Serving in the Senate

Tennessee Republican among tops in well-off Senate

 WASHINGTON (AP) — New Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist is among the wealthiest in a Senate full of millionaires, according to financial disclosure forms released Friday.

The Tennessee Republican, a former Nashville heart-lung transplant surgeon whose family founded HCA — The Healthcare Company, one of the nation's largest for-profit hospital chains, reported blind trusts in the \$6.5 million to \$31 million range.

He also said, in the forms required of all legislators every year, that his wife Karyn and three sons each had blind trusts that earned more than \$1 million apiece.

Frist says he hasn't been actively involved in his family's business since he was first elected to the Senate in 1994.

Frist is among many in the Senate who are likely to reap benefits this year from the just-passed \$350 billion tax cuts that reduce the maximum tax rate on both dividends and capital gains to 15 percent, down from 38.6 percent for dividends and 20 percent for capital gains.

In contrast, Senate Democratic leader Tom Daschle of South Dakota, who has spent most of his life in politics, reported relatively modest holdings.

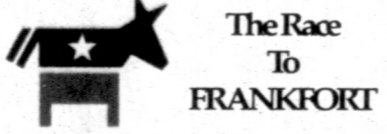

Bunning reported getting reimbursed by the National Baseball Hall of Fame for one trip worth \$1,200 to Cooperstown, N.Y. Bunning is a Hall of Famer who pitched a perfect game in 1964 for the Philadelphia Phillies.

State Democrats rally here

 Preparing for the upcoming November race, Democratic candidates were encouraging party members to support their ticket last night at the 2003 West Kentucky Campaign Kickoff Rally and Dinner, hosted by the Calloway County Democrats.



"We are the party that Kentucky believes in," gubernatorial candidate Ben Chandler told the crowd at the Curris Center ballroom. "We are the party of Kentucky's future. Let's make sure that the Republicans get that message loud and clear."

"We're serious about keeping control of the governor's office," Former University of Kentucky basketball coach Joe B. Hall introduced Chandler, who will face GOP candidate Ernie Fletcher for the governor's office, and complemented the Democratic ticket. The Kentucky icon related the party to sports, saying "Ladies and gentlemen, fellow Democrats, I never saw, in all my years of leading Kentucky basketball, a better team."

Democratic candidates for commissioner of agriculture [Alice Baesler], secretary of state [Russ Maple], state auditor [Crit Luallen] and attorney general [Greg Stumbo] also spoke.

The wife of former Congressman Scotty Baesler, Alice Baesler said that if elected, she plans to help farmers find markets for their products, invest in agriculture infrastructure such as Kentucky beef processing plants and work for food safety.

Baesler said she has the experience to make those changes, and even made a humorous turn of phrase regarding her opponent in November, Richie Farmer, the former UK basketball standout.

"I am the real farmer, and I want to be your agriculture commissioner," she said.

"I'm honored to be a part of this great team," Maple said. He added that Republicans need to be challenged. "We have the temper, we have the materials and we have the ammunition to challenge them and to beat them. I know we can do that."

Luallen said she was encouraged about the Democratic ticket, especially because two women join the candidate ranks. "I think that may help attract women to come out and vote," she said before the candidate speeches began.

"I'm personally very pleased with the kind of reception I've gotten in Calloway County. I won here by a good margin."

In introducing Luallen, master of ceremonies Willie Coursey, assistant to Speaker-of-the-House Jody Richards, pointed out her qualifications for the auditor position.

"Luallen ... is arguably the most capable and experienced candidate this year," he said.

"You need somebody in that office who's looking out for your dollar, to be sure that we're not only finding ways to [counter] abuse after it happens, but that we're looking for it before it happens," Luallen said during her speech.

Stumbo, a member of Kentucky's House of Representatives, said he made a commitment to western Kentucky that he and his wife, Mary Karen, would purchase a residence and develop an attorney general branch office in the area.

"We're not going to be those kinds of politicians that come down here every four years and ask for your vote and don't come back," he said.

The attorney general candidate

from Prestonsburg said he wants to fight drug problems in Kentucky and advocates protection of vulnerable citizens. Stumbo added that Democrats should not be afraid of differences within the party.

"We need to re-energize, refocus and remember ... we march in a broad front."

Richards and Marshall County Judge Executive Mike Miller both offered short speeches. Recognized guests of the evening included Rep. Fred Nesler, D-Mayfield; Rep. Buddy Buckingham, D-Murray; Sen. Joey Pendleton, D-Hopkinsville; State Auditor Ed Hatchett and Sen. Bob Jackson, D-Murray. Organizers of the event, Dottie Lyons and Kathy Jo Stubblefield, received Outstanding Citizenship Awards for their commitments to education and citizenship.

Patton's insurance company asks if it's liable to his former mistress

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Gov. Paul Patton's personal insurance company has gone to court in an attempt to avoid paying the bill if the governor winds up owing damages to his former mistress.

The company is Encompass Insurance Co., through which Patton bought homeowner's coverage. Encompass has asked the Franklin County Circuit Court for a "declaratory judgment" spelling out its stake in the legal case between Patton and Tina Conner.

The company's complaint asks the court for a judgment "declaring that there exists no obligation on the part of Encompass under the policies to provide any indemnification or defense for the claims made by Conner," court documents show.

Patton has said he had an affair with Conner, who owned a nursing home in Clinton, Ky., and was his political contact in Hickman County in far western Kentucky.

Conner claims to have gotten favors from the administration during their sexual affair. She also claims Patton used his power to retaliate against her after the affair ended.

Patton has denied he ever abused his office.

Conner filed suit against Patton charging sexual harassment and other alleged offenses. The circuit court dismissed all the charges but one — an allegation of outrageous conduct.

Patton has requested that Encompass pay for his defense and damages, if any, in the Conner suit, according to the court record.

"Encompass has offered to provide Patton a defense, under a reser-

vation of rights to deny coverage," the complaint says.

Patton's policy included liability coverage for personal injury, bodily injury and property damage.

The company is arguing that Patton's alleged actions, even if true, did not meet those definitions.

"Additionally, if true, the conduct of Patton does not fall within the coverage under the policies," the complaint says.

Patton's attorney, Sheryl Snyder of Louisville, could not be reached for comment. William Orberon, an attorney for Encompass, said he was uncertain whether Patton was still being covered by the insurance company.

\$100,001-\$250,000; a credit union account of \$50,001-\$100,000 and a Fidelity investment fund of \$50,001-\$100,000. He also earned interest and dividend profits from banks and mutual fund accounts in the \$10,000-\$25,000 range.

Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, D-N.Y., received more than \$1.15 million as partial payment for her memoirs. But that sum was overshadowed by the \$9.5 million that her husband, former President Bill Clinton earned making speeches around the world for as much as \$400,000 a speech.

The Clintons still owe somewhere between \$1.7 million to \$7 million in legal fees, stemming largely from past White House investigations.

Sen. Elizabeth Dole, R-Kan., another senator with a famous spouse, former Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, asked for an extension.

Daschle's deputy, Democratic whip Harry Reid, D-Nev., listed 160 acres in Bullhead City, Ariz., worth \$500,000 to \$1 million and Nevada land holdings and mining claims

worth \$786,000 to \$1.675 million. His investments from municipal bonds and other sources, earned him \$29,116-\$85,050.

As always among the top millionaires in the Senate was Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., who has a family trust fund — worth \$8 million to \$45 million — set up in 1936 when he was four years old by his late father Joseph P. Kennedy.

He also has two blind trusts in his name valued at \$1,001,001 to \$5,015,000 and reported unearned income of \$2 million to \$13 million from family and blind trusts.

Democratic presidential candidate Bob Graham said he and his wife have assets worth between \$7.7 million and \$31.6 million.

The Florida senator is director of the Graham Companies, a business established with his brothers to turn the family's farm land into the suburb of Miami Lakes.

The forms do not list the independent assets and earnings of spouses.

Sen. John Kerry of Massachusetts, a Democratic presidential contender, reported no unearned income but his wife Teresa Heinz Kerry, heir to the Heinz food

fortune, is estimated to be worth more than \$500 million.

Kerry lists a Dutch painting owned jointly with his wife worth \$250,000-\$500,000.

The second-ranked Senate Republican, Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, also reported that his wife, Labor Secretary Elaine Chao, was the major breadwinner. She listed a Vanguard 500 Index fund worth \$500,000-\$1 million, another fund worth \$100,000-\$250,000 and a house worth \$500,000-\$1 million that the couple rents for \$5,000-\$15,000.

Among other disclosures:

- Sen. Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn., reported that his wife Hadassah earned nearly \$33,000 from royalties and signing agreements for their book on his 2000 vice presidential campaign. She also earned \$94,000 in fees for eight speeches, all to various Jewish non-profit organizations.
- Sen. Chris Dodd, D-Conn., paid off the original \$15,001-\$50,000 mortgage on a cottage in Ireland.
- Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, took in \$18,009 from his side job as a songwriter. Hatch has written dozens of religious hymns and patriotic soft-rock ballads.
- Sen. John Edwards, D.N.C.,

another presidential candidate, asked for an extension in filing his forms. A former trial lawyer, Edwards last year reported a blind trust worth \$5 million-\$25 million and other accounts in the \$2.3 million-\$8.6 million range.

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., whose 45 years in the Senate is longer than anyone else in the chamber, filed a simple two-age form stating he owns no stocks, bonds or investment properties.

His net worth was under \$700,000.

