-mile pipe line that runs near here.

Put under contract last May by six major construction firms employed by Texas Gas, their goal is to have the new 800-mile artery in the ground and delivering natural gas by the end of the year.

Even for veterans with a quarter century of experience in laying pipe lines throughout the world, the Texas Gas project is a tough, challenging job, made more difficult by the need for speed.

From Texas to Ohio the bulldozers have built a road-like right-of-way wide enough and strong enough to hold the long trucks, heavy tractors, and steam shovels that are now in action laying the pipe lines.

Through seven states, under 15 rivers, men are pushing the pipe line. Before December they

will run four pipe lines under the broad Mississippi and Ohio rivers.

They will bore under 55 railroads and 149 highways without slowing one passenger car or railroad train.

Boomcats and Bulldozers
Perhaps you have seen them as they tapped the reservoir of supplies built up at nearby railroad sidings over the past few months and made preparations to get the 175,000 tons of pipe in the ground.

Behind the bulldozers have come other crews: boom cats picking up the pipe, engineers bending the 26-inch tube to the proper curve of the land, welders tacking and beading the 40-foot sections together, machines coating and wrapping the pipe to protect it once it is in the ground.

The pipe liners you have seen are employed by the contractors working for Texas Gas to do a big job, fast.

Each day that they add another mile to the pipe line helps Texas Gas reach its goal of completing the long-distance carrier by the year's end.

Over twenty years ago, the Congress of the United States passed the Railway Labor Act. It was hailed by union leaders as a model for the settlement of labor disputes.

efficiently or economically if the leaders of the unions ignore agreements or laws.

Provisions of the law which are Disregarded

There are five ways under the Railway Labor Act to settle disputes over the meaning of contracts.

- 1—Decision by National Railroad Adjustment Board.
- 2—Decision by System Adjustment Board for the specific railroad.
- 3—Decision by arbitration.
- 4—Decision by neutral referee.
- 5—Decision by courts.

The Missouri Pacific Railroad has been and is entirely willing to have these disputes settled in accordance with the requirements of the Railway Labor Act. Regardless of this fact, the union leaders have shut down that railroad.

Innocent bystanders Suffer Losses and Hardships

There are about 5,000 engineers, firemen, conductors and trainmen on the Missouri Pacific. They are known as "operating" employees, and are the most highly paid of all employees on the nation's railroads, but their strike action has resulted in the loss of work to 22,500 other employees of the Missouri Pacific. In addition, they have imposed great inconvenience and hardship upon the public and the communities served by that railroad.

The Railway Labor Act was designed to protect the public against just such interruptions of commerce.

If these men will not comply with the provisions of the law for the settlement of such disputes, then all thinking Americans must face the question, "What is the next step?"

Obviously the railroads cannot be run

THE LEADERS of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, Order of Railway Conductors, and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen on the Missouri Pacific Railroad have refused to avail themselves of the peaceful means provided by this Act for settling their disputes. They insist that they be the sole umpire of their own disputes over the meaning of contracts.

There is no Need for Strikes

With all of the available methods for the interpretation of contracts, there is no need for a strike or even a threat of a strike, but the leaders of these railroad unions have ignored the ordinary procedures established by law and insist upon imposing their own interpretations of their contracts by means of a strike.

The wheels have stopped rolling on the Missouri Pacific. They may stop rolling on other railroads at any time. Recently the Wabash Railroad was forced to discontinue operation for several days under similar circumstances.

What are These Strikes About?

These strikes and strike threats are not about wage rates or hours. They result from disputes over the meaning of existing contracts. They cover claims for a full day's pay for less than a day's work, or for payments for services performed by others who were fully paid for the work done.

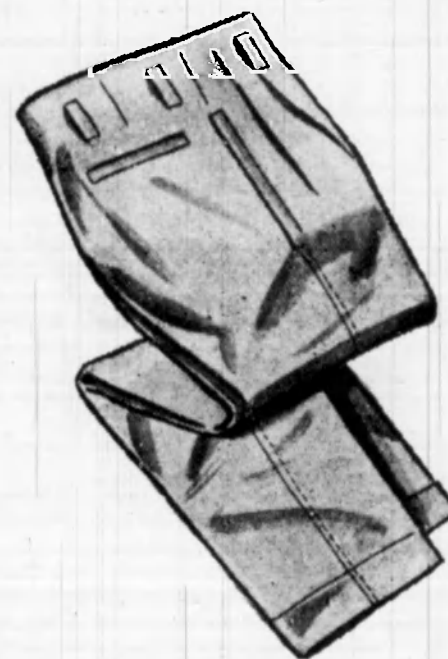

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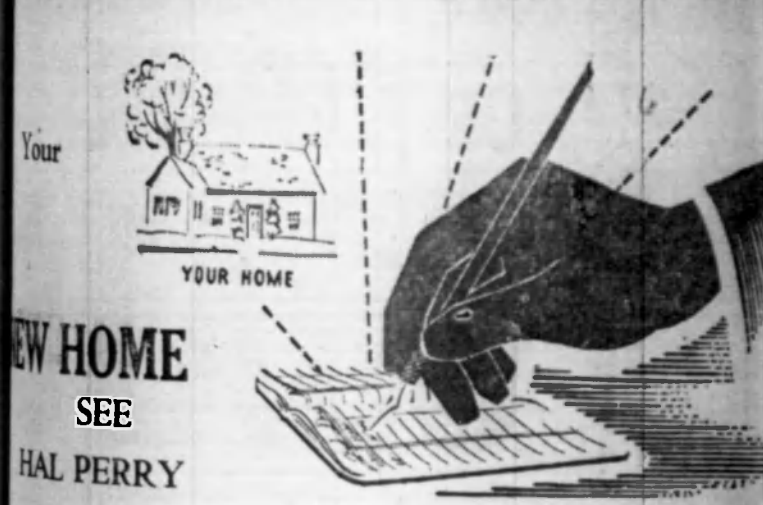
