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

Funeral home owners' son arrested on fraud charge

The son of the Imes-Miller Funeral Home owners was charged with insurance fraud after allegedly switching a pre-paid funeral plan to a monthly payment plan.

Richard Matt Imes, 29, was arrested at 5 p.m. Monday on charges of fraudulent insurance acts more than \$300 and second-degree forgery, according to the Kentucky State Police. Imes, who is a funeral director at his parents' Imes-Miller Funeral Home, was released from the Calloway County jail on a cash bond later that day, a jail spokesman said.

According to KSP Public Affairs Officer Barry Meadows, state police officers began the investigation after Calloway County Attorney David Harrington's office received a complaint of insurance fraud at the funeral home. Troopers executed search warrants at Imes-Miller Funeral Home and Churchill-Imes Family Funeral Home on March 31. Multiple documents were obtained in the search, Meadows said.

An arrest warrant was obtained

Monday for Imes. Other charges are pending as KSP continues to investigate the situation with the Kentucky Department of Insurance and the Attorney General's Office, according to a state police release.

According to Meadows, a male client paid up front and in full for a \$4,420 pre-paid funeral plan at Imes-Miller, but the plan was changed to a 10-year payment plan once it was reported to the insurance company. Meadows said the forgery charge stems from the signature on the funeral plan document.

Kenneth Imes, who along with wife Mary Beth Imes have owned Imes-Miller Funeral Home and Churchill-Imes Family Funeral Home in Murray for approximately three years, said that, in general, funeral homes would not take money off funeral plans, even if the type of plan was changed.

In a written statement, Kenneth Imes alleged the investigation "is a profit-driven investigation instigated by a competitor."

"An individual requested a refund of a fully-funded, irrevocable pre-arranged funeral insurance policy. Inasmuch as the policy was irrevocable, Imes-Miller Funeral Home could not refund the individual's money," the statement read. "The individual had the insurance policy transferred to Blalock, Coleman & York Funeral Home and

Budget talks begin for City of Murray

While cost-of-living expenses demand higher salaries and retirement contributions require additional dollars, the city's health insurance costs remain the same today as they did in 2001.

City council members and administrative officials began their

budget talks this week during the finance committee meeting at city hall. While the city budget will account for other increased expenses concerning its employees, health insurance is one line item that will remain unchanged.

Since 2001, medical insurance for two or more people costs \$8,036 annually. Each family plan costs the

city \$6,650 each year and \$1,386 comes out of the employee's check. For a single medical insurance plan, the city pays the entire \$2,496 annually.

"We've been fortunate for the last couple years because our insurance is self-funded," said Don Leet, the city's finance officer.

City officials recommended to

the council's finance committee several salary-related suggestions. Based on a cost-of-living adjustment, the city recommends all employees receive a 2.5 percent pay increase in the 2004-05 budget. Historically, the city gives raises greater than the regional Consumer

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Fletcher representatives branching out around Western Kentucky

The Governor's office is branching out beyond Frankfort and into Western Kentucky.

Wednesday, a representative from Gov. Ernie Fletcher's office came to Calloway County Courthouse to address individual constituent problems. Virginia Bishop, executive assistant with the Western Kentucky field office of the governor, set up a mini-office at the courthouse and met with individuals one-on-one.

Despite meeting only one person yesterday, Bishop said the task is to cover all concerns of Kentuckians.

"We are to be the eyes and ears of the governor," she said of dealing with situations important to the people in Western Kentucky. "Whether

it is a pot-hole in the road or a problem with the state."

Bishop said constituent reports are filled out by the individual then submitted to specific case workers who will contact individuals on various concerns. She admitted that the process can sometimes be a long one, as with anything in government.

The main Western Kentucky field office is located in Madisonville, but she and field representative Eddie Sprags travel to two counties a day to meet with people. Wednesday was the first time the Western Kentucky field office has made its rounds, which will total 21 counties.


Bishop said the initial plan is to visit each county of the 21 total area at least once a month.

"Hopefully it will catch on," she said before heading to Graves County for a similar visit yesterday afternoon.

As well as traveling to different counties, the field representatives will also be part of Area Development District meetings or economic development meetings as representatives to the governor's office. "Anything that is important for the governor," Bishop said.

She said since Wednesday's stop was her first visit to Calloway County, she didn't expect many visitors ... yet. She also said she was unprepared to discuss the governor's political strategies and plans.

"I don't have the answer to a lot of questions," she said. "It is my job to find answers. It is kind of like customer service."

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Gunmen kidnap Japanese, S. Korean citizens

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Shiite Muslim militias held partial control today over three southern Iraqi cities, while Sunni insurgents killed a U.S. Marine in the battle for Fallujah. In escalating violence, gunmen kidnaped three Japanese and eight South Korean civilians.

In a videotape broadcast to the Arab world by Al-Jazeera, kidnapers armed with automatic rifles and swords threatened to kill the blindfolded Japanese hostages unless Tokyo removed its troops from Iraq. Japan said it had "no reason" to withdraw.

Three explosions rocked central Baghdad, with smoke rising from the Green Zone — the sealed-off neighborhood where the U.S.-led coalition has its headquarters. The military did not immediately report any casualties.

Iraq's interior minister, who leads police and security forces, resigned at the request of top U.S. administrator, L. Paul Bremer, to maintain balance between Sunni and Shiite factions on the governing council. It was unclear if the resignation of Nuri al-Badr was also connected with the failure of Iraqi police to confront insurgents that coalition forces are battling on two fronts.