All 535 members of Congress are required to submit financial disclosure forms every year that show outside sources of income, assets, liabilities, travel paid by private interests and speech honoraria.

By law, all honoraria for speeches must be donated to charity. In general, income from activities other than investments was limited to \$23,205 last year.

In 2002 senators, and their House colleagues, received a salary of \$150,000, a figure that rose to \$154,700 this year. The House and Senate majority and minority leaders were paid \$166,700 last year and are getting \$171,900 this year.

House financial disclosure reports come out Monday.

week. "[Pella has hired] all types of positions, from office personnel to people who actually work out on the lines. Most of them have been production positions."

Applications for employment at Pella are still being accepted through Murray's Career Discovery Center. According to CDC Director Sandra Parks, a recent advertisement for third shift help at the plant has caused the CDC to step up its testing schedule this month.

"We continue to have a steady stream of people filling out applications and taking the tests," she said. "We don't actually have a count, but the flow has been steady since the beginning."

Krafka Harkema said Pella's hiring practices depend largely on how much product a facility is producing, meaning Murray's rapid employee growth is as much a tribute to the company's customers as anything else.

"Obviously, there's a lot of time and effort that goes into starting a new facility," she said. "All in all, things have gone very well."

Mark Manning, president of the

Murray-Calloway County Economic Development Corporation, said Pella is surpassing even his expectations with its rapid growth and development.

"We had just assumed we were just getting a branch location of a Pella windows plant," Manning said. "By the grace of God and the support of the community, we were able to get, what I consider, to be the future of the company."

Manning said the Impervia line will not only give the Murray facility a unique designation in the Pella landscape, but could also help to draw other investors and businessmen to the west Kentucky area.

"This will be a long-term coup for Murray that actually has other long-term implications," he said. "Murray will pretty much be the place people go to learn about advance fiberglass materials."

Both Krafka Harkema and Manning cite Pella's initial response from the local community as one of the keys to the company's success, and Manning said keeping that relationship in place will be beneficial to both the employer and the

Campaign for smoking ban loses steam in Scott County

GEORGETOWN, Ky. (AP) — The campaign for a smoking ban in restaurants has come to a halt after learning that the Scott County Board of Health does not have authority to vote on a proposed ordinance.

That decision would have to be made by the three-county WEDCO District Health Department, which oversees Scott, Harrison and Nicholas counties.

According to state regulations that went into effect last year, a county health board member would have to make a motion recommending that the district board consider a ban on smoking. If there is support from other county board members, the recommendation could be sent to the WEDCO board.

The WEDCO board does not meet until Sept. 22.

WEDCO members would have to consider a ban at two future meetings, which means a vote wouldn't come until spring of 2004, said the WEDCO executive director, Dr. Julie McKee.

"It kind of throws cold water in your face," said Jerry Richardson, who is leading the push to ban smoking in restaurants.

Richardson's group's hopes for a city ban were dashed at a June 5 city council meeting when members voted 6-2 against a motion to draft an ordinance.

After the meeting, Richardson said his group would take its case to the health board and ask for a countywide ban.

Last month, the Scott health board drafted a statement that recognized the dangerous effects of secondhand smoke and supported efforts to eliminate it.

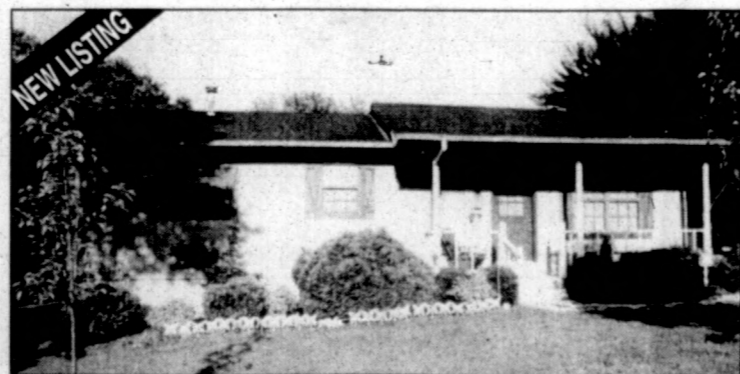

Does God Take Sides?

As the Civil War stretched over his first term of office, Abraham Lincoln had cause for pondering the role of religion in the conflict. In his second inaugural address, a

month before he was slain, Lincoln said in public what he had been saying to visiting clergymen for some time:

"Both (sides) read the same Bible, and pray to the same God; and each invokes His aid against the other.... The prayers of both could not be answered, that of neither has

been answered fully. The Almighty has His own purposes."

That ambivalence about God's role in the awful internecine warfare in our country came to mind upon reading "Doctor Quintard, Chaplain C.S.A. and Second Bishop of Tennessee: The Memoir and Civil War Diary of Charles Todd Quintard" (edited by Sam Davis Elliott, LSU Press, 2003).

Born in Connecticut and educated in New York City, after a year of practicing medicine in New York he moved in 1848 to Georgia, met and married the daughter of a Georgia industrialist, and then moved in 1851 to teach at the Medical College of Memphis.

Memphis was the home and headquarters of the first Episcopal Bishop of Tennessee, James Herve Otey, who led Quintard into the priesthood. When war came in 1861, Quintard had two small churches in Nashville. There, he was also asked to serve as chaplain to a militia group, the Rock City Guard.

As late as November 1860, he opposed secession and war. Then came Fort Sumter and Tennessee left the Union (or tried to), and Quintard followed the men of the militia into service in the First Tennessee Regiment as chaplain.

Over the next four years, the Rev. Mr. Quintard would preach, perform worship services, and serve as doctor and surgeon on many of the great battlefields of the War. He was in Virginia after First Manassas, saw the fight between the Monitor and the Virginia, moved to the western front and was at Perryville, Murfreesboro, and Chickamauga, and followed the army into Tennessee on Hood's ill-fated "invasion" and Franklin and Nashville, before spending the final weeks of the War in Georgia. He also found time, with Bishop Otey ill and then dying in 1863, to act as the unelected Bishop of Tennessee, a post to which he officially rose

only after the War ended.

Prior to the Civil War, Louisiana Bishop Leonidas Polk [a West Point graduate who rose rapidly to be a Confederate corps general] had led his fellow-bishops in envisioning and chartering an Episcopal college, the University of the South. War came too soon for the campus to be built and instruction begun, but a cornerstone had been laid on a forested mountaintop over which both rebel and Union armies traipsed on their way to Chattanooga. [The Yankees blew the rock into gravel when they passed through.]

Once the War was over, that mountaintop and the newly built University of the South at Sewanee would be a major center for some of the leading Civil War officers: Shoup, Gargas, Sevier, Fairbanks, Kirby Smith, and others, Quintard primary among them. Robert E. Lee was invited to head the college, but elected to stay in his Washington College presidency in Virginia. Bishop Quintard became an able agent of American reconciliation within the divided Episcopal Church and then in secular circles.

The division of the Episcopal Church came late. The Baptists, the Methodists, and the Presbyterians had officially separated some time before secession and war came along. Efforts by Otey and other bishops to keep the church united across sectional and political lines had fumbled and then failed.

An argument could be made that religion is a cultural phenomenon and that the "both sides" Lincoln saw "praying to the same God" merely reflected the way in which religion is co-opted in the service of patriotism. We have seen something of that relationship recently in the Iraq War, with both advocates and opponent of the engagement citing religious grounds and religious authorities for their positions.

But an argument could also be made that religion follows people more than it accedes to cultural demands. Quintard did not believe the South or Tennessee were right in seceding, but when they did, he followed his men into service, not because their cause was holy, but because he knew [and confirmed very quickly] that their souls and their bodies would need to be ministered to.

He dressed their wounds, heard their prayers, baptized them, buried them, wed them, and consoled them, because he knew that God knows no sides and that God's love and mercy for His creation is carried through his creatures to their fellow creatures.

Endorsements: Ya can't live without 'em

WASHINGTON (AP) —

Democrat Dick Gephardt has the backing of 31 House colleagues. John Kerry answers with one senator, 15 House members and a top Hispanic member of the Clinton administration. Joe Lieberman counters with a senator, 11 representatives and the Hispanic lieutenant governor of California.

Sounds a lot like kids collecting baseball cards — without the bubble gum.

Endorsements are a staple of the political campaign, support the candidates herald with great fanfare and cannot do without. A select few are far more valuable, with an AFL-CIO endorsement for a Democrat ranking high, for example.

But for all the trumpeting by the candidates, their advisers are the first to admit that most endorsements don't do much to change the outcome of primaries and caucuses.

"Very few elected officials have the ability to move voters to someone other than themselves," said Steve Elmendorf, a senior adviser to the campaign of Missouri's Gephardt. "This has much more to

do with money and momentum and less to do with getting people to show up at the polls."

The endorsements "kind of validate a candidacy," said Craig Smith, campaign director for Lieberman, a Connecticut senator.

Even those who endorse acknowledge that their backing has a limited effect.

Iowa Attorney General Tom Miller, who is supporting Lieberman, said an endorsement can make some difference "at the margins."

Alex Sanders, a former Senate candidate from South Carolina who supports Kerry, said a politician's endorsement usually means little. "How many votes can Alex Sanders deliver?" Sanders asked. "I would say, probably, one."

Still, that does not deter the candidates from pursuing endorsements, especially in the early states such as Iowa and New Hampshire, or ensuring they have the support of politicians whose backing for another candidate could prove embarrassing.

