P. W. PATTERSON, FORMER FULTON CITIZEN, IS DEAD

Passed Away at His Home in Texarkana, Friday

Texarkana, Ark., Dec. 22.—P. W. Patterson, 50, died at his home, Ninth and Hickory, at 4 p. m., Friday, end of a more than nine weeks' illness affecting his heart.

That Texarkana has lost another of its best citizens from the standpoint of interest in all activities that have served to make the city grow is keenly felt in business circles and in private life, despite the fact that what he did in behalf of his home town was done in an unostentatious manner.

P. W. Patterson, better known to his countless friends, as "Pete," was born in Fulton, Kentucky, April 11, 1876, son of Dr. and Mrs. S. G. Patterson, one of the fine old families of Kentucky. He came to Texarkana in 1895, at that time entering the service of G. A. Hays. In the fall of 1906, Mr. Patterson, together with W. H. Booth, withdrew from the Twin City Furniture and Undertaking company and formed a company of their own, then located in the building at Broad and Vine streets, occupied by the H. V. Beasley Music company.

This firm met with success and in 1903 the W. H. Booth company, of which he became secretary, was organized. In 1904 the building at Vine and Third streets was erected and this became the permanent home of the company. In 1909, Mr. Booth sold his interests to the Rogers Furniture company, A. N. Rodgers, of Dallas, coming in as president, and Mr. Patterson becoming vice-president and manager of the Texarkana store, which position he held to his death.

He is survived by his wife; one son, John Wallace Patterson; two sisters, Mrs. Jessie P. Bransford, Pomona, California; Mrs. A. Weiner, Memphis; one brother, S. G. Patterson, of Shawnee, Okla.

He was a member of the Lions Club, Texarkana Country Club, a ready and willing contributor to every activity for the benefit of Texarkana. He was a director in Gate City Building and Loan association.

There is no greater tribute that could be paid him, than that of just a few days ago, and no incident in his whole life in Texarkana that shows more fully his fine character of the man than the comment made by a newsboy, in addressing one of the doctors who attended Mr. Patterson during his long illness.

"Two of us, my brother and I, are sure going to miss him," said this boy, when told that his benefactor was not going to get well. "We sell papers for a living to keep mama. He buys our breakfast every morning so we can take all of the money home to her."

He never wanted publicity on any of his charities, but a further idea of his bigness is shown by the fact that every Christmas he hunted around until he found some family, in needy or destitute circumstance,

es, that had been overlooked by everybody else. It is significant that he never failed to find one, and the Christmas joy brought to that family could not be measured in words.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m., conducted by Rev. Julian S. Sleeper, assisted by Rev. F. M. Freeman, pastor of the First Methodist church, Sixth and Laurel. Burial will be in State Line cemetery.

JEALOUS, TRIES TO WRECK TRAIN

Hickman, Ky., Dec. 20.—The news just leaked out here today that an attempt was made to wreck the Illinois Central passenger train at Miller, ten miles west of Hickman, on December 8, when three stringers on one side of the wooden bridge at that point were found sawed almost in two. The man who is held for attempting to wreck the train is alleged to have made a confession in jail here today to S. W. Brown, special agent of the I. C. at Fulton, and E. A. Leighton, special agent of that road working out of Chicago. The man when arrested several days ago gave his name as Joe Taylor, of Cape Girardeau, Mo., but today said his real name was Alfred Bush-er. He said the engineer on the train had been flirting with his sweetheart each day as he passed Miller station, and this had enraged him and he had decided to get even with him, planning to saw the stringers in two on the bridge to wreck his engine and get rid of him. He gave no thought he said of what might happen to the passen-

But the bridge held up, and trains passed over it three days before the sawed stringers were found by trackman John Lyons, since which time the officers of the county and the detectives of the I. C. railroad, have been quietly working on the case.

Busher did the work on Sunday night, according to the reported confession, using a cross-cut saw that belonged to Lee Armstrong for whom he worked on Evans farm. It was by means of this saw striking the ground at the lowest place on the bridge that left marks that enabled them to locate the saw. Busher is 23 years old and admits having been arrested in St. Louis and Fort Wayne, Ind. He left the Armstrong home on Sunday night and did not return until Tuesday evening, expecting the wreck to occur during his absence. Brown and Leighton spent most of the day today in jail here trying to get a confession out of Busher, finally getting it. Busher said he was jealous of the daughter of his employer Lee Armstrong, who is only fifteen years old.

