COMMENT

WHY PROBE STRATOSPHERE?

Belief that the daring balloonists who explore the stratosphere are opening up a "new frontier of the upper air destined to play an increasingly important part in the world of tomorrow," is expressed in a statement by Dr. Lyman J. Briggs, chairman of the scientific advisory committee for the flight to be made this month through the cooperation of the National Geographic Society and the army air corps.

It is hoped that the balloon will reach a height of fourteen miles, in which case more than 95 per cent of the blanket of air surrounding the earth will be below it. From this altitude it will be possible to study the light of the sun much more accurately than from the earth because much of its ultraviolet rays cannot penetrate the air blanket.

Scientists will also study the ozone gas that exists somewhere in the upper air, and which is believed to protect the earth from invisible rays of the sun which might be harmful. The mysterious cosmic rays, which permeate the human body continuously, can be studied better in the rarefied atmosphere of the stratosphere. It is pointed out that they are the most powerful rays known and if their nature and origin can be established, the past history of the universe and perhaps its future may be better understood.

Important discoveries relating to weather conditions may be unearthed by the scientists in the balloon, and information that it is believed will be of far reaching importance in aviation will be sought too.

Tiny spores of various fungi, many of which cause serious diseases of crops and plants, are carried by the winds of the upper air. To aid in fighting these diseases, scientists must know more about the existence of the spores in the upper reaches. Not only will spores be hunted in the stratosphere, but they will be taken aloft to see if they can live in the cold and rarefied air.

Secrets of vital importance to the development of radio are believed to lurk in the upper air. These will be probed continuously from the minute the balloon leaves the ground.

These are not all of the scientific projects that will be carried out on the flight, points out Dr. Briggs, but they serve to illustrate why scientists consider that exploring the stratosphere is well worth while and will pay large dividends in the advance of human knowledge and welfare—Atlanta Constitution.

Mental Efficiency Lowered By Unwise Meals, Says Scientist

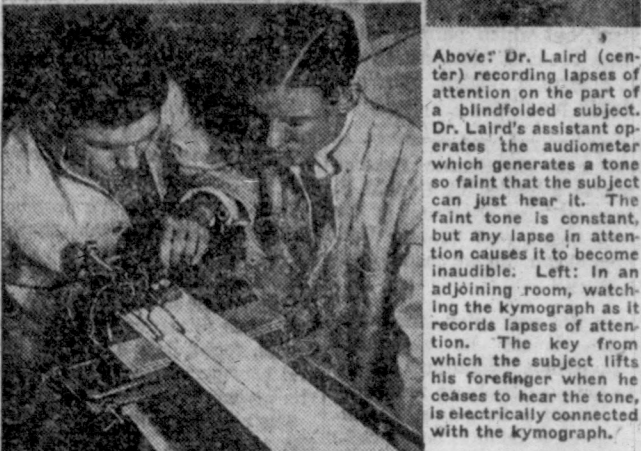
If you work in an office or earn your living by any other kind of mental work, you will do well to guard yourself against becoming a victim of brain anemia. Brain anemia, according to Dr. Donald A. Laird, Director of the Psychological Laboratory, Colgate University, is a condition which afflicts large numbers of mental workers and one which definitely lowers their mental efficiency.

The condition is one that, without being recognized by name, is familiar to many office executives and workers as the post-luncheon mental sluggishness which results almost universally in low production by office workers during the early afternoon. At the recent convention of the National Office Management Association, Dr. Laird described his just completed research investigation of this condition and possible remedies for it.

The series of experiments directed by Dr. Laird extended over a period of 24 days. Eight young men accustomed to mental work were used as subjects. The subjects ate their noon meals in the laboratory. On half of the days, scattered irregularly through the 24-day period, they were served a fairly heavy meal. On the other half of the days, given a light lunch consisting of a ready-to-eat cereal such as corn flakes, with milk; and a light dessert.

Specially devised laboratory equipment was employed to measure the subjects' mental efficiency after the two types of lunches. After the light lunch their minds worked with 6 per cent more speed and 25 per cent more accuracy than after the heavier meals. The difference in the ability of the subjects to keep their attention from fluctuating was even more marked. There were nearly 70 per cent more lapses in attention after the heavier meal than after the light cereal lunch.

"Our experiments showed conclusively," Dr. Laird said, "that the cause of the mental sluggishness which afflicts many office workers in the early afternoon is a condition of brain anemia, due to the fact that the demands placed upon the digestive organs cause them to draw blood away from the brain in order to meet these demands. We have also shown that the adverse effects of this condition are great

enough to affect mental efficiency to a marked degree. "The light meals left the blood supply of the brain relatively unshifted, allowing it to remain in the pink of condition." The heavier meals resulted in a definitely insufficient supply of blood to the brain. "In the pink of condition" is a special apt phrase in this connection, for when the brain is well supplied with blood, and literally in the pink of condition, mental efficiency tends to be at its highest. When blood is drawn from the brain by the digestive organs, it is difficult to direct a heavy meal efficiency is lowered."

made from boards with small cracks between each board to allow the tobacco extract to run through into a container beneath the box. The wet tobacco is subjected to pressure by means of a lever of the proper size and length by fastening one end to a stable object such as a tree, and placing a fulcrum on top of the tobacco and pulling at the long end of the lever until most of the liquid is pressed out of the tobacco leaves. The two portions of extract are combined and thoroughly mixed. The strength of the extract can be tested approximately by taking about a pint and diluting with water until it no longer kills plants like. Enough water is then added to the remaining volume of the extract to bring it to a dilution that will kill plant lice effectively as shown by trial.

A trial test with a sample of tobacco which contained 3.80 percent of nicotine was made with the following amounts of tobacco and water.

One pound of tobacco soaked in one gallon of water gave an extract which contained .054 percent of nicotine, which is about the right strength to use for killing plant lice. However, a stronger extract than this does no harm.

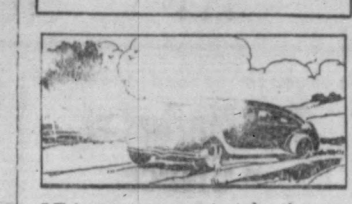
Boiling the tobacco leaves in water causes a loss of nicotine and produces a weaker extract than when the tobacco leaves are digested in warm water as described above.

When diluting the extract it is a good plan to take out a gallon or more of the strong extract and

hold in reserve in case the main portion of the extract is diluted too much, in which case the gallon held in reserve is used to bring the spray to the strength that will kill plant lice effectively. It is recommended that common laundry soap be added to the spray at the rate of an inch cube per gallon.

It is unnecessary to take the vacuum windshield wiper apart for its periodic oiling. Instead, remove the regular hose from the wiper and attach a short length of rubber tubing. Insert the free end of the tubing in a can of oil and open the shut-off valve. Move the wiper blade back and forth several times. This will suck in the oil and lubricate the wiper.

Cleaning grease-spotted cement garage floors can be a difficult job, but use of a mixture of kerosene and ashes will make it an easy one. Loosen the surface dirt with a shovel or hoe. Then sprinkle a cup of kerosene on the floor and rub it into the grease spots with an old broom. Work several shovelfuls of fine furnace ashes into the kerosene and grease. After a good scrubbing and sweeping the floor will be found clean and white.
