This county as well as the surrounding area is being canvassed to bring together the greatest youth talent show Marshall County has ever seen. No effort has been spared to get the best performance in this part of the state.

The program will include such talent as the Girls Quartet and the Mixed Quartet of Gilbetsville, Mixed Quartet of Sharpe, Girls Quartet of Benton, vocal solos by Jim Goheen, Lanette Howard, Connie Gillman and Joan Walker, the 4-H Club Trio of Sharpe, 4-H Duet from Breslers, novelty number by Dwight Wilkins, Patricia Rudolph, tap dancing number, from Benton, and piano solo by Karen Bailey.

Many other numbers are being planned.

Three prizes will be given. First prize \$15, second prize \$10, and third prize \$5. The applause meter method of selecting the winner will be used.

This is an open contest to all youth under 21 in the area, and all talent is invited.

Fonzie Davis of Radio Station WNGO of Mayfield will be master of ceremonies.

The doors will open at 7:15 p. m. The Benton High School band under the direction of Bill Havel will give a pre-program concert beginning at 7:45. Admission will be 50c and 25c. Damage Heavy; Auto Destroyed

Fire Wednesday noon swept the Standard Oil Station, located on Court Square, destroyed a 1949 Oldsmobile owned by John Strow, operator of the station, and extensively damaged the station itself.

The fire started about 12:30.

Mr. Strow said he was filling his Oldsmobile with gasoline when some of the gasoline spilled out on the concrete driveway and immediately ignited.

Flames shot up and engulfed the hose and the automobile gas tank.

Billie Green, station attendant, came out of the grease rack about that time and saw the flames. He helped Mr. Strow try to put out the fire but their efforts were futile. Billie raced to the town fire whistle, which is only a few yards from the station, and sounded the alarm.

Benton's Volunteer Fire Department, most of whom were at lunch, responded promptly and, after a hard fight, had the fire under control in about 30 minutes.

Large Crowd

The fire and billowing black smoke attracted a large noonday crowd of townspeople and visiting shoppers. Most of the spectators kept their distance, however, because of the intense heat and the danger of a possible big explosion.

The automobile gas tank did explode, but it was not a loud blast.

The flames never did reach the underground gasoline tanks, but destroyed two gasoline pumps and damaged the third.

Windows Broken

The front of the brick station was damaged and many of the windows were broken. One automobile on the grease rack was driven to safety by another attendant, Spike.

The station is next door to the city hall and if the flames had gotten out of control the city hall would have been endangered.

The filling station property is owned by Standard Oil Company.

Three other programs will follow on the same schedule on the nights of July 12, July 26 and August 9.

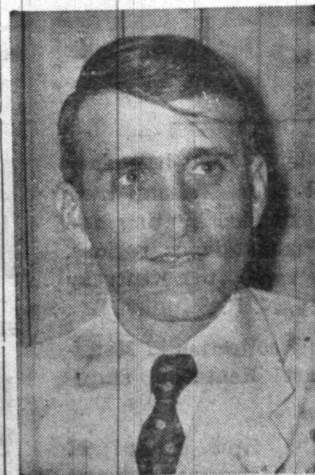

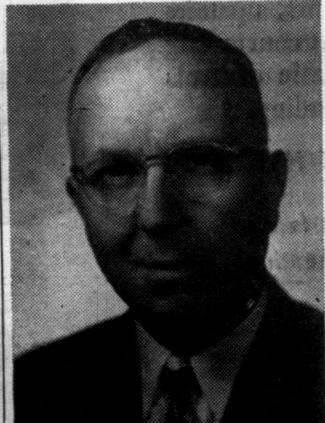

SOIL CONSERVATION

T. E. Harrison and Rochie Howard dug some drainage ditches recently in their bottom land northwest of Benton. Both were handicapped because there were no good outlets. It is hard to find a good outlet in any of the streams which flow into Clark's River. By digging these ditches they hope to carry off some of the surface water so that a crop can be grown if it is a reasonably dry year. They are co-operators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District.



W. W. Shemwell, Oak Level, has made his

first cutting of sericea hay this spring. Sericea makes the best hay if it is cut when about 12 inches high. The yield will be higher the second cutting.

T. D. Humphreys and I. Soil Conservation technicians, have been helping Hoy Thompson, south of Benton, make surveys for two large farm ponds. He hopes to build the dams for one or both of these ponds in August or September.

Cleatus Cunningham, north of Oak Level, dug a farm pond last week. The pond was located in a deep gully which was shaped in such a way that he could use it without danger of starting serious erosion again.

Joe Parker, southwest of Benton, and Jack Shemwell, south of Oak Level, received their complete soil and water conservation farm plans last week. Shemwell plans to continue the establishment of his plan this year by digging a pond and sowing more permanent pasture.

Lester Dunn, Calvert City, is going to rebuild an old pond levee. I helped him set the stakes for the new levee and also the water line and the spillway.
