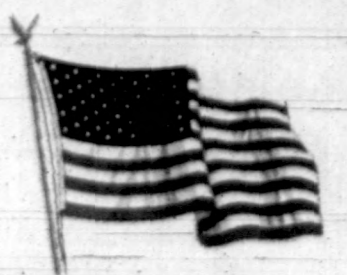

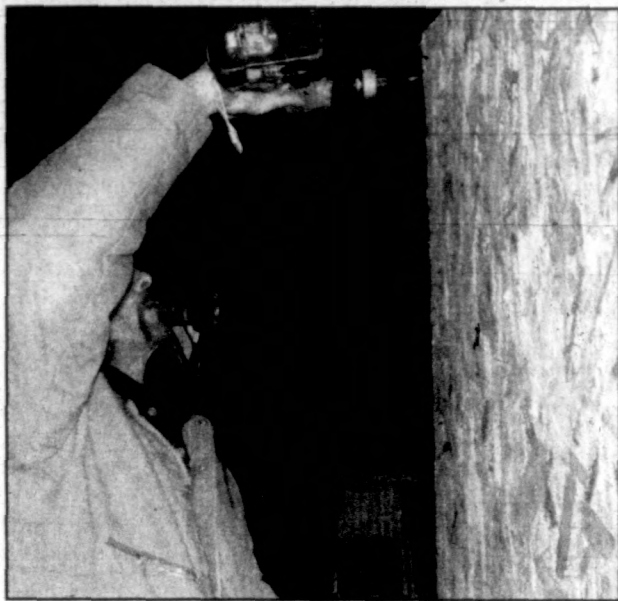

Community lends hand after blaze

HAZEL, Ky. — The official word on the cause of a fire that badly damaged Miss Bradie's is not expected to be final until a report is released by the Kentucky State Fire Marshal's Office next week.

What is not known, though, is how much of Miss Bradie's merchandise, notably Christmas items, will be saved, as well as what the future holds for the business.

"It's just too early to be determining that right now," said Dan Farris, husband of store owner Jo McKinley, Friday afternoon. "I've been inside. In fact, I was in there (early Friday after the fire had been extinguished)

when the water was still coming down from the top of the place. But you just can't tell what can be saved and what can't."

An insurance adjuster is due Monday to help clear up that issue.

The Hazel Fire Department sent its three units and eight firefighters to the downtown Hazel store Thursday when it got the call at 9:20 p.m. Calloway County Fire & Rescue later supplied around 20 personnel and four units. One Hazel fireman was injured outside the building, but not seriously, according to fire officials.

"That's the good part. No amount of merchandise inside a building is worth getting hurt over," Farris said.

As for the many antiques and arts and crafts that were inside the building when the fire broke out, some appear to be still in one piece and may actually be salvageable. The building, though, took a lot of punishment, sustaining a great deal of smoke and water damage.

"It really got hot in there, because all that heat was kept inside," said Hazel's assistant fire chief Ken Craig.

As the hours wore on Friday, several townspeople ventured to the site to view what remained of the yellow wood-frame building. Among them was city commissioner Nancy Mieux.

Bush to propose Medicare changes

 WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush's plan to seek broad changes to Medicare is meeting early resistance from Democrats who say seniors in the government health insurance program shouldn't have to endure a major overhaul just to get a prescription drug benefit.

Administration officials on Friday said Bush will send guidelines to Capitol Hill in coming weeks that will include the drug benefit as well as sweeping changes to Medicare. White House officials were said to be still working out the details, and it is believed Bush will reveal more of his plan in his State of the Union address Jan. 28.

Senior officials who discussed the issue only on the grounds of anonymity said a central component of the changes will be competition among providers. Bush has long proposed such reforms as a way to cut escalating costs. House Republicans included a pilot of that proposal in a prescription drug bill that passed the House last year. The pilot would have called for the traditional Medicare program to compete with health maintenance organizations in four cities.

One administration official said reforms are needed because the government can't just attach a drug benefit to Medicare without structural improvements to the system, particularly when Medicare is on the brink of running out of money with the influx of the baby boomers in coming years.

Still, Democrats said it is unwise to tinker with Medicare's foundation. "Senior citizens have paid into Medicare all their lives and deserve a prescription drug benefit — no strings attached," said Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass. "Medicare should not be the price senior citizens have to pay for the affordable prescription drugs they deserve."

Kennedy, along with Democratic Sens. John Rockefeller of West Virginia and Bob Graham of Florida, sent a letter to Bush Friday asking him to reconsider his plans.

"The most important single step we can take to modernize Medicare and make it better is to provide the prescription drug coverage senior citizens need," the senators wrote. "We urge you not to divert the Congress from that critical task by insisting that partisan, controversial and potentially destructive changes in Medicare be the price senior citizens have to pay for the affordable prescription drugs they deserve."

An official with the AARP said it's too early for the nation's largest senior citizen lobby to declare opposition or support.

Supposedly, the time for the distribution and reception of gifts surrounding the Christmas season comes to an end on Dec. 25. Not too many people think of New Year's Day as a time for that sort of thing.

For most, it is a time of toasting the new year's arrival then continues with a generous helpings of football and black-eyed peas. But 7-year-old Raegan Green had something else in mind, though, on the first day of 2003. She decided to give of herself — just shy of 10 inches, to be exact.

With the gift going to a worthy cause, Murray hairstylist Amy Houston honored Green's wish of having her long mane cut and the hair donated to the Locks of Love charity that uses donated human hair for hairpieces to financially disadvantaged children suffering from long-term medical hair loss.

"She's just a sweet little girl," said Linda Parker, Raegan's grandmother. "It had been so long since

her hair had been cut and, really, it had gotten to the point that something needed to be done. She had just kept it in a pony tail for a long time."

Now with her new shorter do, Raegan, a first grader who turned 7 in October, does not have to worry about pony tails or tangles or unsuspecting tugs. She said she is very pleased with the shoulder-length style Houston was able to create for her curly, dark brown hair.

"Whoever gets it is going to be proud," she said with a big, toothy smile gracing her face. "It was kind of scary. You really don't know what all is going on (especially with this being just her second or third such experience). But it wasn't a 'screaming' scared. I knew I'd be OK."

Eventually, the hair, still tied in a pony tail, will have to be fit into a package to mail it to the Locks of Love headquarters in Lake Worth, Fla. That is where the hairpieces are constructed so they

The Masons have been married 16 years and have two other daughters, Brittany, 14, and Taylor, 9.

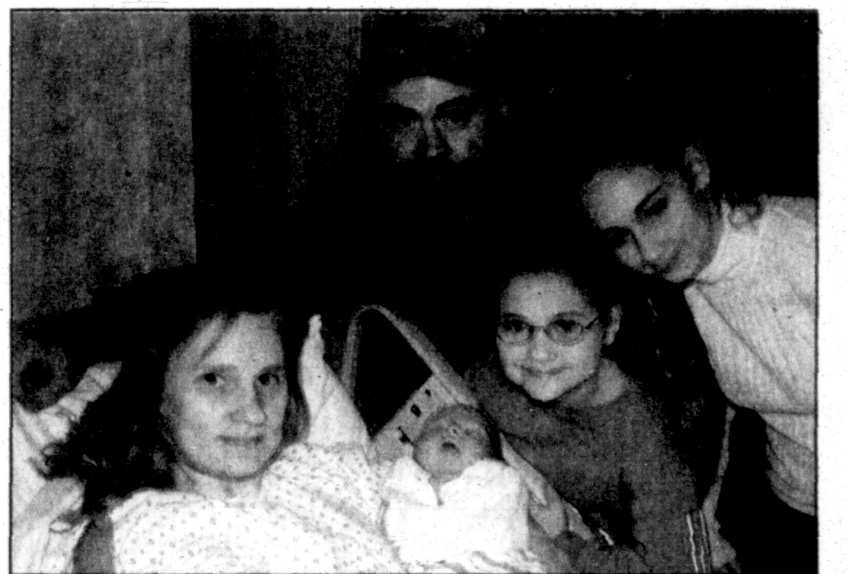
Keith has worked at Briggs and Stratton for the past 7 years. Tammy said she plans to stay home and take care of the children. "Or have them take care of me," she added.

