Democratic Primaries.

The chairman of the democratic committee of the first congressional district has issued a call for a meeting of the committee to be held in this city April 26 to determine the time and manner of nominating a candidate for congress. There are now four candidates in the field seeking the nomination and it has become necessary for the committee to present some method by which the choice of the greatest number of democrats can be ascertained so that he may be declared the nominee of the party. And the way to do this is to hold an old fashioned primary election. Let the polls be opened all day so that every democrat who desires to do so may express his preference. In that way alone can the will of the people be clearly expressed. The committee will order a primary and it should be held earlier than the first Monday in August.—Paducah Standard.

The Standard is now in a great hurry to have a primary election held earlier than the first Monday in August. It has been very much afraid that an election would be called too early, but now since the committee is called to meet, on the 29th of this month, it is desirous of the primary being held earlier than the first Monday in August. This is one more time the Standard is a little off; the people want the primary called for the first Monday in August and if the committee knows its duty, and does it, the election will be called for that day. Any other day will not suit or give satisfaction to the rank and file of the democratic party. Primaries will be called in nearly all the counties to select nominees for county offices, on that day and why not the congressional committee call a congressional primary to select a candidate for congress on that day, so as not to weary the people in attending so many elections. The primary should be called for the first Monday in August and on no other day, such a call will suit the people.

Capital Paragraphs.

Republicans are no longer doing much talking about the "do nothing house" passing two tariff bills—free wool and free cotton ties and bagging—in one week is legislating entirely too fast to suit the republicans, and then the subject of this legislation is not a pleasant one for them to contemplate; it recalls memories of the cyclone of '88, which makes their knees shake at the prospects for its duplication next November.

It has leaked out that prominent republican members of the senate finance committee wish to dodge the tariff issue by smothering these bills in committee, that is not reporting them back to the senate at all—they do not wish to hear, nor allow the country to hear the tariff speech which Senator Carlisle has prepared, nor that of Senator Mills, which was not delivered in the house, because the senator preferred it to be his maiden speech in the senate.

Another reason for wishing to smother these bills is that there are several republican leaders as shaky on the tariff question. Democratic senators have served notice on the republicans that they would resist the smothering process, and intended to have a vote and a discussion, which would show the country where the senate stands, and that may result in making the dodgers toe the mark.

Assistant Secretary Nettleton is the guilty man. It is he who was responsible for the spending, without legal authority, of a large sum of money at Ellis Island, money that was certainly extravagantly lavished upon favored contractors, and which later developments may show to have been dishonestly expended. Immigration affairs have been taken out of Nettleton's hands, but that is not enough; every member of the house and senate committees on immigration, which are conducting this investigation, believes that he should be compelled to resign. Superintendent Owen

had nothing to do with spending the money, but the investigation has made his general incompetence so plain that it may be regarded as certain that he will have to retire.

Representative McCreary introduced in the house a bill prepared by Representative Springer, providing for the holding of an international monetary congress to endeavor to reach all international agreement as to the relation which should be maintained between gold and silver and the uniformity in weight and fineness of coins. The bill is a long one, and was prepared by Mr Springer previous to his late illness.

Only three democrats—English of New Jersey, Coburn of Wisconsin and O'Neill of Missouri—voted against the bill to put cotton ties on the free list.

Tiling Needed.

Tiling can be used by the farmers to a great advantage in this county, and it is as much needed in thousands of acres of land now being cultivated as manure. There is hardly a farm on either side of Clark's river but what could be greatly benefited by the use of tiling. In Illinois, Indiana and Ohio, where the soil is similar to ours, tiling is universally used, and wherever used, the land is greatly improved and its productivity almost doubled. The lands in all the bottoms of our rivers, creeks and branches need tiling, and whenever it is begun, our farmers will soon become familiar with its profitable results. There are over a thousand acres of bottom land that lie near town that are now in cultivation, every acre of which need more or less tiling. The lands along the banks of Jonathan creek, Clark's river Bear creek, West and Middle forks of Clark's river and all the swamp boggy lands on Little Cypress and Tennessee river, besides all the little branches and tributaries to all these streams could be made double their present value by being tiled.

We are not familiar with our dirt enough to know whether tiling can be made here or not, but we do know it is being made successfully as near as Grand Rivers and Henry county, Tenn., but we are of the opinion that good tiling can be made right here in this county. A tiler ought to be established and the manufacture of tiles begun, and when that is begun the farmers will begin to use them, which will greatly benefit their lands. It is not so expensive but all of our farmers are able to use it. It is the very thing our land needs to make it as good land as can be found in any country, and the sooner its use is begun the better it will be for the prosperity of the people.

A Family of Judges.

