Opinions sought on reciprocal fishing license

Area fishing enthusiasts will get an opportunity to express their opinions on a reciprocal license fishing agreement between Kentucky and Tennessee Monday evening.

At 7 p.m. in the Calloway County Public Library, representatives of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will be gathering information about a possible agreement between the two states that will allow one license for the waters between Kentucky and Tennessee.

Calloway County Judge-Executive Larry Elkins has been campaigning for this agreement throughout his term in office and feels a compromise can be made.

He was initially approached by resort owners near the lakes who were seeing declines in fishing.

"It had been detrimental to their business and its confusing for those who fish at the state line," Elkins said.

The two states had a reciprocal license fishing agreement until 1991 when disputes over fishing limits and amount of land covered disbanded the agreement.

Benjy Kinman, director of fisheries of Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, said a new agreement has been drafted that would allow fishing licenses from either state be valid in the areas from the Egner Ferry Bridge and the Scott Fitzhugh Bridge. He said this excludes any area around the Blood River embankment.

"Tennessee is in agreement on this," Kinman said. "They want to see public support on it."

He said the hearing is to show the nine-member commission board that there is support in Kentucky.

"If there is a pretty good show of people against it, we'll probably let it go," Kinman said.

He said he is hopeful the agreement will go through because it is easy for fishers to end up in the next state without even knowing it.

"There's no state line signs on the water," Kinman said.

Elkins said he can see a decrease in license sales, but the benefits could be worth it.

"It makes sense to do it," Elkins said. "The only drawback is the state would get a little less in licensing fees, but I think the big picture is tourism."

Girl Scouts offer soldiers 'a taste of home'

For several weeks now, many area residents have been partaking of a most pleasing element of the nation's food supply — Girl Scout Cookies. Now, those same residents are getting the chance to share this enjoyment with some others that have had way more important things on their minds.

Friday, Girl Scouts of America Troop 579 was back selling the treats in front of the Wal-Mart SuperCenter here, but the main idea was not to get customers to buy them for themselves. This

time, the men and women of Murray's National Guard unit, some of whom both the customers and the Girl Scouts on hand might know personally, were to be the main beneficiaries as the public was asked to pay the \$3-per-box price on their behalf.

"A couple of weeks ago, we saw that another troop had been doing this in another part of the country, so we wanted to give it a try," said Troop 579 co-leader Danielle Schwettman.

Within the next few weeks, though, the 438th Military Police Company will know its home territory has acted accordingly. Schwettman was

told that once the cookies are sent for mailing, it will take 15 days for the package to reach its ultimate destination — the United States Marine Corps Base in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, where the 438th is stationed to guard terrorists.

"We're not looking to make money off this for us," said co-leader Holly Bloodworth. "This is just a project for us where we're looking to do something nice for another group of people."

"It's also something where the girls can realize they're helping a very important cause when it

ATF getting closer to pressing charges

Murray Police Department Detective Capt. Eddie Rollins said Friday that the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms is getting closer to pressing charges relating to explosive items that were found in a Murray residence in February and earlier this month.

Rollins said an ATF representative told him Thursday that the organization is closer to filing charges, but he did not say what those charges might be.

Bureau spokesperson Laura Volk said Friday that the ATF had no additional information to release at the present time. Nancy Jones, a United States attorney for Kentucky's western district, said no federal charges had been filed regarding the situation as of Friday afternoon.

MPD officers, ATF personnel and members of the Paducah Police Department's Explosive Ordinance Disposal Unit

U.S. rejects proposal, no compromise in sight

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States immediately rejected a proposal by Chile on Friday to give Saddam Hussein a last chance to disarm peacefully, leaving no compromise in sight and casting further doubt on any U.N. backing for war.

Some diplomats said privately that diplomacy was dead and the only question left was whether President Bush and his British and Spanish counterparts would decide at their summit Sunday to drop their resolution giving Saddam a Monday ultimatum to prove Iraq is disarming or face bloodshed — or put it to a vote and face certain defeat. Nine votes — and no vetoes — are needed to pass.

Although council diplomats met one-on-one and in small groups, no meeting of the 15 members was scheduled, a sign there was nothing left to discuss. Two lengthy and tense sessions earlier in the week and a new British proposal failed to bridge the deep chasm in the council.

The United States rejected the Chilean pro-

posal within minutes of President Ricardo Lagos' announcement in Santiago, because it didn't include an ultimatum for war or a trigger for military action if Saddam fails to comply with the disarmament demands.

That issue, more than others, is dividing the council. France, Russia and China — all of which have veto-power and want weapons inspections to continue — earlier rejected a British six-step proposal for Saddam to avert war because it would give a green light for military action if he didn't complete the "to-do" list.

Chile's proposal, a copy of which was obtained by The Associated Press, would give Iraq up to 30 days to complete five disarmament tasks. The council would then judge the efforts and decide whether to continue U.N. inspections or subject Iraq to the "serious consequences" it promised in November if Saddam fails to fully cooperate.

White House spokesman Ari Fleischer noted that the administration had previously dismissed similar proposals. "If it was a non-

starter then, it's a non-starter now," he said.

Even though there was nothing viable on the table Friday that could unify the council, nobody was giving up yet, at least publicly.

"It's not over until it is over," said U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan. "I still have hope."

"We're going to continue to work," said British Ambassador Jeremy Greenstock.

"As long as there's 1 percent possibility for peace we'll continue with our efforts," China's U.N. Ambassador Wang Yingfan said after meeting France's deputy ambassador. "We cannot give up hope."

But when asked if there was still 1 percent, he replied: "Everybody knows what's happening in that part of the world, such a big mass

Poll: Americans support war but could shift political balance

WASHINGTON (AP) — While President Bush has substantial voter support for a war to disarm Saddam Hussein, Americans are so worried about problems war could bring that Bush's support — and the nation's political balance — could easily shift, a bipartisan poll finds.

Those sharply mixed feelings

suggest that war and its effect on international relations, terrorism and the economy pose considerable political risks for the president, said two political pollsters who conducted the survey for the Vietnam Veterans of America Foundation.

"The president has inspired a great deal of confidence about himself and one of the consequences is that there are very high expectations for the conduct of the war," said

Democratic pollster Jeremy Rosner.

Republican pollster Bill McInturf said the poll clearly demonstrates "how narrow the window could be for the definition of what goes well in Iraq and how many things could go wrong that could very quickly shift public opinion." If the war goes smoothly, he said, Democrats could face a significant hurdle in the 2004 elections.

Besides the White House,

Republicans currently control both the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The poll found that about half of adults, 47 percent, say they support military action to remove Saddam from power and disarm Iraq, even without the full support of the United Nations Security Council. Almost four in 10, 37 percent, said this country should do that only with full support of the Security Council

and 13 percent said the United States should not take military action even if the Security Council agreed.

The poll also suggested widespread concerns about what would make a war against Iraq successful or unsuccessful.

The public said it would consider the war a success if Iraq is disarmed

Flight attendant accused of spiking crying child's juice

DETROIT (AP) — A former Northwest Airlines flight attendant was charged with assault for allegedly putting a prescription depressant in a toddler's apple juice to stop her crying on an international flight.

Daniel Reed Cunningham, 33, also was charged Thursday with distributing a controlled substance.

The girl's mother told the FBI that Cunningham seemed upset when her 19-month-old daughter became restless and began crying on the flight.

descended on 1405 W. Main St. Feb. 21 and found, among other items, several grenades, a rocket launcher and survivalist handbooks.

