STRAWBERRY PRESERVES

In making any preserves as jelly one rule should be followed: Use a small amount of fruit juice at a time. Another rule for strawberry preserves is to let the preserves stand until cool before packing in containers. In this way the berries will not rise to the top of the container.

STRAWBERRY PRESERVES

2 cups strawberries 1-4 cup water 2 cups sugar
Make a syrup by boiling 1 cup of sugar and the water together. Add 1 cup of berries, let boil. Add 1 cup of sugar, let boil, add 1 cup of berries. Boil 8 to 10 minutes. Remove from stove, cover kettle and let cool. Pack in a shallow pan and let stand over night. Place berries carefully in sterilized jars. Reheat the syrup to boiling point and pour over preserves. Partially seal and process 15 to 20 minutes in water bath. Seal and store in a cool place.

STRAWBERRY PRESERVES USING LEMON JUICE

2 pounds capped berries 4 tablespoons lemon juice 5 cups sugar
Mix berries with sugar. Let stand 3 or 4 hours. Place over very low heat until simmering point is reached. Add lemon juice. Boil rapidly from 10 to 12 minutes (or until berries are clear and syrup thick). Cover and let stand overnight. Pack into hot jars. Process 15 minutes at simmering.

Strawberries should be frozen, preserved or canned for winter use. Freezing is a quite way to put up strawberries. Dry sugar or a medium syrup can be used with either whole or sliced strawberries. However dry sugar and sugar syrup with the whole berries is recommended.

PREPARATION—Wash in cold water, and drain. Strawberries may be packed whole or sliced. For the dry sugar pack, sliced (lengthwise) or whole berries are mixed with granulated sugar in the proportions of 4 to 5 parts, by weight, of berries to 1 part of sugar. For the syrup pack, whole or sliced, berries are placed in suitable containers—waxed cups, glass jars, or cellophane bags—and just covered with medium syrup. 4 cups of sugar to 4 cups of water.

For canning, mix 1 quart of berries, 1 cup sugar and 2 teaspoons of strawberry juice, bring to boil, let set over night. Pack in jars, process 20 minutes in water bath. Strawberries do not make an attractive canned product. However, they may be used in fruit punch.

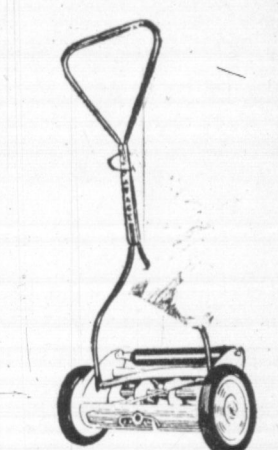

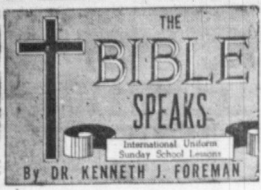

Questioning God

Lesson for June 4, 1959

HABAKKUK has been called the prophet who dared to ask God questions. If he had not asked these questions he would not have had his answers, so we ought to be thankful for him. If he had meekly "taken it" without (so to speak) talking back to God, he himself might never have become a prophet and we might have missed the truth which he was enabled to see. If there had been no Habakkuk, we would have read nothing good in them. As for local news, it was all scandal. Murders, judges dispensing injustice in the courts, good people having a very hard time of it. Abroad, things looked dark. The giant nation of Babylon was on the march westward, and it did not look as if the nation of Judah had what it would take to stop an invasion.

Habakkuk, a deeply sensitive man, could not brush it all off. He could not say, "Oh well, what can you expect?" or "I see the boys are at it again." He could not think of what was going on around him as if it were all a story, a murder-mystery, to be enjoyed in an easy chair. He could not say "It is fate" and let it go at that.

He was desperate in his mind about it all. "Under mine eyes of rage and injury go on," he said (1:3, Moffatt's translation). He dared to ask the question, Why? Why does God permit such things?

God's Terrible Answer
GOD HAD AN ANSWER for Habakkuk, but it did not satisfy him at first; indeed it disturbed him deeply, for the answer looked worse than the original problem. The essence of it was this (Hab. 2:5-11): God had indeed seen the wicked ways of the nation of Judah, and was going to punish the whole country by defeat in war. He was bringing up against them the Babylonians (Chaldeans), an aggressive, fighting, ruthless nation. Sooner or later Babylon and Judah would clash, and then—smash!

The Prophet Still Asks Questions
HABAKKUK KNEW very well what the Babylonians were like and what they had been doing. But could it be true that God would actually make use of a wicked nation like Babylon? God was "of purer eyes than to behold evil," how then could a good God use the cruel violence of godless armies, even for a righteous purpose?