The militia led by radical Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr has full control over the city of Kut and partial control in Najaf, but coalition forces will move soon to break their hold, said Army Lt. Gen. Ricardo Sanchez, the top U.S. general in Iraq said.

Residents of Kufa said militiamen also control that southern city by holding police stations and govern-

ernment buildings. Sanchez said there appeared to be links "at the lowest levels" between the Shiite militia — which has been battling coalition forces in at least a half-dozen southern cities this week — and Sunni Arab insurgents who have long fought U.S. troops in central Iraq cities such as Fallujah and Ramadi.

Ukrainian troops were forced to withdraw from their bases in Kut on Wednesday, but Sanchez said coalition forces would retake it "imminently."

He suggested that the presence of hundreds of thousands of Shiite pilgrims in Najaf for a religious occasion this weekend was hampering coalition forces from moving against militiamen there.

"We are very cognizant of the religious ceremonies," he said.

Polish and Bulgarian soldiers drove off Shiites who attacked them near the municipal hall in Karbala south of Baghdad during all-night battles, a Polish spokesman said.

Coalition forces suffered no casualties but killed nine attackers and wounded about 20 others, Lt. Col. Robert Strzelecki in an interview from Iraq.

The attacks began about 11 p.m. Wednesday and continued until nearly sunrise, Strzelecki said. The attackers, loyal to al-Sadr, used machine guns, rocket-propelled grenades and small arms during fighting that the spokesman described as heavy.

In the Sunni stronghold of Fallujah, U.S. Marines fought insurgents for a second day. One U.S. Marine was reported killed, although no details were released.

Price Index, which measures inflation. In 2003, employees received a 3.6 percent salary increase while the inflation was estimated at 1.66 percent.

"We've been giving good raises," city accountant Carol Roberts told the committee. "They should be happy with that."

Committee member and councilman Jay Morgan said city employees deserve raises but he wants to make sure other city residents won't suffer by having to pay increased taxes.

"I don't have a problem with anyone getting a raise," he said. "I know it has to come from somewhere. But I hope we can do this without raising property taxes."

Another recommendation was made for performance-based dollars. Each department would be allocated a set dollar amount to be used for employee performance evaluations. If employees' performances are determined to be below expectations or satisfactory, then they would not receive additional dollars. For someone who meets expectations, a \$250 amount would be added to their annual salary. Outstanding employee performances would earn workers \$750.

"Certain dollar amounts would be allotted for each department," Leet said. "If you think 75 percent of a group of employees will get \$750, that's not going to happen."

Jobs have changed since 1998, when the city last revised its pay plan for different employment classifications, Leet said.

In a budget recommendation, the city administration wants to allocate \$15,000 to the general fund and \$20,000 to the utility fund to bring parity to job levels in the city and stay competitive with the open market, Leet said. Those two funds pay the salaries for the city's 160-plus employees.

"We need some parity with certain jobs and that is what we are addressing," he said. "It would help recruit competitive people for some of the openings we have."

Another suggestion to help the city positions remain competitive with other jobs is to increase the entry-level salaries by 2 percent. City officials said this is especially important with public safety workers.

The state mandated an increase in the amount of money the city contributes to its employees retirement funds.

In the current fiscal year, the city contributes 18.51 percent of the gross wages for hazardous employees, including police officers and firefighters, and 7.34 percent for a

non-hazardous employees. Those amounts will increase to 22.08 percent and 8.48 percent, respectively, for the coming fiscal year.

Leet also highlighted projected 2004 revenue for the committee, which councilman Bill Wells chairs. Property taxes are expected to increase \$238,914 to \$2,050,000. Insurance taxes should generate at least an additional \$74,000. Fees collected from alcoholic beverage sales are projected to be down about \$19,000 because restaurant sales are beginning to level off.

Projected 2004 revenues are estimated to be \$5,501,500, which is an \$114,259 increase from actual 2003 revenues. "Overall our revenues are up," Leet said. "It's nothing tremendous, but it's good, steady growth."

Currently, Murray Independent Schools pay the city \$12,500 to collect the school tax. That's three-fourths of 1 percent of the total \$1,635,451 collected for the school system. In comparison, the Calloway County Schools pays the sheriff's department 3 percent of the total taxes.

Leet said the city proposes increasing the collection fee to 1.5 percent of the school taxes. That would amount to \$25,000.

Committee member and councilman Tommy Sanders said that amount seems generous and suggested increasing the fee more.

"I am not against the schools, but we are here to take care of the city," Sanders said.

City officials have discussed the increase with Murray Superintendent Dale Reid and the amount seems to be an acceptable to both parties, Wells said.

"We are here to work out a plan for both," he said. "This seems to be a fair amount."

Wanting to maintain a positive partnership seems to be what makes Murray unique among cities, according to committee member and councilman Bill Adams. "Historically, that's the difference," he said. "Murray cares about the good of all."

Evening fire destroys South Calloway house

HAZEL, Ky. — A fire destroyed a house in extreme southern Calloway County Wednesday night.

Calloway County Fire-Rescue received the call just before 8 p.m. at a location on Baker's Crossroad, approximately four miles west of Hazel, just off State Line Road. A CCFR spokesman said the house was engulfed in flames at the time the call was received, and had collapsed by the time firefighters reached the scene.