New Year's rides proved successful for transit authority

Based on its rate of success, the Murray-Calloway Transit Authority's first attempt at offering transportation services on New Year's Eve may roll over into an annual event.

MCTA Director Bjarne Hansen said transit buses transported

approximately 70 people between the hours of 6 p.m. and 12:30 a.m. New Year's Eve. The "freebie night," in which MCTA transported riders all over Calloway County for free, was a reasonable, if not resounding, success, Hansen said.

"I'm very satisfied with 70 people," he said. "I think in some sense, it changed people's perception a lit-

tle bit about what we do. It was definitely worth it."

The New Year's Eve pick-ups joined MCTA's new fixed weekend city route as new ventures Hansen has attempted since being named as the transit authority's new director in July. The Murray City Council recently voted to give MCTA another \$13,000 to help keep it operation

until at least April.

While some of the riders were New Year's revelers, Hansen said some of the evening's ridership was made up of people who simply needed transportation. The hours the services were offered may not have been ideal, though.

"I don't know that I would start at 6 (p.m.) again," he said. "We were

pretty dead from 6-9. I would probably go from 9 (p.m.)-1 (a.m.) next year."

As with any free service that is offered, Hansen said MCTA did have to take a loss financially for the evening, especially considering that it transported people as far as the

Bunning switches committee assignments

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Sen. Jim Bunning will swap committee assignments when the next Congress convenes, giving up a seat on the Armed Services panel for a position on the Finance Committee.

The move comes as Fort Knox supporters are bracing for another round of military base closings. They had hoped that Bunning's influence on the defense panel would give the Army post some leverage.

Bunning, R-Ky., said the chance to become a member of the Finance Committee was too valuable to pass up. He will become the first

reform, Bunning said. "The one disappointment about this change is that I have to give up

Kentuckian in nearly 40 years to get a seat on that panel.

The committee will deal with such issues as tax relief, Medicare prescription-drug benefits and Social Security

my seat on the Senate Armed Services Committee," Bunning said. Bunning said he would continue to look out for Kentucky's military installations.

"From the point of view of defense matters, it's important," retired Col. Don Williams, vice chairman of the Kentucky Commission on Military Affairs, said of Bunning's move. "We would have preferred that he keep his seat on the defense committee. But we do understand his rationale."

Williams, a former chief of staff at Fort Knox, and others said Kentucky's military installations are

looking for all the well-positioned advocates they can find as another round of base closings and realignments get under way in Washington.

By 2005, Pentagon officials expect to begin closing as many installations as they have closed in four previous rounds, beginning in 1988. Fort Campbell, along the Kentucky-Tennessee border, is considered less vulnerable than Fort Knox because it is home to the 101st Airborne Division, a key Army combat component.

In the last decade, Fort Knox has become a center for training, research and recruiting.

Tremor recorded north of Henderson

HENDERSON, Ky. (AP) — Some Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky residents felt a jolt from a small earthquake Friday morning.

A very mild earth tremor was recorded in southwestern Illinois at 11:17 a.m. EST, according to Ray Bowman of the Kentucky Division of Emergency Management. Bowman said there were no reports of damage or injuries.

The quake, centered about 30 miles west of Henderson, Kentucky, registered 2.9. The same area had a more noticeable tremor on June 18 with a 5.0 magnitude earthquake that was centered about 10 miles north of Evansville, Ind.

Not guilty pleas entered to campus sexual assault

MOREHEAD, Ky. (AP) — Five men charged with sexually assaulting a Morehead State University student in her dorm last fall entered innocent pleas in Rowan County Circuit Court on Friday.

Entering the pleas were Nathan Blackburn, 18, of Pikeville; Jordan H. Tackett, 19, of Jenkins; Trevor K. Duncan, 19, of Olympia; Quinton L. Martindale, 18, of Louisville and Calvin G. Roach, 18, of Louisville.

Circuit Judge Beth Lewis Maze scheduled a July 28 trial for the five.

The men, all current or former students at Morehead State, are charged with using a minor in a sexual performance. The 17-year-old girl reported to police that she was gang raped at Waterfield Hall, a

coed dorm where all the accused lived.

The alleged victim has since turned 18 and left school.

Using a minor in a sexual performance carries a penalty of 20 years to life in prison because the victim was injured, prosecutors have said.

Students protested over the school's response to the allegations. They said the administration ignored state and federal laws requiring the university to promptly alert other students of a potential danger.

Morehead State President Ronald Eaglin did not acknowledge the Sept. 14 incident publicly until November — after students held a candlelight vigil outside the dorm.

Calloway students study complexities of industry

When studying industry in the classroom, sometimes it's hard to make it real to the students. Calloway County High School teacher Jeff Slaton knows this. However, he, along with a production engineer from Sportable Scoreboards, has made the concept of cost efficient production a reality.

The students in Slaton's overview of technological systems class have went through a series of training exercises, taught by Kyle Selby, to learn how to make the best use of people, materials, and time.

The goal of the lesson is to make the most efficient production line. The students simulated a series of brief 1-minute production runs where they assembled Lego® parts. On the production line were 6 line workers, 2 quality control inspectors, and a head of inspection.

"We had to try and get the cost of our product down by improving our process," Jeff Slaton said. "We calculated the cost of production based on the number of workers and how many we produced in one minute."

The students then had to find a way to increase production and decrease the size of the workforce in order to make the product more efficient.

Construction spending increased in November

WASHINGTON (AP) — Construction spending rose by 0.3 percent in November, helped by record activity in the red-hot housing market, the government reported Friday.

The Commerce Department said building activity totaled \$843.2 billion at an annual rate in November, up from an annual rate of \$840.5 billion in October, a month when activity had jumped by an even stronger 1 percent.

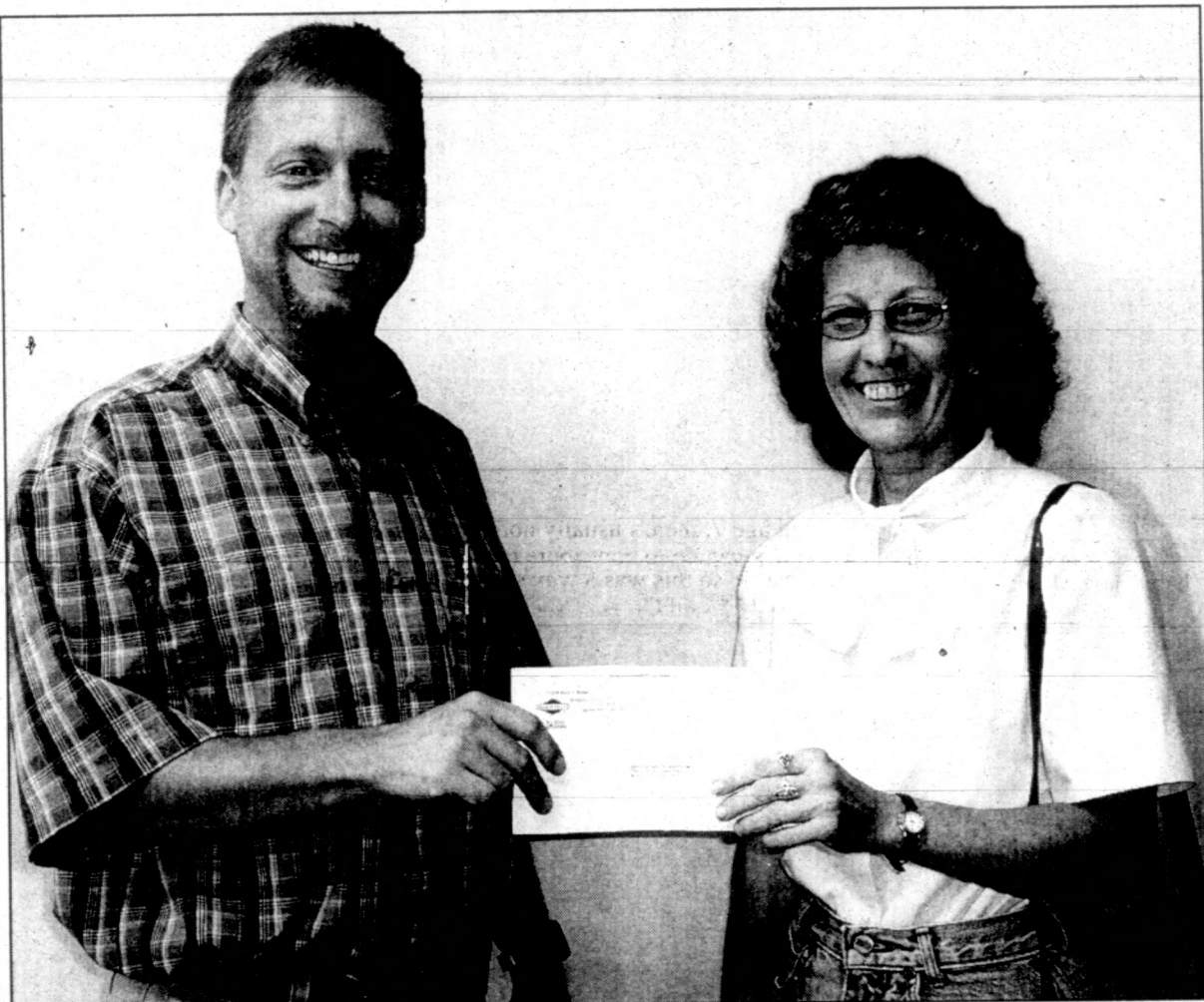
The strong performance was spurred by a 0.9 percent increase in spending on residential construction, which rose to a record \$421.1 billion at an annual rate in November.

