Soil Conservation Notes By Herbert Anderson

Rollie Smith and Morgan Hill, Benton, are using fescue and Ladino clover following corn in rotation on class two and three land. The large root system of fescue will add organic matter to the soil. This will improve the drainage of this land and give a higher yield of corn.
The cleaning and enlarging of an old drainage ditch is a part of their complete soil and water conservation farm plan.

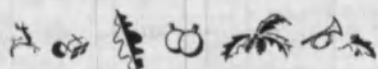

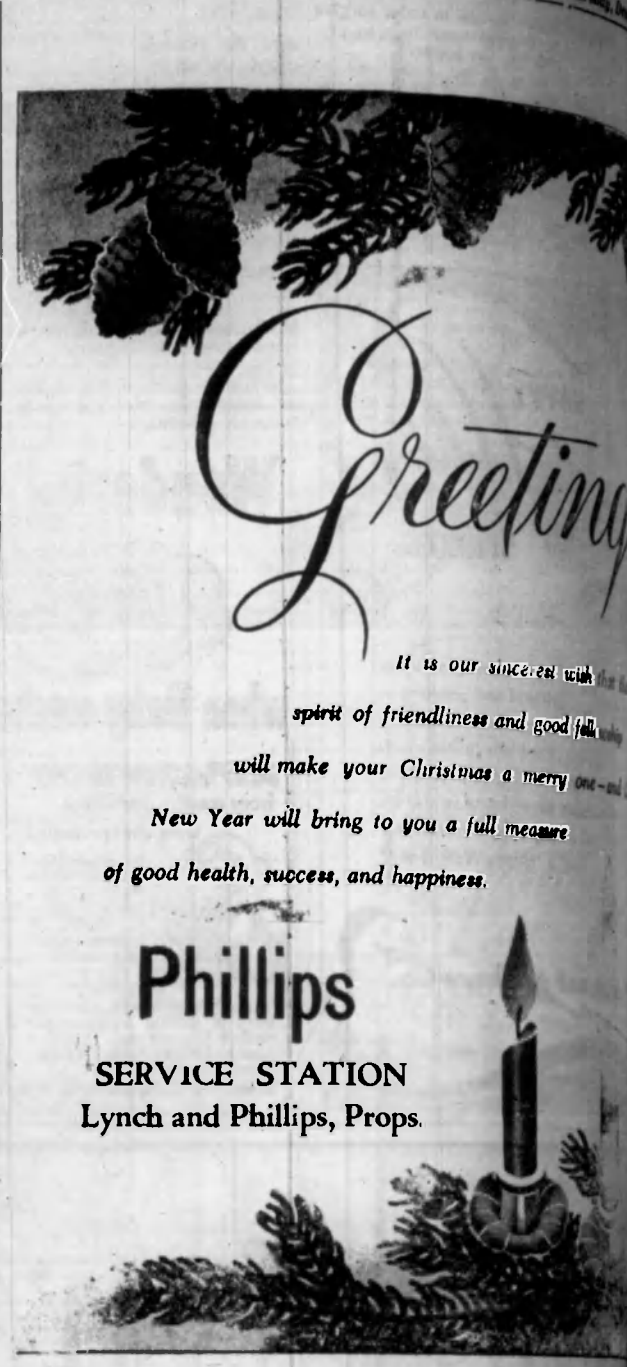

Ky. Dam Bridge Is In Use But Not Officially

The new \$1,049,000 bridge across Kentucky Dam has been declared safe for traffic and is being used daily by the general public, but TVA still has not opened it officially.

Dedication and formal opening of the bridge was set for Saturday.

Late Saturday officials said the bridge would officially open when a TVA engineer could visit and inspect the span. He apparently has not completed his work.

Steel Construction Company of Birmingham, Ala., built the bridge. A 1,620-foot shelf-like bridge is attached to the dam

and a 300-foot conventional structure spans the locks. The state department of highways laid a temporary hard surface and put up guard posts and wire on the railway across the earth fill between the dam and the locks.

Dedication of the bridge probably will not be held until next spring.