The name of the house's owner was not given. No injuries were reported.

CCFR stayed at the scene more than an hour, having sent two trucks from Station No. 8 at Taylor's Store and five from its No. 1 station at Murray. A total of 12 firefighters answered the call.

The cause of the blaze is unknown. The fire is still under investigation.

shortly thereafter, the current investigation started.

Since noted in Imes' statement, Blalock, Coleman & York officials were contacted by the Ledger & Times for comments this morning. Co-owner Kelvin York confirmed the funeral home has the pre-arrangement but did not know about the refund request.

"We do have the prearrangement at our funeral home and we intend to honor that in full as it should have been in the beginning," York said by phone. "We didn't know about the request for a refund."

Another statement Imes released later this morning showed support for his son.

"To the best of my knowledge, Matt has not done anything criminal but if he has, he will be held accountable," it read. "No matter what happens, he is my son and I intend to support him."

"We have reviewed all of the pre-paid funeral arrangements at both Imes-Miller Funeral Home and Churchill-Imes Funeral Home and all are fully funded and no pre-need arrangement is at risk." Kenneth Imes stated in the release that anyone with questions or concerns may contact the funeral home at 753-7000.

Richard Imes is scheduled to appear in Calloway District Court for an arraignment at 9 a.m. April 19.

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Rice acknowledges nation not on 'war footing' at time of Sept. 11 attacks

WASHINGTON (AP) — National security adviser Condoleezza Rice testified today "there was no silver bullet that could have prevented" the Sept. 11, 2001 terror strikes, conceding the United States was ill-prepared despite a threat two decades in the making.

Rice said the president came into office determined to develop a "more robust" policy to combat al-Qaida. "He made clear to me that he did not want to respond to al-Qaida one attack at a time. He told me he was 'tired of swatting flies,'" she the commission delving into the attacks that killed nearly 3,000, destroyed the twin World Trade Center towers in New York and blasted a hole in the Pentagon.

In widely anticipated testimony, Rice offered no apology for the failure to prevent the attacks — as Clarke did two weeks ago. Instead, she said, "as an officer of government on duty that day, I will never forget the sorrow and the anger I felt."

But she also said, "Tragically, for all the language of war spoken before Sept. 11, this country simply was not on a war footing."

Rice's testimony, under oath and on live national television, came after weeks of White House resistance. Bush yielded in response to repeated public requests from members of the commission — as well as quiet proddings of Republicans in Congress — that an on-the-record rebuttal was needed in response to Clarke's explosive charges.

The former White House aide testified last month that the Bush administration gave a lower priority to combatting terrorism than had former President Clinton, and that the decision to invade Iraq undermined the war on terror. In addition to raising questions about administration attention to the threat of terrorism, his remarks implicitly challenged a key underpinning of Bush's campaign for re-election.

Rice's appearance was businesslike for the most part, but turned contentious when Richard Ben-Veniste, a Democratic member of the commission, pressed her on what was known about the terrorist threat in advance of the Sept. 11 attacks. They interrupted one another repeatedly, the interrogator and the witness.

"I would like to finish my point," she said when he began speaking while she was.

"I didn't know there was a point," he replied.

Under questioning, Rice acknowledged that she had spoken too broadly once when she said that no one had ever envisioned terrorists using planes and crashing them into buildings. She said that aides came to her within days and said there had been reports or memos about that possibility, but that she hadn't seen them.

Pointing a finger of blame, she said that senior officials "have to depend on intelligence agencies to tell you what is relevant."

She also directly challenged one of the claims made by Clarke, who said earlier that the administration had moved slowly on some of the recommendations he and others made before the attacks.

"I'm now convinced that while nothing in this strategy would have done anything about 9-11, if we had in fact moved on the things that were in the original memos that we got from our counterterrorism people, we might have even gone off course," she said.

Asked to rebut Clarke's claim that Bush pressed him to find an Iraq connection to the suicide hijackings, Rice said she did not recall such a discussion but that "I'm quite certain the president never pushed anybody to twist the facts."

She added, "It is not surprising that the president would say 'What about Iraq?'" But she said that when Bush's top advisers met after Sept. 11, none recommended action against Iraq before taking military action against Afghanistan.

In her prepared testimony, Rice neither criticized Clarke nor offered a point by point rebuttal of his appearance. She said she made the unusual decision to retain him when the new administration came into office, saying, he was an "expert in his field, as well as an experienced crisis manager."

She said confronting terrorists competed with other foreign policy concerns when the president came into office, but added that the administration's top national security advisers completed work on the first major national security policy directive of the administration on Sept. 4. The subject, she said, was "not Russia, not missile defense, not Iraq, but the elimination of al-Qaida."

Bush, she said, "understood the threat, and he understood its importance," she said.

"He made clear to me that he did not want to respond to al-Qaida one attack at a time. He told me he was 'tired of swatting flies,'" Rice told the commission.

Rice slid into the witness chair before an audience that included relatives of victims of the attacks, in which terrorists flew hijacked jetliners into the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. A fourth plane — presumably on course for the Capitol or another high-profile target in Washington — crashed into a field in Pennsylvania after passengers engaged in a struggle with the hijackers.

been better information about threats inside the United States, something made difficult by structural and legal impediments that prevented the collection and sharing of information by our law enforcement and intelligence agencies," she said.

