UK Issues Statement on Black Shank in Tobacco

The following statement on the black shank disease of tobacco was issued by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

"Black shank has made its appearance in tobacco fields. This should be the signal for every farmer whether in a black shank area or not to be on the alert for the first signs of the disease in his patch. If black shank is found early and the proper precautions taken it is possible to hold the losses at a low point. On the other hand, if black shank starts and spreads widely before it is detected, losses in the summer may be very heavy. Kentucky farmers should keep in mind three things in relation to black shank in tobacco: first, to find and identify diseased plants; second, to remove diseased plants from the field; and third, to pot sterilize the areas where diseased plants are removed, with nabam.

"Small plants having black shank ore limp. The leaves

will and soon turn yellow, even when the ground is moist. The black color in the stalk may not be observed until the stalk is split open or the surface of the crown of the plant removed. Farmers suspecting black shank should have the plants diagnosed by the county agent or the black shank committee in his community. It is important to know, at the earliest possible time, if black shank is present.

"Black shank plants should be removed at the first sign of the disease, put in a tight paper bag, removed from the field and burned. If this is done thoroughly, the disease will not spread from that point and there should be no carry-over to next year. If the first plants are not removed and a rainy period follows, there is grave danger of a wide spread of the disease in the field.

"After loosening the soil, the spot where the diseased plants are removed should be drenched with a solution of nabam, three tablespoons to 10 quarts of water. The use of nabam is a precaution that should be followed in every field where black shank appears or where plants suddenly collapse and turn yellow, whether in black shank areas or in areas that previously have been free from the black shank disease.

"If Kentucky farmers will follow the simple program of identifying all plants suspected of black shank, removing black shank plants from the field, and treating the ground, it is possible that the losses from black shank in the state this year may be low. This program should be followed throughout the summer and early fall or until the last tobacco is harvested.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

For this week's fine recipe, we are indebted to Mrs. Herman Creason of Benton.

Here's the recipe:
Banana Bread
One and three-fourths cups of sifted flour.
Three-fourths teaspoonful of soda.
One and one-fourth teaspoons cream of tartar.
One half teaspoon salt.

One-third cup of shortening.
Two-thirds cup of sugar.
Two eggs well beaten.
One cup mashed bananas (about 2 or 3).
Sift the flour, soda cream of tartar and salt together — 3 times. Rub the shortening to a creamy consistency with spoon.
Stir sugar a little at a time into the shortening and continue stirring after each addition until fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add flour mixture with bananas a small amount at a time.
Beat until smooth. Pour in a well-greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees for about one hour.

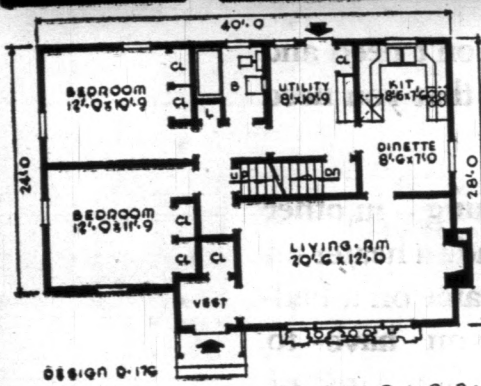
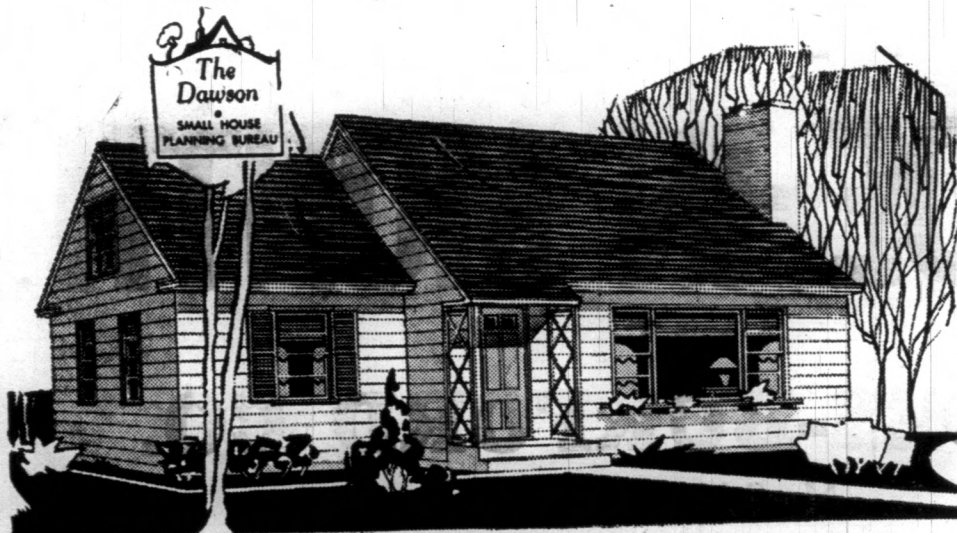

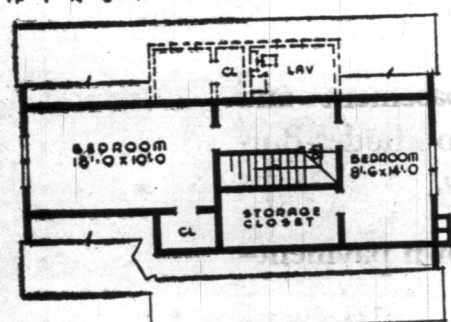

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lesson
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Judges 4-5.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalm 33: 12-22.