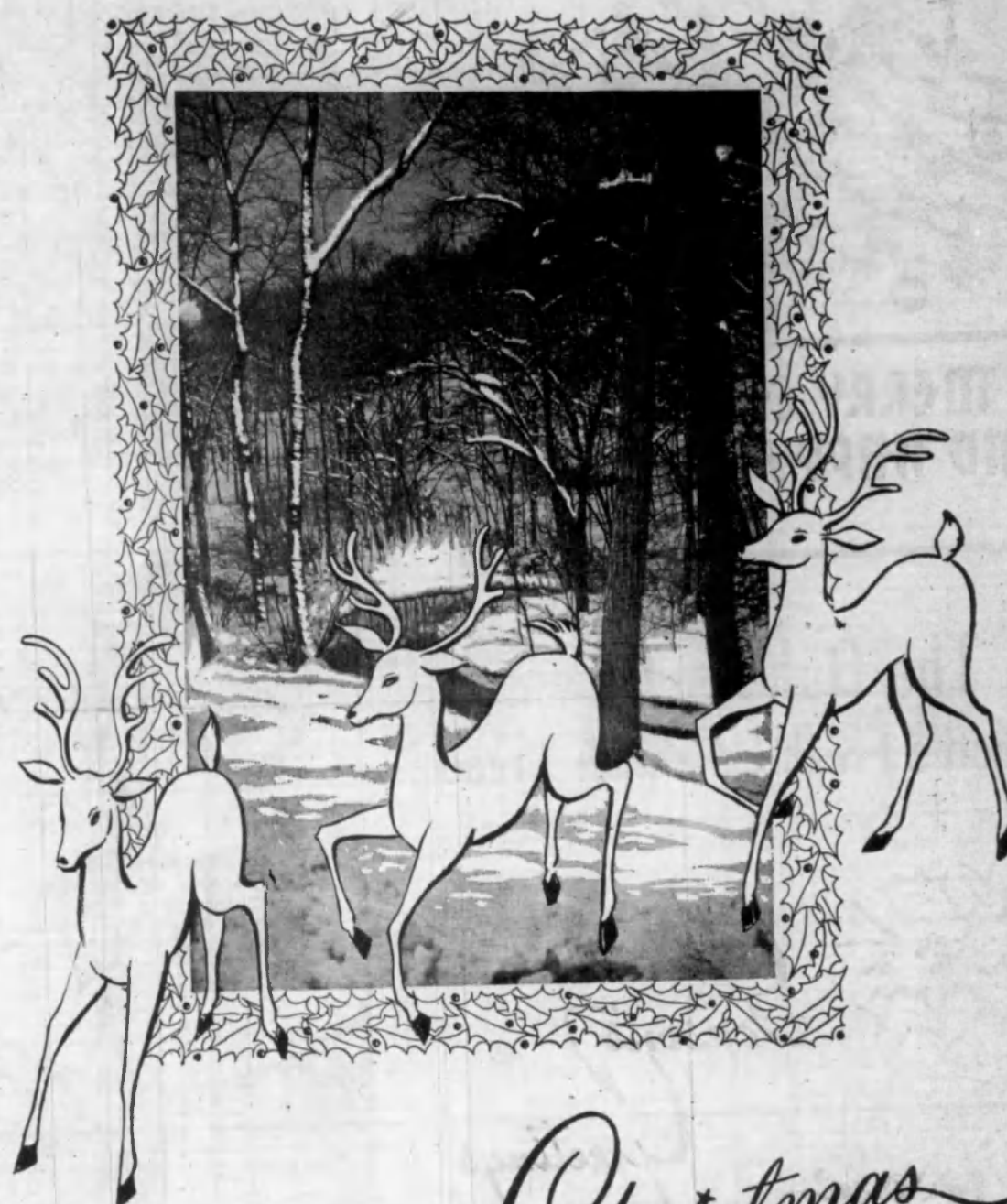

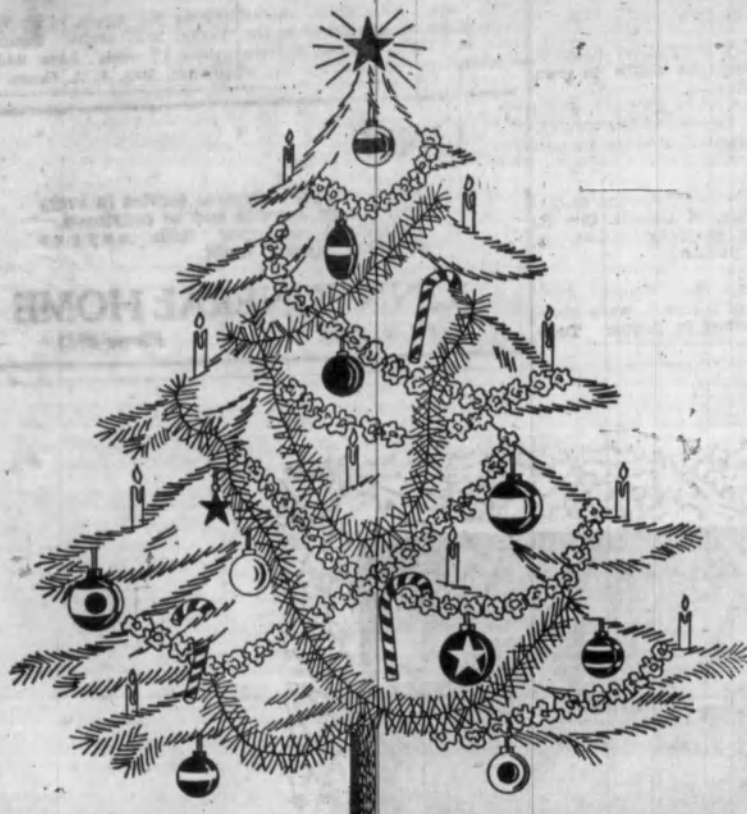