Acting on a tip received by the Calloway County Sheriff's Office, authorities returned to the residence March 7 and discovered 13 grenades, two automatic weapons and more explosive devices in different areas of the house, which had been split into rental property.

Recovered items from the initial seizure at the residence were sent to Maryland for lab testing.

Smart suspect may have tried to abduct cousin

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The religious fanatic accused of kidnapping Elizabeth Smart may have tried to abduct her 18-year-old cousin seven weeks later, authorities said Friday as they began studying a 27-page manifesto in which the suspect talks of assembling a harem of wives.

According to a July 24 sheriff's report, the screen on Jessica Wright's bedroom window was cut and a chair

was found beneath it. The would-be intruder fled when the family heard noises in the night and called authorities.

A chair was similarly found under the kitchen window at the Smart's home after Elizabeth disappeared from her bedroom early on June 5. And the screen was reported cut from the outside.

"It's more than a coincidence," said Sheriff Aaron Kennard. "You have this cousin who looks like Elizabeth and is

good friends with Elizabeth."

Wright has been described as Elizabeth's favorite cousin. Kennard said his investigators had evidence linking the two incidents that would be given to prosecutors for attempted kidnapping charges that could be filed early next week.

The sheriff also said investigators may have to ask the teenager whether she was assaulted.

Police found the girl on Wednesday walking in a Salt Lake City suburb with Brian Mitchell, a shaggy-haired vagabond and self-styled prophet. With them was his wife, Wanda Barzee. Authorities said the three had been living under bridges and in tents in Utah and California, apparently panhandling to eat.

Family members and police have not disclosed details of Elizabeth's ordeal.

comes to this country," she added.

Participants in the drive, dubbed "A Taste of Home," were also able to add a personal touch. With a purchase for the troops, customers had the option of submitting a personal note that would be placed on top of the box, so the troops would know from where in the country the cookies were coming.

"That makes it more special, we think," said Bloodworth, noting the Scouts themselves have a vested

interest, as well. "Many of them know kids at school that have parents that have been directly affected by this, so they know that this could be helping those families, too."

"We're also thinking that they don't get too many Girl Scout cookies popping their way down there very much, either," added Schwettman.

"At this time of year, late in Girl Scout cookie sales, so many people have been eating cookies for a while and they're getting concerned about

their weight," she said. "This way, they can participate without gaining the weight."

That appeared to be a theme well taken. Just minutes into Friday's drive, a customer was asked if he would like to buy some cookies. At first, he said no, but changed his mind when informed of the actual purpose of the Scouts' setup.

"I'll send them over there. I don't want them," the customer said with a laugh. "I've sworn off."

and Saddam removed, even if more than 1,000 U.S. soldiers are killed and even if thousands of Iraqi civilians are killed.

But a majority said they would not consider the war a success in the following circumstances: if the war costs more than \$100 billion, if Iraq uses weapons of mass destruction against U.S. troops, if Iraq returns to dictatorship after the war, if there are more terrorist attacks on the United States, and if Israel is attacked and the Mideast becomes more unstable.

By a 2-1 margin, Americans said the United States needs to preserve the American tradition of not launching attacks on other countries unless it is attacked, rather than taking military action against countries before they can threaten or strike this country.

"Given the amount of emphasis the administration has placed on this (pre-emptive attack) rationale, this is really quite stunning," said Democrat Rosner.

The poll showed significant gender differences, with women more likely than men to say they feel threatened, and more women saying

they are cautious about going to war without support of the United Nations.

Eight in 10 of the entire sample said it's important to be liked and respected abroad, but a majority, 55 percent, said they feel that the United States is less liked and respected by people in other countries than a year ago.

The poll of 1,005 registered voters was taken between March 3-8 and has an error margin of plus or minus 3 percentage points. The poll was conducted by the Democratic polling firm of Greenberg Quinlan Rosner Research and the Republican firm of Public Opinion Strategies.

GOP pollster McInturff said the results of the poll, along with several focus groups held around the country, have convinced him that people are very torn about what to do about Iraq, no matter which side they are on.

"Are we safer because we initiate military action in Iraq," he asked, "or does that simply unleash a response that makes this country more vulnerable?"

Americans, he said, "don't know the answer to that question."

Turmoil causing mission trips to take hit

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — For evangelical Christians, the threat of war with Iraq and global fears of terrorism have sparked a great debate about Jesus Christ's command to "go and make disciples of all nations."

While saying they're not forsaking that command, some Christian universities and churches are canceling international mission trips out of concern that Americans could become targets.

"The potential for risk outweighed the potential for ministry," said the Rev. Ed Rowell, whose People's Church in suburban Franklin abandoned plans for a mission to Krygyzstan, where a radical Islamic group has called for a holy war against Americans.

Likewise, Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Ark., cited international uncertainty in halting planned summer mission efforts to Kenya, Russia and Taiwan.

But others argue fear should not dissuade Christians. "We have to continue to do what God has called us to do," said Nicku Mordi, missions director for Bethel World Outreach Ministries in Silver Spring, Md.

Undeterred, Earl Lavender, director of missions at Church of Christ-affiliated Lipscomb University in Nashville, left Friday with a group of students headed for Scotland and England.

Lavender said he warned students about disruptive behavior and political discussions on the spring break trip, telling them they were going "to do good, not to represent political positions of their country."

"I choose to live in a world where God is in control," he said.

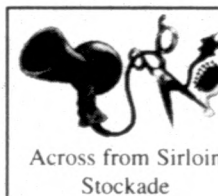

Somewhere Over the Rainbow ...

Crayola celebrates its 100th anniversary this year by retiring four more colors. One of five retiree nominees (burnt sienna, blizzard blue, teal blue, mulberry, and magic mint) will be saved.

Back in 1990, Crayola retired eight other colors but replaced them with new colors. Losing four colors this year should reduce the choices to 120 colors, unless I have miscounted.

The first color pack, in 1903, consisted of only eight colors and sold for a nickel. Our own first Crayolas, at the end of the Depression and in the beginning years of World War II, were in that same eight-pack box. (Like Henry Ford's Model T, why argue with successful sales?)

In 1958, Crayola came out with a box of 64 colors. Once I even had a box of 72, which I held on to for years. I wouldn't even let our daughters have it because it was such a rarity.

Surely some psychologist can explain why most of us are so fascinated by crayons in the yellow-orange and green boxes with matching yellow-orange and green paper wrappers around them, each carefully labeled with the color it is. Not many of us really use them to color with, but they are nice to have around.

You can rearrange them in color groups by contrasts or by degrees of shading with blue-green or red-orange for transitions between sets. Beyond stormy black and gray is a silver lining, and beyond it an infinite rainbow of color, with gold at the end.

You can learn spelling and vocabulary from them. What poetry there is in "magenta" or "turquoise" or "burnt sienna" or "puce"! You can count them, or learn to count by using them for 1s, the shape they bear.

You can line them up on end in triangles at the end of a hardwood hallway and make a bowling alley, using marbles for bowling balls.

Or you can melt a couple and mold them into a homemade bowling ball.

Breaking one is enough to make you cry. Wearing down and rounding out their sharp points or having to tear their wrapping to use them is a great tragedy.

My earliest memories of crayons are from the third grade. Appropriately, since it was during World War II, they were shaped like bullets. One memory is of some one in class occasionally eating one or chewing it for gum.

Billy Oliver admits he did chew them — but only short green ones.

Another third-grade crayon memory is more vivid. One day when our teacher, Miss Rebecca Bayer, was absent, the substitute handed out pages of outlined Thanksgiving turkeys and told us to color them. What I recall is her walking up and down the aisles and looking over our shoulders as we colored, telling us over and over, "Don't color outside the lines."