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., last month announced her support for her predecessor, former Democratic leader Gephardt. If Pelosi had backed anyone else, it would have left the Gephardt camp chagrined.

The endorsement that will boost the spirits of Gephardt, or any of the other nine Democrats, would be the backing of the AFL-CIO. The union will decide in August whether to make an endorsement. In 1983, shortly before the primaries, the AFL-CIO went with the eventual nominee, Walter Mondale, and in 1999, it backed Al Gore, the Democrats' pick in 2000.

Other endorsements to watch for include four-term Iowa Democratic Sen. Tom Harkin and former New Hampshire Gov. Jeanne Shaheen.

Bill Shaheen said his decision to serve as Kerry's state party chairman has not swayed his wife. "I've been trying to get her to endorse for the last three months," Shaheen said. "I can't move her."

In South Carolina, Rep. Jim Clyburn's endorsement could be

crucial. He is the most prominent black politician in a state where almost half the voters in the Democratic primary in early February probably will be minorities.

In the meantime, the candidates will continue to keep a scorecard.

Sen. John Edwards has six House members from his home state of North Carolina as well as Texas Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson. Howard Dean, the former Vermont governor, totals two House members and Vermont's two senators. Sen. Bob Graham of Florida has rounded up some local endorsements from the early primary states.

The candidates also have a slew of state officials and party activists, too many to list.

"My general rule of thumb is that if you get somebody to endorse you, you may have their vote, and if you're lucky, their spouse," said Dayton Duncan, a New Hampshire party activist and author of a book about the state's presidential primary.

The following is an editorial published by The Kentucky Post in Covington, and provided by the Associated Press. This editorial is not to be mistaken as representing a position taken by The Associated Press or the Murray Ledger & Times:

Two months ago, the Kentucky General Assembly walked away from a responsibility and pretended otherwise.

The budget they passed was a sham — a cobbled-together spending plan that shortchanges the present and robs the future.

Meanwhile, the bad tax structure that Frankfort has avoided fixing for decades, a bad economy and now a bad tax cut made in Washington are combining to threaten crucial public services.

The outlook is gloomy in the commonwealth, with everything from layoffs of teachers to evictions from nursing homes looming. Along with Bush's tax cut, the federal government is shifting more of the responsibility to provide services and more of the burden to pay for them to the states. Even with a \$276

million windfall coming to Frankfort from Washington, the state would have to pay more just to stay even with the services it has provided. And staying even isn't the direction Kentucky is headed.

The commonwealth is not the only state mired in budget problems. A survey of a cross-section of 771 state legislators conducted by the Pew Center on the States paints a gloomy picture. Most say their states have been losing ground the last two years, when it comes to the economy and jobs, health care and balancing the state budget. Furthermore, they expect dire budget problems the next two years.

Even education, the top priority among the legislators, is likely to feel the budgetary ax. While Kentucky legis-

lators slog about in this morass, it is to a large degree a morass of their own making.

Our legislators' failure to reform Kentucky's tax code — because they are paralyzed by conflicting special interests, bound up by foolish no-tax pledges or too afraid politically to act — is sinking the commonwealth as certainly as bad economic times and shifting policies in Washington.

Kentucky's leaders have a way out if they can only muster the will to take it. Kentucky's tax code is out of synch with a changing economy. It is riddled with loopholes. It saps poor and moderate-income families. It cries out for reform.

It is the commonwealth's most critical problem. Our elected leaders know it. Failing to address it is failing Kentucky.

Our Readers Write

To The Editor,
Absent in the debate about adding a prescription drug benefit to Medicare are the voices of older Americans. Here is what we at AARP have heard:

For our 400,000 members in Kentucky and 35 million across the nation, this is the most important health policy decision since the enactment of Medicare in 1965. AARP members have lost patience with the political stalemate. They tell us that the cost of meeting their pharmaceutical needs is becoming outrageous — not just for the poor, but for most older and disabled Americans.

AARP members want Congress to keep their election promises and come together — on both sides of the aisle — to enact a benefit this year that is based on some common sense principles:

Universal — the benefit should be available to all on Medicare, not just to some;

Affordable — the out-of-pocket costs of premiums, co-pays, and deductibles, should be attractive enough to provide a genuine incentive for enrollment; and

Continuous — every effort should be made to eliminate gaps in coverage and the benefit should be stable from year to year. Once people qualify and are eligible, their benefits should not stop after their expenses reach a certain point.

Older Americans recognize that Medicare prescription drug coverage is not our country's only priority. They understand that we have to meet other challenges overseas and at home. But they will not settle for a bill that simply replaces the high cost of drugs with the high cost of insurance — including premiums, deductibles and co-pays — that they can't afford. Congress must pass a meaningful prescription drug bill now!

Coalition soldier found dead in lake

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A coalition soldier was found dead in a lake at a military compound near the town of Fallujah Friday, the U.S. military said.

The soldier, whose identity is being withheld pending notification of relatives, had been reported missing since Thursday and had been swimming.

A search was undertaken after fellow soldiers found some of the soldier's belongings and clothing at the edge of the lake.

No other details were immediately available.

Fallujah is a Sunni Muslim stronghold about 30 miles west of Baghdad. It has been the site of sev-

eral attacks against coalition forces by alleged loyalists of the ousted regime of Saddam Hussein.

Also Friday, another soldier was killed and eight others injured when their armored vehicle rolled over in an accident 12 miles south of Iraq's Al Asad Air base, a U.S. military statement said.

"The personnel were traveling in an M113 armored personnel carrier on a mission when they encountered a four-foot drop off on the side of the road that caused the vehicle to throw a track and roll over," the statement said, adding that names were being withheld pending notification of relatives.

Officers put on leave after fatal shooting

MADISONVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A suspect who police said lunged at officers with a knife was fatally shot Friday, and two Madisonville police officers were placed on administrative leave, Kentucky State Police said.

Madisonville Officers Jerry Robards, 41, and Nathan Lutz, 28, were placed on leave Friday, which is standard procedure for the department.

The officers were called to a residence where Dallas Johnson, 37, of Madisonville, was allegedly attempting to break into a vehicle parked in front of the house, state police said. As Robards and Lutz approached Johnson, who was armed with a knife, he fled into the garage of the residence, state police said. The officers confronted Johnson, who then lunged at the officers with the knife and ran to the

front porch, where he broke into the residence about 2 p.m. CDT, state police said.

Two women, a man and two infants were inside the house. Officers gave Johnson several verbal commands to surrender the knife, but Johnson refused to do so, according to state police.

Robards and Lutz then fired at Johnson, fatally striking him, state police said.

Madisonville police had received two reports of Johnson before officers located him at the residence. Johnson was first seen outside a local hospital wearing only a hospital gown and shoes. Another call revealed that Johnson was allegedly attempting to break into several cars at a nearby parking lot, police said.

An autopsy was scheduled for today in Louisville. State police continued the investigation.

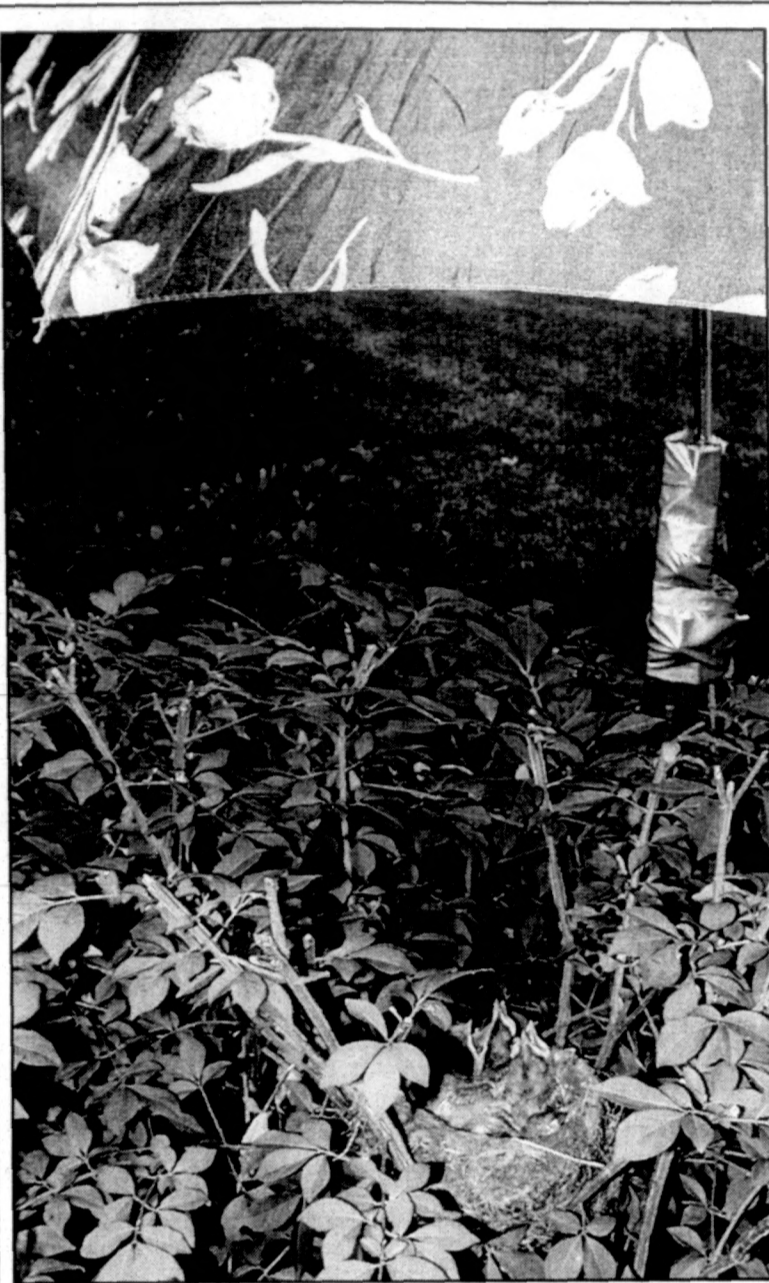
she has been nominated for the 2003 Diamond Awards for Soloist of the Year.

