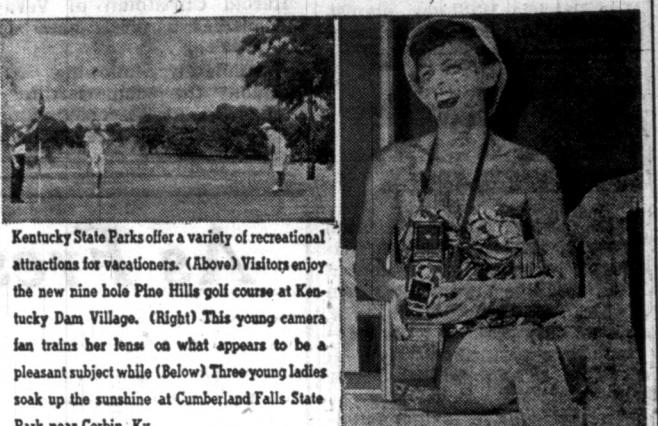

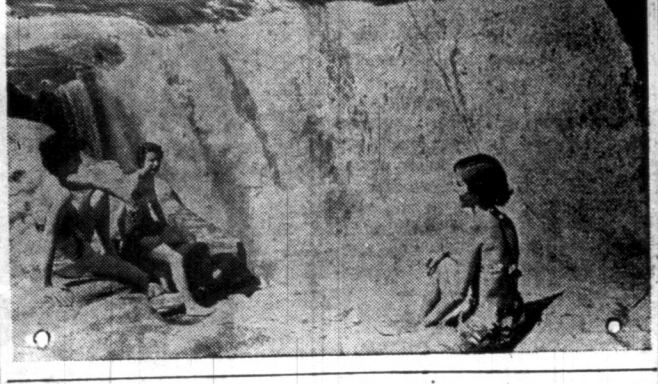
## Rotary Official Speaks

## Showers Helpful But Crops in Poor Shape

Local showers in the past few days have given some relief to drought conditions in the county. Pastures and meadows have suffered worst from the lack of moisture and the excessive heat. Most pastures have completely stopped growth, resulting in a severe shortage on many farms. A number of cattle growers have been forced to sell because of inadequate pasture and hay. Stock water has also become a problem on many farms. With pasture gone and no water, farmers must move cattle regardless of prices. The hay crop has been drastically reduced. Most red top and timothy has been harvested with very low yields. The demand for hay is great, the supply small, and the price high. Most row crops have been damaged materially. Much of the tobacco crop was never set and many acres set did not give good stands. Corn yields have been drastically reduced. Some farmers have begun pasturing corn fields. Pasture was needed and the corn crop was gone. Resulting feed costs will be high for both grain and hay. Farmers must seed small grain, rye grass and fescue to reduce feed demands. Ballo rye, oats, barley, rye grass, and fescue may be seeded as soon as sufficient moisture is available. Fertilizer may be used economically to increase plant growth on new seedlings and to top dress pastures.

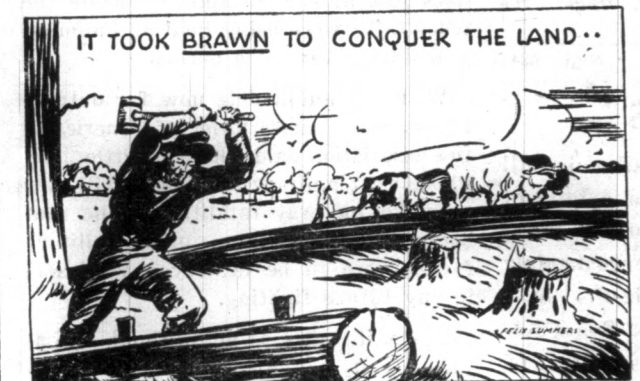
## New GI Bill Is Signed

The president has signed into law a new GI Bill for veterans who served in the armed forces any place in the world since the start of the Korean conflict on 6-27-50. The new law provides five benefits. Included are education and training, guaranteed or insured loans for homes, farms and businesses, unemployment compensation, mustering out pay, and job finding help. The education and training provisions allow a veteran one and one-half days of training for each day in service after the Korean outbreak up to a maximum of 36 months. Veterans in GI Bill training will receive an education and training allowance each month from the government to meet part of the expense of their training and living costs. Tuition fees, books, supplies and equipment will not be paid by the government. Instead, they will have to be paid out of the monthly allowance. Rates for veterans in full time training in schools and colleges are \$110 a month. If they have no dependents, \$135 if they have one dependent, and \$160 if they have more than one dependent. Those in training less than full time will receive lower monthly rates. Top monthly amounts for on the job trainees are \$70 without dependents, \$85 with one dependent, and \$105 with more than one dependent. The maximum for industrial on farm trainees are \$95, \$110 and \$130, respectively. The law requires that on job and on farm rates be reduced, at four month intervals, as the training progresses and the veterans own earnings increase. The law also stipulates that veterans taking institutional on farm training must devote full time to their program. The new GI Bill places a \$310 a month ceiling on job training, regardless of dependency status. Loan provisions of the new GI Bill for post Korean veterans are similar to the GI Loan Program now in effect for World War 11 veterans. The amount of VA guarantee on a loan is the same for both groups of veterans. Home loans may be guaranteed for up to 60 percent of the loan, but the guaranteed portion may not exceed \$7,500. Other real estate loans may be guaranteed up to 50 percent, with a \$4,000 top. And non-real estate loans, such as GI business loans, may not be guaranteed for up to 60 percent with a \$2,000 ceiling as to the guarantee.