It was my introduction to Fascism, which we were fighting a war to defeat.

Our world consisted of lines. We lined up outside the front door each morning, waiting for the opening bell. We lined up to go to the restroom or to recess, to lunch and from one classroom to another, and to file out in the afternoon.

We sat in assigned lined desks, rows of them bolted to the floor. (Remember the kind? With slanted tops that lifted and inkwell holes in the righthand upper corners? And generations of initials carved in the tops and generations of chewing gum stuck underneath?)

Kindly Miss Rebecca with her beautiful silver hair heaped up atop her head, except for stray strands she never seemed able to control, and bearing the worldly experience of what I assumed to be at least 97 years, had never forced us to stay in the lines or to keep our strokes in the same direction.

In those days of regimentation, when our lives were organized by math drill numbers and by writing rules and by Palmer Method penmanship practice, Miss Rebecca was the symbol of freedom's promises.

She occasionally stopped class to play games at times other than recess. At recess, she played sandlot ball with us. She kept books of her own in her rented room a block away and encouraged us to come by and borrow them. And she let us color outside the lines — in any color we wanted.

My turkey the day she was absent was a respectable brown. But in my memory, I picture it as it would have been if Miss Rebecca had been there that November day. Purple.

Purple for royalty, for this king or queen of the birds. And purple, too, for regal Miss Rebecca, with whom the color purple is indelibly entwined in our hearts and minds.

Twenty years later, when Hippies appeared, shocking Flower Children whom Billy Oliver would have loved, we recognized them instantly. They were pale imitations of Miss Rebecca Bayer, who let us color outside the lines.

Eyes turn toward North Korea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — If North Korean missile launches and a fighter jet fly-by weren't enough to rattle nerves in Washington, Pyongyang has other more daunting cards to play and could be waiting for bombs to fall on Baghdad.

As the world counts down to war in Iraq, focus here is turning to what the communist North might do next — and when. Many expect action to coincide with possible conflict in the Middle East, when Washington has its hands full.

"The provocations will continue. And it will get worse once the bombs start to drop on Iraq," said E. Han Kim, a North Korea expert at the University of Michigan's William Davidson Institute. "It will escalate."

A long-range missile test, cross-border confrontations or the reprocessing of spent nuclear fuel for atomic bombs might be in store in coming weeks.

Over the past month alone, North Korea has gradually ratcheted up tension in an apparent attempt to force Washington to the negotiating table.

A North Korean fighter jet alarmed South Korea by darting into its airspace, the North fired short-range cruise missiles off its east coast, and four communist jets intercepted a U.S. spy plane over international waters.

The United States filed a protest

with Pyongyang over the interception and sent long-range bombers to Guam. A U.S. aircraft carrier, the USS Carl Vinson, docked off the South's coast to take part in annual military exercises.

Secretary of State Colin Powell, however, called the first North Korean missile launch "innocuous."

"The United States still has a doing nothing policy and is preoccupied with Iraq," said Paik Haksoo, of the Sejong Institute, a research center near Seoul. "North Korean leaders may think the time has come to play more aggressively."

Testifying before a U.S. Congressional committee on Wednesday, Gen. Leon J. Laporte, the commander of the 37,000 American forces in South Korea, said he also expected North Korea to "continue to politically escalate the situation."

Laporte said the North probably wouldn't attack South Korea, but forecast that additional actions like the plane interception were possible, as well as missile tests and additional steps toward producing nuclear weapons.

At issue is North Korea's insistence on direct negotiations with the United States to sign a nonaggression pact. The North also wants economic aid.

The United States has refused, saying North Korea must first abandon its nuclear development programs.

Since the United States accused the North of having a secret nuclear

weapons program in October, tensions have spiraled.

Washington and its allies suspended fuel shipments to the impoverished nation. The North retaliated by expelling U.N. monitors, withdrawing from the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty and restarting a nuclear reactor.

Recent events are seen as attempts to pressure the United States into negotiations.

If there is war in Iraq, Washington would likely be in a weaker bargaining position, more susceptible to hardball bluffs and more likely to compromise, said Kim Sung-han, a North Korea watcher with the Institute for Foreign Affairs and National Security, a government-backed policy group in Seoul.

The United States has asked the U.N. Security Council to condemn North Korea for withdrawing from the nuclear treaty, but China and Russia have resisted the idea.

China's U.N. ambassador Wang Yingfan said Thursday that China is trying to bring the United States and North Korea together for talks and doesn't want the Security Council involved at this stage.

North Korea's pressure tactics could include staging exercises near the border with South Korea, or triggering a naval clash similar to a deadly shootout in June.

It could also test the long-range Taepodong-2 missile. The Pentagon believes that rocket could reach the U.S. mainland with a payload of

several hundred pounds. Although the accuracy of the missile is in question, a test would pose a grave threat to the United States because of the specter of a nuclear-tipped warhead.

The North has not conducted such a missile test since 1998, when it fired a rocket over Japan and into the Pacific Ocean.

A final North Korean bid could be starting up its nuclear reprocessing factory. That would mean it is poised to develop several atomic bombs in a matter of months by extracting weapons-grade plutonium from spent fuel rods.

Thomas Hubbard, the U.S. Ambassador to South Korea, said Wednesday the North Koreans have taken "a number of steps over the last several months that would seem consistent with resuming reprocessing." But he could not confirm that reprocessing has actually begun.

Analysts say time may be running out for North Korea to raise the stakes. That's, in part, because Pyongyang fears it could be the next target of U.S. military strikes after a successful campaign in Iraq.

If a war in Iraq is quick, North Korea could lose its willingness to gamble. But if the war bogs down, North Korea could be emboldened to try something new.

"The North Korean leadership is very disciplined and calculating," Paik said. "They will be closely watching how things develop."

Attracting the fast-growing Hispanic population

WASHINGTON (AP) — Click on the Web sites of the national political parties or some of the Democratic presidential candidates and you can read their statements in Spanish.

Listen to John Kerry stumping for votes, and you might hear the Massachusetts senator speak Spanish: he's been practicing with language tapes the last few years.

Like the 2000 White House rivals George W. Bush and Al Gore, who occasionally made their appeals in Spanish, the current candidates are trying to burnish their images with Hispanic voters. Leaders in the community, however, expect more than just lip service.

"Both parties have to fight for the hearts and minds of Hispanic voters," said Gabriela Lemus, a policy specialist for the League of United Latin American Citizens. "It's not enough to speak Spanish to us. We're being acknowledged, but window dressing isn't going to do it."

Hispanics expect significant progress from the Bush administration or concrete proposals from the Democratic candidates on core issues such as education, employment, immigration and health care. Specifically, Hispanics want:

— Access to quality education and the ability to get their children into college. About two-thirds of Hispanics in this country are 25 or younger.

— Resumption of talks with Mexico about immigration policy and inclusion of other Latin American countries in those talks, as well as

access to citizenship and benefits for immigrants who are already working in this country or are in this country trying to find work.

— Quality jobs and access to quality health care.

The Hispanic vote was crucial to President Bush's election in 2000. Previous Republican presidential nominees failed to break 30 percent among Hispanic voters — Bob Dole garnered 21 percent in 1996 and Bush's father got 25 percent in 1992. The president secured 35 percent of the Hispanic vote in 2000.

In return for that support, Hispanics expected the administration to push changes in immigration rules. The Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, though, dampened enthusiasm to open the nation's borders further or ease regulations.