Rice read some of the "chatter" that the United States picked up during the spring and summer that raised alarms about a possible attack: "Unbelievable news in coming weeks." "Big event... there will be a very, very, very big uproar." "There will be attacks in the near future."

Kean extended a welcome to Rice, and the panel's co-chairman, former Indiana Democratic Rep. Lee Hamilton, promised "some searching and some difficult questions."

Rice was emphatic on one point — that the threat of terrorism had been building for years.

"The terrorists were at war with us, but we were not yet at war with them. For more than 20 years, the terrorist threat gathered, and America's response across several administrations of both parties was insufficient," she said.

"In hindsight, if anything might have helped stop 9/11, it would have

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
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
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
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
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
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
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

KILLING bin LADEN

WASHINGTON (AP) — Somewhere in Afghanistan, some time before the Sept. 11 attacks, the CIA came calling on Ahmed Shah Massoud.

He was a fearsome Tajik warlord who had worked with the agency to end the Soviet occupation in the 1980s. Now he was fighting the Taliban government and the CIA wanted to support his fight against another common enemy: Osama bin Laden.

But first came the ground rules: A CIA officer read Massoud a document spelling out the precise, legal terms under which Massoud's Northern Alliance could — or could not — attack bin Laden.

Massoud laughed. "You Americans are crazy. You guys never change," he said.

The undated exchange was cited last month by the independent commission investigating the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks as an example of CIA frustration over the obstacles it faced in pursuing bin Laden between 1998 and 2001.

The findings by the commission, while overshadowed by the testimony of former Bush counterterrorism adviser Richard Clarke, offer a rare and extraordinary public account of the United States' most secret of operations.

They highlight what the commission identified as a key problem in the American efforts to get bin Laden: conflicting views over the circumstances in which Massoud and other CIA-backed fighters were permitted to kill the al-Qaida leader in his Afghan refuge.

Those barriers were largely swept aside after the Sept. 11 attacks. Until then, though, U.S. officials were cautious in their dealings with Afghan warlords and reluctant to endanger innocents in their pursuit of bin Laden.

It is still not clear what exactly the limitations were. According to the commission, Clinton administration officials said a series of presidential findings gave the CIA broad authority to have bin Laden killed; the CIA thought it could kill bin Laden only as part of a legitimate operation to capture him.

The presidential findings, known as memorandums of notification, remain classified. In interviews, former government and intelligence officials have varying recollections of how many were issued, when they were issued and what precisely they said. Most officials spoke on condition of anonymity.

The memorandums were signed by former President Clinton after the August 1998 bombings of U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania. The commission report said the CIA was instructed "to use its proxies to capture or assault bin Laden and his lieutenants in operations in which they might be killed. The instructions, except in one defined contingency, were to capture bin Laden if possible."

The authorities granted to the CIA gradually increased, but a former senior CIA official said Clinton never signed a "pure kill" authorization.

"You could plan a capture and if (bin Laden was killed), fine, but you couldn't hide behind a tree and shoot them," the official said.

The CIA saw the capture requirement as an impediment, the commission report said. A former head of the CIA station that target-

ed bin Laden was quoted as saying, "We always talked about how much easier it would have been to kill him."

But former White House officials say the authorizations shouldn't have been an obstacle.

The CIA should try to have bin Laden captured, "but if the circumstances prevented the capture, then they were to kill him," one former White House counterterrorism official said.

In an interview, Clarke said there were four or five memorandums and while the first one was ambiguous, the later ones were not.

"My understanding is the last one in particular said 'we understand that capture is impossible' rather than saying bin Laden could be killed 'if capture is impossible.'"

Clinton administration legal advisers determined that killing bin Laden would not violate a 1976 ban on assassinations. It would have been considered self-defense against someone who posed an imminent threat to the United States, according to the commission report.

Clinton clearly wanted to kill bin Laden with cruise missile strikes in 1998, former officials said. Also, several officials cited an authorization which would have permitted the downing of a helicopter with bin Laden aboard.

The CIA-backed fighters did not have free rein. Guidelines were needed because of reservations about dealing with local Afghans, many of whom were known for crimes and brutality.

The memorandums "did not say here's a pile of money, go to Afghanistan and let them anybody kill anybody they want to kill," a former Clinton administration official said.

CIA-backed fighters had about six opportunities to attack bin Laden, usually while he was traveling near his Afghan base, the report said. Each time the plan was abandoned because bin Laden took a different route or security was too tight, or because it was feared innocents would be killed.

Several former government officials noted that the CIA participated in the drafting of the authorizations and could have objected if they didn't go far enough. The commission report also said that no one at the CIA ever complained that the authorizations were too restrictive.


The former CIA official said the agency tried to broaden its authority at one point, but the expanded language did not survive into the final version of the memorandum.

The commission also referred to some reticence at the CIA. At least two senior officials were morally opposed to getting the CIA involved in what might have looked like an assassination, the report said. One former counterterrorism chief said he would have refused an order to directly kill bin Laden.

Appearing before the commission's hearing, CIA Director George Tenet declined to discuss specifics of the authorizations but hinted that the CIA may not have been in a position to directly target bin Laden, making the question of authority less significant.

He said "the capability to do what you're asked to do is actually a lot more important than the authorities that you're granted." He said if his capabilities had grown, he would have sought expanded authority.