The Federal Reserve has kept interest rates at the lowest levels in four-decades for more than a year now and this has spurred strong sales of both new and existing homes as well as high demand for other big-ticket items such as cars.

The strength in consumer spending has helped to offset weakness in business investment and has kept the recovery on track, although activity has been proceeding in fits and starts.

I'll bet it was in a January that those wandering Hebrews made their golden calf and that the earth swallowed a passel of them. Our Januarys are like that. The people are gone, swallowed up.

Were they ever really there? Last month, in December, you couldn't stir them with a stick. People were everywhere. Even Christmas couldn't keep them home. For the week after, they stayed on out, exchanging things and hitting the after-Christmas sales. Now they are gone.

Where do they go? Are we hibernating mammals that pull into our dens for January and February? Outside, it is crisp, breathtakingly nippy, gray — and deserted. This is the real time, not December, when "not a creature is stirring, not even a mouse."

Except for the weather, January would be an ideal time for all those highway repairmen who turn double-lanes into one-lanes. They wouldn't have us to get in their way, and vice versa. But the road repair crews are gone, too. Gone wherever people go in January. We'll not see them again until asphalt season, after Easter.

Where do people go? Deer and duck blinds and ski lodges don't account for more than a fraction of them. They can't all be in Florida or on the Caribbean; the highways, airports and bus stations aren't teeming. Logically, there are no fewer people in the world in January than there were in July or December, but they seem to be so many fewer in number. January must be an optical illusion.

The illusion has something to do with weather, shopping seasons, holidays, fiscal years and fatigue. The converging and merging of all these factors coincide with winter. In man's race to set his own calendar rather than use nature's old one, January remains man's last link to the natural cycle of things. Central heating has not yet conquered January in the way that air-conditioning has done away with July. This is the season for hibernation and contemplation, the pause in nature's cycle that refreshes and

renews.

Nature conspires in January, as it has for centuries, to force upon the world a time of rest and a time for family. January is a time for recovery and planning, for recounting and patching, a time when interiors — of homes, and bodies, and minds — are more important than exteriors.

January gets its name from the Roman god Janus who had two faces. Often Roman homes had a mask of the two-faced god over the door, to watch goings out and comings in. January is an ideal Janus month, a time for looking both ways at once, studying the past year while entering a new one.

January is inventory time for people as well as for business. We sit by firesides and count gains and losses. They are far more numerous than canceled checks show. Inventories in January include measuring gains and losses in self-esteem, family affection, friendships, work satisfaction, health, world affairs and human relations. January is humanity's self-assessment time.

Maybe the tradition of starting January with black-eyed peas, collard greens and hog jowls is only southern; the meal is to bring good luck for the year. The thing that appeals most about that Jan. 18 menu, however, is that it is soul food. There is something about January, when half of us seem to have vanished and the other half seem less harried and frenetic, that is soul-feeding.

Military convoys have halted and gone into winter camps; snow supplies to become spring streams for summer lakes are building up. Last year's best sellers are finally getting read and jigsaw puzzles on card tables are taking shape. Even the birds, scratching the ice under the bird-feeder for a few spilled grains, seem more at ease and less anxious to be on the wing. The quiet is deafening, and our souls are deepening. Both faces of Janus are smiling. Last fall's popcorn explodes. Last summer's peach preserves taste sweeter.

Time and reflection are January's gifts. In the cold, cold January of reason, sobered up from December's frenetic pace, perhaps this year a chill will settle on the war-wagers of the world, and the hard, hard work of making Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men a reality without bloodshed can begin.

Cal's Thoughts

Having already decided, with the support of academics, clergy and journalists, that certain categories and stages of life are not entitled to the protection of law, why are so many appalled, outraged and surprised when cloning arrives at the door? Cloning is the unnatural fruit — there will be many more — produced when the root of the tree of life has been pulled out of its nurturing soil and replanted into a soil of situational ethics that serve the temporal interests and feelings of humanity. What was it a few people said in 1973 about a slippery slope? We have slid a long way since then, and cloning is but a way station where the rest of humanity indulges itself

in a slight gasp before resuming the downward spiral.

Whether or not "doctor" and cultist Brigitte Boisselier and her Clonaid operation have, in fact, cloned a girl named "Eve," the horror expressed in some quarters is a little late.

Ross Clark, a father of two, wrote a column in the London Times this week, asking why it's fine to "kill babies" in an abortion, but not to create them through cloning. "Our fear of clinicians in white coats is much greater when they are creating human life than when they are destroying it," he noted. Clark thinks the population growth fanatics don't mind when science kills, but they oppose anything that would add to our numbers. "We are more inclined to support science when it stops births than when it enables them," he said.

This is why pro-lifers favor returning to a uniform life ethic, covering the unborn, the handicapped, the elderly, racial and religious minorities, in short, all human life. Once one category of humanity is declared unfit to live — regardless of the reason — all others become at risk to the whims of society at a given moment. We still

recoil at what Hitler did to the Jews, gypsies, homosexuals and the sick, but he was simply ahead of his time. Today, he might be invited to speak at Princeton about his unique form of eugenics. Why Princeton? It is the home of Dr. Peter Singer, the Australian philosopher who believes human life is not sacred and can and should be manipulated for whatever end the "healthy" and "fit" determine would serve their current interests. In fact, Hitler might be a candidate for cloning among those who believe his "work" should continue.

Cloning might produce large armies, such as those bred for war by the evil Saruman in "The Lord of the Rings." Clone wars might remove any sense of morality or immorality about war since those who are killing, or being killed, would be the fruits of soulless technology and of no greater value (but less expense) than an airplane or tank.

Some members of Congress, including many who have lost any moral standing on this issue because of their support of abortion through all nine months and even during delivery (known as "partial birth abortion"), now express shock

and outrage over the latest cloning news. They are too late to be taken seriously. Having allowed the process to begin and failed to do anything to stop it; they may pass a law in hopes of slowing down the inevitable, but they will not succeed.

Western culture has told God that we don't need or want Him. It has told history that we will neither learn from it nor care. It worships at the shrine of The Self, and in so doing it has produced a type of "Rosemary's baby" that will be impossible to control absent a revival of the things that once mattered most about life.

After 40 million (and counting) aborted babies in the United States, who, or what, is going to stop cloning? And on what grounds?

Muzzling Science

WASHINGTON (AP) — More federal research dollars are coming with strings attached as the government tries to keep sensitive information out of the hands of terrorists.