We often see whole families with like inclinations, and frequent ly each member in the same profession or pursuit of their ancestors, one generation after another, thus we see families of mechanics, families of merchants, families of ministers, and families of lawyers, but a family of judges is something a little remarkable. Yet, Lyon county has furnished such a one, in the Watkins family. A short sketch of the family may be of interest to our readers.

Thos. G. Watkins was born near Frankfort, Ky. in 1798, went to Murray county, Tenn. in 1806 and returned to Kentucky, settled in what is now Lyon county, but at that time, Caldwell, 7 miles above Eddyville, on Cumberland river.

He was a farmer but took great interest in politics, and in 1827, was married to Nancy Dyer, daughter of Gen. John Dyer, of Trigg county.

Three sons were born to them. John Dyer, in 1828, Lynn Boyd in 1836, and Thos Jefferson, in 1838, all of whom were reared on a farm, and received their education at the country schools and at Cumberland College, at that time located at Princeton. John Dyer Watkins, the oldest son, emigrated to Louisiana in 1852, and settled at Minden, obtained license to practice law and as soon as eligible, was appointed district attorney, corresponding with the commonwealth's attorney of this state, and at the next election, was elected and continued in office until the courts and state government were broken up by the war.

Just after the war he was elected and was holding the office of circuit judge, of his district, at the time of the adoption of the fourteenth amendment to the federal constitution but a republican court declared him ineligible, for that he had taken part in the rebellion.

A short time afterwards, he was nominated by the democrats and elected, but was counted out by the carpet-bag administration that had control at that time, under the operation of the returning board. Since that time he represented his district in the constitutional convention that formed the last constitution of that state, and enjoys a lucrative law practice.

Lynn Boyd Watkins followed his brother to Minden, in 1857, and read law with him and was admitted to the bar in 1858. He practiced with his brother until the war, after the war he resumed the practice alone, and in 1872, was elected and served one term as circuit judge of the same district that had been elected in. Five years ago he was elected judge of the supreme court of the state and is now on the bench at New Orleans.

John T. and Lynn Boyd, Jr., sons of John Dyer Watkins are prominent young lawyers at Minden, and a few weeks since, John T. was nominated by the democrats for circuit judge of the same district his father and uncle had served, over older opponents, which is equivalent to an election.

Last, but not least, is Thos. Jefferson Watkins, He read law during the war and when peace was declared began the practice here in Eddyville and has had a large share of the litigation during the time. Most of the time he has occupied the same office he is now in. For five successive terms he was nominated by the democrats without opposition, and elected county judge of this county. During all this time he has had an extensive practice in the circuit court, and is to-day one of the foremost lawyers in this end of the state.—Tale of Two Cities.

The World's fair bill has been signed and approved by their governor.

How would Ben Keys do as a candidate for congress on the third party ticket?

Who will be the first lucky man to receive his walking papers from that secret "freezing" committee?

Would Campbell, Robertson or Hendrick remain at his post more than Stone has done? It will take a sticker to beat Stone.

The third parties have decided not to nominate a candidate for congress at their Paducah meeting, but will wait to see who the democrats nominate.

Three railroad commissioners were appointed, by Gov. Brown, this week. Urey Woodson, of Owensboro, C. C. McChord, of Springfield and C. B. Poyntz, of Maysville.

Governor Brown appointed the following persons as the World's fair commissioners for Kentucky: Dr. John D. Clardy, of Christian county; W. H. Dulaney and Young E. Allison, of Louisville; J. D. Black of Barbourville, and John W. Yerkes, of Danville. A good selection.

As we announced a few days ago, we have it, "on the inside," that Hill will soon be out of the field as a presidential probability and will give his influence for the nominee, whoever he may be. This of course means Mr. Cleveland. Mr. Cleveland will have no trouble in receiving the nomination, and when once nominated, will have no trouble in being elected.

Mr. Dale says he is no candidate nor a democrat. Well sir, if that be true, just wait until you are a candidate and then you can be heard; but don't be running about interfering in a democratic fight before a primary or convention is held and a nomination made. After the nomination is made by the democrats, and you are the

nominee of the third party or called out by its proper authorities, then you can claim a part of the time of the nominee of the democratic party in joint discussion. If four third party candidates were out speaking for the nomination, would it not be contrary to political etiquette for Robertson, Campbell, Hendrick or any other democrat, be he candidate or not, to be all the time putting in his lip in an outside discussion. We think so. Brother Dale, stand aside until you are called.

Every man knows his business, but we are at a loss to know why our friend Bud Dale will go about over the country taking up the time of candidates and being in the way, when he is no candidate and says he is not asking for any office. Bud, stay out of the way, unless you are a candidate, and let the candidates be heard by the people. Time enough for you when you are called.

It is thought that congress will not adjourn until the first of August. If it does not, will Capt. Stone continue at his post, as he has always done, and leave his election in the hands of his friends. He would certainly be excusable to come back and make a few speeches over the district, giving an account of his services, and in a mild way attend to the boys who are now jumping upon his record.

