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MARSHALL COUNTY WOODS NEED FIRE PROTECTION

More than \$1600 dollars worth of wood burners, to say nothing of other losses, in Marshall County woods each year. It will cost the woodland owners of the county \$1400 to get protection. The magistrates will be given a chance to vote for county wide fire protection, the next regular session of the county court which meets December 12th. If you want state

protection from forest fires, see your magistrate before December 12th, and instruct him to vote for county-wide protection.

The timber owner is being asked to pay only 2 cents of the 8 cents necessary to protect each acre of woodland. You pay only 6 cents on the woodland acreage. If you have ten acres of woods on a one hundred acre farm, you pay only 20 cents per year for protection from forest fires. It may save your farm buildings also. See your magistrate before December 12th and instruct him to vote for protection for a 5-year period, after which the magistrates will decide whether protection will continue.

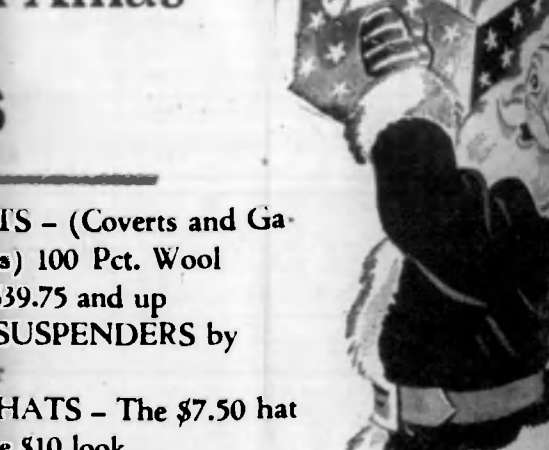

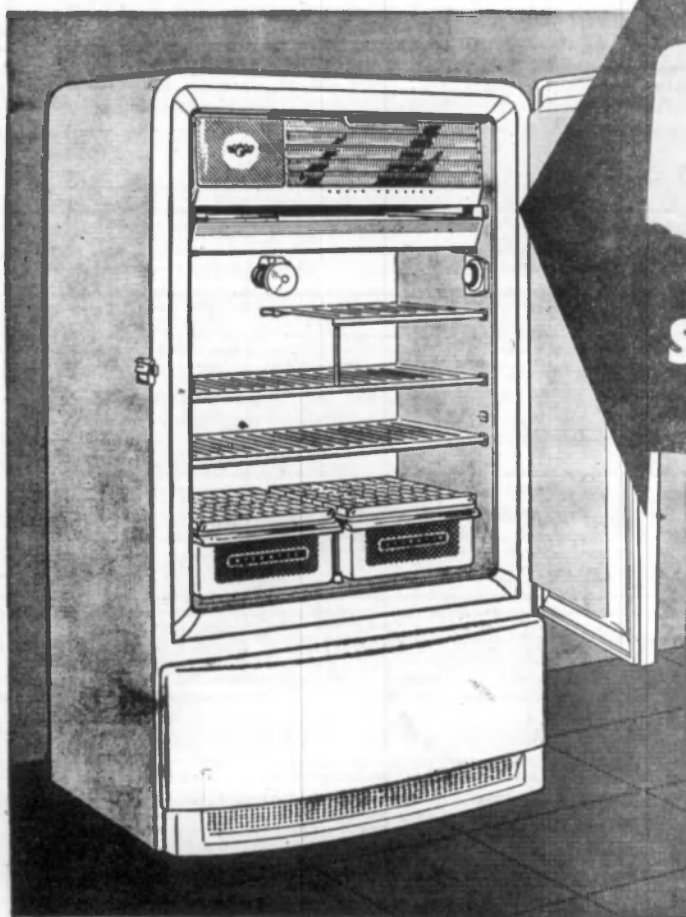

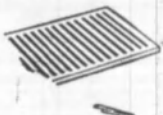