"The outreach efforts get the attention of the community, but there needs to be some proof that action follows outreach," said Clarissa Martinez, a policy specialist at the National Council of La Raza. "We are hopeful that the Bush administration will prove it plans to make the tent bigger."

Hispanics represent a key voting bloc in electorally rich states such as California, Florida, New York and Texas. Hispanic registered voters totaled 7.5 million in the 2000 Census.

Republicans are eager to recruit more Hispanic candidates. This weekend in Missouri, the GOP is holding the first of 20 or more

recruitment seminars planned around the country for potential Hispanic candidates. Candidates will learn about getting started in politics, fund raising and dealing with the media.

As of June 2002, there were 1,521 elected Democratic Hispanics and 116 elected Republican Hispanics, said Larry Gonzalez of the National Association of Latino Elected Officials. Polls suggest that almost two-thirds of Hispanic voters identify themselves as Democrats, a fifth as Republicans and the rest independent, said Rodolfo de la Garza, a political scientist at Columbia University.

But Republicans hope to capitalize on the Democratic filibuster of Bush's nomination of Miguel Estrada to a federal appeals court. In the Senate Thursday, the GOP fell five votes short of the 60 necessary to end the filibuster.

"The Democrats think they own the Hispanic community and don't want to give a Republican president a political victory," said Rep. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, R-Fla.

White House political adviser Karl Rove has worked hard at courting Hispanic voters. New Jersey Rep. Bob Menendez, chairman of the House Democratic Caucus, said Rove "gets it. And hopefully so do the leaders of the Democratic Party."

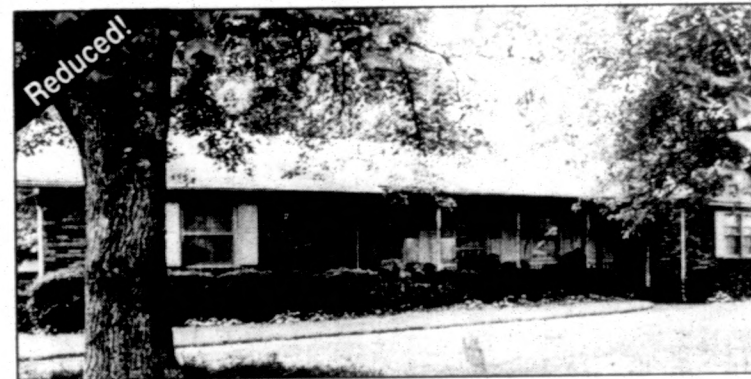

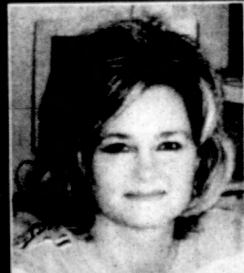

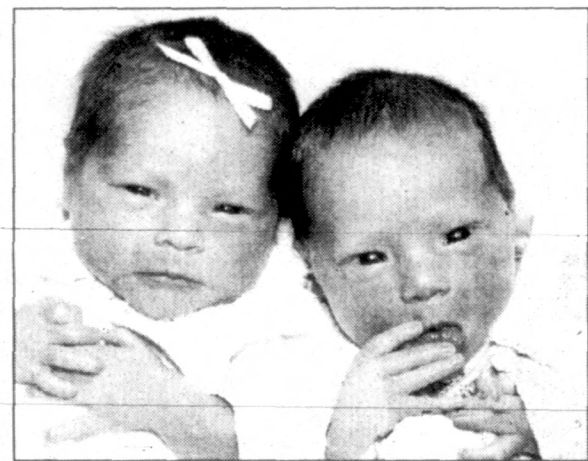

Lakers sail to region title game

McClure's 24 lifts CCHS past Heath

In many respects, it's been a long season for the Calloway County Lakers.

However, Terry Birdsong's fourth CCHS squad doesn't mind one bit that it will last at least one more night.

Riding the senior guard tandem of Mitchell McClure and Jimmy Bynum, the Lakers outlasted a senior-laden Heath club 59-53 in Friday night's region semifinals to earn the school's first berth in 19 seasons in the Boys' First Region championship game.

The Lakers (18-11) will face Third District champion Mayfield — a 69-65 winner over Carlisle County in Friday's late semifinal matchup — tonight at 7 at the Regional Special Events Center for the First Region title and a trip to next week's Sweet 16 state tournament.

"This is a great feeling," said Birdsong, a former Marshall County standout who helped the Marshals reach the state tournament as a player in 1987.

"I was fortunate enough to play in the state tournament, and I hope I can get back there as a head coach. ... I hope our kids and our fans can get there because it's a great experience."

Despite a laundry list of health concerns throughout the 2002-03 season, the Lakers have only recently hit their stride — and it couldn't have come at a more oppor-

tune time.

The 6-1 McClure, who has missed the most time this season with a foot injury, practically willed Calloway into the regional championship for the first time since 1984 with a game-high 24 points on 6-of-11 shooting from the field. He was 3-of-5 from 3-point range and hit all nine of his free-throw attempts.

Backcourt mate Bynum followed McClure with 18 points of his own on 7-of-15 shooting as the Lakers knocked down 15-of-19 attempts from the foul line, including an 8-of-9 effort that helped them pull away in the fourth quarter.

"Coach (Birdsong) just told me and Jimmy to keep the ball in our hands as much as we could down the stretch," noted McClure, who helped seal the Pirates' fate with four true tosses from the charity stripe and a long jumper in the final 4:09. "We talked about taking the game over in the final minutes, and it worked out good."

Cards' duo grounds Comets in semifinals

Raphael Kendrick and Derrick Parrott combined for 39 points, 17 rebounds and five free throws in the last 70 seconds as Mayfield fended off Carlisle County for the final spot in today's Boys' First Region Tournament championship game.

Parrott had 16 points and 11 rebounds, Kendrick added 23 points and Jerome Saxton tossed in 14 second-half points to lift the Third District champion Cardinals (26-5) over the Comets 69-65 and into the 7 p.m. final against Calloway County.

Mayfield, winners of seven straight games, survived Brett Hoskins' 29-point effort on 11-of-23 shooting as the First District titlist Comets (19-9) chiseled Mayfield's 15-point second-quarter edge to a three-point deficit on Cody Martin's jumper with 54 seconds left.

After Parrott missed two foul shots with 47.1 ticks on the clock, Carlisle's Kirk Arnold fired a 3-pointer from the top of the key but missed.

The ball bounced into the hands of Hoskins, who dove to the floor to corral one of the Comets' 14 offensive rebounds and toss the ball to a teammate.

The next pass found a wide-open Martin under the basket, but he missed the layup and Carlisle was forced to foul Kendrick with 11.6 seconds to go.

Kendrick dropped in both charities, and although Martin scored on a baseline drive with 3.7 seconds remaining, Parrott iced the

game with another free throw.

Arnold and Martin finished with 10 points apiece and Austin Tyler had eight points and nine rebounds for the Comets, who rebounded from a 7-of-23 shooting performance from the field in the first half.

Hoskins scored 25 points after halftime and converted on all seven of his trips to the free-throw line as Carlisle went 18-of-22 from the stripe — a perfect 8-for-8 in the second half — while knocking down 16-of-31 baskets in the final 16 minutes of play.

Kendrick poured in 15 of his points before intermission as Mayfield (24-of-50 from the floor) hit 16-of-30 first-half shots.

The Cards used a 21-3 run to turn a 9-6 Comet advantage into a 27-12 Cardinal lead with 6:15 left in the second quarter.

