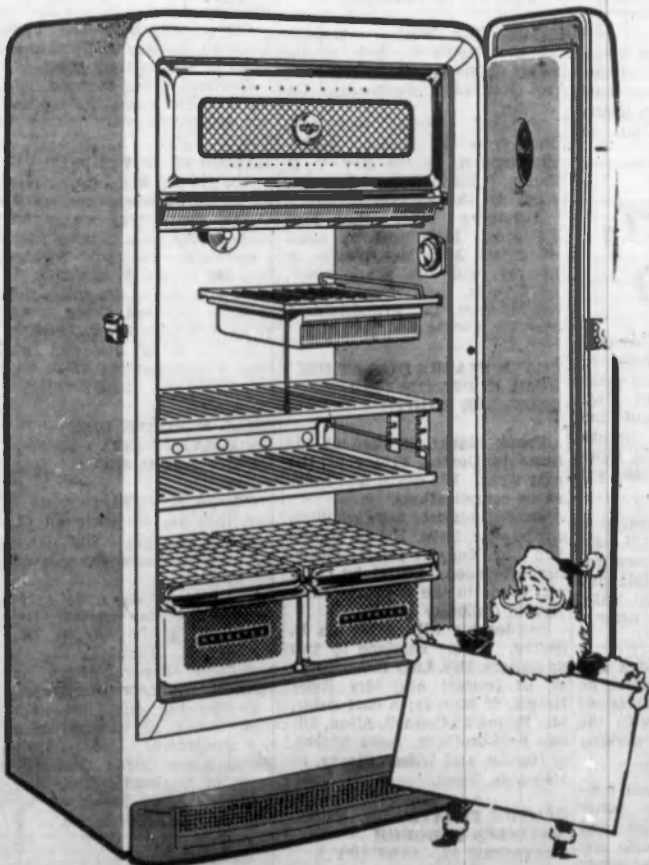

## Home Agent Gives Good Advice For Enjoying The Christmas Holidays

CAN YOU READ? — DO YOU? Well do you? In this day and time directions are printed on most packages we buy. Read what it says. Then follow instructions.

Articles in magazines and news papers suggest we do certain things each month. Why not try some of these things for a change.

For Example, be sure your Christmas tree is fire proofed. At least, put the tree in a flower pot or bucket of sand and keep it watered. It may take a lard can for a large tree. Be sure to turn off Christmas tree lights when you are to be gone from home or from room several hours.

A Christmas Wreath at your front door gives a warm welcome to those who enter as well as a HELLO to those who pass by.

Home grown cedar can be used to make a wreath. The 4-H Club members have been wiring the cedar on a coat hanger, then decorating with colored Christmas bulbs or painted seed pods. Sweet gum balls and sycamore balls painted with aluminum paint are fine for Christmas decorations.

For that exchange gift at the Christmas meeting, why not

wrap up a silver tipped light bulb or a yellow bulb or a plastic hade for a hanging light. Silver tipped bulbs can be used over work benches, ironing boards or in the kitchen.

In planning menus for Xmas use plenty of fruit. Low shelves and cupboards, easy for children to reach make a special storage place for toys Santa Claus will bring.

Aside from the convenience and pleasure to the child of having his own place to keep his own playthings. Such cupboards help keep the house orderly and may prevent accidents, roller skates parked on door steps, blocks on the living room floor, and other toys underfoot have caused many a fall.

Did you get a cook book with that new electric range? Does it have a special storage place in your kitchen? Then get it and select an oven meal and try it. You owe it to the family and to yourself to try one new recipe each week. Add variety to your meals.

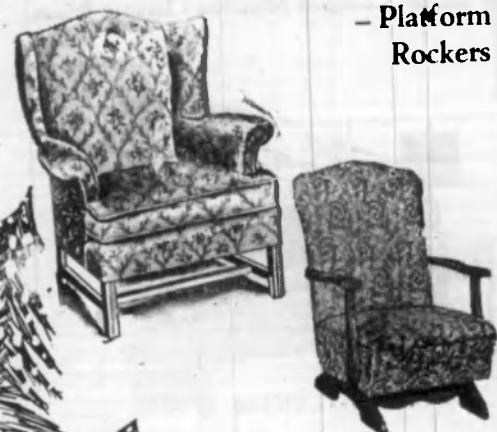

The one who makes the most progress in establishing a complete soil and water conservation program on his farm from January 1 to December 31, 1950 will be the winner. Prizes range from \$250 down. The contest closes last day of this month.