Countermove made regarding federal college financial aid formula

A change in the way the federal government calculates financial aid could result in middle-class Americans paying more for college at a time when tuition costs are rising sharply.

The revisions, which would go into effect in 2004, could reduce the amount that families may deduct in state and local taxes when calculating their family income.

Financial aid is determined according to a complex formula that looks at a family's earnings and assets and how many children they have in school. Under federal law, the formula has to be adjusted periodically for inflation and other economic factors.

The Education Department said that the potential loss of financial aid could be partly offset by other alterations in the formula with regard to family income and assets.

"We don't believe this is going to result in any significant changes," said Sally Stroup, assistant secretary for postsecondary education.

Some Democrats disagreed. "At the very time Congress has been battling the administration

over increased aid for public schools, the Bush administration has been quietly closing the door to college for millions of needy students," said Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass.

Sen. Jon Corzine, D-N.J., introduced legislation Friday to block the changes.

Many schools, especially public colleges and universities, have imposed double-digit increases in tuition as states struggle to balance their budgets during the economic downturn.

Millions of students get \$67 billion a year in federal financial aid, according to the Education Department.

Stroup had no immediate estimate of how many middle-class families would have to shoulder more of the cost of college, and no figures on how much they might lose in financial aid.

"It really depends on the family, how many kids are in the family, where you live and how many kids are in college," she said.

She said the changes in the formula will result in more aid to recipients of Pell Grants, which go to low-income students.

Ten cars burned in arena parking lot during NBA Finals

Bomb threat also

called in Friday

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Fire damaged 10 cars in a parking lot at Continental Airlines Arena during Game 5 of the NBA Finals soon after a bomb threat was made against the arena, but the incidents were not connected, police said.

The fire likely was caused by tailgaters who left coals burning on a portable grill, said Trooper John Quinlan of the New Jersey State Police.

Canine units investigated the bomb threat and nothing unusual was found at the arena, said state police spokesman Steve Jones. The threat was called in to the East Rutherford Police Department at 10:15 p.m., said East Rutherford Police Lt. Dennis Rivelli.

The fire was in Lot 12C of Giants Stadium, an overflow lot for

those attending the game between the New Jersey Nets and the San Antonio Spurs.

The lot is hundreds of yards away from the arena, separated by a four-lane road and only accessible by a long pedestrian tunnel.

Fans exiting the arena only saw two fire engines and a tow truck in the parking lot, where yellow police tape blocked the affected area.

By the time most fans reached the lot, only three damaged vehicles remained: an SUV that had been completely gutted, and two smaller sedans with their windows blown out and interior damage.

The Meadowlands Fire Department extinguished the blaze.

He completed his residency in oral and maxillofacial surgery at

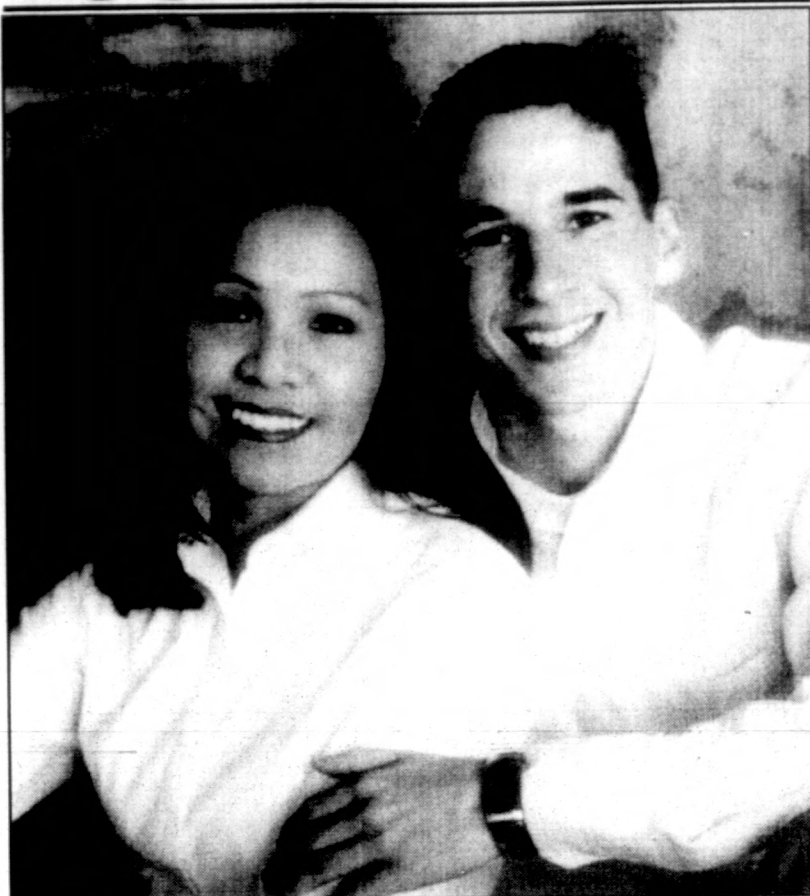

Rewarding students for academic achievement and community leadership;

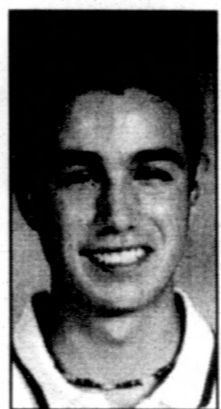

TIPS FOR ADJUSTMENT AND SUCCESS

While fathers were once viewed as little more than monetary providers and disciplinarians, today's fathers can enjoy more closeness with their children and involvement in their lives. Fathers provide invaluable nurturing. What you do with your child and how you parent may be different than your spouse's way of nurturing. It's OK to have a different way of parenting. Trust your instincts when caring for child.

GETTING STARTED

► Be prepared financially. Talk with other parents to get an idea of costs that come with raising a family. Together with your spouse, list your financial priorities and use them as guidelines for saving and budgeting. Set a reasonable budget and follow it.

► Witnessing the birth of your child is an important step toward parenthood and a close relationship with your child. Seeing your spouse through the work of labor and delivery helps create a teamwork approach to child bearing.

► Once mother and baby are home and settled, the adjustment to have a child can be difficult. Most often, women stay home the first few weeks to care for infant children. It's easy to feel left out at this stage because your wife is with the baby all day and night. It's important to be involved with the care of the baby from day one. You can bathe, change, feed an console the baby just as well as a mother can.

► Keep your expectations in check. What may seem exasperating about your child may very well be normal for that age.

THE STRUGGLE FOR QUALITY TIME

Spending time with your family needs to become a priority. If something else comes up too often, take time to list your priorities and plan for time at home. Quality time is found in all kinds of activities. Running errands, window

shopping, going to a movie or visiting a museum are all ways of spending time together.

Experts agree that no child is ever too young or too old to be read to. Reading at bedtime is an excellent way to spend quiet time cuddling with your child.

CARE FOR THE COUPLE

Within the family structure couples need to be taken care of, too. Becoming parents is often overwhelming. Couples need time together. Hire a sitter for a few hours or ask a family member to come by. Take in a movie, go to dinner or just find someplace to talk. (Some couples of young children have even been known to rent a motel room just to sleep).

FAMILY VS. WORK

► When family emergencies come up during work hours, apologies to coworkers are not necessary. Try to create a backup system to deal with these situations effectively without taking too much time away from work.

► Be realistic about your capabilities. Set reasonable goals and deadlines for yourself. Keep a list of reliable people handy in case you need support.

► If you've worked out a job-share situation to spend more time at home, be sensitive to the feelings of your coworkers and keep the lines of communication open.

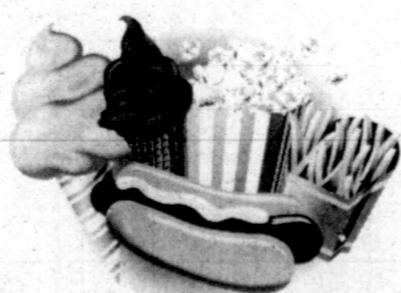

MHS falls out of state tourney after three games

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky. — For a couple of hours under a full moon on Friday the 13th, the Murray High Lady Tigers turned into savage beasts after being bitten by a Wolfe.

Louisville Mercy pitcher Laura Wolfe combined with two relievers on a three-hitter as the 12th-ranked Jaguars beat MHS 8-0 in the opening round of the state softball tournament at Tie Breaker Park.

However, the First Region champion Lady Tigers rebounded in the consolation bracket for a 5-0 win over No. 30 Meade County, giving Murray its first-ever state tournament victory.

Only the silver bullets fired by No. 3 Greenwood could stop Murray's short-lived rampage late Friday night, as a 4-1 loss ended the Lady Tigers' stay at the 16-team double-elimination event, which concludes today.