Some federal agencies, for example, are pressing to review papers on certain topics and ban foreign researchers who have not been specially screened.

Universities are balking at new restrictions, and in some cases turning down lucrative contracts because they violate long-standing policies.

"Those are deal-breaker issues for us," said Paul Powell, who negotiates federal contracts for the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

MIT persuaded the Defense Department to drop wording from several contracts that would have allowed the military to block unclassified research before it was published, he said.

But the National Security Agency refused to budge from a requirement that any foreigners working on a planned project at MIT's Artificial Intelligence Laboratory be approved by the government, Powell said, forcing the school to walk away from \$404,000.

About half of graduate students in the physical sciences and engineering at U.S. universities come from abroad, and many schools have policies against treating them differently. An NSA spokeswoman said on Thursday the agency could provide no immediate comment.

Although still in the minority, the number of contracts carrying such restrictions has increased significantly since Sept. 11, 2001. Some officials in academia worry about a trend toward more secrecy that jeopardizes researchers' ability to verify and build on each others' findings.

"The stakes are very high in working this out," said former Air Force Secretary Sheila Widnall, now an aeronautics professor at MIT. Widnall led a faculty committee that opposed restrictions on unclassified research.

The Bush administration and scientists alike are struggling with how to balance openness against the fear that all sorts of research could help terrorists — by disclosing structural weaknesses in bridges or revealing how to make biological weapons, for example.

President Bush signed a law last summer prohibiting students from countries considered sponsors of terrorism from working with germs and toxins most likely to be used for bioterrorism.

Meantime, researchers and scientific journals are debating whether — and how — they should censor themselves to safeguard information.

"The whole atmosphere under which we work was affected by Sept. 11," said Richard Seligman, who negotiates government contracts at the California Institute of Technology.

For example, CalTech has agreed to allow the Army Research Laboratory to review a professor's work on computer simulation before publication, Seligman said. The university made an exception to its rules "in the national interest," he said.

Sometimes, restrictions crop up in studies that seem to be of no interest to terrorists. The Justice Department demanded the right to approve before publication a study on physical abuse of college women, said Robert Richardson, Cornell University's vice provost for research.

Cornell turned down the government money. "The people who write their papers don't want to keep it secret," Richardson said.

The White House and Defense Department are

each studying whether new controls should be placed on a wide range of sensitive government information. It's unclear how universities might be affected by any changes.

For now, there are no government-wide guidelines for deciding what unclassified research deserves closer scrutiny.

The president's science adviser, John Marburger, told the House Science Committee in October that science will have to adjust to heightened security. Foreign students are receiving closer scrutiny, Marburger said, because of "the possibility that we are training future terrorists."

Traditionally, universities have held the position that any research not classified as secret could be published freely — a broad understanding that was formalized by President Reagan. The National Academies, chartered by Congress to advise the government on science, recently urged the administration to stick with that principle.

But exceptions existed before the attacks on New York and Washington. The Federal Aviation Administration, for example, had a long-standing requirement that research it financed be vetted to avoid revealing too much about security procedures.

The month before the terrorist attacks, the Army Research Laboratory began requiring researchers it finances to get Army approval before publishing studies.

After an outcry from schools, the Army softened the provision last summer to say that papers must be submitted in advance for review, but not for approval, said Robert Hardy, associate director of the Council on Governmental Relations, which represents universities.

Both sides are still discussing the issue, said Melissa Bohan, an Army spokeswoman.

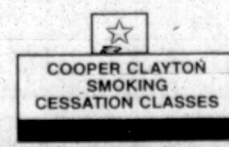

Clean Sweep

Lady Lakers learn quickly in victory

DRAFFENVILLE, Ky. — One could say that the Calloway County Lady Lakers have learned their lesson.

In back-to-back losses to Beech (Tenn.) and Louisville Mercy during the recent Lady Invitational of the South holiday tournament, Calloway witnessed aggressive post play up close and personal.

The Lady Lakers showed they were quick studies on Friday night, using a 14-point performance from junior forward Shameka Dial to down rival Marshall County 50-41 in a key Fourth District contest at Reed Conder Gymnasium.

"We really learned a lot at the LIS tournament," claimed CCHS head coach Scott Sivills. "We got a good lesson on post play from those two teams. That's the way I want our kids to play, and we did that (Friday)."

Calloway (6-5, 1-0 Fourth District) also got help on the perimeter from guard Kalyn Fox, who scored 14 points on 6-of-14 shooting — including a 2-of-3 performance from 3-point range.

Fox's play in the third quarter was a big factor in the game's outcome as the 5-9 sophomore scorched the net for seven points in the final 1:55, helping Calloway turn a 20-18 halftime deficit into a 34-28 lead heading into the

final eight minutes.

"We talked (at halftime) about how we needed to control the first few minutes of the second half," Sivills said. "I think we were able to get in a little rhythm in the second half, and we took them out of their (transition) game."

Dial finished off the Lady Marshals in the fourth quarter, opening the stanza with a layup and then scoring back-to-back buckets to put Calloway comfortably ahead at 44-34 with 2:58 remaining.

"This is the best Shameka has played since she's been here. We talked to her about squaring up and getting better looks at the basket," Sivills said. "I really believe she has the ability to be one of the best players in the (First Region)."

Marshall closed the gap to 48-41 on a pair of free throws from Stephanie Fields with 55.5 seconds left, but would get no closer as Felisha Prescott sank two foul shots with just under 30 seconds showing to cap the Lady Laker victory.

CCHS finished the contest at 50 percent (20-of-40) shooting from the floor while making 7-of-11 free throw attempts.

Senior forward Carley Williams and junior guard Katie Ross pitched in seven points each for the Lady Lakers, who held MCHS to just 37.5 percent (15-of-40)

from the field. The Lady Marshals connected on just 2-of-11 shots from 3-point range.

The Lady Lakers return to the

court on Monday, hosting Mayfield at Jeffrey Gymnasium before taking on crosstown rival Murray High next Friday night.

Fiesta Bowl Ohio State shocks Canes in OT thriller

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Perfectly shocking! Perfectly thrilling!

Ohio State worked two overtimes to rip the national championship from the confident 'Canes in one of the greatest college football games ever.

Maurice Claret ran 5 yards for the winning touchdown, and Ohio State's defense turned back one final bid by No. 1 Miami to tie the game. With that, the Buckeyes completed an unlikely, unbeaten run to their first national title in 34 years with a 31-24 win Friday night at the Fiesta Bowl.

The No. 2 Buckeyes, 11 1/2-point underdogs, ended the Hurricanes' try for a second title and their winning streak at 34.

"It's no different than what we've done all year," Ohio State quarterback Craig Krenzel said. "We make plays in the big games when we have to."

But it would have never happened if not for a late pass interference call at the end of the first overtime — which came with Miami players already celebrating an apparent championship.

Instead, the fourth-down call gave Ohio State the chance it needed to tie the game and send it into the second overtime.

By then, it already was a classic — the first national championship game to go into overtime, in a matchup of the nation's last two undefeated teams, both fighting staying to stay perfect.

"It was just like two great heavyweights slugging it out," Ohio State coach Jim Tressel said.

The greatest game ever? "It's got to be right up there if it's not," Krenzel said.

Miami's Todd Sievers sent the game into overtime with his 40-yard field goal on the final play

of the fourth quarter.

The Buckeyes' punishing defense had rattled and pounded Miami QB Ken Dorsey all night.

And on the last play of the game, on fourth-and-goal at the 1, Cie Grant blitzed and forced Dorsey to heave a desperation pass that linebacker Matt Wilhelm batted to the ground.

A few plays earlier, Wilhelm hit Dorsey with such force it sent the quarterback to the sideline for one play. He came back in, but the Buckeyes would not be denied against a team trying to secure its place in history as one of college football's great dynasties.