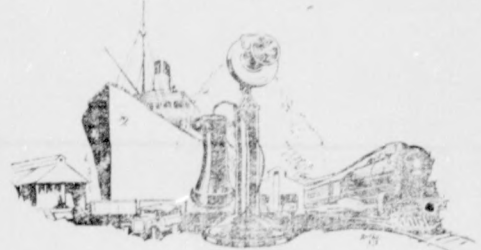

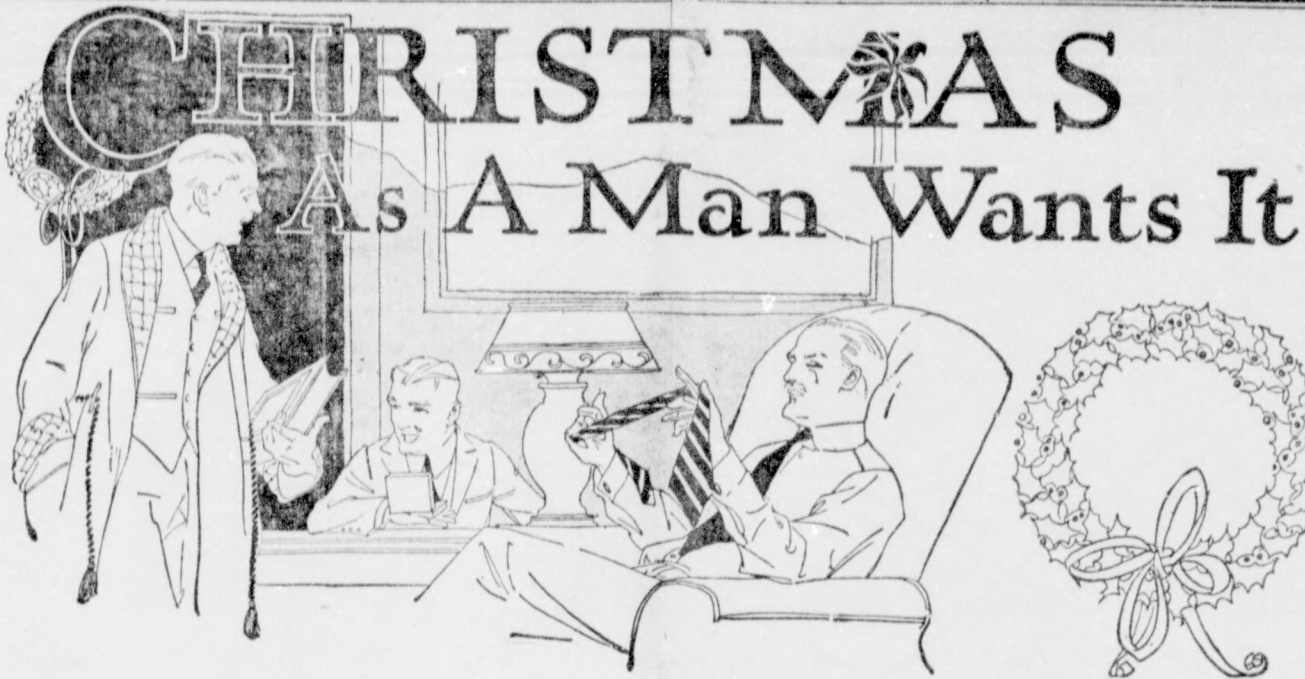

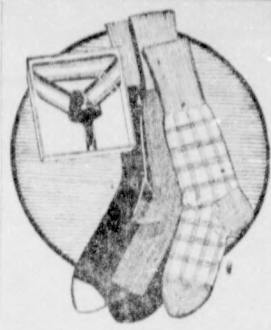

The Christmas Holly

NOTHING quite so typifies the spirit of Christmas as a bunch of beautiful, glistening foliaged and scarlet-berried holly. Holly seems the quintessence of Yule and should generally do occupy the place of honor in Christmas decorations.

There are states where the holly isn't to be found in great abundance. In some sections of the South a limited supply must be made to serve the purpose. For profuse decorations other greens fashioned from sprays of Irish yew whose fan-like and leafy foliage is ideal for this use; and, too, there are the beautiful, waxy leaves from the magnolia as well as cedar.

But the holly hough, of course, of all Christmas green is the loveliest and most popular, not only here but in other lands and in France, in particular, as it thrives grows it in quantities. The holly is of slow growth and propagated by seed which do not germinate until the second year. We think of holly berries always as being red, but some kinds bear yellow fruit, some white, and others even black.

The holly has a commercial value that isn't generally known. Its even-grained and hard wood is ivory white and is used for inlaying and as an ebony substitute for teapots handles and other articles, when stained. The leaves are used in medicine.—Frances Marshall Morgan, 626, 1924, Western Newspaper Union.