The Babylonians were not God's people—they did not worship him or know him. How could God use his enemies to punish his own people? Does God justify the means by the end? Does God do evil that good may come?

Habakkuk, in short, was troubled by exactly the same kind of questions that have always arisen when men who believe in a righteous God ponder the meaning of the power of evil.

Faith Comes Through
HABAKKUK never did get a complete, logical answer to his doubts. What he did get was something more valuable. It was a two-fold answer. First, WAIT AND SEE. (2:1-3) The crushing of Judah by Babylon would not be the last chapter of history. God has yet to settle his account with Babylon, and "God does settle all his accounts in October."

The other part of the answer is: THE JUST SHALL LIVE BY FAITH. The meaning here (2:4) is that there are two kinds of life, two types of character, two sorts of men. One is the man of pride and unfaith, the other is the man of faith. Unfaith kills, faith makes alive. Unfaith trembles and falls, faith endures.

So it is with men and nations. At that time you might have thought, Babylon will survive, Judah has no chance. But in the light of history, we know it was Babylon that perished, Judah that endured. Godlessness may have terrible power, but since it is godlessness, it has no final power against the real God.

So Habakkuk who began by asking questions, came out into glorious faith. The great poem with which his book closes is a bold confession of faith. No longer complaining, he cries out, "The Lord God is my strength!"

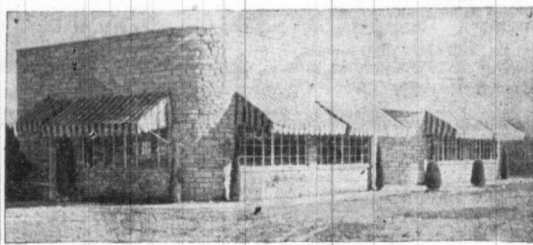
Fishing In All Parts Of Ky. Lake Take Turn For Better

Miss your fishy news last week? Ye fishy one tried them out for a day or so, had only fisherman's luck. The wind has been in the wrong direction and the moon upside down for anglers for several days. A full moon is now coming up, so luck may change. B. L. Trevathan reports good luck Thursday and Friday of the past week while bass fishing under the bridge, south side of Dam and on East side. 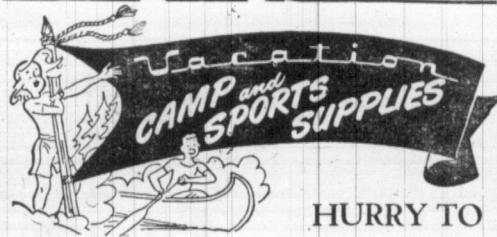

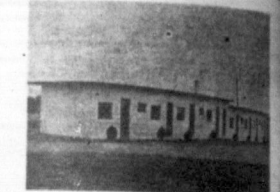

Rapid City Public Schools and
South Dakota Division of Crip-
pled Children, speech is not an
inherited talent.

Writing in the South Dakota
Education Association Journal,
she points out,
"We have our eyes with which
to see and our ears with which
to hear, but we have been created
with no organ primarily for speech. The
organs we use for speech are
primarily for eating, breathing,
and maintaining life. Each per-
son must train these organs to
take on the added burden of
speech."

She comments that tradi-
tional attitude toward the child
whose speech deviates from the
normal pattern of other chil-
dren has been, "Oh, leave him
alone! He'll outgrow it!" But for
every child with sufficient abili-
ty, motivation, and favorable
environment who is able to over-
come his speech difficulties
there are many who are not suc-
cessful, whose ambitions are fre-
quently thwarted and whose
lives and personalities are some-
times distorted because of the
neglect of their speech. This "leave
it alone and he'll outgrow it" atti-
tude has not proved good advice,
she says as "there are one and
a half million speech defectives
of school age in this country
alone."

About 60 to 70 per cent of
speech difficulties in school chil-
dren are due to the fact they
have not learned to make and to
use speech sound correctly. They
substitute, omit, or distort the

production of sounds.
Training in speech improve-
ment, at least in the first five
grades, she maintains, should
be a definite part of the element-
ary school curriculum. If fifteen
minutes daily could be assign-
ed to this work, the results
would show not only better read-
ers, better spellers, and better
students. This doesn't mean spe-
ech improvement should cease
after the fifteen minute period,
nor at the end of the fifth grade.
Rather all classroom activities
and all subjects should be used
to teach good speech habits to
children.

Nor should speech training be
confined to the school alone.
Each and every parent would do
well to attempt a speech correc-
tino program. This can be devel-
oped in an organized, systemat-
ic and progressive manner
through the cooperation of the
school.
