## 203 Tons of Hay Ordered By Farmers

Marshall County farmers have ordered 203 tons of hay as of Aug. 19, it was announced Tuesday by Everett Treas, chairman of the county PMA committee.

The first shipment of hay is expected to reach Benton the first week in September. Farmers who want to order hay are urged to inspect this first shipment.

The price of legume hay (clover and alfalfa) has been reduced from \$36 to \$32 per ton.

Mr. Treas advises farmers who want hay to place their orders as soon as possible so the year can get the best hay possible and also to avoid the late rush.

Farmers who want their soil tested are asked to contact the PMA office in Benton at once. Information of great importance is available in seeding fall crops, Mr. Treas said.

## John W. Franklin Buried in County

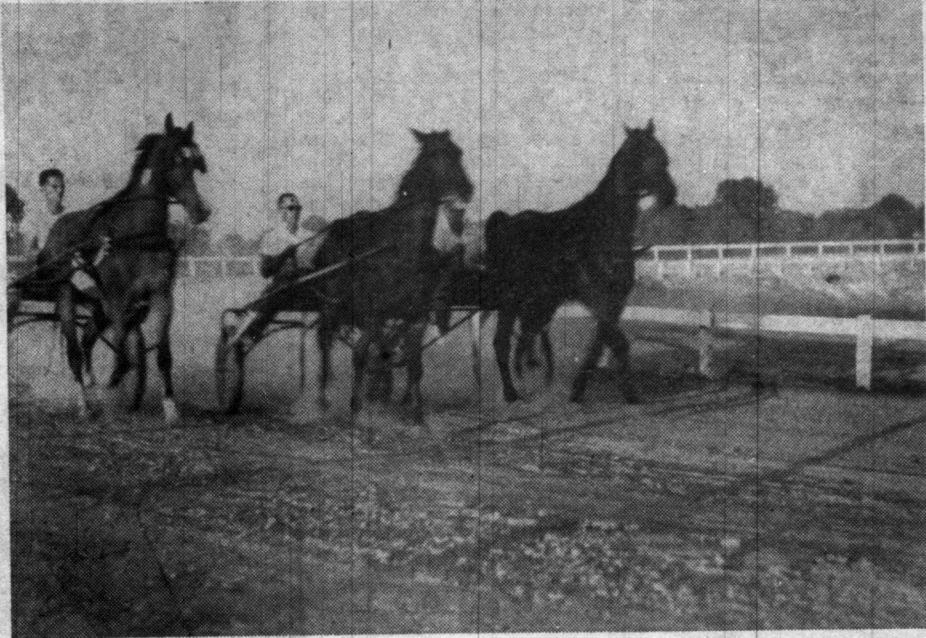

## DISASTER LOANS AVAILABLE TO FARMERS THROUGH FHA

Disaster loans are now available through the Farmers Home Administration to Kentucky farmers whose crops and pastures have been seriously damaged by this summer's drought. These loans will be made only to farmers who cannot get needed credit from local banks, PCA's, or other established credit sources to buy feed, seed and fertilizer or to meet other farm operating expenses.

Applications for disaster loans are handled through the local county offices of the Farmers Home Administration.

Under this program, farmers can obtain loans for the purchase of hay and other feed necessary to carry their livestock through the winter. Loans also will be made to enable farmers to reseed their pastures, where necessary because of drought, and to buy the seed and fertilizer required for fall and winter grazing crops or to plant fall grain.

With such help available, most farmers should be able to save their basic herds, and thus be in hope to make a quick recovery from this year's drought.

This is one of the aims of the government's emergency credit program. It would take most farmers several years to rebuild their herds to the present level if they sell off too sharply now because of the temporary feed shortage.

Disaster loan assistance also will be available to eligible Kentucky farmers to cover 1933 farm operating expenses. A farmer may receive a loan now to meet his immediate needs, such as feed, seed and fertilizer, and later obtain further credit to meet next year's operating expenses. Such loans may be made for any usual agricultural purpose essential to the borrower's continued operations.

The purpose of this program is to help farmers stay in business when it appears that, with the help of the loan, there is a reasonable chance to succeed. Assistance is not available under this program to enable a farmer to change his present system of farming nor to expand materially his operations.