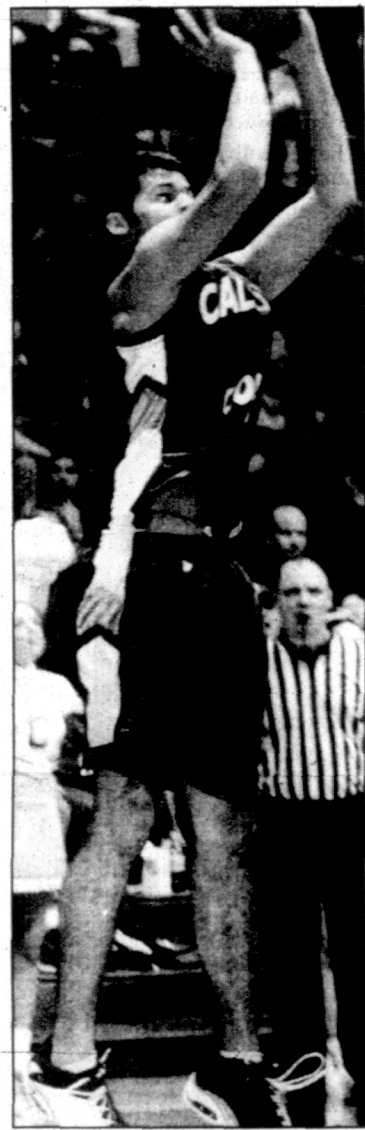
"It feels unreal," Miami fullback Quadtrine Hill said. "After the game was over, it felt like we had one play left. It can't be over. It's something I never want to feel again."

While Miami coach Larry Coker lost for the first time in 25 games, Tressel now has a major college title to add to the four he won in Division I-AA at Youngstown State.

Nine times since Woody Hayes coached the Buckeyes to the 1968 title, Ohio State lost a late-season game that cost it a possible championship. But the Buckeyes finally brought the title back to Columbus with a conservative offense and fierce defense.

Miami (12-1) nearly had its 35th straight victory in the first overtime after scoring a touchdown on its first possession.

Trailing 24-17, Ohio State (14-0) converted a fourth-and-14 on a pass by Krenzel. But the Buckeyes then faced a fourth-and-3 at the 5 when Krenzel threw to the right corner of the end zone for Chris Gamble, who was being covered by Glenn Sharpe.

Walker's post play key as Lakers defeat Marshals

DRAFFENVILLE, Ky. — Since losing leading scorer Mitchell McClure to an injury last month, the Calloway County Lakers have been looking for someone to pick up the offensive load the senior guard took to the bench with him.

At least on Friday night, the Lakers found their man — and not a moment too soon.

Center Logan Walker scored a game-high 17 points on 7-of-10 shooting, grabbed six rebounds and even recorded five blocked shots defensively as Calloway held off host Marshall County 40-37 in a key Fourth District showdown at Reed Conder Gym.

"Logan has shown flashes this season of what he can do," said CCHS head coach Terry Birdsong. "(Friday) he was able to do it with some consistency ... Logan has played against some good competition this year, and he's learned a lot from that."

Calloway (4-7, 1-0 Fourth District) started slow offensively, hitting just 20 percent of its shots in the first half while watching Marshall's Jimmy Lee Holder

score eight of his team-high 14 points in the second quarter as the Marshals led 19-11 at the halftime break.

"We just couldn't hit any shots in the first half," Birdsong noted. "But as I looked at the scoreboard, they only had 19 points. And they're not used to having just 19 points in a half."

Walker and the Lakers heated up in the third quarter. The 6-4 junior scored seven of his points in the first 4:20 of the second half, knocking down a jumper from the baseline and hitting one of two free throws to pull CCHS to within 24-23 with 1:25 left in the third period.

Kenny Marsh followed with a jumper to put the Marshals up by three, but freshman guard Chase Futrell drew the Lakers even at 26-26 heading into the final eight minutes.

Terry Adams' layup in transition began a 10-5 Calloway run that appeared to have put the game away as Jimmy Bynum sank two foul shots for a 38-31 Laker edge with just 1:36 to play.

But Marshall used its full-court pressure defense to force back-to-back turnovers as Marsh scored

six unanswered points to single-handedly put the Marshals back in the game at 38-37 with 1:08 to go.

Futrell and Walker sandwiched a missed 3-pointer by Holder with two made foul shots in four attempts for a 40-37 edge, setting up one last gasp for the Marshals with 8.7 seconds showing on the scoreboard.

Marshall eventually got two attempts to tie the contest as Holder's wild 3-point attempt caromed off the rim and out to Nick Newcomb, who just beat the buzzer with a desperation heave that fell short.

The Lakers shot 38.2 percent (13-of-34) for the game while limiting the Marshals to 38.9 percent (14-of-36).

"I thought we looked more in sync tonight than we have this season," said Birdsong. "But we've spend a lot of time in the gym getting ourselves prepared for games like this."

Calloway travels to Fulton City on Monday and then hosts Fulton County Tuesday before meeting crosstown and district rival Murray High next Friday at MHS.

Lady Tigers top Carlisle; Tigers fall

A rehashing of the Carlisle County scouting report at halftime sorted out the Murray High Lady Tiger defense: switch on all screens!

Then Breanna Volp flipped the switch for a famished MHS offense Friday at Tiger Gym.

Volp's 3-pointer with 4:43 left in the fourth quarter — the Lady Tigers' fourth made field goal since the first period — ignited a 10-1 run as Murray (9-1) defeated the Lady Comets 48-42.

Ahead 17-9 after eight minutes of action thanks to a 10-1 spurt to close the opening frame, the home team struggled to score 12 more points on three baskets over the next two quarters.

"There's going to be nights where we're going to struggle offensively, and we can't rely on scoring 55, 60 points a game every night," said Lady Tiger head coach Rechelle Cadwell-Turner.

Carlisle (5-7), powered by Brandi Goode's 23 points, tied the game at 29-29 going into the fourth, and her free throws with 4:53 to play put the Lady Comets on top 37-34.

But Volp calmly took a pass from Ashley Patterson, turned and fired from the left wing just 10 seconds later to even the contest.

Taking a cue from her sophomore classmate, Lisa Thurman then buried a jumper from the right corner — on the 3-point line — and then a trey from the opposite side to push Murray on top 42-38 at the 3:06 mark.

Sherrie Sexton's foul shots with 1:44 left padded the lead to six, and after Goode's basket at 1:20, Carlisle got no closer than 44-40.

Sexton paced the Lady Tigers with 13 points while Volp poured in 12 and Thurman 10. Scoring 11 points off 16 Lady Comet turnovers, MHS put 19 points on the board in the final stanza.

Murray will look to extend its eight-game winning streak when it faces Hickman County Monday at 7:30 p.m. in Clinton.

Carlisle Co. 73, Tigers 54

The visiting Comets (9-2) placed four players in double figures as Carlisle's combination of quickness, savvy and size frustrated Murray High (5-7) Friday at Tiger Gym.

Carlisle used a full-court press to force 17 MHS turnovers — leading to 22 points — and hold the hosts to six first-quarter points while grabbing 20 offensive rebounds and making 27 field goals in a 19-point victory.

J.J. Winnans hit three 3-pointers for a game-high 19 points and Dylan Volp pitched in with 17 for the Tigers, but Mark Daniel managed just four points before picking up his third foul with 4:35 left in the second period.

"We really, really need Mark in there for the majority of the game, and I feel like anytime he

goes out, we generally hit a lull," said Murray head coach Dan Hudson of the 6-5 center, who eventually fouled out 38 seconds into the fourth quarter.