Kerry's Crash Continues

The latest daily tracking polls by Scott Rasmussen show that President Bush has moved up six points in the past week to take a three-point lead over Sen. John Kerry. For a while, the Kerry collapse was disguised by the national focus on Richard Clarke's accusations about Bush's policies before and after 9/11. The short-term impact of the Clarke hearings was to besmirch the Bush image, but once the headlines faded, the remorseless Bush attacks on Kerry began to take their toll in earnest.

The conventional wisdom has been that the contest between Bush and Kerry will be very close. But the evidence is mounting that it may not be. Consider what Bush has going for him:

■ With gas prices at record heights, Kerry is on the spot because of his advocacy of a higher gas tax.

Voters know that the president can't control oil prices, but they sure know he can raise or lower taxes.

■ The recent economic-growth and job-creation data is pulling the rug out from under Kerry inch by inch. A few more months like March, and his entire campaign theme will be made moot.

■ More and more voters are becoming convinced that Kerry would raise their taxes. His promises to confine tax hikes to the rich are about as credible as an alcoholic's pledge only to drink at night. Once they start raising taxes, voters figure, they can't stop themselves.

■ It is evident that Kerry has no effective answer for Bush's charge that he would undermine homeland security. With the national focus shifting more and more to terrorism and away from the fading recession, Bush's lead becomes ever more daunting.



■ Kerry's own work habits are subject to question. His ski vacation and elective shoulder surgery put him on the sidelines when he most needed to defend himself against Bush's attacks.

On the other side of the ledger are the continuing casualties in Iraq. Bush can't sustain these losses week after week. He dare not go into the election with a daily body count topping each night's news.

While the news media will cover U.S. and Iraqi deaths with the same sensationalism, American voters care vastly more about the safety of our own troops than the restoration of peace and order in Iraq. Bush needs to get over his nation-building fixation and cut our losses after the transfer of sovereignty.

He should keep our troops on bases and end the patrols into the towns and villages. That task is best handled by the Iraqi police and troops themselves. The U.S. soldiers should be standing by to stop the bad guys from coming back into power. Even if Iraq remains a powder keg with

constant bombings and attacks, they will make no political difference in our election unless Americans are killed.


Without the economy to use as a hot button issue to attract voters, the Democratic Party is likely to begin to focus instead in Medicare and Social Security, raising alarms and fears about Bush's privatization alternatives and attacking the prescription-drug benefit. A nice countermove would be to focus on Kerry's support for higher taxes on Social Security recipients and the fact that he missed the vote on Bush's prescription-drug legislation.

The Democrats really have no issues and their candidate is way too far to the left. The hiring of John Sasso, competent as he may be, is indicative. Kerry seems destined to run the worst Democratic campaign since Mike Dukakis, Sasso's previous employer.







Jordan Huston had a career day, going 4-for-4 at the plate and driving in the winning runs as the Murray High Lady Tigers came from behind to beat Heath 4-3 on Wednesday.

Trailing 3-2 in the seventh inning, Breanna Volp drew a lead-off walk and Megan Snow provided a sacrifice-bunt to advance Volp to second. Emily Seay then hit a hard shot up the middle that put runners on the corners.

Shania Marinoff followed suit with a walk to load the bases, and then Huston rocketed a shot to the gap in right-center field that scored Volp and Seay for the win.

Kaci Carpenter (5-1) struck out eight, walked two and allowed five hits and two earned runs in helping Murray (7-1) to the victory.

The Lady Pirates have been a thorn in Murray High's side since third-year head coach Patty Patterson took over the Lady Tiger program.

"There are only two teams out there that we have had trouble with since I have been here, and Heath is one of them," she said. "The two times that we have played Heath, I feel like we beat ourselves."

"But this was a good win and a great game," Patterson said of her second win of the season over Heath.

The Lady Tigers blanked Heath 2-0 in the second game of last week's Lone Oak Invitational.

Huston, who finished perfect at the plate and with two RBIs, caught the attention of her head coach.

"I've been saying for two years now that Jordan could do that," Patterson said. "She's got a good bat and she's a strong hitter. She really stepped up for us."

Huston scored the first run of the game, touching home plate in the second inning off a sacrifice bunt by Shannon Elias.

The Lady Tigers took a 2-0 lead in the third, when Snow reached on a fielder's choice and advanced to third on a passed ball. Snow scored off a Marinoff RBI

single. Heath tied the game at 2-2 in the top of the fourth and took a 3-2 lead in the top of the fifth.

The Lady Tigers resume play Friday, when they host Livingston Central at 5 p.m.

Auburn names Lebo new coach

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Chattanooga coach Jeff Lebo accepted the same job at Auburn, the online edition of the Chattanooga Times Free Press reported Thursday.

Lebo, who led the Southern Conference Mocs to a 40-20 record in two seasons, told the newspaper he was taking the Auburn job left open by the departure of Cliff Ellis.

Lebo couldn't immediately be reached for comment by The Associated Press.

Hal Baird, athletics assistant to Auburn Interim President Ed Richardson, said when asked about the report Thursday: "I hope what you're hearing is right. I think we're closer."

Lebo said he would speak to reporters in Chattanooga about 1 p.m. EDT.

The Auburn package of about \$800,000 is more than double what Lebo makes at Chattanooga, the newspaper reported.

Lebo, a star at North Carolina, previously was head coach at Tennessee Tech, where his teams won back-to-back Ohio Valley Conference championships. He also worked as an assistant under Eddie Fogler at Vanderbilt and South Carolina.