Down 33-18 with 3:37 to go in the half, Carlisle hit six straight free throws to whittle the gap to nine before settling for a 37-25 differential.

Mayfield connected on 18-of-28 foul shots, including 12-of-20 in the fourth period, to end the Comets' eight-game winning streak.

Cats roll over Vandy again

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Less than five minutes into the game, coach Tubby Smith decided to send a message as only Kentucky can.

Starters, take a seat. Let's try a new five.

Showing off their depth and versatility, the No. 2 Wildcats shrugged off an early nine-point deficit and cruised to an 81-63 victory over Vanderbilt in the quarterfinals of the Southeastern Conference Tournament Friday night.

"We have a lot of guys coming off the bench who could be starting for other programs," Smith said. "You can plug someone in the game and not have a major dropoff. The group I put in gave us a big lift. That's a real luxury to have as a coach."

Kentucky (27-3) extended its winning streak to 21 games after becoming just the second SEC team in 47 years to go through the league schedule with a perfect record (16-0). The Wildcats advanced to meet either Tennessee or Auburn in today's semifinals.

Keith Bogans had 16 points, leading four players in double figures. Seven others scored as Kentucky cleared its bench and still shot 53 percent from the field.

"The way we're playing, we're not going to have any letdown," Bogans said. "We're going to keep playing the way we're playing."

Unlike most schools, Smith has plenty of options to keep his players on their toes. With 15:28 left in the first half, he sat down all five starters and inserted a new lineup. Not that it mattered much.

The way the Wildcats are playing, they're competing more with themselves than their opponent.

"I wanted more intensity," Smith said. "We had a couple of turnovers. That tells me, mentally, we weren't sharp."

The fresh group included Ger-

A-Rod hurt, Guerrero suspended

Alex Rodriguez should be ready for Texas' opening day despite a minor injury to his neck. The only way Vladimir Guerrero can play the opener for Montreal is if he appeals his suspension.

Guerrero was suspended for three games Friday and Florida pitcher Brad Penny was suspended for five games for their roles in a bench-clearing brawl this week.

Montreal infielder Jose Macias was suspended two games. All three players were also fined by baseball disciplinarian Bob Watson.

The suspensions for Guerrero and Penny are scheduled to start on opening day unless the players appeal them. Macias' suspen-

sion is scheduled to start April 4.

Watson figures to be busy in the next few days. He's still deciding a punishment for New York Mets catcher Mike Piazza and Los Angeles reliever Guillermo Mota after their brawl Wednesday.

This is the second straight year players have been suspended for regular season games because of a fight in spring training.

Last year, Anaheim's Scott Spiezio and Troy Glaus and San Diego's Bobby Jones and Ryan Klesko were suspended after a fight between the Angels and Padres.

Rodriguez will miss at least a few days with a small herniated disc in his neck, but the Rangers

are confident their \$252 million shortstop will be healthy by opening day.

"From everything we've been told about the injury, we sit here today very confident that Alex will be back any day," general manager John Hart said Friday. "There's no reason to think he won't."

Rodriguez complained of stiffness and fatigue in his left shoulder after playing Tuesday and Wednesday. He went back to Dallas Thursday for additional tests, which revealed a small herniated disc in one of the vertebrae in his neck and an irritated nerve.

Rodriguez received a cortisone injection Friday to relieve the swelling and is expected back in

Rangers' camp Sunday or Monday.

"Knowing Alex, the whole idea is to keep him away from this environment," manager Buck Showalter said.

The five-time All-Star led the majors last season with 57 home runs, 142 RBIs and 389 total bases. He became the fifth player in major league history to have consecutive 50-homer seasons, hitting 52 in 2001.

Dean, Cards oust Memphis from C-USA

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Louisville freshman Taquan Dean's only field goal Friday night was the biggest one of the game.

The 6-foot-3 guard rattled in a 3-pointer with 11.1 seconds left that gave the Cardinals the lead for good in a 78-75 win over 16th-ranked Memphis in the Conference USA Tournament semifinals.

Dean, who had an earlier free throw, finished 1-for-8 from the field.

Louisville coach Rick Pitino kept encouraging Dean throughout the game, despite his shooting woes.

"I hit that shot for Coach," said Dean. "He gives me the confidence. Even though I was 1-for-8, I knew I still had one in me. If it was an open shot, he told me to shoot it. So, I shot it."

Dean's shot from the wing over Rodney Carney gave the 20th-ranked Cardinals (23-6) a 76-75 lead. Memphis guard Billy Richmond missed a one-handed baseline shot at the other end and Louisville's Luke Whitehead rebounded and was fouled.

Whitehead sank two free throws with 4.3 seconds left. The 6-foot-7 junior finished with 10 points and 12 rebounds, his third straight

double-double.

Whitehead's rebounding has been crucial since the loss of leading rebounder Ellis Myles to a knee injury on Feb. 27.

"I told Luke, 'If you don't rebound the ball, you can't play for us at Louisville,'" Pitino said. "That was three games ago, and since then, he's been a rebounding demon."

The Tigers called timeout after Whitehead's free throws. Memphis point guard Antonio Burks missed a 3-point attempt off the back of the rim as time expired. The loss snapped the Tigers' 12-game winning streak.

John Grice went 6-for-10 from 3-point range and scored a career-high 29 to lead Memphis (23-6). Chris Massie, the Tigers' 6-foot-10 center who was averaging 17.6 points, went scoreless for the first time this season against constant double-teams.

The Tigers shot 35 percent (18-of-51) from the field and were outrebounded 44-37.

"We played great low-post defense. It was a team effort defensively," Pitino said. "All five guys were part of a string moving together."

Francisco Garcia and Marvin Stone had 15 points apiece for Louisville.

MSU's Hicks 4th at NCAA

WEST POINT, N.Y. — Murray State junior Morgan Hicks placed fourth in individual air rifle at the NCAA Championships Friday afternoon and finished eighth in individual smallbore competition.

Today, Murray State will compete in its 24th consecutive NCAA Championships. The U.S. Military Academy is hosting.

Hicks was one of only 11 shooters to qualify as an individual shooter in air rifle and one of 13 to qualify as an individual in smallbore.

She fired a 392 out of a possible 400 in air rifle, shooting one perfect target of 100 points. Alaska-Fairbanks' Jamie Beyerle won the individual air rifle competition with a score of 395.

In smallbore, Hicks shot an 1173 out of a possible 1200, tying with Navy's Matthew

Albright, but taking fifth with 75 bull's-eyes to Albright's 77.

Alaska-Fairbanks' Matthew Emmons won the smallbore competition with a score of 1191, setting a new NCAA record.

Murray State will be competing in its 24th NCAA Championships today, having taken part in every NCAA Rifle Championships since they began in 1980. The Racers qualified to compete in both smallbore and air rifle, meaning they will be competing for a national title.

Other schools competing in both guns are defending champion Alaska-Fairbanks, Jacksonville State, Kentucky, Nevada and Xavier. Tennessee Tech and West Virginia will compete in smallbore only, while Air Force and Navy will compete only in air rifle.



Kirksey's triple carries 'Breds

McCutchan scored twice for the 'Breds and picked up a double, while Dan McAlevey also faced a double for MSU.

Rhoades (2-0) got the win, allowing one unearned run on four hits, striking out six and walking three in six innings of work.

Greg Gray entered in the ninth inning and earned his second save of the season, allowing no hits and walking one, facing the minimum three batters in the inning with the aid of a game-ending double play.