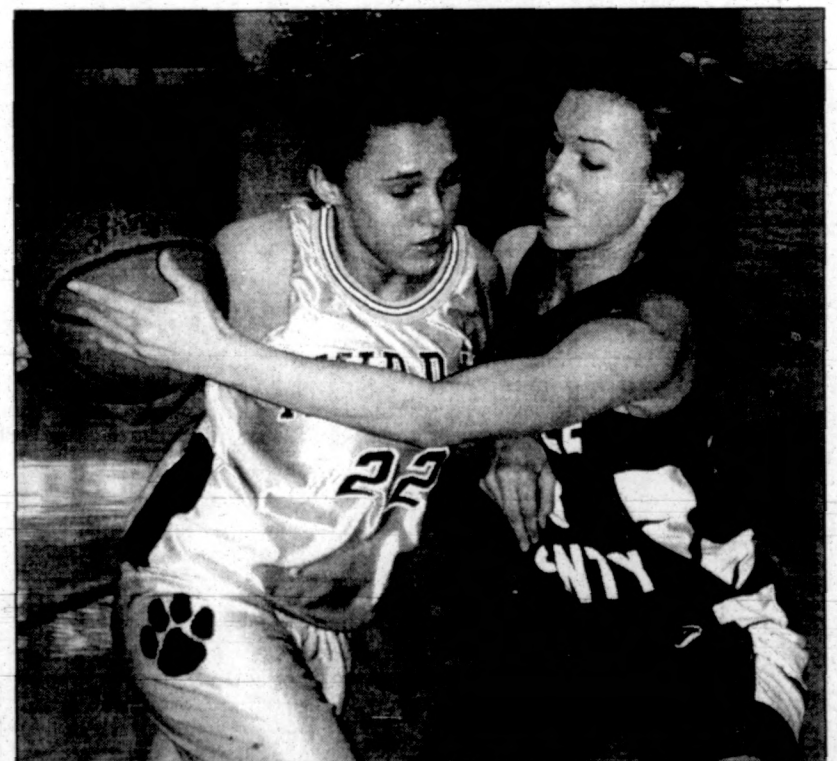

Weather conditions slow area anglers

We are dealing with some large sections of western Kentucky that are saturated to the max!

The continuous slow rainfall has covered this area for several days.

The Clarks River has flooded twice, adding more to the already flooded Ohio River bottoms between us and the Mississippi River at Wickliffe.

The strong currents in our main lake areas of Kentucky and Barkley lakes have kept the crappie fishing to a new December low. Crappie are not built for dealing with strong currents continuously. When this situation develops, they back off into the deeper bays where they can wait the problem out.

This means that most of the

time when there is a heavy current, the crappie bite is mostly little or none. Of course, many of you that have dealt with crappie for a number of years have caught some on days when you didn't really expect to get a bite. This is the reason we always see guys out when nearly everyone else didn't go.

Our local water elevations are still changing daily. We don't expect much in the way of good news very soon. We are very near the winter pool stage of 354 feet above and only 15 feet high below the dam at 316.

We may have a little break before the next rise, but it won't be much. Tennessee has been catching more rainfall than we have. You know a lot of that comes north right through here!

A lot is usually five or six degrees warmer, and it usually helps to turn our resident species on. That will start a good series of feeding on fresh shad.

We need a little current daily to promote good sauger activity and blue channel catfish move-

ment. Both feed on the currents, which cause movements of shad along the upper levels of the main river banks and creeks.

I am happy that we haven't had a big freeze and lost the resident threadfin in the larger bays. As long as the populations remain high in the bays, all species will continue to hang out there when it's feeding time.

I expect the sauger to be gathering steadily as their spawning run begins in about a month — if conditions are suitable.

This last rise and fall washed a lot of banks free of the debris we had planned on using to build more fish attractors, so we will have to scratch around and find some.

I plan on showing some of the different types of attractors that one can use for most species of our gamefish during my seminars at the Spring Boat Show (Jan. 17-19). We will be at the Regional Special Events Center to help with designs, materials and placement for fish attractors. Also, I will speak about some of the new tackle —

whether or not you should invest in them.

I had the pleasure of going on a quail hunting trip last Sunday afternoon with some good friends of mine from Fulton. Barry Turner and his son, Caleb, have invited me over before, but bad weather had caused some delays and some real rainchecks.

We began with Barry's amazing hunting dogs being Gordon Setters and the male only having three legs! Yes, I said three legs — two front legs and one back one were all that dog had, but you couldn't tell it by the way it ran and hunted.

Last spring, the male was missing when Barry left for work. He didn't have time to look for a young, rambunctious pup! It was at home the next day, but its right hind leg was cut above the ankle. It appeared to be cut — much like a wire snare would do.

The local veterinarian didn't offer much hope for saving the foot. It was treated, bandaged and medicated with the best of care. But the dog eventually lost it.

Barry told the doctor to remove the leg, thinking that he meant the lower leg. But after a few days, he picked up his dog minus an entire right leg. It was removed at the hip. At first, no one knew if the dog would be able to move around.

The Gordon Setter is a tough breed, but no one knew just how tough and how much this dog really wanted to hunt!

I watched in amazement as it forged through thick weed beds, knee-high fescue and brush piles in the heavily-wooded lots. Finally, this wonderful animal showed a sign of becoming tired when it climbed out of a high-banked creek. This was nearly four hours later!

I take my hat off to this true hunter and to the image it placed in my mind forever.

We did have some great points also as the male, female Gordon Setter combination worked perfectly. If the hunters could shoot as well as the dogs could hunt, then we would have bagged our limits. I don't remember the last time I hunted quail. I just know

I missed some shots that I should have made.

We were crossing a bean field that was right next to a fescue field when we were almost stampeded by a huge herd of deer. Some four wheelers were coming cross country about 500 yards in front of us, but they were out of our sight. The does they were pushing didn't see us until they were right upon us!

Pandemonium is a good word to use for what went on when we all came together. It was a sight to behold — deer running in all directions around the dogs, guys looking but not believing what they were seeing and those two Gordon Setters continuing to hunt for quail after a brief glimpse at the deer that nearly ran over them!

It was a National Geographic moment. It was a real treat that I will never forget.

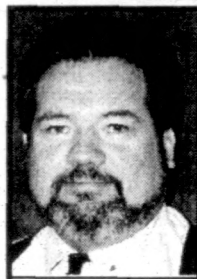

In The Field

The Paint Rock River Valley is a narrow but beautiful stretch of fairly flat land notched between the high mountain ridges of the lower Appalachian range southwest of Chattanooga.

The namesake — Paint Rock River — begins in the plateau land of south-central Tennessee, near Winchester. The Hurricane fork of the river forms just north of Highway 16 — near Windtrace Gap — and flows south through the Walls of Jericho, a massive formation of rock cliffs on the Tennessee/Alabama line, on its way to merge with the Estill Fork River to form the Paint Rock River.

The Estill Fork springs from the foothills just inside Tennessee near Carolina Cove, flowing southward past Round Mountain into the Heart of Dixie, joining the Hurricane near the small town which bears its name.

Along the way, the forks of the river flow past interesting and mysterious places like Roberts Folly Cave, Unexplored Cave, Keep Out Cave, Doctor Knob, The Punch Bowl, The Sinks and Polecat Hollow.

From the junction at Estillfork, the Paint Rock River continues southward until it spills into the Tennessee River just above Guntersville Dam. The valley is lush green — even in the dead of winter — with rough, grey mountains rising abruptly from its edges. The valley is nothing more than a deep furrow in an otherwise high and rocky land.

It is here where the forks of the Paint Rock River come together at Estillfork that the Chairman and I have observed New Year's Eve for the past eight years

at the Paint Rock Valley Lodge. We are drawn there for some reason — probably many.

Estillfork is not even a crossroads community. There is but one way in and one way out.

There was a store and a post office until both closed last year following the death of the 90-plus-year-old proprietor. All that remains is the Freedom Bridge, a one-lane affair, a fire/rescue station, Freedom Baptist Church and the Lodge.

I killed a nice buck, an 8-pointer, on our second trip there on the morning of New Year's Eve.

We celebrated by trekking 30 some-odd miles into Scottsboro to visit the famous home of Unclaimed Baggage — a favorite of the Chairman. In spite of the early success, I have not taken another Alabama deer.

I suspect that the owner of the lodge found it embarrassing to explain to visiting hunters why his most faithful client

had taken only one deer in eight years of hunting and asked me to help guide other hunters in lieu of hunting myself.

I'm not a regular guide, mind you — just a backup in case he books more hunters than the real guides can handle. Come to think of it, I'm not really a guide at all. I just drive the paying customers up the mountain and say, "follow that trail to the deer-stand."

It's easy work, and I get to sleep more than when I hunted everyday. When the Holiday crowd cleared out this year, I did manage to slip away to the woods for a little while, seeing nothing but does and turkeys.