The state board of equalization in and by its work this year has caused more dissatisfaction among the counties than in any one year before. A large number of counties have sent committees to Frankfort to meet the board and ask a reduction in the per cent added to their assessments by the board this session. The usefulness of the board was destroyed when the present law was passed, yet it does some good in equalizing taxation in all the counties. The state cannot afford to repeal the law, because it would not be long before the same inequality of assessments would exist as did before the first law was passed. There is, as usual, a bill before the legislature to have the law repealed, but it will hardly pass, as the people are well aware that some such law is very much needed. The present law is greatly defective, which the present legislature ought by all means to remedy. The people in each county should assess their property up to a certain standard, or be made to do so, that taxation fall alike on all tax-payers in the state. Without the state board it would not be done, it could not be done, and for this reason if no other, such a board ought to be retained.

HOW THINGS DO CHANGE!
Two years ago, when the county democratic committee called a primary election for the purpose of nominating county candidates, a great hue and cry went up from certain individuals against primary elections, conventions, caucuses, etc.; and how are these over-zealous gentlemen about now? They are not only in favor of primary elections, but they have become so tame that a mass convention is called to meet in Benton on April the 30th for the purpose of selecting delegates to attend a congressional convention in Paducah on May 7, 1892, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for congress. Then they called it non-partisan, non-political, etc. Now they call it political in all that the word means. We knew what it would come to then; we said so then, and sure enough our prediction is being verified. In most of the counties the mass conventions are nominating candidates for county officers, but we have been so closely upon their trail in this county, that the party bosses will not allow nominations to be made on April 30, but will resort to the virtue left in the "freezing" committee that worked in ways that were strange and mysterious two years ago. Mr. Fields and Mr. Jones, candidates for sheriff on the independent ticket, would do well to keep a weather eye on the bosses, because it will only be a short time until the chilly touches of that heartless "freezing" committee will begin to be felt, and off will go one of their heads. Read the Tribune and hear the speeches made now, and compare them with what was said two years ago, and note the wonderful change. How we do change; that is, us third party folks.

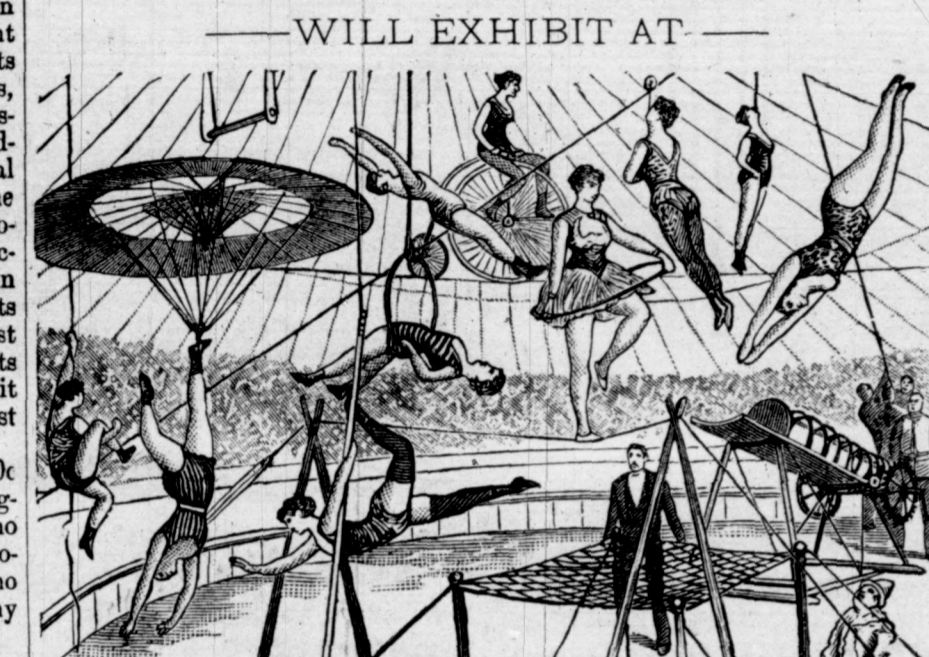

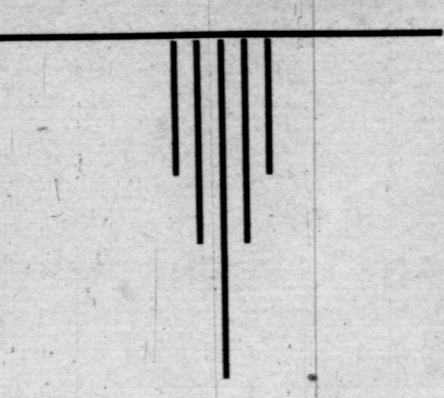
