Tekel, Thou Art Weighed In The Scales--Found Wanting

THIRD SERMON FROM THE SAME CHAPTER BY EVANGELIST CULPEPPER FRIDAY NIGHT--GREAT CROWD PRESENT AND MANY CAME HOME TO JESUS--BIG DAY ANTICIPATED FOR THE SUNDAY MEETINGS.

Friday night made another high water mark at the great Culpepper revival at the auditorium. The largest crowd of the week was present, filling the big auditorium. Mr. John U. Robinson directed the stirring song and praise services and rendered an impressive solo. Dr. J. W. Blackard offered a fervent prayer for the success of the revival.

He said that a splendid service was held at the noon hour at the I. C. shops and another service is to be held Monday at 12:30.

Before beginning his sermon, Evangelist Culpepper said:

Listen: Next Sunday I want you to go to Sunday school somewhere. The pastors haven't asked me to say this. If you are a Baptist, go to the Baptist; if you are a Presbyterian, go to the Presbyterian; if you are an Episcopalian, go there; wherever you ought to go, go there. You will find good teachers every place, and the best thing you can do Sunday morning is to get up--that's the first thing to do Sunday morning, get up--then kneel down and say your prayers; get up, go eat, have a good breakfast, have a smile on your face, put a flower in the buttonhole of your coat. Let your mail alone, let your business alone. Shut up your doors Sunday morning and keep them shut until Monday morning. Sunday morning go hear your pastor preach at 11 o'clock. Come and hear me preach at 3 o'clock; hear me or your pastor preach Sunday night. If it will not be the happiest day you ever spent, I will pay the damages. Don't go to your bank; don't go to your drug store, except for medicine.

In Johnson City, Tenn., they have about ten drug stores, maybe more. You can't buy anything in that city on Sunday, even at a drug store, except medicine; and you can't buy medicine at but one drug store in that town on Sunday. The druggists have gone into an agreement; one drug store keeps a prescription clerk there two hours Sunday morning, two hours Sunday afternoon; the other druggists shut up tight. The next Sunday another druggist does it, and so on, giving the druggists and their employees a day of rest.

Brethren, let's have a real Sabbath. Next Sunday go to Sunday school, go to church; do your best to make a real Sabbath in your town and county. You might bring an old circus to this town, let its stay as long as I stayed, and they would break down. The people would say, "I have heard those clowns, I have seen those women act, I have looked at those animals." I have been here two weeks, and have the best crowd tonight I have had at all. Sunday night the crowd will be larger. The longer the meeting runs the bigger the crowd will be. A man told Brother Nance (you know I said last night, "Don't call me Nance.") Well, I did not mean any reflection on Brother Nance--he told me when I went to Paducah a man 'old him "Culpepper won't have any crowd." But God bless you, we had then from the Baptist church, the Presbyterian church, the Christian church, and some from the Catholic church. But I have not found a paper that will compare with The Fulton Daily Leader--a paper that is unsectarian. Stand for that paper! Subscribe for that paper! That paper is a real friend to every church in this town.

Manager Williams and Editor Simmons, and others on the staff, have been to see me and talked with me. Here is a paper that has turned the others down. That paper is doing all it can to help this revival. I am ashamed of some of you church people. You haven't done a thing toward helping this revival. Some papers stand for the meeting and some don't. Some papers stand for the meeting and some lie for it. I want to send copies of that paper wherever I am going and let them see just what a real live paper can do. I want you Methodists to pay 10 cents for them and send them out over the world and let people see what one live "crackerjack" paper in the town of Fulton can do.

Text recorded in Daniel v, 27.