"(Greenwood) is a great team, but I can tell by the emotions that are going on here that there are a whole lot of kids that are upset because we won't be playing (today)," said MHS head coach Patty Patterson after her squad finished the year 23-12.

"I am exceptionally proud. We relaxed and got the jitters off (after the first game) and played like we're capable of. You don't ever want to go home and not feel like you never played your game, and we bounced back.

"Even (against Greenwood), we didn't play that badly; we just got beat by a very good team."

The Fourth Region champion Lady Gators (30-6) knocked out Murray behind a four-hitter from Kathy Church and back-to-back two-run rallies in the third and fourth innings.

Church averted disaster in the second when the Lady Tigers put runners on second and third with one out. Shaina Marinoff was

thrown out at the plate trying to score on a wild pitch, and Church handled Lisa Thurman's grounder for the third out.

With one down in the top of the third, Jenna Lee drew a walk and Elizabeth Ferrell beat Marinoff's throw for a bunt single, setting the table for Greenwood.

Church's two-out single into right field scored pinch runner Angela Kitchens, and Ferrell came home when Rachael Williams' throw to the plate sailed up the third-base line and got away from MHS catcher Megan Snow.

Williams atoned by leading off the bottom of the third with a single and advancing to second on right fielder Brittany York's error. A wild pitch and Lacey Latimer's one-out grounder brought in Williams to cut the deficit to 2-1.

But the Lady Gators answered as Andrea Fitzpatrick doubled with one away and advanced on a fielder's choice. A Jessica Mus-

tread grounder scored Fitzpatrick before Lee's RBI double over Williams' head plated Rachel Riley.

"The chances were there to make things a little bit different, and obviously, they took the wind out of our sails," Patterson said. "It hurt us to get runners at second and third early and not get them in, but my goodness, (Greenwood) hit the ball with power."

Church allowed just one baserunner — Latimer's leadoff single in the sixth — over the last four innings, striking out four and walking none to earn the complete-game victory.

Murray pitcher Kaci Carpenter (22-10) took the loss after going the distance for the third time in as many games Friday, yielding three earned runs on six hits and a walk while fanning three.

Rocket gets 300th win

Clemens also gets 4,000th K vs. Cards

NEW YORK (AP) — Roger Clemens got his milestones two at a time.

The Rocket finally reached 300 wins Friday night and entered an even more exclusive club, becoming only the third pitcher with 4,000 strikeouts as he led the New York Yankees over the St. Louis Cardinals 5-2.

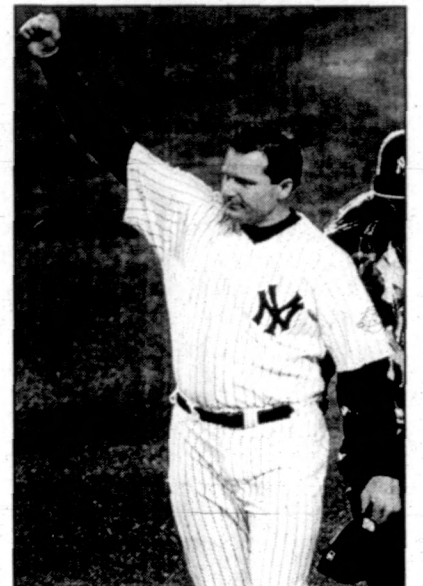
Clemens (7-4) was the 21st pitcher to make it 300, and did it on his fourth try.

"4,000 and 300 puts me with some great names that ever played the game, that ever stepped on that mound," Clemens said.

Clemens allowed two runs in 6 2-3 innings and struck out 10, raising his total to 4,006 on an unusually cool, damp night. He threw 120 pitches before handing a lead to New York's bullpen for his third straight start.

Handed a 3-2 advantage, this time Chris Hammond escaped the seventh-inning jam he created, and Antonio Osuna and Mariano Rivera pitched perfect innings.

A sellout crowd of 55,214

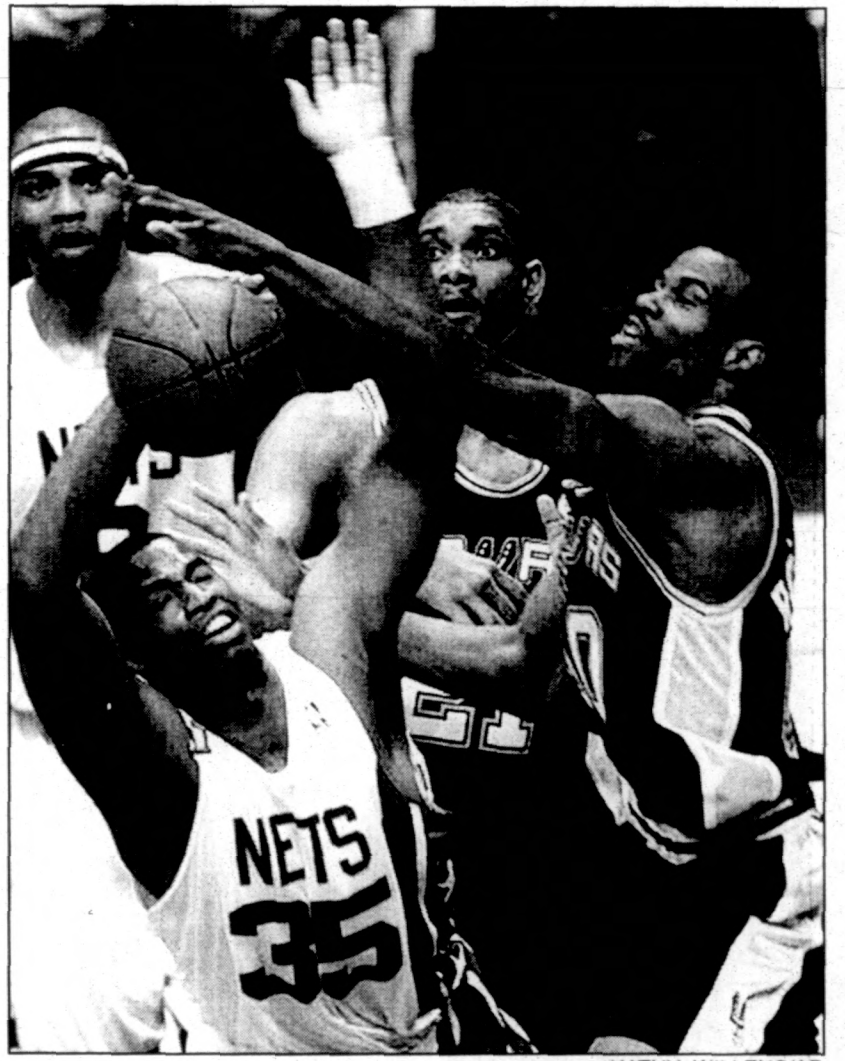

cheered while Clemens' teammates hugged him in the dugout after the final out.

Clemens jogged onto the field as Elton John's "Rocket Man" played over the public-address system. He raised both arms, tipped his cap to the fans in right field, then left, then touched his heart.

Singh nabs share of lead at Open

OLYMPIA FIELDS, Ill. (AP) — A month after Vijay Singh made headlines with his mouth, he did it with his golf clubs.

Criticized for his comments that Annika Sorenstam doesn't belong on the PGA Tour, Singh took his place atop the leaderboard Friday at the U.S. Open with a 7-under 63, matching the best score in major championship history.

He was heckled by a fan on the 14th hole, but nothing stopped the big Fijian.

"I wasn't too emotionally concerned with my score," Singh said. "I was just playing my game and enjoying it."

Jim Furyk had a bogey-free 66 and joined Singh in the record books at 7-under 133, the lowest 36-hole score ever in the U.S. Open. They had a one-stroke lead over Stephen Leaney (68) and Jonathan Byrd (66), with Tiger Woods closing in fast.

Woods had six birdies in a round of 66 and was only three strokes behind as he tries to become the second player in the last 50 years to win consecutive Opens.

It was the lowest second round of scoring in U.S. Open history, and the 71.9 average at Olympia Fields was the fifth-lowest in any round. That didn't make it any easier on Singh, who was heckled by a fan on the 14th hole as he was making a bid for major championship history.

After an 8-iron into 4 feet, a fan called out, "If it would have been Annika, it would have gone in the hole."

As security escorted the fan from Olympia

Fields, Singh appeared to raise his putter at him. Then, he stood over the putt and holed it for birdie.

Asked about the incident, Singh said, "I didn't notice anything."

Rocco Mediate, his playing partner and a former neighbor in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla., made it sound as if it were impossible to ignore.

"His caddie said something to him, and he (the fan) said, 'Why don't you come over here and say that?'" Mediate said. "They escorted (him) out. It was just stupid. Enough's enough. I don't think they'll say much if he's holding that trophy up on Sunday."

They cheered Singh long and loud as he played the final holes Friday afternoon, flawless execution from a two-time major champion.

"It felt like it was the last day of the Open," he said. "I was pumped up and playing well."

This is supposed to be the best toughest test in golf, although that's open to debate.

The rough is thick, but there have been no reports of missing children. The greens are quick, but they will hold just about any shot.

The scores were unlike anything the U.S. Open has seen in 10 years.

The cut was 3-over 143, the lowest in history. It was 1-over 145 in 1990 at Medinah, the last time a U.S. Open was held outside Chicago.