For Akron (1-6), Tom Lindhe went 2-for-3 to lead the Zips' offense. UA's Matt Halligan (0-1) took the loss, allowing three runs on eight hits, striking out one and walking one in 6 2-3 innings.

These teams will face each other in a doubleheader today at noon and will close out the four-game series on Sunday at noon.

"I've said all along that Mitchell McClure is one those special players who don't come along very often," Birdsong claimed. "He just wouldn't let us lose."

Calloway did manage to pull away at the end, but not before a few anxious moments in the final eight minutes.

The Lakers built as much as a 10-point cushion (26-16) in the first half and sailed into the locker room up 29-21 at the break.

Heath (23-5) used a 10-5 third-quarter run to close the deficit to only three points (34-31) on a 3-pointer from Eric Eidson. But McClure and Bynum scored nine of the period's final 12 points as CCHS appeared to be in command at 43-34 heading into the fourth stanza.

Standout guard Charlie Throgmorton tallied 15 points for Heath, but the 6-0 senior scored just four points in the second half.

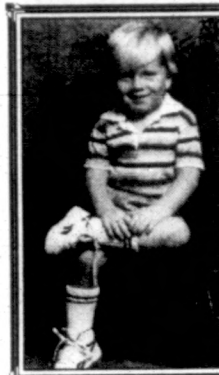

Tennessee faring better than some in education funding

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) —

Tennessee, which trails much of the nation in education spending, is on track under the governor's new budget to avoid an unpopular option being considered in many states — taking chunks of money from schools to balance state books.

Gov. Phil Bredesen proposed this week to give more money to K-12 schools by adding \$33 million next year to the state's \$2.6 billion Basic Education Program. The Democratic governor's first budget targets another \$27 million to school districts with the lowest teacher salaries, addressing a court order to equalize pay across the state.

The Tennessee plan protects K-12 education at a time when states from Alaska to Florida are considering the layoffs of thousands of teachers, shortened school years or school weeks, and the elimination of extracurricular activities.

"Given the severity of the problems states are faced with, it's that much more difficult to arrive at a balanced budget if they don't include K-12 education," said Arturo Perez of the National Conference of State Legislatures. "Clearly that's not a popular choice ... but it comprises the largest component of state spending."

But Bredesen promised during the campaign to be an "education governor" and decided cutting education funding wasn't an option.

"He is walking the talk," said Education Department Commissioner Lana Seivers. "He did what he said he was going to do and he put education first on the list."

Seivers believes giving more money to education at a time when many states may do the opposite "certainly should foster Tennessee going up in the (national) rankings."

Tennessee ranks 46th nationally in overall spending per student, according to the National Education Association, just above Arkansas and Alabama.

Southeastern states that spend more are West Virginia at 14th, Georgia at 20th and South Carolina at 27th.

"Tennessee could move up the

rankings by default, even if the increase is not substantial," said NEA spokesman Dan Kaufman.

But sparing education in Tennessee came at the expense of other departments. Bredesen is requiring 9 percent cuts by almost all other areas of state government, including higher education, to erase a projected \$629 million deficit next year.

The state must have a balanced budget in place by July 1.

As he presented his budget to lawmakers, Bredesen noted nine states have already cut K-12 education funding as part of mid-year reductions, and districts in seven others are shifting to four-day school weeks.

On both of those lists was Oregon, where Portland teachers have volunteered to work 10 days for free and the City Council is looking at temporary taxes to assure its schools can complete the full term.

About 100 other districts plan to trim at least two days from their school years to save money and another 10 will chop as many as 14 days. Approximately 3,000 teaching and other professional positions also could be eliminated.

Almost all of Oregon's education funding comes from a state income tax, said Gene Evans, spokesman for the Oregon Department of Education.

"When the economy's bad those dollars drop off immediately," Evans said. "It started bleeding in June and hasn't stopped."

Other states aren't faring much better.

In Kentucky, K-12 education is getting a one-time \$14.7 million boost in the upcoming fiscal year. But other agencies must cut their budgets by 3 percent — including the Education Department.

"Even though on paper it looks like schools are getting more money, that's not actually what it means," said department spokeswoman Lisa Gross.

"We're facing possible staff cuts, facing the prospect of having to provide services with limited staff and fewer dollars," she said. "It will be a struggle for us and eventually for the school districts because they depend on us."

In Georgia, K-12 and higher education took a 2 percent mid-year reduction, while the remainder of state government cut about 5 percent. For the new fiscal year, Gov. Sonny Perdue has proposed a 1.7 percent reduction in school operating funds, dropping it to \$5.6 billion.

In Tennessee, education advocates are celebrating what they see as the first step in placing a high priority on the value of learning.

Donna Jerden, a teacher at Central High School in Morgan County, is one of approximately 17,000 teachers who will receive pay raises under Bredesen's proposal.

"He's been saying his priority is education. The resources we have in Tennessee, I think that is our children," said Jerden, whom Bredesen recognized along with two other teachers during his budget address.

"For him to put his money where his words are is very encouraging."

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from chronic constipation to the point that I have had to remove impacted stool manually, an unpleasant task. My doctor's suggestions (increased fluid intake, Metamucil and Senokot) have not solved the problem. Consequently, I have been forced to use chemical laxatives about once a week. Am I at risk for a blocked intestine? Can you offer any solutions for my difficulty?

DEAR READER: Chronic constipation, which commonly affects most of us as we age, can be difficult to treat. Although in many instances the situation can be corrected by a high-fluid/high-fiber intake and occasional mild laxatives, such as Milk of Magnesia or Senokot, some patients require more aggressive therapy. This is especially the case when colon contents become impacted — too hard and too large to pass normally.

I've found that constipation can be successfully kept at bay by either of two natural and safe means: 8 ounces of hot prune juice every morning or triple mix (which I use for my nursing home patients). Triple mix consists of equal portions of prune juice, bran and applesauce. Ordinarily, two or three tablespoons of the concoction taken daily (and with extra fluids) will do the trick.

While simple constipation is not likely to lead to intestinal blockage, impaction may if it is not corrected. So, to avoid problems, try my prune juice or triple mix remedies. Should this approach fail to overcome your condition, ask your doctor to prescribe Miralax, a powder mixed with water.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been prescribed Coumadin therapy for atrial fibrillation. Is there a medication I can use for aches and pains that is compatible with Coumadin? Am I still allowed to drink 12 ounces of beer daily?

DEAR READER: Atrial fibrillation is a common arrhythmia, marked by a disruption of the normal, regular pulse rate. Patients with the affliction have irregular cardiac contractions that may predispose such people to blood clots. If carried to the brain from the heart, these clots can cause stroke. Hence, Coumadin is prescribed to prevent this.

Because aspirin will slow blood coagulation, it should be avoided in the presence of Coumadin. The two drugs are not compatible, as a general rule.

However, acetaminophen — and, to a lesser extent, ibuprofen — have little effect on the clotting mechanism and may, in a majority of cases, be taken along with Coumadin.

Twelve ounces of beer should have no effect whatsoever.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 72, weigh 106 pounds, have a fasting glucose level of 93, and am addicted to sweets. Unfortunately, these products cause my heart to race and I become dizzy, nauseated and anxious. Artificial sweeteners also don't agree with me either. The situation is worsening year by year. Do you think it could be fatal?

DEAR READER: While I doubt that your sensitivity to sugar products will lead to serious health consequences, I certainly urge you to investigate the reaction further. Perhaps you are suffering from reactive hypoglycemia, for instance, a common ailment marked by low blood sugar levels following the ingestion of sugar. I suggest that you begin the investigation with your family physician, who will question and examine you then order appropriate lab tests.