I am back to the same chapter for the third sermon. I am going to take just one word for my text--"Tekel," Daniel v, 27, "Thou art weighed in the scales and found wanting." Babylon, that great and mighty city, as spoken of in holy writ and holy history. It is almost impossible to tell who built that city. Some say Semiramis did, but the Bible teaches us Nebuchadnezzar did. I know these cities were not built by God. They were built by men, and certain characteristics of the men who did it crops out. Look at Memphis; it qualifies Shelby county; Paducah, it qualifies McCracken county; look at New York, it qualifies America; London, England. When you think of London you think of England; when you think of New York, you think of America. Take the city--everybody is there. They are there from the smaller towns. The city is constituted of the best and the worst people on earth. In Memphis there are some of the meanest people on earth, and there are men and women there that would lay them down and die before they would dishonor themselves. There are people in Memphis that would cut your throat for a quarter. Memphis is no better than the average city. There are two crowds of people in Memphis, church folk, and dishonest folk. I have had occasion to pass in and out of Memphis all times of the day and night, from 12 o'clock until 2. There is a different crowd in the night. One-half of the world don't know what is going on at night. The average young man when he goes to the city will not stand the temptations of the city. Babylon, that wicked ancient city, and that great feast that I described a few night ago, when suddenly a hand appeared and wrote upon the wall, and some who were in touch with God called for Daniel to interpret the writing. One word, "Tekel," "Thou art weighed in the balance and found wanting." There are two kinds of scales, accurate and adjusting. Some merchants have two pairs of scales, buying scales and selling scales. I wanted to weigh once and the man said, "Get on the selling scales, don't get on the buying scales." I found out he had two pairs of scales. God pity the merchant that has two yard sticks. God pity the butcher that has scales that he can so handle as to make you think you are getting two pounds of meat when you are only getting a half pound of meat and a pound of bone. I think when the butcher gets to hell, if he goes there, the devil will feed

Fine Paper By Fulton Man

WILL APPLY AS WELL HERE

The following paper, prepared by Division Gardeners, Member of Fulton and read by him today before the Fine Paper Association of Jackson, Tenn., is very interesting and sets forth what should be done in our own gardens. It is a beautiful paper and should be read by all. Mr. Harrison, a member of the association, and the paper is being considered for publication in the Illinois Gardeners' Journal.

A sense of civic improvement is everywhere in the country. The American people are beginning to pay more attention to the beautiful things of life. The recreation and rest, both physical and mental, that come to one who is in close touch with nature can only be appreciated by those who have the opportunity to do so. A garden is a place where man in his own hand has desired to bestow on himself and his family a place of beauty and refinement. The garden of Eden was a garden, and the Garden of Eden was a garden. Adam, assisted by Eve, was the first gardener, and from then on, the garden has been a part of human life. The mission of the gardener is one of beauty and refinement. Therefore we naturally turn to the woman for support in our work. Flowers have an elevating and ennobling influence on character. Teach your daughter to love and care for flowers and she will be a lady, associating with the purest of earth's people. The lilies and roses will have their influence. Teach your son to spend more of his time in the front yard with the flowers, and less of it in back alleys, and he will be more of a gentleman.

With the planting of fruits and flowers come better kept premises, cleaner homes and more sanitation every day. Back lots and alleys littered with tin cans and all kinds of refuse, instead of being an harboring place for mosquitoes, flies and fever germs, can be made as beautiful as a city park. I wonder if you really know what women can do if they will only work! Fifteen years ago railway landscape gardening was almost unheard of in this country. Today almost every railroad in the United States has a gardener. All this movement started by one woman asking permission to plant a few flower seed on the railroad's right-of-way to screen an unsightly building. When landscape gardening is mentioned to most of you, you think of the large city parks and magnificent country estates of the millionaire, which require a real architect to lay them out and the service of a skilled gardener to maintain them; thus you decide they are too expensive for you. This is a mistaken idea. A small place can be made artistic and beautiful and the cost will be very low. That is the great advantage of the art of gardening. Very few of us are able to have the opportunity to visit the galleries of paintings and sculpture, but the poorest washer-woman, who would not know a Rembrandt from a colored poster in the Sunday paper, can grow a red geranium in her window and appreciate its beauty and fragrance the same as the wealthy man will enjoy his million dollar garden.

I am going to give you a few suggestions and figures, and you can easily see that landscape beauty is within the reach of everyone in this town. The average city lot, usually 30x100 feet, for a very small sum can have a carpet of grass, a few well chosen flowers and shrubs properly grouped, and a very pleasing effect produced. Properly speaking, there are only two kinds of landscape gardening, the formal and the natural. Naturalness is gained by open lawns, curved lines, grouped trees, use of shrubs and the union of the house with the grounds. Of course we have no iron-bound rules to work by--every place is a separate problem and the entire plan must harmonize. In other words, you must make your home and grounds "a picture." The house should be the central idea and should be framed by trees and shrubs. To secure this, the front of the lawn must be left open; scattered planting obstructs the view, breaks up the lawn and makes it appear smaller, while the open lawn makes the grounds appear larger and gives the house a better setting. With beautiful trees in the background, all busy back fences and outbuildings softened by flowering shrubs, and a few graceful shrubs near the base of the house, we have a beautiful and attractive picture. The important point to remember in the planting of shrubs is that there should be no straight lines. The general outline of the planting around the borders should be undulating, and made up of a series of graceful curves. Some of the best shrubs for this planting are spirea, hawberry, hydrangea, weigela, forsythia and lilac. These, combined with our garden of Southern flowers, the rose, and a few of the choicest specimens from grandmother's old-fashioned garden, will reproduce the gardener's ideal plan. A lot of the dimensions given above can be planted with a selection of these shrubs, together with such ornamental trees as catalpa, bungei and weeping mulberries, for approximately \$25, a very small sum when you consider the beauty and blooms you will have from March until frost.