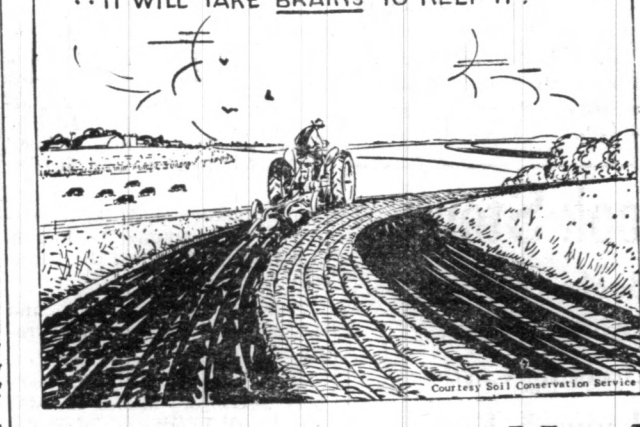
## Now Mr. Houser Will Get More Eggs

## Soil Conservation Need Stressed By Anderson

Lawrence W. Wetherby, governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, issued a proclamation on the nineteenth day of May, 1952, calling on the people of the state to observe July 20 to 27 inclusive as soil conservation district week. County Judge Leonard Jones issued a similar proclamation on July 8, 1952, calling on the people of Marshall County to observe the soil week. Both of these officials recognized the need for soil and water conservation and requested all persons and organizations concerned with the land to unite with the local soil conservation district supervisors in an effort during the period to stimulate among the people a full realization of the desperate need for conserving our soil and water resources. The present supervisors are Renloe Rudolph, chairman; Eura Mathis, secretary and treasurer; Sam Gold, Homer Chester and J. M. Solomon. These men will appreciate help from individuals or organizations in carrying out the proclamations issued by the governor and the county judge. Euclid Ross started to work last week for the Soil Conservation Service. He will help me do the surveying and staking of the permanent type soil and water conservation measures. These include farm ponds, terraces, diversion ditches, and sod waterways. Floyd Roberts, Benton, dug a diversion ditch last week on his farm near Brewers. This ditch will keep the water which falls on a 23 acre watershed from running down on a bottom land field along Duncan Creek. A bulldozer was used to dig the ditch. Because of the large amount of water it must carry, the ditch was surveyed to have a foot fall per one hundred feet. It also has a ten-foot flat bottom. I checked farm ponds last week which had been dug on the farms of Connie Watkins, Fairdealing, Homer Chester, Brewers, S. P. Gibson, near Benton on the Symsonia Road; and Jack Shemwell, south of Oak Level. COUNTY GETTING CLOSER TO ITS BOND QUOTA Sales of U. S. Savings Bonds in Marshall County have reached a total of \$125,562 the U. S. Treasury Department reports. The county's 1952 goal is \$200,000. Lyon and Clinton counties recently exceeded their quotas.

The 10th Governor's Park and Tourist Promotion Tour of Kentucky will be held Sept. 10-14, Governor Wetherby's office announced. Western Kentucky newspaper and radio men will inspect park and tourist facilities in Southeastern Kentucky. Last April, Eastern Kentucky newspaper and radio men visited Western Kentucky. Kenlake Hotel will be the assembly point for the start of the September tour. Wolfe Creek Dam and Lake Cumberland, Falls State Park, Pine Mountain State Park and Kentucky Ridge Sorest at Pineville and Cumberland Gap will be visited on the tour. "In promoting our tourist program one of the most important jobs we face is selling Kentucky to Kentuckians and having our own citizens realize the great economic importance of this program. Thus, through this pattern of intersectional visits of Kentucky newspaper editors and radio men, I sincerely believe we all can equip ourselves better to do this job of selling our state to our own people," Wetherby said. The tour is being planned by David F. Cocks, president of the State Chamber; Robert W. ## TRAFFIC DEATHS

The nation's military deaths in all wars since 1775 had reached a total of about 1,005,600 at the end of two years of war in Korea, where approximately 19,350 American combat deaths have occurred since the invasion of South Korea on June 25, 1950, the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies estimated.

