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City Jail Inmate Slashes Throat Sunday

County Health Spray Program To Start Here This Week

Dr. S. L. Henson announced
today that the Communicable
Disease Center of the Marshall
County Health Department will
begin its residual spray pro-
gram in this county this week.

Spraying will be conducted
in the entire 11-county district
if personnel is available. Start-
ing date has been postponed
because of the late spring and
will also give the housewives a
chance to do spring cleaning
before spray crews arrive.

DDT and chlordane emul-
sions will be used this year.
Last year these two chemicals
were very effective in insect
control.

A contact man will call at
each home and arrange a spray
date. The spray crew will fol-
low one or two days later. A fee
of \$3.00 will be charged for each
home and additional fees for
spraying barns will be charged
in accordance to the size of the
barn.

Householders are urged to
take advantage of this service,
in order to protect themselves
against disease carrying insects.
Department officials would
like to impress on every per-
son that spraying will not take
the place of basic sanitation.
Chemical treatment is an aid to
good sanitation, and the two
practices used simultaneously
will give good control of insects
that carry disease.

Early Sunday Morning Fire Here Does Estimated \$35,000 In Damage To 3 Business Places

Three local business establish-
ments, Kinney Tractor and Ap-
pliance Co., Jackson's Grocery,
and Dr. J. H. Miller's office,
suffered extensive damage in a
fire here early Sunday morn-
ing.

Origin of the blaze is un-
known, but it was believed to
have started from an over-heated
motor of a meat box located
in the grocery, according to
Jim Kinney, owner of the build-
ings.

Mr. Kinney said "the base-
ment of the buildings was on

SOIL CONSERVATION NOTES

Sam Gold, a supervisor of the Marshall
County Soil Conservation District, won a \$50 U. S. Savings Bond, as a 2nd
place state prize in the Forestry Division
of the Save our Soil Contest. This
contest was open to entries in this state
for the first time last year.

Entries in the 1952 contest are now
being accepted. Entry blanks can be obtained
at the office of these agricultural
agencies in Benton:
SCS, PMA, and the
County Extension Service. All entries must
be turned in to the SCS
office by June 30.

I helped Hatler Morgan
stake terraces in
an eighteen acre field
last month on his farm south of Benton.

This field was seeded to grass last
fall. But a poor stand was obtained on
the steep slopes leading into two natural
draws of the field.

Morgan says, "The heavy rains last
winter washed off tons of the soil. I believe
that terraces on these slopes will
protect them until I can get a stand of
grass."

Morgan builds his own terraces with
his tractor and disc plow. After showing
him the proper method of building one
terrace, he went on and built the others
without any other supervision. Moving
the dirt three times was all that was necessary
to build them.

Will Gay and Kenneth Sholar, Olive,
planted one field of corn on the contour
last week. Bobby Dotson, 4H Club Member
at Fairdeal, and I helped them
stake the guide lines.

Two guide lines were all that were
needed on the field and they were located
where the longest and most uniform
rows could be planted.

Contour planting of row crops is the
easiest practice to do. And it does not
cost anything.

Contour planting saves soil, water,
seed, and fertilizer. In addition, it saves
tractor power, produces higher yields,
reduces costs, and increases profits. By
practicing everything is to be gained and
nothing lost.

Marvin Jones, north of Brewers, is
planting all his popcorn on the contour
again this year. Level farming on sloping
land is much easier.