More evidence? Woody Austin, a guy famous for breaking a putter over his head, shot 64. Masters champion Mike Weir had a 67 that included a 7 on his scorecard.

There were 38 rounds in the 60s, making it 52 for the first two days.

Spurs grab series lead in Game 5

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Steve Kerr faked a shot from the corner, took two dribbles to his right and knocked down a 15-footer on the run.

He celebrated by high-stepping backward downcourt.

The seldom-used player with four championship rings came through in the clutch again for the Spurs, knocking down a pair of timely jumpers and making a key steal late in the fourth quarter as San Antonio defeated the New Jersey Nets 93-83 Friday night to take a 3-2 lead in the NBA Finals.

Kerr is the only player on either roster to have played in a championship series that was tied 2-2, doing it in 1997 with the Chicago Bulls. He didn't enter the game until early in the final quarter, then displayed all the poise of someone who has done this many times before.

First came a 3-pointer with 3:03 left to put the Spurs ahead 83-76, next came a steal from Kenyon Martin, and last came the running jumper and the backward high-

step after his 15-footer made it 87-78 with 1:42 left.

"Steve was fantastic," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said. "He's the consummate pro. He comes on the court, he knows what we're doing. He's in shape, and he did a really fine job. Obviously, he was a huge factor down the stretch."

It was the latest heroic postseason chapter for Kerr, whose resume from this postseason includes a 4-for-4 performance from 3-point range in a 23-0 run the Spurs used to defeat the Dallas Mavericks in Game 6 of the Western Conference finals — the victory that got them here.

The next step will be closing out the Nets, and the Spurs' chance will come at home Sunday night in Game 6, Game 7, if necessary, will be in San Antonio next Wednesday.

Tim Duncan carried the Spurs for most of the game with 27 points, 17 rebounds and four blocks. Tony Parker and Malik Rose each added 14 points and Manu Ginobili had 12.

Titans, Stanford earn wins at CWS

 OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Shane Costa hit a go-ahead three-run homer in the third inning, and Jason Windsor combined with two relievers on a five-hitter as Cal State Fullerton beat Louisiana State 8-2 at the College World Series on Friday night.

The Titans (49-14) advanced to a winner's bracket game Sunday against Stanford, which shut out South Carolina 8-0 earlier Friday. LSU (45-21-1) plays South Carolina in an elimination game Sunday.

Windsor (11-2) held the Tigers to one run on four hits in 5 2-3 innings. He has given up three earned runs and 10 hits in his last 19 innings over three games. Sean Martin and Chad Cordero held the Tigers to one hit the rest of the way.

Costa's homer — his fifth of the season and first since March 23 — put Fullerton ahead for good at 4-1.

Stanford 8, South Carolina 0

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — John Hudgins gave up two hits over eight innings and Ryan Garko drove in three runs as Stanford defeated South Carolina in the opening game of the CWS.

It was the third CWS shutout since 1995 and the first since last year's opener, when South Carolina lost 11-0 to Georgia Tech. The Gamecocks then won four straight to reach the national championship game.

Stanford (47-15) stretched its season-long winning streak to 10 games as Hudgins (12-3) held South Carolina (44-21) hitless until Justin Harris doubled with one out in the fourth inning. Only two other batters reached base against the Pacific-10 pitcher of the year.

Hudgins and Kodiak Quick combined on the first CWS two-hitter since June of 1993.

Storm system creates havoc for anglers

The present storm system coming through our area may cause problems with some anglers.

They move fast and are loaded with high winds and lightning, which is distributed freely without a conscience.

You certainly don't need to continue to fish with a fiberglass or graphite rod. Just think about standing and waving these electrically-charged wands with heavy dark clouds hanging overhead!

Most anglers are lucky, but some can insulate with gloves or shoes to prevent building a charge.

I fished Tuesday with Joe and Ron for a couple of hours under these same conditions. I was very careful to keep the guys safe and healthy by moving from a location where the static charge was building.

It's very easy to tell when the

static is building just by watching your line as you cast. When everything is normal, the line will play out properly as you cast. If the static electricity begins to build up, your line will hang or suspend after the lure has been cast out.

The line tends to float or behave like smoke does in high humidity. That is telling you of the pressure change. It's time to change locations at that point. Don't scoff and make another cast — just go!

Normally, you don't have to move very far to get out of that situation. Joe and Ron were looking for some hot bass action, and we found some. But it was very lukewarm. The southeast winds were tough, and many good areas were impossible to fish.

We threw some cranks, tubes and worms but finally had to move way back in the bays to find a place to fish. I lost one large bass that I wasn't able to turn as it powered past the bow, heading out into deeper waters.

We caught several nice largemouth and smallmouth bass and a couple of 2-pound Kentucky bass. But, as always, you want to put your guys on some big bass

every now and then.

It's a fact known by all anglers that sometimes one can do no wrong while other days it's best to just enjoy the scenery and be grateful for the opportunity to be outside. I like to refer to those days as good for honing your skills.

We could see a storm approaching from the west, so I began to work back to Kenlake by cove-jumping and casting only to the prime targets.

We continued to catch the smaller bass, and they seemed to move more shallow as the storm came closer.

Joe and I fished together several years ago, so we knew each other's skill level. I continued to work them back north. Each place resulted in some bass. The falling barometer was working on the fish, and they were getting wild.

When we saw a dozen or so lightning strikes in succession, I suggested that we come in before the rain came our direction. We just barely made it home when the storm struck our area!

Earlier in the week, I had the pleasure of fishing with John West again. John wanted to learn about some areas where he could bring

his boat and compete in tournaments.

We left early and began to cover the main lake drops and ledges along the deep banks of rock on the north end.

We found a few bass at each stop, but most of them were lured shy from all of the tournament anglers who had recently come through the area.

I taught John how to find the ledges that hold bass. He can now come back and learn more on his time.

We found about a dozen boats that were gathered along these rock shores. They were so close together that casting was impossible. They had to flip underhand or jig vertically.

We covered several miles of water and shoreline. The numbers of boats only increased. We caught some big smallmouths, but the Kentucky bass were doing their thing that day. We really enjoyed them all, small or not!

John West is a good fisherman. He will learn the ways of our bass and how to deal with them before too much longer.

Jeanne and I took off on another adventure and really enjoyed

the time together. We had planned to look for strippers first. We wanted to see what they were doing before we fished for bluegill and shellcrackers.

We only found a few strippers at each place we looked for them. They were nice, but they weren't fat by any stretch of the imagination.

They are very slim fish right now. But as the threadfin shad grow larger and move out onto the main lake, these strippers will fatten pretty quickly.

If some of you locals have been looking for the strippers, then you must have found what we did — mostly rockfish.

That's right, rockfish strippers! They are a holy terror when they are hooked — even if they are only 10 inches long.

The dictionary describes these strippers perfectly. They have an excessive enthusiasm for something. That something is getting free from that hook. If you are not very careful, you will be on that same hook with the striper!

I have been wanting a good population of the big strippers for at least 30 years. Now, I believe that we are about to realize that

dream!

We found the small young strippers at each place we tried on this day. Those were the only fish working and looking for food at the time. I was told by an angler in North Carolina that we would be better off with our resident white and yellow strippers instead. I guess we are going to find out soon enough!

I know sometimes that we hop a spoon along a bar and will get a strike from a fish we never see. When that happens, I wind up never seeing the lure again, either!

Jeanne and I finally went into a bay and filled our cooler with some huge bluegill and shellcrackers. The main lake is moving strongly again, and we could tell where the bluegill would be by the current.

I caught another bluegill that weighed over 1 1/4 pounds and a shellcracker that was 1 1/2 pounds. I think it may get mounted!

There is a Chompers bass tournament coming up soon, so turn in your application to Kenlake Marina. Stop in and see all of the prizes they will give away. It looks pretty good.

Time to get off the bleachers, into fields

It was an ice-cold morning in Dennis Heskett's duck blind, stuck off somewhere on an old oxbow turn of the Obion River.

Down the slough a bit was another blind — one of the occupants of which was Dennis's son, Adam.

The ducks had slowed and Dennis was cooking greasy egg-and-bacon sandwiches in our blind — and holding court.

"My father hunted in this same blind with his father and grandfather," he said while lining a skillet with bacon. "Fifty years later to the day, my father got to hunt in this same blind again with his son and grand-

son. Dennis's voice trailed off and was drowned out by the bacon crackling in the old iron skillet, which suddenly required his undivided attention. His statement, however, had opened a window to a world that was warm and familiar.

No, I had never hunted ducks with my father. But we had traipsed over hill and valley together hunting bobwhites and cottontails every Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day — just as generations of Hesketts had climbed into their duck blind before dawn on those same days.

I would have loved more than anything to have shot a limit of quail on one of those excursions, or to have filled the game pouch on the back of my Sears and Roebuck hunting coat with rabbits. But limits were hardly motivation for hunting trips in those days when birds and bunnies were scarce.

I always thought that Dad continued to hunt because he remembered a time when there were

plenty of birds, rabbits and squirrels and that if he hunted hard enough, he would find them again in an old sagebrush field or barnlot.

Now I know that the furry and feathered creatures had little to do with the whole thing — my father had hunted with his father and wanted the same for me. Such simple but important times are all but lost in today's frantic world where the emphasis is on the quantity rather than the quality of experiences.

When I was a young pup, I felt sorry for kids whose parents or grandparents didn't take them hunting. There was always a group or two of kids around who would go out hunting together, but that held no interest for me.