She Led Men

Lesson for July 13, 1952

WOMEN complain that this is a man's world. Well, it's half a man's world anyhow, because about half the grown people in it are men. But that's not the point. Women complain because men are the bosses, men get the big salaries, men run the government. Women are teachers but men run the school board, and so forth. As a matter of fact, it can be doubted whether women actually would like it the other way. Women like men who are leaders, men with minds of their own, who can take hold of troublesome situations and straighten them out.

Wife, Mother, Judge
ANYHOW, Deborah was a woman like that. Her name means "Bee" and she was the sort of woman who would somehow sting lazy or timid people into doing their duty. She is the only one of the "Judges" of Israel who was a woman.

Now some female heroines are a bit odd, to say the least of it. Take Joan of Arc, who was a kind of bee herself, and who took over when the rightful leader hung back. Joan was the kind of girl who could hear voices no one else heard. She was not exactly the kind of girl any man would feel quite comfortable with. And naturally she never married.

But this Deborah was a wife and a mother. She made some man happy, she was a home-maker, children cuddled up in her lap.
When later she became a "Judge" she had all the wisdom of common-sense and of normal experience as the basis of her wisdom. She knew how mothers and home-makers feel. When it says that she "judged Israel" it does not mean that she ran for office like modern judges, or that any king had appointed her, for there was no king to do it. It means simply that everybody respected her judgment so much that when there were problems more tangled and twisted than common, they would go ask Deborah what she thought.

She Didn't Like a Sissy
ON one famous occasion Deborah did not wait for the man to come; she sent for him. He lived far from her home, and his name was Barak. She put an idea into his head, only it was not her idea, she claimed for it the authority of God. Barak was to be a general, he was to recruit an army. She told him, there under the palm tree, where he was to get his army, where he was to take it and what to do with it when he got there.

Space does not permit the details that would show that Deborah's ideas were absolutely sound from a military point of view. She was a whole General Staff by herself.

But Barak backed off from his great opportunity. He would go, he said, provided she would go along. Now Deborah didn't like that. She liked a man who would go out on his own without having to have a lady at hand to tell him what to do. So she went; but she told him the journey would not be for his honor. That, however, is another story. The point is that this Deborah was a woman so wise that the ablest man in the country at the time was not willing to do anything important without her advice.

Deborah's Daughters
DEBORAH was not the last woman whose wisdom and whose decisions have led men to success.

There are today in the United States women in congress, both in the senate and in the house; a woman is in charge of manpower; at least one woman is a U.S. circuit judge, the next highest in rank below the Supreme Court. There was a woman governor of Wyoming as far back as 1924.

But for every woman who makes the headlines and Who's Who, for every woman who has some official position, there are hundreds of others, unnamed and unsung, who are known in their homes and in their home towns for their unflinching good advice.

"Ask Mrs. —" is the first thing the neighbors think when something comes up. And sometimes a wise woman's reputation doesn't even get around to the neighbors. Sometimes it is only her family that know how wise she is.

But it is a safe guess that if you took out of our modern life all that women contribute, all the good acts and far-sighted policies that they have thought of first, ours would be a much worse world than it is.

Army Colonel To Head Murray State ROTC

MURRAY, Ky. — Assignment of Lt. Col. Francis Wellenreiter, U. S. Army, to head the ROTC program being activated at Murray State College this year was announced in an outline of faculty changes this week by President Ralph H. Woods.

Dr. Karl Van D'Eiden, appointed two years ago to the languages and literature department and called to military service before he could join the faculty, is expected to be here this fall.

The appointment of Rex Alexander to the post of assistant basketball coach, previously announced, and Prof. Thomas Venable to the education department are the only other additions to the teaching staff for the fall up to the present time. Members of the faculty who will not return this fall include Dr. Rolf E. King, who had been here on a two-year appointment while Van D'Eiden was in service, Prof. Thomas Wikstrom of the training school, who resigned, and Tim O'Brien, training

school teacher and assistant basketball coach, who resigned to become principal of Pope County High School in Golconda, Ill.

Also on the list of those who will not return this fall are Jim Cullivan, graduate student who has been serving as assistant football coach, and Prof. George C. Patterson of the physics staff who resigned. Professor Patterson had been on leave for several years working on his doctorate.

Professors Charles Stamps, Ruth Butler, and Peter Panera who were on leave during 1951-52 will be on leave in 1952-53. Prof. B. J. Tillman will be on leave for graduate study this coming school year also.

Prof. Auburn Wells of the Social Science department, who was on leave during 1951-52 is expected to return for the fall semester.

Squirrel Season Eo Opens August 25th

FRANKFORT, Ky. — The squirrel season for this year will open on Aug. 25 and extend through Nov. 5, according to a regulation filed with the statutes revision commission by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The bag limit, according to the regulation, will remain at six per day or a possession limit of 12 after two or more days of hunting. Dates and bag limits for other game and birds have not yet been set by the commission and the commissioner of the department.

Non-Resident Must By Minnow License

FRANKFORT, Ky. — A license fee of \$5 will be required of any non-resident person or firm transporting or selling minnows or crawfish in Kentucky after Aug. 15, according to a regulation filed with the statutes revision commission by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

It is pointed out by the commissioner of the department, Earl Wallace, that this act is necessary so that the department may have closer supervision of non-residents transporting and selling minnows and crawfish in the state.

Each and every out-of-state truck or any other type vehicle hauling minnows and crawfish must carry this non-resident license. This license runs for the calendar year.
