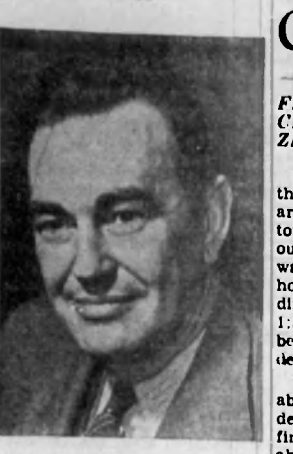

The ceremony followed official notice that retiring Gov. Earl Clements had taken his seat in Washington as Kentucky's junior U. S. Senator.

G. Riddings on East 12th street around 1:30 A. M. Sunday. The fire was believed to have been caused by defective wiring in the kitchen.

The blaze had gained considerable headway but was soon under control after arrival of the fire fighters. However, considerable damage was done by the fire smoke, and water.

Just after dawn the same morning, the fire department was called out again to the home of H. E. Morgan in the same neighborhood. This fire was believed to have started from overheated pipes. The ceiling in the room where the fire started was damaged by the blaze, smoke and water.

**INCREASE IS SHOWN IN XMAS FUNDS RELEASED OVER YEAR AGO**

**FAMILY OF BEAVERS ARE LOCATED ON FARM OF JOHN A. HENSON, ROUTE 1**

A family of beavers, believed to be as many as 10 to 15 is located on the farm of John A. Henson, on Benton Route 1, a mile or so North of Glade.

Mr. Henson discovered a dam across a creek the beavers had built several months ago. He removed the dam, but the almost extinct animal began to build another dam across the creek.

This week Mr. Henson brought to the Courier office a stump of a sapling the beavers had gnawed down in their work of building a place for their home.

Mr. Henson said some of the saplings cut down by the beavers were as large as a man's arm at its largest part.

The print of the teeth of the animals showed a painstaking and neat job of cutting down the saplings.

This is the first report of beavers in this county in many years. They are protected by law that prohibit hunting of or killing them.

**How You Do It**  
Stripes of jelly jar labels make

fashion elegant curtains. For  
linoleum, color-pencil a pattern on  
geometric embossed gift paper.

Gift wrappings in small floral  
patterns, are folded accordion-wise  
to resemble drapes, and these are  
hung in place with Scotch tape.  
Jelly jar labels, singly, serve as  
picture frames, with flowers cut  
into position.

from old Christmas cards for the  
pictures themselves.

If your budget doesn't stretch  
to miniature furniture, you can  
cut out pictured furniture, in  
scale, from an old home furnish-  
ings magazine.

**Mechanics of Assembling**  
Setting up the skeleton of the  
doll house is easy. Especially suit-  
able in a Tide carton which pack-  
ages the all-purpose detergent, be-  
cause the box is large enough to  
partition into four rooms, and yet  
shallow enough for practical play.  
Cut away one of the big sides of  
the carton with a razor blade or  
very sharp paring knife.

The flooring and walls are made  
from the cut off front. Several  
small metal angle supports out of  
Dad's tool box, can be brass-  
stapled to box walls to effect firm  
support for flooring. Paste walls  
into position.

### WHO'S Crippled?

SUCCESS STORY OF THE MONTH



Edward Monroe

In spite of being crippled since he was 7 years old, Edward Monroe of Akron, O., is nearing the realization of his life-long ambition—to become a high school science teacher. He will graduate next June from Akron University with degrees in both elementary and secondary education, and will then become eligible to pursue a career in teaching.

Because of his courage and determination in not allowing his handicap to stand in his way, the 23-year-old prospective teacher has received the "Who's Crippled?" citation from the Ohio Society for Crippled Children. This award was presented to him at a special dinner ceremony marking the first annual meeting of the year-old Summit County Society for Crippled Children at the Akron Women's City Club.

The "Who's Crippled?" citation is conferred every month by the National Society for Crippled Children, the Easter Seal Agency, through its state affiliates, to persons like Monroe who have overcome severe physical handicaps to live happy, useful lives.

Monroe was suddenly stricken with polio in 1934 and lost the use of his legs. As the result of a long program of surgery and therapy, he now walks to his classes on crutches which he hopes soon to discard.

Ever since he can remember, Monroe has wanted to become a teacher. After graduating from Akron West High School with high scholastic honors, he enrolled at Kent State University where he began to study for his teaching career. He was within two semesters of finishing his courses when his money ran out. The Ohio State Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation had paid for his tuition up until that time, but could not finance the extra semesters he needed.

Then, the Summit County Society for Crippled Children, an affiliate of the Ohio Society, came to the rescue. The Society's board approved a loan of \$349, enough to see Monroe through his final two semesters. He received one of the Society's first character loans from a \$1,000 fund set up for loans to "disabled and handicapped persons for the purpose of rehabilitation."

According to Walter B. Underwood, executive director of the Ohio Society, "The case history of Edward Monroe is a good example of how a severely handicapped individual can be assisted in his fight to lead a useful, happy life through the combined efforts of health and welfare agencies. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the Ohio State Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation, and the Summit County Society for Crippled Children have all done their share to see that Monroe gets his teaching opportunity."