Baseball and basketball were reserved for school friends — hunting was for family. Today, I see fathers whose idea of good parenting is to provide timely transportation to ball games, school functions, social events and the like.

I've never understood the logic in spending 15 minutes in a car with a child, then abandoning him or her to seek role models among coaches or Sunday School-teachers — to abdicate their one and only opportunity to be their child's hero to someone else.

Don't get me wrong. Coaches and Sunday School teachers are important people in the life of a child. But these third-parties are at best supplements to the real role of the parent.

A father who takes a son or daughter fishing, hunting or camping actually gets to spend quality time alone with their child — time when they can be the role-model and hero in the child's life. This can be a time of bonding and imprinting that a child will come back to when grown and will pass along to his or her children.

Sunday is Father's Day. What had you rather do for your child? Drive him or her down to the ballpark and sit in the stands while the coach becomes the child's hero,

or drive them out to the lake and teach them how to fish and how to have fun.

Show them that you can build a campfire, cook breakfast on a Coleman stove. Show them that you know the way of the woods; teach them to hunt deer or how to call ducks and turkeys.

This will take not just days, but years to accomplish. You will have to spend long hours together — sometimes fun, sometimes hard. You will have to shoulder the burden of responsibility together and share the sting of defeat, but you'll bask in the glory of success, too.

It's an ambitious plan, to be sure. But put in the time and your children's children will still proclaim that they are what are because their daddy and their daddy's daddy took them hunting and fishing.

Do you really think all of that can be accomplished from the bleachers?

State's man-made trout fishing flourishes

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — How does Kentucky's trout fishing of the present compare with that of the "good old days?"

There's no comparison at all, because Kentucky has no native trout population. The popular trout fishing in the Bluegrass State exists only through the efforts of fisheries managers and financing of the fishermen themselves.

"It's a user-paid program," said Benjy Kinman, chief of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' Fisheries Division.

The department stocks trout in a varied series of waters across the state.

Anglers' involvement in providing the fish comes in paying

for annual state trout permits, \$10 per angler, to enable them to take trout on Kentucky waters. Money from permit sales pays for the transportation of trout from Wolf Creek National Fish Hatchery at Wolf Creek Dam, which impounds Lake Cumberland near Rowena, to stocking sites.

"Kentucky gets the lion's share of the fish from Wolf Creek," Kinman said. "The federal hatchery provides trout at no charge for mitigation waters — Corps of Engineers lakes and tailwaters — and for waters on federal reservations. For the other state streams, we have to reimburse them for the trout, which comes to \$106,000 a year."

Kentucky sold 26,600 trout permits last year, although there are additional trout anglers represented in those who purchase senior

hunting/fishing licenses and sportsmen's licenses, which include trout fishing privileges.

The requirements for establishing and maintaining trout fishing opportunities are chiefly cold water habitat, necessary for trout survival, and fishermen's access to the waters, Kinman said.

"Some of the small streams are surrounded by private land and we have had to close some trout streams and to stop stocking them because of landowners posting property and blocking access," he said.

The bulk of Kentucky's trout waters are in eastern to central portions of the state because of habitat.

"Most of our trout streams are in higher elevations because of cooler water there," Kinman said. "Most

are in highland streams where there are no threatened or endangered species that could be affected by introducing another predator to the system."

A few selected spring-fed streams and tailwaters allow the trout program to be conducted on a spot basis across the central part of the state into the relative flatlands of western Kentucky, too.

"We've got 305 miles of trout water in 68 streams, including tailwaters," Kinman said. "But almost a third of that mileage is in the Cumberland River from Wolf Creek Dam to the Tennessee state line."

The Cumberland River tailrace below Wolf Creek is Kentucky's showcase trout fishery. The volume of habitat allows much heavier stocking of both rainbow and brown trout, and "holdover" fish

— those that survive an extended time after release — create a trophy fishery for older, jumbo-sized fish.

Such abundant resources provide good fishing, and anglers have flocked to the Cumberland to enjoy the bounty. So popular has been the fishing and so heavy the fishing pressure that managers have responded to moderate the harvest of fish to maintain the quality of the fishery.

The Cumberland River section already features brown trout regulations that promote trophy fish production: a 20-inch minimum size limit and a one-fish daily creel limit.

Elsewhere in the state, the general regulations on trout are a daily creel limit of eight rainbows or rainbows and browns in combina-

Squirrel season open to hunters

The 2003 June squirrel season opened on June 7 and runs through June 20.

The outlook for the season is good statewide. The season — implemented in 1994 to take advantage of squirrel breeding chronology — provides Kentucky outdoorsmen a chance to hunt in a time of the year when their hunting gear is usually in storage.

Squirrels in June prefer different habitat than in the fall. The hot weather of early summer moves them into drainages, hollows and creek bottoms.

Although those areas offer relief from the heat, they will not hold squirrels if they don't possess the right food sources.

Squirrels in early summer feed on the seeds and fruit of ash, pine, maple, elm, hornbeam, dogwood, sassafras, wild cherry and mulberry trees.

Hunters should locate themselves in a spring fed draw or creek bottom where these trees grow.

The choice of a firearm is dictated by the tree foliage. A 12- or 20-gauge shotgun is better for shooting through tree leaves than the .22 rifles that many hunters prefer in the fall.

Hunters planning to participate should record their day's hunt in the spring squirrel hunting log, found in the back of the 2003 Kentucky Spring Hunting Guide for Turkey and Squirrel.

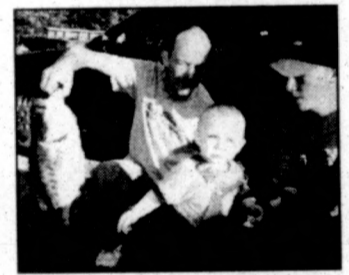

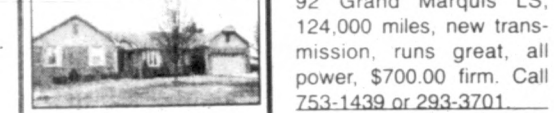

Monkeypox victim under home isolation

MAYFIELD, Ky. (AP) — A person with a suspected case of monkeypox in western Kentucky is under home isolation, state health officials said. The person had contact with several animals from the Illinois distributor, whose animals are believed to have transmitted monkeypox to people in several states. The person was suffering from a rash, aching and exhaustion, symptoms associated with the illness, said Sharon Godec, nursing director for the Purchase District Health Department. Godec said the results on the testing by the Center for Disease Control should be known by Wednesday. She said she didn't know what kind of animal was involved in the suspected infection. The state Department of Fish and Wildlife is testing the animal, she said. "We're monitoring their case so we can make sure that they don't get sicker," said Gwenda Bond, a spokeswoman for the Cabinet for Health Services. Bond added that the person had the lowest level of criteria for exposure to the illness. The pet shop is under quarantine, and people who have recently bought animals from the store are being contacted, the health cabinet said. State officials said they don't believe the public is at risk.

Two Wisconsin health workers may have caught monkeypox from humans

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Officials are investigating whether two Wisconsin health care workers may have contracted monkeypox from patients, in what would be the first known transmission of the virus from one human to another in the United States. Until now, health officials investigating the weeklong outbreak in the United States have said that the virus was being spread by pet prairie dogs. But the disease can also be transmitted from one person to another, something that has happened in Africa. Patrice M. Skonieczny, infection control coordinator at St. Francis Hospital in Milwaukee, said a nurse developed monkeypox symptoms after caring for a patient with a possible case of the disease. In another case, Dr. John Melski, a dermatologist at Marshfield Clinic in Marshfield, said a medical assistant is suspected of getting the disease after helping treat a 3-year-old girl May 22. The girl was later diagnosed with monkeypox. "She held the child when the child was brought in and may have had contact with the infected lesion," Melski said. He said the medical assistant's boyfriend has some similar symptoms, but it's unknown how he may have gotten sick. "If I were a family member of somebody who had monkeypox, I would want to know you really need to practice precautions within the home," Melski said. State epidemiologist Jeff Davis said Thursday that confirmation of those cases would mark the first known human-to-human transmission of the virus in the nation. Skonieczny said the nurse at St. Francis was wearing protective clothing, including a mask, gloves and a gown, when she cared for the south Milwaukee pet distributor being treated for possible monkeypox. The nurse developed flu-like symptoms, including a transient rash, several days later.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is Huntington's disease hereditary?

DEAR READER: Huntington's disease is a hereditary neurological affliction marked by random, uncontrollable muscle movements (chorea) and progressive intellectual deterioration. It usually begins in middle age and affects both sexes equally.

The malady is associated with apathy, irritability or full-blown psychosis, coupled with flicking twitches of the extremities, a lilted gait and an inability to sustain purposeful movement. There is no treatment. Patients eventually cannot care for themselves, become incontinent and severely demented, lose the ability to swallow and must be admitted to skilled nursing facilities.

Genetic counseling is absolutely vital for anyone with a family history of the disease, because 50 percent of the offspring of an affected parent are at risk for this crippling disorder. The disease does not usually become apparent until after the childbearing years, and no tests are available for detection in patients without symptoms. Many specialists believe that all children and siblings of a patient with Huntington's disease should avoid having children. This view may seem extreme, but it isn't. Once you have seen a Huntington's patient in the last few months of life, you wouldn't wish that curse on anyone, especially someone you love.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 72-year-old male diabetic. My doctor says that taking insulin makes one sexy. Why and how?