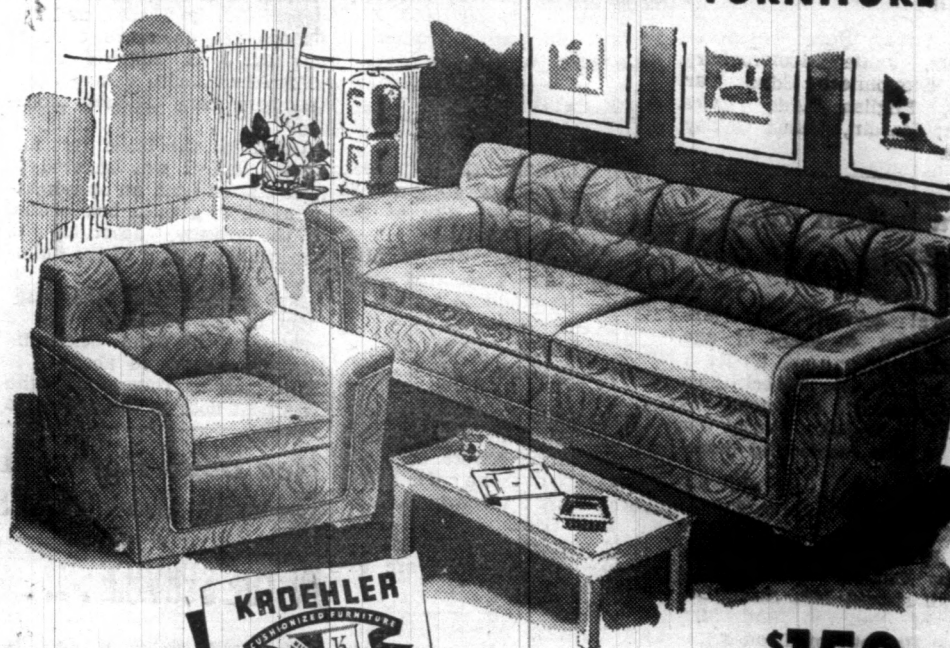

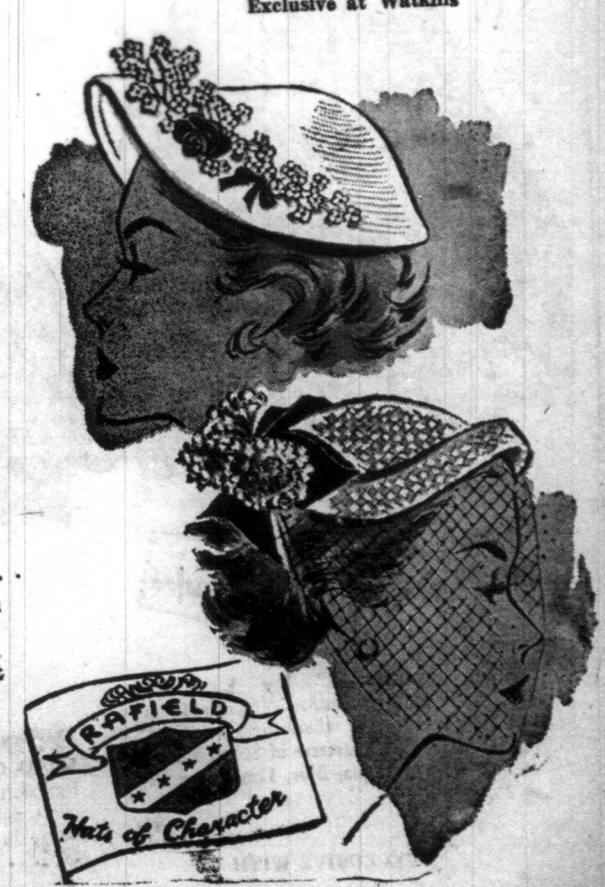

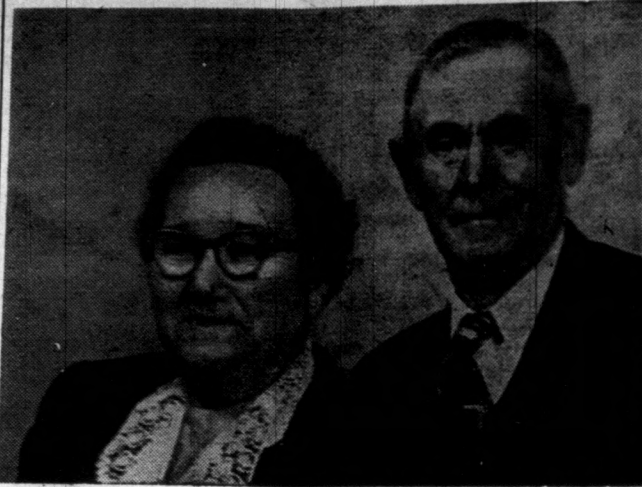