The next problem that confronts civic improvement leagues is the planting of street shade trees. To produce the best effect there should be a line of trees on each side of the street uniformly spaced and all of the same variety. Where each property owner plants his individual selection of trees you get an effect that reminds me of a woman trying to wear a half-dozen colors at one time. Just a few of the best trees are ash, American elm, maple, oak and Kentucky coffee tree.

Now, just a few words in reference to city parks. These have been likened to the lungs, which help to purify the air and afford a breathing place for city dwellers. But their most important service is that of mental rest and sanitation. For this purpose there is nothing better than rural scenery, quiet and clear air. Keep your parks in the natural state. The quiet woodland, the cool, growing grass and budding flowers have a restful, soothing influence on everyone.

But, finally, it does not matter whether we have in mind a great park, a small city lot, a large estate or a modest dooryard, we must go about our work with an artistic spirit if we want proper results. Two trees, six shrubs, a scrap of lawn and a dash of bright flowers may form either a picture of beauty or a disarray of forms and color.

Judge Benton Renders Decision in Local Option Case.

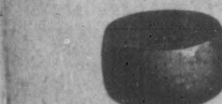

"Johnson received \$30,000, and when I defend my title I am going to get the same amount of money he did," Willard said. The champion handed Charles Cutler, the wrestler, who first attempted to develop him as a heavyweight boxer, a check for \$1,250 as compensation for the Chicagoan's services. Cutler obtained a judgment against Willard in Milwaukee for \$2,500, but when they met Thursday a compromise was reached, and Cutler cut the judgment in half.

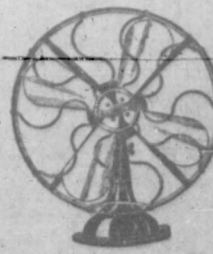

The good roads campaign is now on and every citizen of the county should see that he is informed and understands what he is voting for on May 22. The opportunity will be given, so that none may make a mistake.

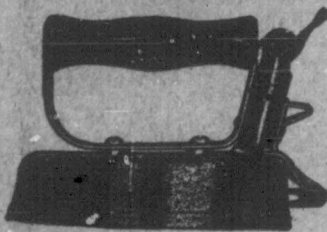

him on red-hot bones. And I want to tell you, there is a woman in town as mean as the butcher, and that is the old boarding house mistress that feeds you on tough beef as long as she can get it on credit, and when she can get credit no farther, she talks about that butcher's old tough beef and goes to another butcher. I think she ought to be fed on red-hot bones, too. The most accurate scales in the world are in Paris, France. Listen! I was in New Orleans and went out to the mint. I saw a wonderful pair of scales. Those scales are so accurate they took two pieces of paper and put them on the scales and they weighed just the same. The man took a piece of paper and made a pencil mark on one piece of paper and the little indicator dropped. The pencil mark weighs something. Then he pinched off a little piece of his mustache and put that on the scales, and the little indicator dropped. I thought, How consoling to the young dude who is trying to sprout his first mustache; they really weigh something. They showed me a pair of scales that weighed the money. One pair of scales showed 25 cents short. They searched every employee, every man and every woman. They swept the floor, took up the rug, took out the chairs—couldn't find that quarter. Those little scales said one quarter was gone; there had not been returned as much as had gone out. Finally one said, "Let's look in the stove." The little coin was in a crack in the bottom of the stove, and they couldn't find it. But the little scales kept saying, "One piece gone. Now, listen! Angels must be very accurate in keeping tab on us. When I was a boy they told me an angel stood on my left shoulder and one on my right shoulder. They said the angel on the left side took down all the bad deeds, and the one on the right shoulder took down all the good deeds. There is a record kept in heaven of every transgression. I have often wondered which angel I kept the busiest, the angel with the bad record or the angel with the good record. The angels have scales and the Bible says they weigh our deeds; they weigh our thoughts, weigh our imaginations, and last, weigh our motives. Young man, they are keeping tab on you, they are keeping tab on me. Oh, God, help us to weigh just what we should. The average man, the average woman, believes in God. There is one scale that many people are weighing on—the scale of "comparative excellence."