The coach was interviewed by Richardson Wednesday. Lebo and his wife, Melissa, spent eight hours on Auburn's campus Wednesday, touring Beard-Eaves-Memorial Coliseum and meeting athletic department officials.

Athletic department spokesman Jeff Romero told the AP Thursday that Lebo had not contacted him.

Racers working with offense, new 'D' coordinator

Looking for playmakers has been an offseason priority for Murray State head football coach Joe Pannunzio.

The Racers struggled to a 4-8 finish in 2003, primarily because they lacked game-breaking offensive ability. And the search for that type of talent has extended into MSU's spring practice sessions.

"I'm still concerned because we don't have enough breakaway threats," said Pannunzio, whose squad has reached about the midway point of its allotted 15 practices this spring. "I'm excited about the way we're coming together, but we've still got a lot of work to do."

Murray must find a way to improve on its 2003 offensive production, which finished next to last in the nine-team Ohio Valley Conference in total offense at an average of only 302.4 yards per game. That total bested only Eastern Illinois, which was the only school in the league to average less than 300 yards per game (292.8).

The Racers were also just seventh in the conference in scoring offense, averaging only 18.8 points per game. Only EIU (17.5 ppg.) and Tennessee-Martin (16.5) were worse.

The squad's struggles at quarterback proved to be a major factor in the low offensive numbers. An early-season injury to senior

Stewart Childress forced inexperienced sophomore left-hander Stephen Hatchell into action.

Hatchell, a Graves County product, at times showed potential, but was largely inconsistent. The 6-foot-2, 200-pounder's final numbers were the proof: 1,441 yards on 131-of-249 attempts, seven touchdowns and nine interceptions.

There is plenty of competition for the signal caller's post this spring as Hatchell is being joined on the practice field by sophomore-to-be Ryne Salyer, rising junior Trevor Larson, junior-college transfer Adam Fisher and Justin Gaines, a mid-year transfer from Louisiana Tech.

The five candidates will continue to duke it out this spring. However, the results of that competition will likely have to wait.

"We're not going to make a decision on a quarterback until August," Pannunzio explained. "They're all working hard and getting better, but we're only seven or eight days into practice."

As is typical for this time of year, the defense has positioned itself ahead of the offensive unit in workouts. However, the defense has been slowed somewhat by a coaching change.

In perhaps the program's biggest offseason move, Pannunzio replaced defensive coordinator Mike Vite with former Army and Illinois State assistant coach Dennis Therrell.

Therrell comes to MSU from

Army, where he served the past four years as the Black Knights' defensive coordinator under head coach Todd Berry. The Pikeville, Tenn., native also served under Berry in the same capacity at Illinois State from 1996 to 2000.


A Tennessee Tech graduate, Therrell played on the Golden Eagles' 1975 OVC championship team. His coaching career has also included stops at Middle Tennessee State (assistant), Tennessee (graduate assistant) and Division III Lock Haven University (head coach).

"With a new defensive coordinator, our kids are having to learn a whole new system," noted Pannunzio. "It's going to take some time."

Also new to the Racers this spring is a morning workout schedule, which was instituted by Pannunzio to foster better discipline within the program.

"Our attitude is just so different and so much better," he claimed. "We're getting up at 6 a.m. and working out in the weight room and doing some different things. The main thing is just the consistency of doing it day after day."

Summitt: Lady Vols have plenty to be proud of

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Tennessee coach Pat Summitt and the Lady Vols were welcomed home Wednesday by about 300 fans who gathered for a celebration complete with indoor fireworks, streamers and proclamations from the mayor and governor.

Similar rallies have been held after winning a national championship — not coming in second. But the university felt this team deserved it.

This season's Lady Vols were considered less talented than previous editions, but they made it to the NCAA final in New Orleans after a run of heart-pounding wins. Tennessee lost to Connecticut 70-61 Tuesday night.

"You have been an inspiration to us," Summitt said in addressing the fans. "At times, you know we needed inspiration."

Knox County proclaimed Wednesday as "University of Tennessee Lady Vols Bas-

ketball Day," and Gov. Phil Bredesen declared it "Lady Vols Day." Representatives of U.S. Sens. Bill Frist and Lamar Alexander and the sister of U.S. Rep. Jimmy Duncan spoke at the rally in Thompson-Boling Arena, and thanked the team for this season's accomplishments.

"Thanks for the memories. Thanks for the heart attacks!" said women's athletic director Joan Cronan, who presented Summitt with a basketball signed by legendary

UCLA coach John Wooden.

Leadership from three seniors, particularly Tasha Butts, helped Tennessee pull out several close victories.

"Obviously we wanted to win (the national championship). A lot of people didn't expect us to be there. We fought to the end and that's all we can ask for," Butts said.

Some consider this season Summitt's best coaching job.

Cards' bullpen leads way to first win

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals' rebuilt bullpen passed its first test.

Five relievers combined to allow just one run in six innings, and the Cardinals rallied for a 9-4 win over the Milwaukee Brewers on Wednesday night.

"The bullpen is strong, there's no doubt about it," starter Woody Williams said after throwing 82 pitches in three innings. "We've got a lot of guys with experience and they know how to get outs."

In the offseason, the Cardinals added Julian Tavarez, Ray King and Mike Lincoln to a bullpen that blew a major league-high 30 save opportunities last year, failing early while closer Jason Isringhausen was recovering from shoulder surgery.