Opening lead — jack of diamonds.

There is a play in bridge called a trump squeeze. The opportunity to use it seldom occurs, but when the proper setup arises, the trump squeeze can be applied with devastating effect.

Consider this deal where West led the jack of diamonds against six spades. Declarer played low from dummy and ruffed West's diamond continuation at trick two. At this point, it might seem that declarer requires a successful club finesse to make the slam, but South decided not to put all his eggs in this one basket. Instead he cashed the ace of

hearts at trick three, then ruffed a heart with dummy's ten. A low trump to the nine was followed by the jack of hearts, ruffed with dummy's jack as East discarded a diamond. South then overtook the queen of trumps with the king and cashed the ace of trumps, discarding a club from dummy, as East discarded another diamond. This was now the position:

North
♦ K 8
♠ A K 10

West
♥ 10 9 7
♣ 9 7

East
♦ A Q
♣ 8 5

South
♠ 6 3
♥ J 6 2

By this time, declarer was aware that East had started with one spade, two hearts, six diamonds and, therefore, four clubs. This meant that East was subject to a trump squeeze, and that it did not matter whether he had the queen of clubs or not.

Accordingly, South led the spade six and discarded the club ten from dummy, placing East in an untenable position. If East discarded a club, declarer would cash the A-K of clubs to establish his jack; if East discarded the diamond queen instead, declarer would cross to dummy with a club and ruff the eight of diamonds to establish the king. Either way, the contract was home.

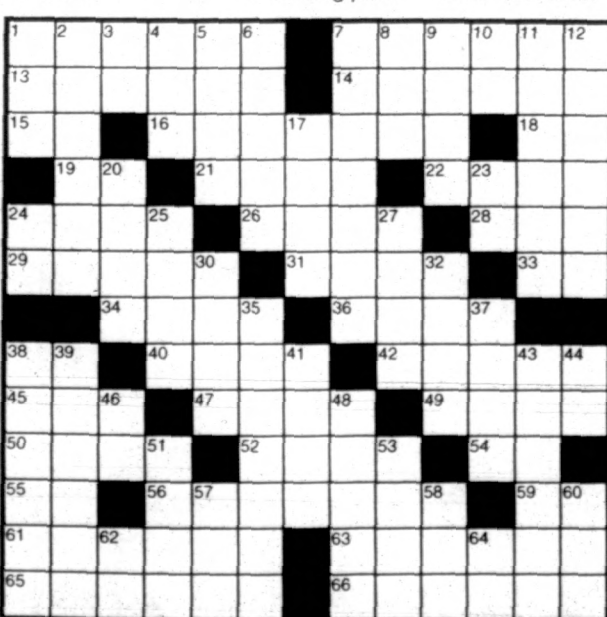

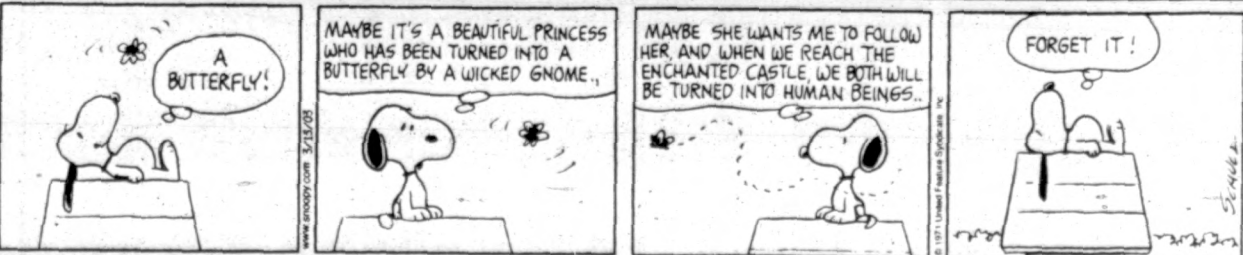

Temps say spring not here just yet

We are another week closer to spring by the calendar, but the local temperature says winter isn't through with this area just yet!



Fishing Line

The arctic blasts are reaching into the deep south and causing problems everywhere for the early anglers. We have become spoiled with several years of mild winters and early springs, where we can go fishing with only a light jacket to ward off the chill.

Rainfall is possibly coming our direction, but that is a plus for the anglers and the folks who sell rainsuits!

Our local elevation is hopefully at its lowest point for this spring. Maybe the conditions will improve so that a perfect spring

will soon unfold.

Standing at 354 feet above sea level and at 47 degrees, we could possibly begin to smell the roses very soon. The water clarity is actually perfect for the fish because it is a little stained and will allow them to move more shallow as the sunlight heats this type of water more rapidly than the clear.

Of course, we want to know how the shad population made out through the winter.

I have noticed small schools on my electronics, but I was not in my major bait area at all. The seagulls left early, so maybe we didn't lose too many of them to the cold.

I had the pleasure of fishing with Donnie and Gina Winchester last Saturday. It was a tough, windy day to be casting light crappie jigs.

We had planned the trip some time ago, but we had to cancel once already because of bad weather.

The conditions were great when we left the marina. But, as the

day progressed, the winds became very strong. Gina can tell you the spray that came over the side was cold as we traveled.

Donnie and Gina hadn't fished deep water for crappie, and that was our intention.

We had to travel farther than we expected because so many areas were either being worked or the wind was too strong.

There was a strong current, and we really had to look past some of my favorite places before coming up with a solution. Once we came into the zone, the crappie we were feeding on were good.

I caught the first slab crappie to prove that they were there and were willing to eat. But Gina soon took over and began to lay them in the livewell.

She was now casting and reeling, just waiting for that light tap on the lure. But if she had caught all of them, Donnie and I both would have been slain!

The current was so strong that we had to cast our lures well ahead of the target area and then

reel in the slack line. At times, we couldn't get the line taut quick enough. When the fish struck, it had time to expel the lure before it could be caught.

Donnie and I were intent on crappie fishing. All at once, Gina decided to bass fish with her light tackle.

It was touch and go for a while because the bass was over 2-1/2 pounds. It had no intention of coming any closer to our boat.

Fortunately, I always carry a long-handled net in the boat, and Gina knew how to deal with a tough fighter.

It was a piece of cake! Donnie and I knew for certain that we were outnumbered. In that case, we should just relax and enjoyed the ride.

We caught some more good crappie and had to release a couple of them, but the window had closed and the winds increased drastically.

We were forced to change locations. Donnie caught another crappie along a deep ledge. There were

several fish there, but they didn't like our offerings even though I changed the direction of the retrieve several times.

I was convinced then that we were wasting our time. The lake was really rolling, so we decided to come in. Thanks to Dognie and Gina, I had a great time!

We made contact with several other anglers. As I looked out, all of them said they didn't have any luck with the fish. Some even said that they didn't get a single bite!

The elevation has continued to stay at that level as the waters pour through the from the Tennessee lakes. This is one reason why we have so much stained water right now. All of the small creeks and drains are still running excess from the fields and valleys that boarder these lakes.

As we receive more and more sunshine, we can expect the lake temperature to begin a slow climb. This should be the beginning of our spring warming trend. If you plan on getting any cover material out or placing any attractors,

now is the time to do it.

I recently spoke with Calloway County Judge/Executive Larry Elkins. He encouraged all of our local anglers to attend a meeting on Monday at the Murray-Calloway County Library.

It concerns the reciprocal agreement between Kentucky and Tennessee. This is a very important meeting for all anglers, so be there if you have any questions or can be of assistance.