Listen, I never heard a man say, "I know a man who is worth just \$100,000 and will not try to get any more." I don't care who you are, you strive for every dollar you can get. Comparing yourselves with the excellence of others. You know a man that has more money than you. You are never satisfied. A great many people look around and say something like this: "I am not as bad as Mr. Jones." I know a man that gets drunk; I just take an occasional drink. I know a young man that swears; I never, except when I get angry. I know a young man that is very vile and impure; I am never vile and impure except when I am away from Fulton. So many people weigh in the scales of comparative excellence. Compare yourselves with others. There is another pair of scales—the scales of personal opinion. Hear me! I feel I have a message for Fulton this Friday night, but oh, God, give me power, give me force, give me the brains of this great audience tonight. I am pleading that some of our prayers may be answered at this service. The scales of personal opinion. You go to the bank and they say your note is so-and-so; but you say, It is my opinion that it is not that much. It don't count there. There is the record, there is a signed note. You've got to give in the evidence, and your personal opinion counts nothing. Listen, you can't go to the court and say, "Judge, it is my personal opinion." The judge will say, "I care nothing for your personal opinion. I want evidence." Then, listen! If you can't weigh in the scale of personal opinion on the farm, in the bank, in the court, at your own fireside, your personal opinion counts for nothing here. You sit down there in the store and don't come to the afternoon service. Hear me! Some man will say, "It is my personal opinion that God would not condemn a fellow for not going to church. I have got to make a living." I have heard many a man say God is too good to do that. You can't spend your personal opinion; it don't go anywhere. Why should you try to thrust it in the face of God?

tagonistic scales are damning more men than a few. A man came to me and said: "I have heard your logic. I am going to give my heart to God as soon as I save up \$10,000." I said, "How long will it take you to save \$10,000?" He said, "Ten years. I am a livery man. I clear a thousand dollars every year on my business." I said, "Sit down. Suppose you were God and God were you, and you would keep postponing and postponing for ten years, and when the ten years were gone and you had everything comfortable and said, 'I will join the church now and serve God.' I said, 'What would you do?'" He said, "Well, preacher, you ask me a plain question. I tell you, I don't believe I would accept him." I said, "Don't you wait ten years until you get that ten thousand dollars." That man was in my room; he took my hand and said: "Preacher, when you finish your sermon tonight I will give you my hand." I will not weigh in the scales of antagonistic claims. Don't you let anything come between you and Jesus Christ. At Jacksonville, Fla., I was walking up the railroad tracks one day and there were about twenty little negroes in a flat car dancing.

