Calloway Representative Discusses Work of General Assembly at Frankfort.

Waylon Rayburn, representative to the state legislature from Calloway County, in a chapel address at Murray College Monday morning, March 19, asked that he be instructed as to the wishes of special session of the General ent semester.

Mr. Rayburn, an alumnus of Murray State College, said that unless additional revenue is ATTENDED MURRAY raised the state institutions must close, common schools can run only 21/2 months, and Kentucky will be without relief funds. He asked the citizens to tell him what plan to favor.

Resolutions Adopted

Following the suggestion of T. H. Stokes, member of the Murray Hester, registrar. College board of regents, the students and faculty adopted a resolution urging the representatives to use every effort in securing adequate appropriation and to use their own judgment as to the means. The resolution assured the representative and senator that any campaign pledge need not be adhered to if it interfered with carrying out the best program available.

Although the recent session had failed to enact revenue and appropriation legislation sufficient to balance the budget, it had done constructive work, according to Mr. Rayburn. The school code, the real estate reduction, license fee reduction, reorganization bill,

burn explained. State Senator T. O .Turner spoke briefly to the assembly, opposing the general sales tax.

Senator Turner stated that he was opposed to reducing the tax on real estate for state purposes from 30c to 5c because the peoole themselves voted against a constitutional amendment which vould have given the state legisature the privilege of removing all taxes from real estate for state purposes. The Senator staed further that special interests uch as railroads, power companies and telegraph companies had been relieved more than any

one else. "It would not have been necessary to call an extra session", he said.