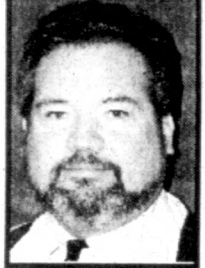
We enjoyed the original agreement for 48 years, and we would surely like to see it re-instated if at all possible. All of the anglers in this area should be concerned.

Wildlife commission makes changes official

The commissioners from the nine wildlife districts in Kentucky met in Frankfort last Friday to finalize the 2003-04 seasons and changes.

This is a process that begins as rumor then spills over into committee meetings before finally being accepted or rejected by the commissioners. Input is provided by the KDFWR and through contact with sportsmen and sportsmen's groups throughout the Commonwealth.

Archery season for deer will begin on Sept. 6 this year and will end on Jan. 19, 2004. This will stick-and-string hunters a little jump on the early part of the season. Wild turkeys may also be taken by bow during this time.

Gun hunters will once again have 17 days — Nov. 8-23 in Zones 1 and 2 Zones 3 and 4 will only have the first 10 days. Although the prospect of a split gun season had been ran up the flagpole by the KDFWR, it will not happen this year.

The most notable changes are in the fall turkey season. According to an arti-

cle by KDFWR staffer Norm Minch in the April edition of Kentucky Fish and Game magazine, more than 13,000 deer and turkey surveys were sent to Kentucky hunters last fall.

The majority of the respondents preferred the fall turkey season in early December as opposed to the pre-Thanksgiving date.

In accordance with the sportsmen's wishes, the fall season will remain Dec. 6 — 10 but a new early "pre-Thanksgiving" season has been inserted, Oct. 25-29.

As a result of the new early turkey season, the youth hunt weekend is moved forward to Oct. 11-12, and the early muzzle-loader season to Oct. 18-19. The commissioners also heard a report on the state's turkey flock, which showed the poult-to-hen ratio at its lowest level since 1997.

It is no coincidence that the statewide turkey harvest fell in 1999 — as the 1997 poults reached the two-year mark. Still, the commissioners decided to have not one, but two five-day fall turkey seasons where hens and poults are legal game. Go figure.

Another change that came flying out of left field was an additional youth weekend on Dec. 27-28. This was proposed by the KDFWR to enable youngsters under 16-years-old to use the new gun or hunting equipment they just received

for Christmas for deer or small game free of charge for one weekend.

While this seems to be a good idea in terms of promoting youth hunting, the proposal was vehemently opposed by sportsmen's groups across the Commonwealth who feared further erosion of the small game seasons. Although the groups

were well represented and plead their case forcefully before the Wildlife Commission, the measure passed.

In other changes, the late muzzle-loader season will be Dec. 13-19. Crossbow season for deer will run the first 10 days of December, overlapping the late turkey season. Caldwell County moves from a Zone 1 county to Zone 2. Bonus archery tags for deer have been eliminated in favor of general bonus tags for use with gun or bow.

The season for trapping or hunting furbearers has been extended until the end of February. The definition of "antlered deer" has been changed to include racks that are still in velvet. And, finally, applications for quota hunts on state-run WMA's will be handled this year by a real, live person via Bass Pro Shops.

On the legislative front, SB 112 — restricting the importation of captive deer and elk to prevent the spread of CWD — appears to be stalled in the House Committee on Agriculture and Small Business. It is probably dead for this session.

A horrible bill that would have effectively ended deer hunting in Kentucky was filed by some misguided individuals in response to SB 112, but went absolutely nowhere. HB 343, which would put some sharp teeth into the penalties for trespassing, is moving through a committee and has a chance to become law.

For all the waterfowlers out there who want to do something positive for the resource, there will be meeting on Monday at the Marshall County Extension Office to organize a Delta Waterfowl Chapter for western Kentucky.

Founded in 1911, Delta Waterfowl's mission is to enhance waterfowl populations while securing a future for waterfowl hunting. The extension office is located on the southwest corner of the intersection of the Hwy. 641 bypass and Hwy. 58 near Benton — just before the junction with the Purchase Parkway. The meeting starts at 7 p.m.

So there you have it, boys and girls — a bumper crop of changes coming down the pike from Frankfort. Be sure to consult the newest hunting and fishing guides for up to date information. They even have a "red letter" edition so you can spot the changes immediately.

Also, hunting licenses expired at the end of February. Be sure to get the new 2003-04 license before going out in the field. If you plan to hunt deer, waterfowl, doves or turkeys in both spring and fall and fish a little on the side, then the 2003-04 sportsman's license is a steal at \$80!

See, not all changes are bad.

Public meeting will discuss agreement for fish license

Area anglers are encouraged to attend a public meeting in Murray regarding the possibility of creating a new reciprocal fishing license agreement between Kentucky and Tennessee on Kentucky Lake.

The meeting is scheduled at 7 p.m. on March 17 at the Calloway County Public Library. The meeting will last approximately one hour.

Personnel from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will discuss the terms of a possible reciprocal fishing zone and will be available to take

comments from anglers.

"We want to gauge public sentiment on the idea of creating a new reciprocal fishing agreement before we bring the issue before the agency's commission for consideration," said KDFWR Fisheries Director Benji Kinman. "We hope anglers will come to the meeting and give us their opinion."

Up until April 19, 1991, Kentucky and Tennessee honored the other state's fishing license in the portion of the lake between the Hwy. 68/80 bridge at Egner Ferry to the Hwy. 79 bridge at Paris Landing. The agreement was dissolved due to a difference in fish-

eries management strategies between the two states.

Most of the fishing regulations on Kentucky Lake in Kentucky and Tennessee are nearly the same. A new boundary has been discussed with the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

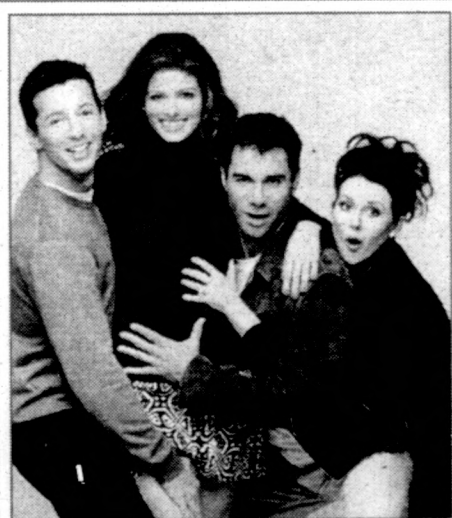

A: In a case of routine rescheduling, ABC's updated "Nancy Drew," which saw the character entering college, finally aired on Dec. 15, where it tanked, coming in fourth in its time period.

Q: Can you tell me why Lorraine Toussaint was killed off on "Crossing Jordan"? —S. Booth, West Palm Beach, Fla.

A: The NBC publicist for the

show reports that this surprise plot twist was built into the role when Toussaint signed on last fall for the limited story arc.

It was intended as a surprise to viewers, and it appears to have done the trick.

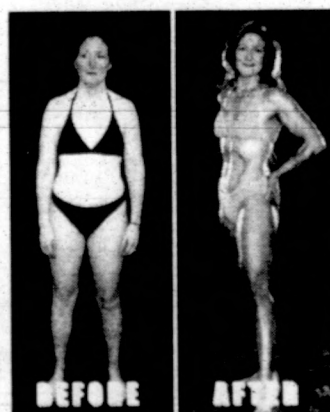

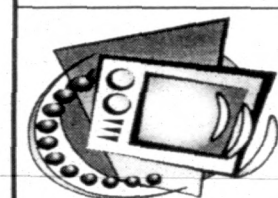