Tavarez and Lincoln, along with holdover Cal Eldred, played key roles Wednesday.

The Cardinals also overcame some shoddy defense to beat a Brewers team that nicked them for 15 runs the first two games.

Scott Rolen capped a five-run rally in the seventh inning with a three-run homer. Rolen and Jim Edmonds each hit their first homers of the season for the Cardinals, who stumbled out of the gate against a team that went 68-94 last year.

"Nobody was panicking, obviously," Rolen said. "But it's nice to start tallying wins instead of tallying losses."

Wes Helms had three hits with two RBIs for the Brewers, who missed a chance to start the season 3-0 for only the sixth time in franchise history. They last did it in 1995.

The Cardinals got five runs on five

hits in the seventh off Adrian Hernandez (0-1), making his season debut after making the team as a non-roster invitee. Albert Pujols' sacrifice fly tied it at 4 and Edmonds gave St. Louis the lead with a sharply hit ball that second baseman Junior Spivey knocked down in the shallow infield but could not stop.

Rolen followed Edmonds' hit with his home run on a full-count pitch.

"I know he's waiting for something to hit and I threw the curveball out over the plate," Hernandez said.

Williams totaled only five innings in spring training due to shoulder tendinitis, and the rust showed as he allowed three runs — two earned — on six hits. He struggled with his command, going to a full count against five of the first six batters and throwing 33 pitches in the Brewers' two-run second.

Have Augusta changes taken away Sunday drama?

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — It's a mantra that's as much a part of Augusta National as the azaleas and pimiento cheese sandwiches: The Masters doesn't begin until the back nine on Sunday.

Who'll ever forget Jack Nicklaus in 1986, charging from behind with a 30 on the final nine holes to win his sixth green jacket?

Or what happened a decade later, when Greg Norman staggered to the clubhouse with a 40, having surrendered a supposedly impregnable lead to Nick Faldo?

These days, it's hard to envision those sort of momentous events occurring on the final day of the Masters. In fact, the tournament could be over by the time they get to the back nine Sunday.

"There used to be creativity and imagination," Brad Faxon said. "Now, it's going to be plod along, plod along."

Beginning in 2002, Augusta National underwent two years of drastic changes, all in attempt to stay a stroke ahead of younger, stronger players and their increasingly high-tech equipment.

The revamped course is longer off the tee, thinner through the fairways, thicker in the rough. But the changes also have removed much of the risk-and-reward shot-making that defined so many Sun-

day afternoons.

The back nine has become the place to protect what you've got — and hope the others guys make the mistakes. Of course, everyone else is likely to be playing it safe, too.

Is this what the Masters is supposed to be?

"It used to be the fun tournament," Faxon said. "I don't think it's as fun as it used to be."

Just look at No. 13, a par-5 that was lengthened to 510 yards. With the tee box farther back, most players have given up on trying to curl their drives around the pine trees and creek on the left side of the fairway, cutting down on the number of eagle chances.

Three-time winner Tiger Woods isn't surprised. In fact, he told Augusta National chairman Hootie Johnson that stretching the hole would lead to less risk-taking.

"You won't see as many 7s on the hole, and you won't see as many 3s," Woods said. "You'll see a lot more 4s and 5s because you don't have that risk of taking the ball around the corner."

There's another par-5 at 15 — reachable in two, but requiring a long, accurate drive. A cluster of pines are starting to mature on the right side of the fairway.

Board decides GED recipients won't be called dropouts

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A student who quit school but quickly obtained a new type of GED for teens would no longer be classified as a dropout under a guideline approved Wednesday by the Kentucky Board of Education.

The equivalency diploma would not count for the school's graduation rate, but the student would have to take all the usual, mandatory state tests while pursuing it. That was "to ensure we're not using the GED, for lack of a better word, for a dumping ground" of problem students, Kyna Koch, an associate commissioner of the Department of Education, told board members.

Under the board's action, the Department of Education would develop statewide standards for a "secondary GED" — a General Educational Development program aimed at teens, not adults. The state's only current GED program is tailored for adults and is run by the adult-education division of the Council on Postsecondary Education. Present-day dropouts are barred from enrolling in the GED program for at least a year unless their superintendent grants a waiver.

Currently in Kentucky, a student who withdraws from school and enrolls in an adult GED program is counted as a dropout. Under the new guideline, that would change if the student completed a secondary GED by Oct. 1 of the following school year.

The definition adopted by the state board is a federal standard from the National Center for Education Statistics. It would allow for national comparisons, according to the department.

A bill to provide for locally operated GED programs was passed by the General Assembly and was pending before Gov. Ernie Fletcher on Wednesday.

Study: 90 million have low 'health literacy'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nearly half of American adults face higher risks of health problems because of trouble understanding medical terms and directions, experts said Thursday in a report that calls for a national effort to improve health literacy.

Comprehending medicine's arcane jargon is difficult for even the most educated of laymen. It's almost impossible for millions who can't read well, aren't fluent in English, or have vision or cognitive problems caused by aging.

Now the prestigious Institute of Medicine has put a number on just how many people have "limited health literacy" — a surprising 90 million adults.

They have problems following instructions on drug labels, interpreting hospital consent forms, even understanding a doctor's diagnosis and instructions.

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Reflux should not need narcotics for relief

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am 55 and have a hiatal hernia for which I have been prescribed (ineffectively) five medicines for acid reflux. My family doctor has given me narcotics in the past for this, but now says he won't prescribe narcotics to control my severe pain. How, then, am I supposed to take care of this intense and chronic discomfort?