The turkeys flew off their mountain roosts every morning and formed a loose confederation of flocks that contained over 200 birds in a single field!

I did not shoot a doe — I wanted only a buck, a fact that irritated the other hunters who would have been happy to take any number of does had they seen

them.

The highlight of the trip for me was some fast and furious shotgunning for wood ducks on the wooded sloughs near the river.

I deferred to the ducks on two afternoons, and I would have been highly successful but for the fact that I could not hit the speedy waterfowl as they twisted and turned through the timber.

The highlight of the trip for the Chairman was another junket to Unclaimed Baggage for a new purse.

On New Year's Eve, I sat near the spot where I had connected on our second trip and wished for another 8-pointer (or better) to follow a doe into the woods like that morning long ago.

When no buck appeared, I made my way back to the lodge, stopping to pay homage at the site of my last success and to sit again on a grey five-gallon bucket that means absolutely nothing to anyone but me.

Holidays are merry times for those hunting muskrat

PEA PATCH ISLAND, Del. (AP) — Shin-deep in the icy muck, Tim Evans reaches a gloved hand into a watery hole and fishes out his treasure: a sodden mass of dark hair and claws, with four tiny, yellow incisors, a long rubbery tail, and beady gray eyes, cloudy in death.

It is muskrat season in Delaware, which means good business for trappers and good eating for those who have no objection to dining on rodent.

Trapping season in Delaware starts in December and runs through mid-March, a period when the animals' fur is at its thickest.

"Muskrat is the No. 1 fur-bearer in the state as far as trapping," said Tom Whittedale, a state wildlife biologist.

In the past, muskrat trapping was a valuable activity for

Delaware farmers, who used it to supplement their income in the winter and put more meat on the table. Nowadays, it is mostly a hobby for outdoor lovers everywhere from Maryland and Maine to Montana.

Delaware's muskrat harvest totaled about 20,000 last year, down from a recent high of about 49,000 in 1996.

The pelts usually are sold to fur buyers for shipment mostly to Russia and are used to make coats, fur trimmings and garment linings.

Delaware trappers get around \$3 to \$5 for a muskrat pelt, and there is no harvest limit. A total of 185 resident trapper licenses were sold in Delaware last year, roughly half the number from the late 1980s.

Delaware's harvest is a mere fraction of the totals in Penn-

sylvania and Maryland, where the Eastern Shore community of Golden Hill is home to the annual World Muskrat Skinning Championships. In 2001, Pennsylvania trappers took about 121,000 muskrats, down from 827,000 in 1981, during a fur boom.

"There seems to be less and less interest in trapping because of the fur market itself," said Wade Henry of the Maryland Department of Natural Resources. "The hides aren't worth much these days."

Evans has a contract with the state to trap muskrats in the Delaware River marshes of Pea Patch Island, in the shadow of the Civil War-era Fort Delaware.

While muskrats are trapped primarily for their fur, rodent eaters start salivating this time of year at the prospect of muskrat meat.

Young eagles summer in Alaska's oil-rich north

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Young golden eagles migrating for the first time don't return to their birthplace in Denali National Park and Preserve in central Alaska, but summer instead in oil-rich areas in the Arctic.

The surprise finding was part of a four-year study to track for the first time the migration routes of Alaska's golden eagles. The finding again raises concerns about oil development on Alaska's North Slope and in the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska, and about the increased pressure to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to drilling.

"We are really afraid we will lose what's special about the western Arctic before we even understand what is there," said Sara Chapell, spokeswoman for the Sierra Club in Alaska.

After wintering in the south, the young eagles headed north, bypassing the 6 million-acre national

park and flying another 450 to 600 miles to summer on the Arctic coastal plain. A few ended up near the Alaska Range in the Interior or on the Kenai Peninsula south of Anchorage, but most flew north.

"They were all across the North Slope," said Carol McIntyre, a wildlife biologist at Denali who has been studying eagles since 1987. The park is home to at least 100 breeding pairs of golden eagles.

Golden eagles weigh 8 to 12 pounds and have gold and buff-colored feathers on the crown and nape of the neck. They are found in the northern part of the Northern Hemisphere and have been protected in the U.S. since 1963.

The \$250,000 study was funded by the National Park Service and the U.S. Geological Survey.

McIntyre said in 1997 and 1999 tiny Teflon backpacks containing small satellite transmitters costing \$2,500 each were attached to the

backs of 45 golden eagles just prior to their first migration.

Weights and measurements were taken on the young birds before they left their nests in late July to mid-August. The eagles didn't depart Denali until late September and early October, a time when the parents continue to feed and protect them and the young practice their flying and hunting skills.

McIntyre and Michael Collopy, a former USGS scientist, tracked the birds as they flew south from central Alaska, wintering anywhere from southern Canada to northern Mexico.

Scientists don't know why some birds stop in Canada and others fly all the way to Mexico. Some could be looking for food. Weather could be a factor. Maybe they simply "feel the need to keep going," said Collopy, now department chairman of Environmental and Resource Sciences at the University of Nevada in Reno.







DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am in a health class that is learning about weight loss — in particular, the safest way to lose weight. Our teacher said to consume 500 calories a day rather than following the Hollywood diet or Slim-Fast. She claims that once these diets are stopped, the weight will return. We think the best way is to follow what our teacher said and not starve ourselves. What is your opinion?

DEAR READER: I totally disagree with your teacher. What you describe as her solution is, in reality, a starvation diet that will be virtually impossible to follow for any length of time. Here's why I object.

The normal American diet contains about 2,500 calories from various sources, including protein, fat and carbohydrate. Unfortunately, many adults (and, recently, children) consume more calories because they eat junk food and sugary products, don't exercise and make no effort to be prudent. Most professionals agree that limitation of dietary calories is the most efficient and healthful way to shed pounds.

However, your teacher's policy — 500 calories a day — means that people would have to make drastically unacceptable and unhealthy reductions in caloric consumption. If you

don't believe me, try a 500-calorie meal: meat, potato and vegetables; forget breakfast and lunch. Could you accept such limitations? I doubt it. Maybe for the short haul, but not as a consistent program, which is precisely the problem. The Atkin's diet, the grapefruit diet, the Hollywood diet and diets ad nauseum are great for rapid and significant weight loss — but they are impossible to follow chronically. And this is precisely where we must focus our attention. Flip-flop, up-and-down dieting may be medically harmful; it's also discouraging. A more appropriate diet is one that 1) enables patients to lose at least a pound a week, 2) is inexpensive, 3) is healthful and safe, 4) will permit patients to take better (and more realistic) control of their lives. Believe me, folks, being in control — reasonable control — is a vital factor in any weight-reduction diet.

All this leads me to disagree with your teacher. I will send you my Health Report "Weight Loss" which contains my simple, cheap and effective diet: no sugar, no flour.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is the current recommendation regarding the precautions and/or toxicity associated with eating garden fruits and vegetables grown in soil previously contaminated by lead paint? Are strawberries safe to eat under these circumstances?

DEAR READER: Lead from lead paint will leach into the soil. However, studies have shown that it is not incorporated to any harmful extent into plants grown in that soil. Thus, you may safely consume strawberries grown in this environment.

My comments do not include soil that has been massively contaminated by toxic materials or hazardous substances, such as occurs in landfills or toxic dumps. In those situations, toxicology testing should be performed on groundwater samples, as well as on edible vegetation.

DEAR ABBY

DEAR ABBY: My daughter, "Jenny," is engaged to marry a nice young physician. It's going to be an elaborate "black tie" affair in a castle in Europe. The young man's family is enormously wealthy, and his siblings are all doctors or lawyers. Some of the wealthiest people in the world will attend the wedding.

On the other hand, our combined income is less than \$30,000 a year. We pay our bills on time, but we have nothing extra at the end of the month. The good news is that the groom-to-be's family has contributed a lot of money toward the wedding. The bad news is that they're asking me why we haven't contributed any. Our daughter mentioned that some of her friends' parents have taken out a second mortgage on their homes so they can give their daughters their dream weddings. (We live in an apartment.) Jenny hasn't lived at home for 12 years and makes more money than I ever will.