The association's continuing comparative study of war and traffic deaths showed, however, that the total of highway fatalities since the first automobile accident victim was killed in New York City 52 years and nine months ago is now far ahead of the all-time war total. Since February, when the total lives lost in highway accidents equalled military fatalities for the first time, the historic toll of 1,018,500 traffic deaths has surged 13,000 above the nation's war fatality toll of 1,005,600.

In the four months since the automobile outpaced war as a killer, highway deaths have climbed 6,500. This is more than 100 times greater than the increase of 600 in the number of American lives lost in Korean fighting while the truce talks were being held at Panmunjom during the same period.

With the automobile now far outpacing war as a mass killer of Americans, the association said, there is little likelihood that military casualties will ever overtake highway fatalities in the race between the two killers, unless military forces were to be destroyed wholesale in any future fighting.

Peace, it seems, is not without its hazards. And, unfortunately, some of our finest inventions become machines of destruction.

**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**  
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN  
SCRIPTURE: 1 Samuel 1:1-4:1a.  
DEVOTIONAL READING: 1 Samuel 2:1-10.

**God Prepared Him**  
Lesson for July 27, 1952

WHEN A CHRISTIAN looks back, he can see God's hand better than he can see it looking forward. A Christian, even a worrying Christian (though there should be no such people as Christians who worry), can feel very thankful for God's blessings, care and guidance in the past, even while worrying over tomorrow's uncertainties. How foolish this is! God is even now making ready for the future. He is not to be taken by surprise. He knows what he wants and he knows how to get it. While we waste time in worry, God is at work. The story of Samuel is a case in point.

**God's Home**  
EVERY ONE KNOWS that the strongest single influence in a person's life is his home. We sometimes take that for granted. On the contrary, a home may wreck a man before he starts. It has been said that many alcoholics get their start, not their start in drinking but their start in the nervous, unsettled disposition which easily slips down into alcoholism and other drug habits, before they are six years old. The wrong kind of parents, lack of harmony between father and mother, ill-treatment or simple neglect, can make a child already abnormal before he is old enough to go to school. On the other hand, the foundation of a strong man can always be found in the home where he first lives. So it was with the remarkable man, the prophet Samuel. In later life he became lawgiver, king-maker, preacher and general of the army; no ordinary man! The nation needed him; and when the time came, God produced him. But God produced his mother first.

**God's Church**  
AFTER LEAVING HOME, Samuel literally lived in the tabernacle, which served as a church in those far off days. The little boy found there a second home. Old Eli the priest no doubt came to mean much more to him than his own father did, his father whom he so seldom saw. It still is, where the church is doing what it should for the children of its people. A child should not be afraid of the minister; he should not feel anything but love for the church. True, a church building is different from other buildings in that it is set apart for a sacred use. A church is the symbol of God's presence among men, and the sanctuary of a church ought to make all who come into it feel that this place is holy ground. But that does not mean that a child should be afraid of the place, as some children are. If they have been coming there every Sunday since they can remember, sitting with the rest of the family in the family pew (sounds old-fashioned but there are still thousands of them), coming so regularly that no question is ever asked on Sunday morning, "Well, shall we go to church or not?"—then they will feel more at home on the inside of the church, when the Lord's Day comes, than they ever will on the outside. Now this is not all always true. If children and young people are not attracted by the church, as too often they are not, whose fault is it? Whoever may be to blame, it is certain that a church which loses its young people is headed for its end.

**The Voice of God**  
IT IS MOST INTERESTING to know that when young Samuel heard the voice of God, it sounded just like the voice of Eli the priest. (If you heard the voice of God, whose human voice would it sound like?) At any rate, God prepared this great prophet Samuel not only by the influence of home and church, but by a personal religious experience. Now there is no real conflict or contradiction between religious education and conversion, between the church and the home, and the work of the Holy Spirit. God was in Samuel's home, God was in that tabernacle, God was in his religious education. But God also came to him directly and not only through home and church. If we wonder sometimes where the Christian leaders for the next generation are coming from, we may be sure God is preparing them even now, in simple if obscure ways, as he did with Samuel of old.

**A HELPING HAND**

**On Cleaning Bathrooms**

There's one bright spot in the cleaning routine, and that is the complete washability of your bathroom. But even here, your valued friend the vacuum cleaner can be of help.

If you are planning a really thorough, start-to-finish cleaning job, take advantage of the brush attachment on the cleaner. Go over your tiles first, brushing and sucking out the dust which will get into those little crevices. Dust the tops of your windows with the brush, and go over the joinings between wall covering and door and window frames. Use the brush as a first quick cleaner for your Venetian blinds, too.

You will find that a good deal of the surface dirt has disappeared, making the washing so much easier. Now, take a good sized sponge and, using warm water, wipe down the walls and wash the porcelain fixtures. With a sponge you can use plenty of water, wring the sponge out quickly and wipe almost dry. All this without having to carry two or three soft cloths around with you. Use the same equipment on your tile or linoleum floors. Very little cleaning agent is needed, perhaps a sifting of pure soap flakes.
