Soil Conservation Notes By Herbert Anderson

Rastus Lowery, Briensburg, sowed two acres sericea last week from which he expects to harvest seed, hay, and pasture.

The seedbed was prepared by disking and harrowing. The seed were then broadcast at the rate of fifty pounds to the acre and were not covered. Sericea sown this early should get a good start before the dry weather of summer comes.

E. W. Burkhardt, Oak Level, made a basic soil and water conservation farm plan the first of March. Help in making this kind of a farm plan is provided by the Soil Conservation Service.

Burkhardt has removed the bushes and other wild growth from a long steep hillside which has been lying idle for a number of years. This land which gets very dry in the summer is better suited to grow sericea than any other pasture or hay plant. He plans to sow this in sericea in the spring of 1938.

I helped Reed Heath, Briensburg, survey and stake a farm pond last week.

He had an ideal location for the pond in a natural valley. By building a dam seven and one-half feet high, he will have water at least eight feet deep. This is a very cheap way of getting stock water and if the watershed is properly maintained in sod, the pond will last for many, many years.

L. J. Rickman, near the Oakland Methodist Church, plans to establish a sod of fescue in the spillway of his pond this spring.

His pond was dug last fall and the winter rains have washed out the spillway to hard subsoil. To correct this and get grass in it, Rickman is going to fill the spillway with half a foot of good soil. Then dig up a heavy sod of fescue, and put it on top of the soil. This will then be fertilized and manured heavily so it will get a quick start.

Many ponds with large watersheds draining into them will need a sod of Bermuda grass established in their spillways this spring.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Fellowship Supreme

Lesson for April 6, 1932

THE church of the twentieth century is taking a beating. We are living in one of the dark eras when the Christian church in large parts of the world is on the retreat. One-sixth of the earth's surface, that used to be called "Christian," is now dominated by anti-religious powers. There were once 8,000 missionaries in China where now there are 200, and the number is growing fewer still. An inquiring minister in Georgia recently asked a number of American church leaders whether they thought we can call the United States a "Christian" nation. Most of them said No, and most of them thought that America is at present slipping farther away from Christ.

What Did the Early Church Have That We Haven't?

NOW the question is: What did the early church have that we don't have? Why did they succeed where we have not been succeeding? One quality which was strong in the early church, weak today, is fellowship. Let us first see what the New Testament idea of fellowship is not. It is not organization. It was not any one Big Man or Big Church or any pattern of organization that made the early church "click." Also, it was not simple nearness.

For many persons today, "belonging to the same church" with another person means no more than that on occasional Sundays they find themselves sitting within a few yards of each other. They do not know each other's names, perhaps, much less take any personal interest in each other's affairs.

Furthermore, the New Testament does not hold up subscription to a creed as the main feature of fellowship. All mathematics teachers believe in the truth of algebra and geometry, but that does not make a fellowship out of mathematics teachers. So you can have several hundred or several thousand people repeating the same Creed without ever being a fellowship or even knowing what the word means.

No Tinker-Toy Business

ONE thing that fellowship did mean, when it meant something, Jesus made very plain. It is like the life of a growing vine. You cannot think of the branches without the vine, nor of the vine without the branches.

Carrying on the same idea, Paul (1 Cor. 12) speaks of the church as the "body" of Christ. Christian fellowship is first of all an intimate growing-in to the life of Christ, sharing the same life with him.

You can make a tinker-toy man with two arms or no arms, you can pull the legs and arms out and stick them in again as you like, because the tinker-toy man is not real. It is only blocks and sticks. But you cannot stick branches in and pull them out of a vine like that; much less pull legs and arms out of a living body.

If the church today is weak, it is because too many individual "members" are not members of Christ. They belong to the church, statistically speaking, but they do not belong to Christ.

Belonging to One Another

ANOTHER thing that fellowship means, grows out of this first thing. The New Testament idea—the New Testament fact—is that all Christians are parts of one another, just as all parts of a living thing belong to one another.

It is quite true that not every one in the church then understood this, or Jesus and Paul would not have had to speak and write as they did. But the church at large did understand it. Every church then was a kind of family, indeed often a much better family than that into which its members had first been born.

Although each Christian was himself, indeed a new self ("If any man is in Christ, he is a new creation," Paul said), yet in the church every one belonged to every one else, just as in a good family. The good of one was the happiness of all; the sorrow and trouble of one was the trouble of all; the temptation of one gave the others an opportunity to fight for his rescue.

The church, when it is the church, is the fellowship supreme, the united life, the life of God shared by those who love him and one another.

Perhaps the best thing the Christian church today could do, instead of getting more "members" who are not members, would be to rediscover and re-practice New Testament fellowship. Such a church would begin to win victories again!