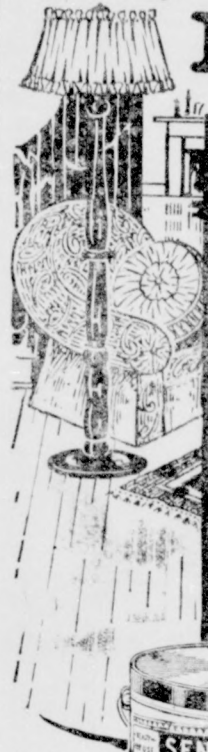

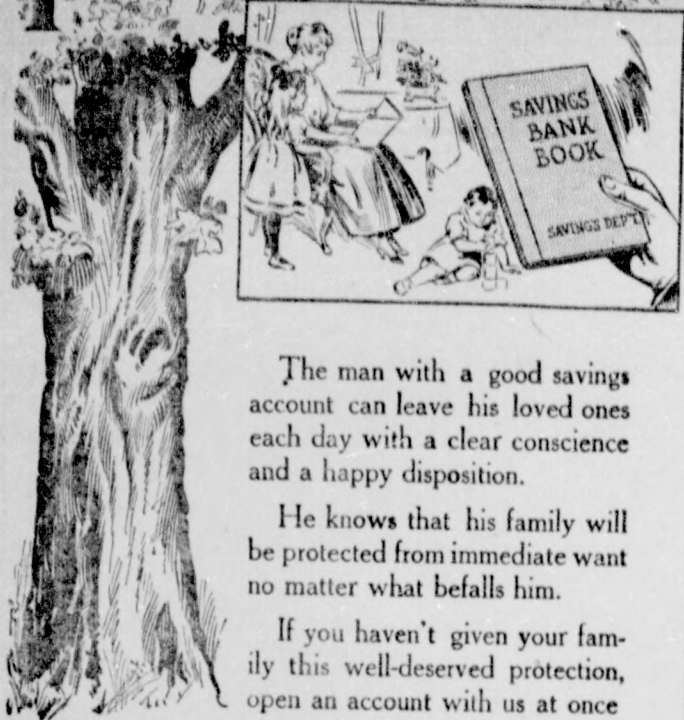

Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

By REV. F. B. FITZWATER, D.D., Dean of Day and Evening Schools, Moody Bible Institute of Chicago (Oct. 1924, Western Newspaper Union.)

Lesson for December 19

SAMUEL THE JUST JUDGE

LESSON TEXT—I Sam. 7:1-17, 12:1-15.
GOLDEN TEXT—Prepare your heart unto the Lord and serve Him only.
PRIMARY TOPIC—God Helps the People at Mizpah.
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Victory at Mizpah.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What Samuel Did for His People.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—How the Lord Helps.

I. Samuel Called the People to Forsake Their Idols (7:1-6).

Under the administration of Eli, the nation rapidly deteriorated. For their sins, God permitted the nation to be bitterly oppressed by the Philistines. Samuel promised them deliverance on the condition of repentance.

II. Samuel Prayed for the People (7:7-14).

Moved by fear of the Philistines the people brought Samuel to cry unto God for them. In response to his prayer God miraculously delivered them from the Philistines.

III. Samuel Judging Israel (7:15-17).

Bethel, Gilgal, Mizpah and Ramah were his circuits, to each of which he made annual visits. These centers were for the accommodation of the people.

IV. Samuel's Farewell Address (12:1-25).

When Saul, the new king, was crowned, Samuel turned over to him his authority, and gracefully retired. I. Samuel's challenge to the people (vv. 1-5).

(1) A reminder of the way the king had been given (v. 1).

He showed that they were directly responsible for the change in government. Though keenly feeling the reflection upon himself, and their ingratitude to God in their demand for a king, he had not resisted their wish.

(2) Review of his own administration (vv. 2, 3).

a. Walk from childhood (v. 2). Samuel's was a remarkable life; from childhood to old age he had lived an upright and pure life.

b. Career as judge and ruler (v. 3).

He boldly challenged them to show where and how he had ever oppressed anyone.

(3) The vote of confidence by the people (vv. 4, 5).

It was Samuel's right as he laid down the reins of government to have his record vindicated and to have his integrity established beyond a doubt, so that no evil-minded man should ever be able to cast reproach upon him.

2. Samuel reviews God's dealing from the time of Moses (vv. 6-15).

He reasoned with them concerning the good hand of the Lord upon them from the time of Moses. Though they with ingratitude turned from the Lord and demanded a king like the other nations, He had acceded to their request and set a king over them.

(1) National prosperity conditioned by obedience (v. 14).

Though they had displeased God in choosing a king, if they would fear the Lord and render obedience, national prosperity would still be given.

(2) Disobedience to God meant the nation's ruin (v. 15). It is folly to ask God's blessing upon a nation while it is living in rebellion against Him.

3. Samuel's own vindication (vv. 16-19).

This was such a critical hour in the history of the nation that Samuel sought to indelibly impress its meaning on their hearts. This he did by means of the thunder and rain out of season. Harvest time was not the season for thunder and rain, so when it came at Mizpah, the people were terrified. They saw it as an example of God's mighty power, which if directed against them, would destroy them in an instant.

4. Samuel's gracious response (vv. 20-25).

(1) "Fear not—serve the Lord with all your heart" (vv. 20-22).

Samuel did not minimize their sin but assured them that if they would serve the Lord wholeheartedly He would not forsake them. The ground of their hope was the faithfulness of God in keeping His covenant.

(2) "God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you" (v. 23).

The people had rejected Samuel, yet he had such magnanimity of soul that he did not allow their ingratitude to cause his intercession for them to cease. He assured them that in spite of their sin their one concern should be to fear the Lord and serve Him wholeheartedly.