DEAR READER: I'm puzzled why your pain is so resistant to medication. Hiatal hernia is often associated with reflux (the painful backwash of stomach acid into the lower esophagus) that can usually be easily controlled by medications — such as Nexium, Prevacid, Protonix and others — that reduce the production of gastric acid and aid healing.

In my view, you should forego the fruitless odyssey of searching for an analgesic. Instead, you should focus on what is causing your pain.

First, you need a gastroenterologist. Such a specialist will probably perform endoscopy, a test to examine your esophagus and stomach to determine if more than a hiatal hernia is present.

For example, you could have an ulcer that resists therapy, or the continuing irritation of the reflux may

have produced a complication known as Barrett's esophagus, pre-malignant changes in the cells lining this organ.

Second, as you know, cardiac pain — notably heart-muscle cramping called "angina" — may mimic the pain of reflux and — for obvious reasons — is treated differently, with nitroglycerine and other medicines.

Therefore, if your gastroenterologist concludes that your discomfort is not related to the hiatal hernia, you probably should have a stress test. Your family physician can coordinate this and other appropriate studies. Let me know what the doctors conclude.

To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Hiatal Hernia." Other readers who would like a copy should send a long, self-addressed, stamped envelope and \$2 to Newsletter, P.O. Box 167, Wickliffe, OH 44092. Be sure to mention the title.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from violent motion sickness, both in the air, on the water or within a vehicle. I also suffer from glaucoma, so I cannot take antihistamines. At 88, I'm tired of this nonsense. Is there any help for me?

DEAR READER: There may be help for you in the form of a prescription drug called Antivert (meclizine), which — in low doses — should not appreciably affect your glaucoma. Ask your ophthalmologist about this.

Also, remember that the drug scopolamine (available by prescription as a patch called Transderm Scop) is an excellent antidote for motion sickness. The patch is changed every three days, so you might consider this option for long airplane flights, extended sea voyages or lengthy automobile rides.

Again, obtain approval for this — and any other prescription or over-the-counter drugs — from your ophthalmologist.

Teenage girl got no security from installer of home system

DEAR ABBY: After reading the letter from "Concerned in Northbrook," where the 14-year-old niece was instructed to stay home alone and let the tile man in, I feel compelled to share my story.

Her parents' determination to shield their daughter enabled Steve to plea-bargain a prison sentence of only eight months. Although he is a registered sex offender, no one would ever guess Steve is a pedophile. His parole officer told me that he shouldn't be around children. Can you imagine leaving your 14-year-old daughter home alone to let in my charming former husband? — ALSO CONCERNED IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

DEAR ALSO CONCERNED: Your warning is chilling. Parents, please take note and take nothing for granted. Better to be overly cautious than not cautious enough.

DEAR ABBY: I just turned 13. My best friend, "Heather," moved an hour away, and we have kind of drifted apart. On Saturday, I ran into her at my friend "Tanya's" house here in town. We all went to the mall, and Heather met "Johnny," a 16-year-old guy who goes to my school.

East knows, of course, that West led a singleton. He can therefore be sure of collecting two club tricks and the king of spades. His problem is to try to find the best way of securing a fourth trick.

One possibility is that West has the king of hearts. (Given the bidding, it is unlikely that West has the ace.) In that case, it might be best to return a heart at trick two to establish

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

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Candidate Mongiardo makes personal appeal for videotape of Bunning speech

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — State Sen. Daniel Mongiardo made a personal appeal Wednesday for U.S. Sen. Jim Bunning to release a videotape of a speech in which Bunning said Mongiardo looks like one of Saddam Hussein's sons.

Mongiardo, who is seeking the Democratic nomination to run against the incumbent Republican, said he believes Kentuckians deserve to judge for themselves whether Bunning's remark was appropriate.

"I'm not interested in an apology," Mongiardo said. "Being in Kentucky politics, I've come to expect this kind of thing. This cuts much deeper. It's about honesty and integrity."

Mongiardo said Bunning's campaign first denied that he made the remark and now is "hiding behind a cloak of silence."

Bunning made the remark March 20 at the annual 4th Congressional District Lincoln/Reagan Day Dinner at the Hilton hotel in Florence. Bunning's speech was videotaped, but Bunning campaign manager David Young declined to make the tape of Bunning's speech available.

Young said Wednesday that Bunning has apologized for the remark and will not make any further comments on the matter.

"This is just a dead issue to us," he said. "For the 10th time, we're sorry." Mongiardo, 43, a physician from the Appalachian town of Hazard whose parents emigrated from Italy, is running in the Democratic primary against David Lynn Williams of Glasgow, a perennial candidate who is not running an active campaign.

Bunning, 72, is seeking a second six-year term in the Senate. He is

opposed in the May 18 primary election by former state Sen. Barry Metcalf of Richmond, whom he defeated in the 1998 primary.

"I was born in Hazard, Ky., on the Fourth of July," Mongiardo said Wednesday. "You don't get much more American than that."

In his 2002 campaign for state Senate, Mongiardo accused Republican Johnnie L. Turner of Harlan of using bigotry and racism in an ad that showed Sept. 11 hijacker Mohammed Atta. Mongiardo said the ad made a point of showing that he and Atta both had dark eyes, black hair and olive complexions.

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