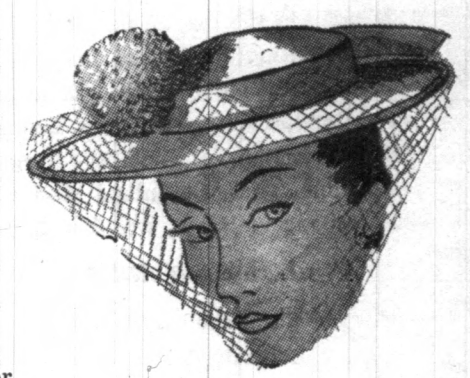
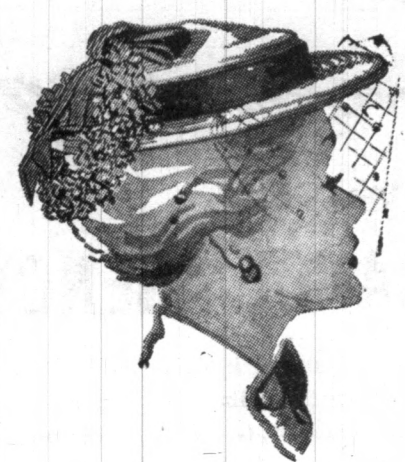

Letters To The Editor

Dear Gania and Ervie:

Guess how I got a coveted seat at the Red hearings? By showing my free lance press card that expired in 1946 I scratched out the date and by telling the guard that I was a regular correspondent to the Marshall Courier, a well-known Kentucky

newspaper.

The radio here was so full of the testimony I took a morning off determined to hear it. After I hurried back to the office they almost had a fight when a Congressman shouted at a witness: "We've been insulted by much bigger Communists than you!"

I'm sorry I missed the near-fight. Romano, a handsome Italian, was so co-operative he had the Congressmen nodding their heads as if to say, "I knew it!" He was asked how come him to tie up with the Communists in the first place and ah! his answer was reminding of the depression. The soldiers' march on Washington. He was not a soldier but that started him.

He testified about a subject that caused my eyes to bug that first year when I was new in Detroit. One morning as I came to the entrance of the Polk building a little old woman was forming a picket line of her own and carrying a banner saying: "Open the second front now."

Romano testified last week that the order was from Russia and they passed it down the line whether it was militarily advantageous or not the second front must be opened. It was, and Windsor boys were killed by the thousands as well as many of our own. I later sat in CIO meetings with the woman who carried the banner and saw her and the Russian girl who headed the Local play sisters.

Romano spoke of Teheran where Roosevelt formed policies and of the difference in orders that came after that. Commun-

ists never oppose the Taft-Hartley Law till after the loyalty oath was introduced. He said they favor what he called "repressive" labor legislation because of its propaganda value.

Enough of Romano, communism and labor unions, back to something more pleasant—Kentucky and home.

Did you know that TVA may turn my old home into one of its beautiful Parks? It is not assured yet, but I'm wondering how my blackberry patches will look with bare-legged gals running about! I know every sheep path in every pasture and if I go back there I'll find them. The land had been handed down from one generation to another and until TVA took it over it had never been deeded except for love and affection. I am turning the 16 acres the government left me into a Memorial to

my Grandmother and Grandfather Heath, and all Heaths, their kinsfolk, and their friends will always be welcome and will never be asked to pay, except with love and affection.

I still hold that Detroit is as friendly as Kentucky. Once when I remarked to one of the girls that even the Policemen are friendly, she asked why would I say such a strange thing as that. I answered, "Well, they've chased me twice for walking red lights—caught me too—when I told them I was from Kentucky they let me go without a ticket." There are not many of us Marshall county folks downtown—just me and Lola Pace and Maud Culp. I run into J. L. Hudson's often to see Lola and I went to see Maud today.

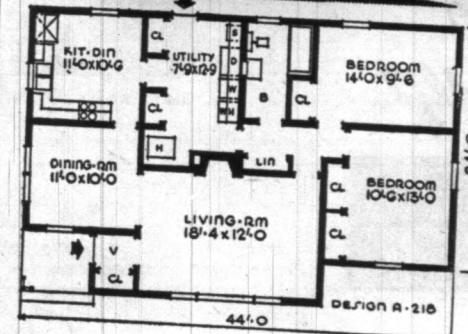
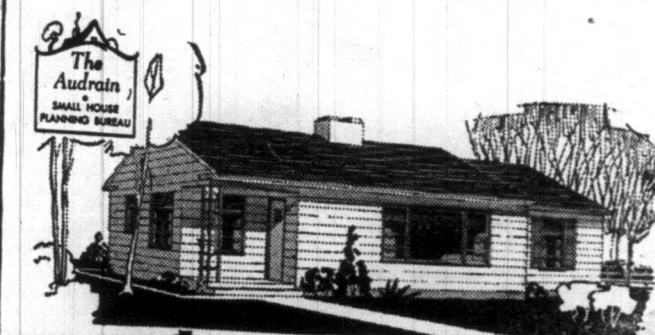