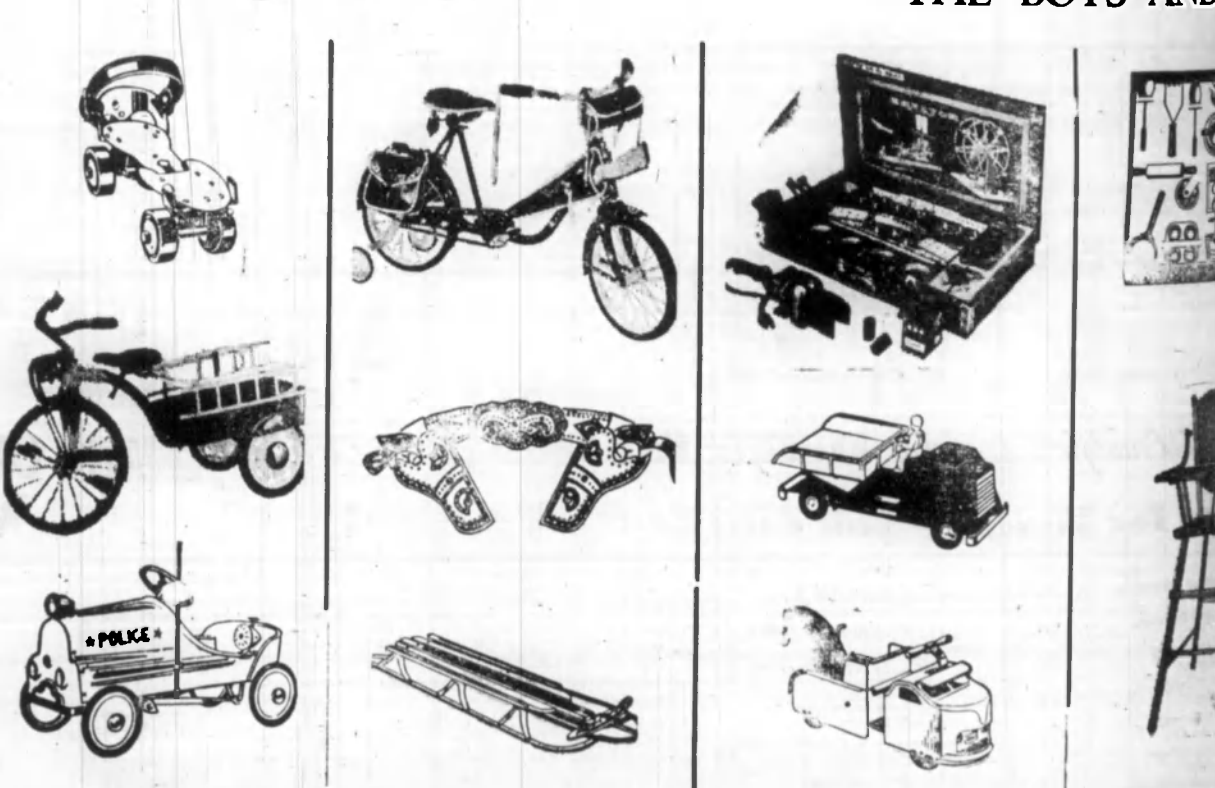

TOP ranking records in the 1950 National 4-H Canning, Achievement, Food Preparation and Girls' Record awards programs have brought state honors to three Kentucky club members. Each received an all-expense trip to the 1950 National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Brief outlines of their records follow:



Mary Ann Hullege, 16, of Valley Station, high honors in the 4-H Canning Achievement program. A 4-H'er for seven years, she has completed 26 projects, and canning has been her favorite. Because she learned how to select and preserve fruits, vegetables, poultry and meat produced on the farm, Mary Ann has been able to reduce the family food bill considerably. Use of home-canned foods also provided well balanced meals the year round. She has canned 1,438 jars of food alone and assisted with most of the family canning for the last seven years. With this knowledge and experience she has become an authority on canning and helps relatives and friends with their canning problems. A versatile girl, Mary is outstanding in agricultural projects as well. She has entered in many fairs and exhibits and won numerous blue ribbons. She helped organize her club and served as junior leader, secretary and treasurer. For her fine record, Kerr Glass provided Mary's trip to Chicago.

Mary Lee Porter, 17, Liberty, when she was named state winner in the Food Preparation program. A 4-H'er for seven years, Mary Lee has completed 15 projects, specializing in funds, canning, clothing and housekeeping. She became expert in meal planning, and has cooked and served more than 825 meals besides doing all of the baking. All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA co-operation.

Betty Folson, 16, of Wickliffe, was selected as the 4-H'er with the most outstanding Girls' Record in Kentucky. She had just completed her 15th year in club work and 32 projects when she received this trip award, donated by Montgomery Ward. Canning is a special favorite with Betty, along with clothing, food preparation and frozen foods. She has sewn 303 garments, canned 308 jars of chicken, 81 quarts of meat and 413 quarts of other food. Betty devoted more than 5,000 hours to housekeeping projects. She gave 161 individual and team demonstrations to audiences totaling 2,000. The young lady has won high honors on her many local, county and state exhibits. This year she was elected president of her local 4-H Club, county 4-H president, and secretary, and advisor of the county extension advisory committee.

85% in his studies, he has been a 4-H president and treasurer.

Dick Metzger farmed two acres of kale and cabbage and reaped a harvest that paid \$525. About \$300 of this was net profit, plus \$60 for his own labor, with a total of 200 hours spent on the project. He sold most of his crops to wholesale houses and local A & P stores. Dick averages 90 in his school grades, and was a 4-H president in 1948. He is also a member of the FFA, and a Boy Scout.

Emma Conner, 17, and a high school senior, now a pilot 125 by 140 feet planted to mixed vegetables, and another plot 175 by 40 feet with potatoes in it. The harvest yielded a gross revenue of \$571, of which \$485 was net profit after paying herself \$25.40 for labor. She marketed her vegetables along with those of her father, through his facilities. Emma has been a 4-H club president for three years; district garden champion, as well as holding other important posts, and has a long list of impressive prizes taken at local fairs for her gardening and canning.

Ernest Bonzo grew \$125 worth of vegetables on one-quarter of an acre limiting his crops to tomatoes, onions, and potatoes. He realized a net profit of \$89 on just 35 hours of work, for which he computed the additional gain of \$17.50 in wages. A member of 4-H for four years, this is his first garden project.
