Pennsalt Sets New Records In Sales And Earnings

Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Company made new highs in sales and earnings in the June quarter, the Wall Street Journal reports.

Volume rose to \$10,423,049, compared with \$9,009,507 in the June 1949 quarter. Net profits set a high mark for the concern's 100 year history at \$1,124,248, against \$941, 116 in the record breaking March quarter and \$715,261 a year ago. June quarter net was equal to \$1.27 a share on 874,156 common shares outstanding, compared with \$.18 a share on 764,814 common shares in the March quarter and 89 cents on 764,573 shares in the June, 1949 quarter.

Business continues good and there is a tremendous demand for many of Pennsalt's products, particularly chlorides and ammonia. Unless something unforeseen develops, new records in sales and profits are expected for 1950.

The Journal continued: "The higher earnings are due to improved profit margins and greater sales. The increase in the margin of profits stems from the company's \$15 million investment in new plants and equipment which was largely completed last year and in beginning to show returns is a substantial way.
