100th Anniversary of Henry Clay's Death Will Be Observed

LEXINGTON, Ky. - A program commemorating the 100th anniversary of the death of Henry Clay will be held in Lexington next Monday, just 100 years and one day after the "Sage of Ashland" died in Washington, D. C., at the age of 75.

Cooperating in staging the centennial observances are the Henry Clay Memorial Foundation of Lexington, the Filson Club, a private historical society devoted to Kentucky and Ohio Valley history with headquarters in Louisville, Transylvania College and the University of Kentucky.

The university has scheduled its summer Blazer lecture in history and social sciences Monday June 30, in the Guignol theatre of the University's Fine Arts building. Subject of the lecture will be "Henry Clay of Kentucky."

Speaker for the occasion will be Dr. Glyndon G. VanDeusen, professor of American history at the University of Rochester and authority on the life of Henry Clay. He is the author of a biography recognized as the most complete work on Clay's life.

Charles Nimmo of Briensburg was a business visitor in Benton Monday and reported his parents, ailing for some time, as slowly improving.

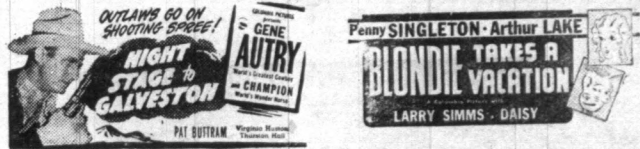

MRS. HENDON HOSTESS TO OLIVE HOMEMAKERS

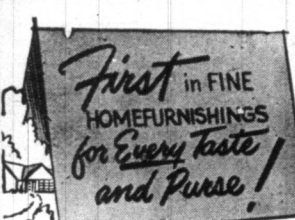
The Olive Homemakers Club met recently at the home of Mrs. Ruby Hendon. Officers were elected and baskets were made.

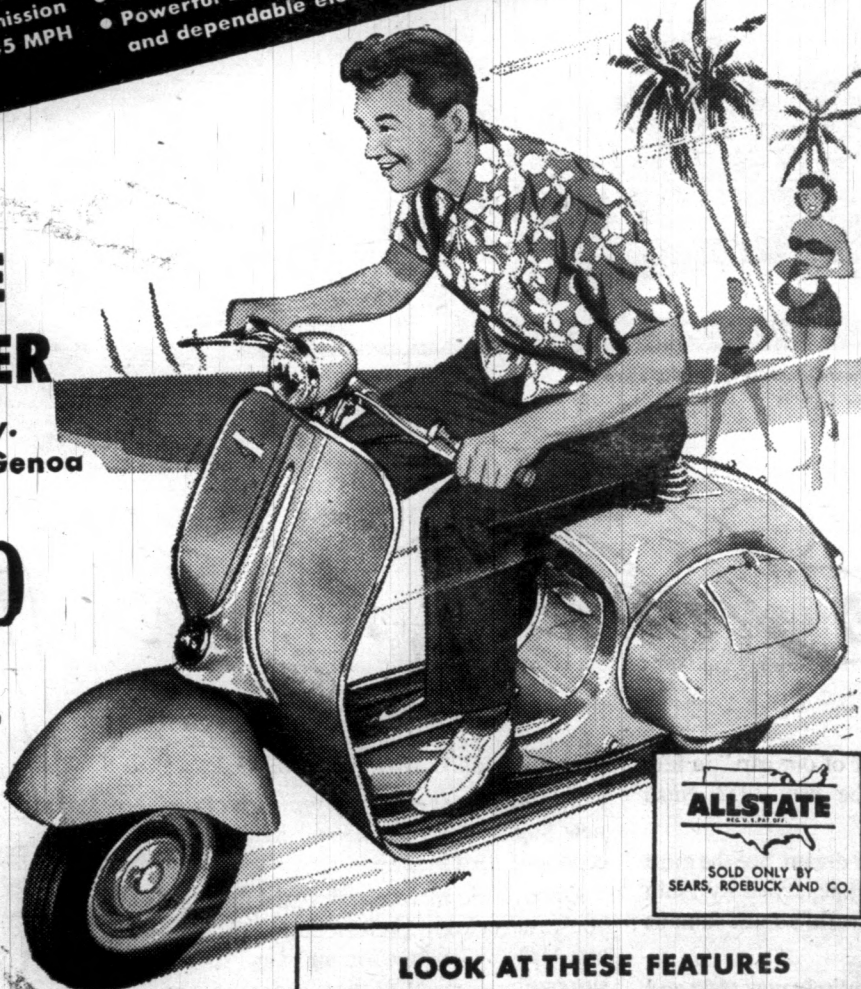

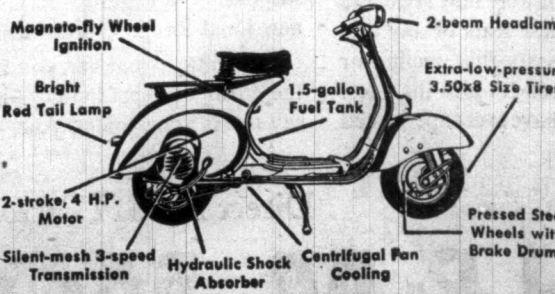