DEAR READER: Wonder no longer. Insulin has no effect on sexual interest, appearance or performance.

However, diabetes is a common cause of sexual malfunction in men because of premature arteriosclerosis. Therefore, I suppose that insulin, which treats the diabetes, could have a strictly secondary benefit.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been diagnosed with severe anemia. I am a healthy 76-year-old female and have

had a history of anemia since my teens. I've had the following normal tests: iron levels, B12 and folic acid levels, stool, urine and chest X-rays. A bone marrow examination showed that I am not producing blood as I should. For two months, I was given weekly Procrit injections, with a subsequent rise in my hemoglobin from 8 to 10. How should I proceed? My hematologist hasn't advised me.

DEAR READER: Anemia means too few red blood corpuscles. It can result from blood loss, blood destruction (as in some autoimmune disorders) or failure of the bone marrow to make enough new cells.

This last category is, apparently, the source of your problem, because your marrow has responded to erythropoietin (Procrit), a compound that stimulates the marrow to shape up and put out. This treatment is primarily used in patients who have received chemotherapy and/or radiation for cancer; such treatments often poison the bone marrow, leading to anemia.

I do not know why your marrow is behaving inappropriately. This is an issue that you should address with your hematologist, because it is crucial to your good health. You appear not to have an iron or vitamin deficiency; therefore, in my opinion, more testing is necessary. In the meantime, continue your injections. A normal hemoglobin is 12 to 15 grams per deciliter; therefore, your rise from 8 to 10 is encouraging. Your doctor is on the right track, but, in my opinion, you need more answers.

The Turn of the Screw

North dealer. North-South vulnerable. NORTH: ♠ A K 9, ♥ A J 10 9 7 4, ♦ 10, ♣ J 9 7

WEST: ♠ J 8 4, ♥ K Q 8 5 2, ♦ 7 6 4, ♣ 6 3. EAST: ♠ Q 10 6 5 3, ♥ 3, ♦ 8 3, ♣ Q 10 8 5 2

SOUTH: ♠ 7 2, ♥ 6, ♦ A K Q J 9 5 2, ♣ A K 4

The bidding: North 1♥, East Pass, South 3♦, West Pass; North 3♥, East Pass, South 4♦, West Pass; North 4♠, East Pass, South 4NT, West Pass; North 5♥, East Pass, South 5NT, West Pass; North 6♦, East Pass, South 7♦.

Opening lead-seven of diamonds. When declarer runs a long suit, the opponents often find themselves unable to withstand the pressure of discarding.

Consider this case where South-after learning via Blackwood that his partner had two aces and a king-bid seven diamonds in the hope that dummy would provide him with a 13th trick in addition to the 12 he

could already count. West led a trump, won in dummy, and South played the ace and another heart, ruffing in his hand. When East showed out on the second heart, any chance of developing an extra heart trick by ruffing went by the boards, forcing declarer to rely primarily on a squeeze. Accordingly, he next played three rounds of trumps and cashed the A-K of clubs to produce this position:

North: ♠ A K 9, ♥ J, ♦ J, ♣ J. West: ♠ J 8 4, ♥ K Q. South: ♠ 7 2, ♥ J 9, ♦ 4, ♣ Q 10. East: ♠ Q 10 6, ♥ 3, ♦ 8 3, ♣ Q 10.

The jack-of-diamonds lead caused no problem for either defender, West discarding a heart, and dummy and East each a club. But the nine-of-diamonds lead left both opponents without recourse. West had to part with a spade, whereupon declarer discarded dummy's heart. East was then forced to part with a spade or the queen of clubs, and either way, South was sure to score the rest of the tricks.

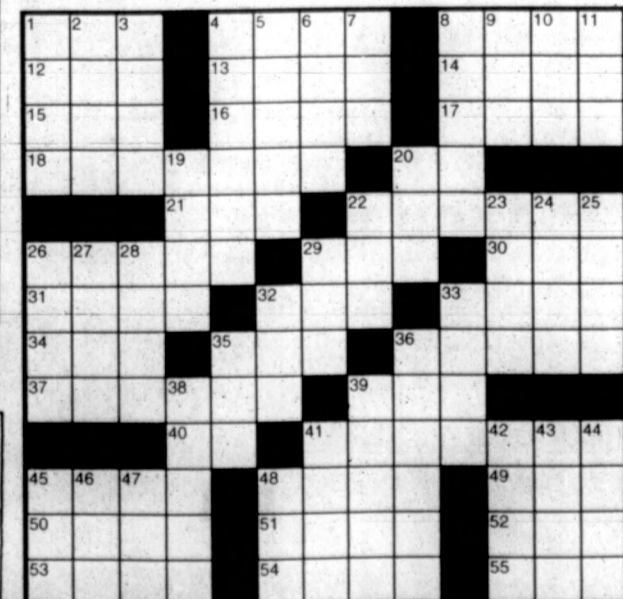

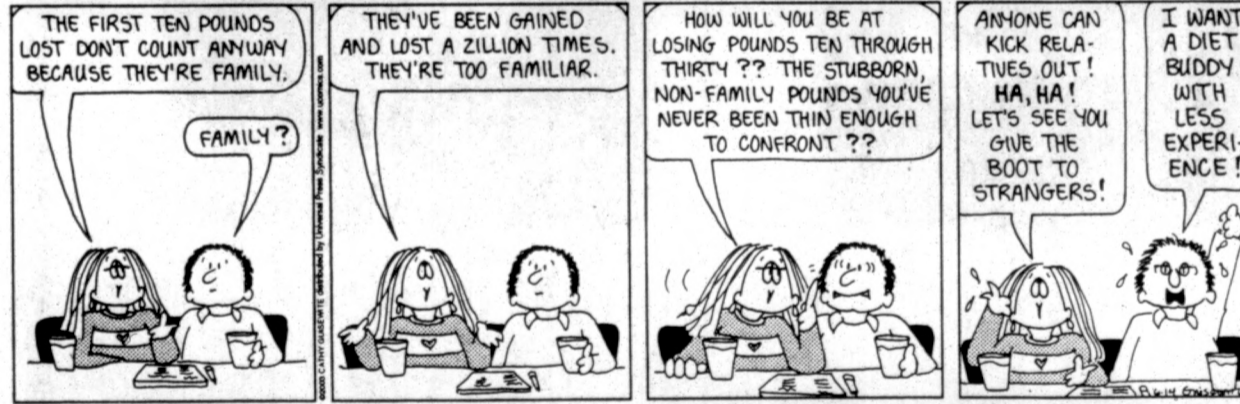

Obesity rate doubles in Colo.

DENVER (AP) — Colorado still has bragging rights as the leanest state in the country. However, things are changing, with adult obesity more than doubling over the past decade, state health officials warned.

While Colorado's obesity rate of 14.9 percent is the lowest in the country, health experts said the increase is cause for concern.

Experts say obesity is a critical health issue because of the serious health effects, including increased risk of heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, cancer, diabetes, arthritis, sleep apnea and depression.

In 1990, 6.9 percent of the adults in Colorado were obese. In 2001, the latest year for which data is available, that number more than doubled to 14.9 percent, according to an annual survey of 2,000 residents by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment.

That means more than 450,000 of the state's 3.3 million adults are obese. By comparison, Mississippi's obesity rate is 26.5 percent, the country's highest.

Q: I am a huge fan of Kyle Chandler ("Early Edition"). What is he doing next? —J.B., Wichita, Kan.

A: The very popular Chandler returns to prime time next fall in NBC's highly anticipated series "The Lyon's Den," a legal drama set in Washington, D.C. Q: Do you know if "Angel" will begin airing in syndication any time soon like its sister show, "Buffy the Vampire Slayer"? —Kim Miller, Harrisburg, Pa.

A: Yes, TNT will begin airing syndicated repeats of the David Boreanaz vampire drama this fall. The show also recently squeaked by with another season's order or new episodes on The WB Network.

Q: What can you tell us about Monica Horan, who plays Amy on "Everybody Loves Raymond"? —John in Johnston, Iowa.

A: Horan is married to "Raymond" creator Phil Rosenthal, so she has spent a lot of time hearing her real-life domestic arguments with her husband replayed by Ray and Debra Barone (Ray Romano, Patricia Heaton) on the

Emmy-winning CBS hit.

Horan earned a degree in theater studies before moving to New York to begin stage working. Rosenthal, then a struggling actor himself, saw her in an off-Broadway comedy and sent a note backstage. Soon they were dating, and they wed in 1990.

Following guest shots on "General Hospital" and "L.A. Law," among other shows, Horan had put her acting career on hold to become a full-time mother to the couple's two children before Rosenthal tapped her to play Amy. The character clicked with viewers, leading to her becoming a semi-regular on the sitcom.

Q: Dan Futterman was introduced as Barry, the new love interest for Will on "Will & Grace," but disappeared after only two episodes. What happened? —Christopher J. Koke, Ashland, Ore.

A: Nothing. Futterman, who actually appeared in four "Will & Grace" episodes, signed on only for a limited story arc (the actor lives with his family on the East Coast, which is why he left his previous series gig on "Judging Amy"). Unfortunately, reports that he had signed to play a potential love interest for Will were misinterpreted in many quarters to mean he would be playing Barry on a recurring basis, much as Harry Connick Jr. has done in his role as Leo, Grace's husband. That never was intended to be the case with Futterman.