Abby, what is expected of me and my family? How can we explain to Jenny that we are happy for her and love her, but cannot and will not use our small retirement savings to pay for her elaborate extravaganza? As it is, we will all have to travel to her castle, and pay for hotel rooms, tuxes, plus give them a lovely gift. We need your expert advice — and fast!

NOT EVEN CLOSE IN UPSTATE NEW YORK

DEAR NOT EVEN CLOSE: Do not allow yourself to be stampeded. I've said it before and I'll say it again: Under no circumstances should you mortgage your future to pay for a wedding. A wedding is a gift, not an obligation. Your daughter has chosen something that's beyond your means.

If the groom's family is unaware of this fact of life, please waste no time in explaining it to them. There should be no shame in doing so. It's reality.

DEAR ABBY: I am miserable. I am married and the mother of two children. I don't know how to get out of my marriage. My husband is so volatile he hollers, throws things, and is loud and verbally abusive to me. He also acts this way with the children.

I do not love him. I married too young and for all the wrong reasons. When we argue, he goes running to my family and tells them a sob story, and they blame me. When I try to talk to them, they refuse to listen and push me to stay with him.

I don't want to have to walk out on all of my possessions, but I will if I have to. I am willing to do almost anything to get out of this marriage.

The last time we went through this, he wouldn't leave. Now he is saying he will and promises he will not contact my family. However, I'm afraid to trust. Please help me.

CONFUSED AND UNSURE IN NORTH CAROLINA

DEAR CONFUSED: Since you have already decided that the marriage was a mistake and not worth trying to save, consult a lawyer who specializes in family law. He or she will counsel you about what each of you is entitled to and how to ensure that your husband leaves.

Establish how you will support yourself and the children when the time comes. Do not depend upon your family for emotional support and you will not be disappointed. It is said that "breaking up is hard to do," but your lawyer can help you through the process. No one comes through a divorce entirely unscathed — but it's better than remaining in a loveless marriage with a volatile, verbally abusive spouse.

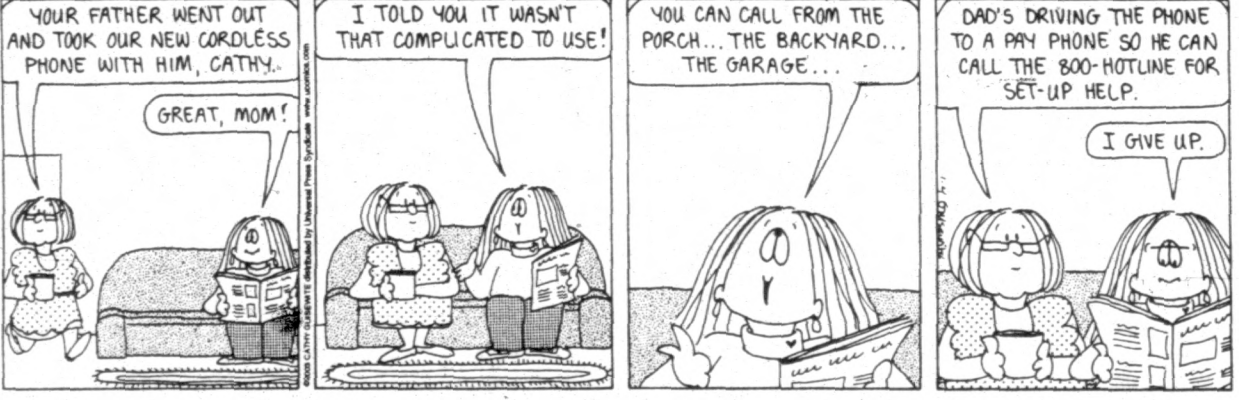

Cutting the Gordian Knot

West dealer. North-South vulnerable. NORTH: A Q 10 6 3, K 8 4 3, 6, J 7 5. WEST: 9 8 5 2, A 6, A 9 8 3 2, K Q. SOUTH: J, Q J 9 5 2, J 10, A 10 8 4.

The bidding: West North East South 1♦ Dble 4♦ 4♥. Opening lead — king of clubs. In bridge, as in war, interfering with enemy communications can sometimes produce a victory that could not otherwise be attained. In today's deal, which occurred in a national championship, declarer made good use of a communications-breaking play to salvage his contract.

South was Richard Freeman, "Quiz Kids" star of radio two generations ago. West led the king of clubs, and Freeman won with the ace. It was apparent that the only real threat to the contract was the possibility of a club ruff, but instead of leading a trump at trick two to try to eliminate this threat, Freeman led the jack of diamonds!

As a result of this play, the contract could no longer be defeated. The only tricks declarer eventually lost were a heart, a diamond and a club.

Now let's suppose that South had led a trump at trick two, as most declarers in Freeman's shoes probably would have done. In that case, the contract would have gone down one against proper defense.

West would have taken the ace of trumps, cashed the queen of clubs, led a low diamond to East and ruffed the club return to score the fourth trick for the defense. Furthermore, this series of plays by East-West would not have been hard to find.

West would naturally assume that East, for his four-diamond bid, was likely to have the king of that suit, and East would assume that West's underlead of the ace of diamonds after cashing the queen of clubs at trick three was a clear-cut request for a club return.

The jack of diamonds lead at trick two cut a vital link in East-West's line of communications, and in one fell swoop short-circuited the defense.

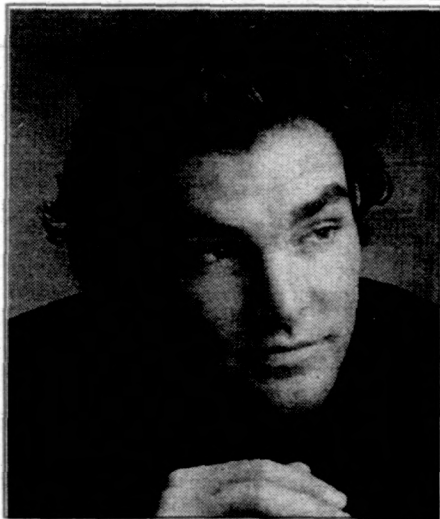

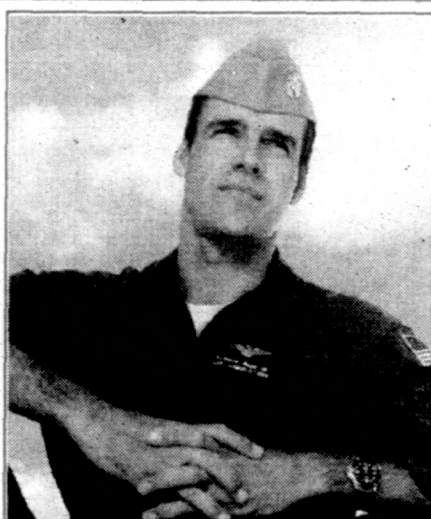

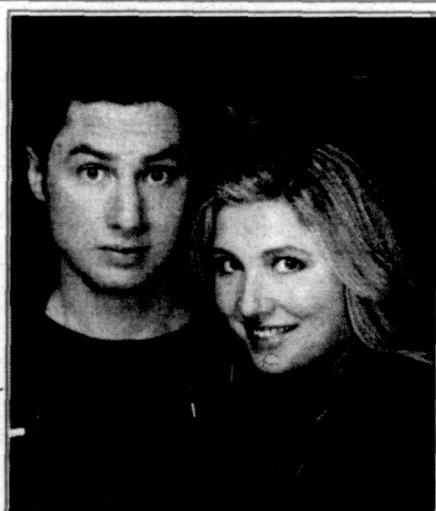

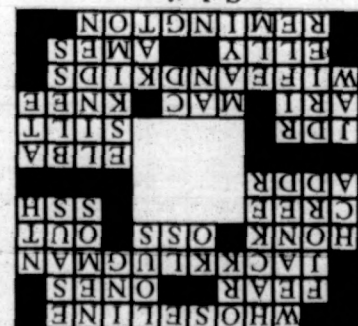