One little fellow was playing the fiddle. Now you talk about those shining, black-legged boys not dancing! I never saw anybody that could beat them. I went up to a big, fashionable church and one young lady said she liked dancing, she thought it was intelligent. I said if you want to see some dancing at home, you ought to see the negroes dance. Society claims, financial claims. I want you to hear me! A man that sells goods on Sunday is a murderer and a suicide, and I am going to prove it. God says, "Thou shalt not kill." He said, "Well, do you know, I have sinned against the Holy Ghost." I said, "What do you mean?" He said, "Well, if you will never use my name, here is the story: I had a sweet wife, but she caught me in an act of infidelity that crushed her heart. The rubies left her cheek, the luster left her eye. I thought, How can I win back my wife's confidence. I did love her! I thought and thought how I could do to get by with my wife. 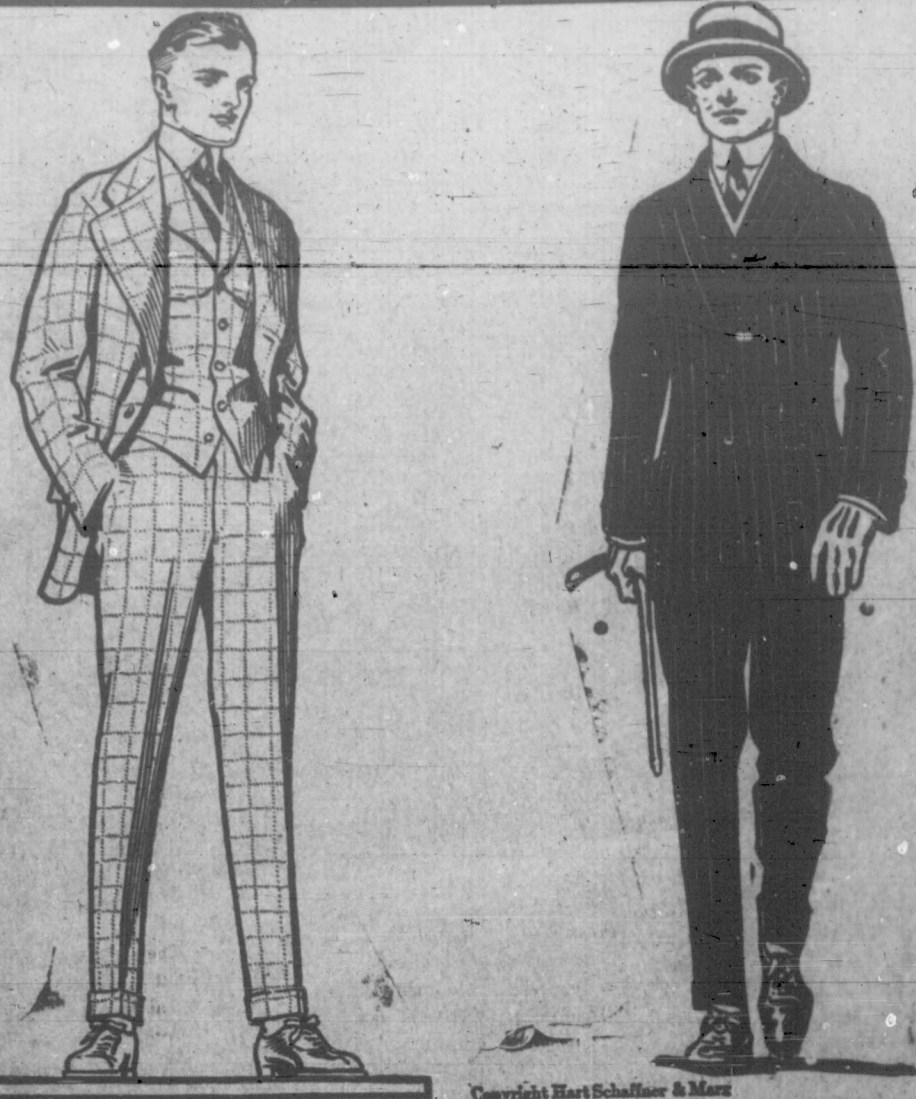

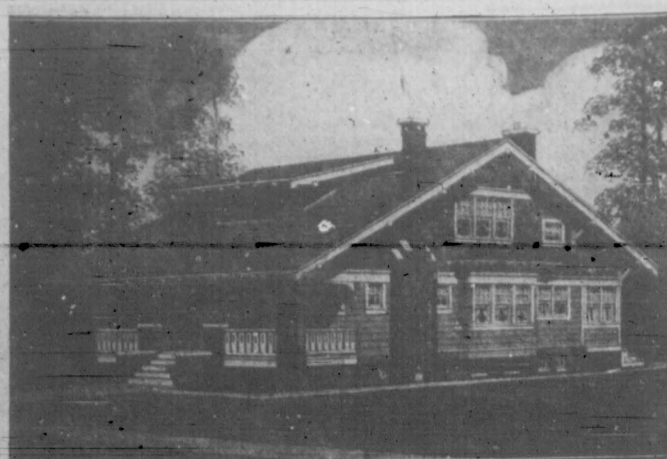

GEORGE SLAUGHTER GETS SEVEN YEARS

Former Circuit Court Clerk of Marshall County Convicted.

Paducah, Ky., April 24.—After a deliberation of one hour and 15 minutes, Friday afternoon the jury in the case of George Slaughter, charged with the burning of the Marshall county courthouse on the night of Dec. 16, 1914, returned a verdict of guilty, fixing his punishment at from seven years to seven years and one month in the state penitentiary. The sentence was a minimum one, as the limit for such an offense is 21 years.

"Yes, it is pretty tough, but there is still hope," was the statement of George Slaughter after the verdict of the jury had been returned.

Slaughter's counsel will probably file a motion for a new trial immediately, having stated that there were numerous grounds upon which such an appeal could be made.
