SOUND SENSE

"South Swann Democrat" Discovers Circuit Judge Race With Good, Common Sense.

EDITOR LEDGER: Will you kindly give a reader of your very interesting paper a little space to make a few observations on the pending contest for circuit judge in this, the 3rd judicial district, composed of Calloway, Christian, Lyon and Trigg counties, primary election to be held next Saturday, June 5th.

Notice in a certain paper published in Calloway county, what purports to be a letter from Crossland, down in old South Swann precinct, which in reality could have been written in the office of said paper (now mind you I don't say that it was.) At any rate, it goes on to say, or at least to leave the impression that the people down here are almost solidly for Hanberry, and goes on to give one or two flimsy reasons why this is thusly, etc.

Now, as a matter of fact, this is very misleading, or might be. But don't never believe that people living on the north and east side of the county, who may not be acquainted with the real situation on the west side of the county, which, stated truly is about like this. The vote here will be somewhat mixed up. But if Cook's friends do not fail to vote because of over confidence, he ought easily to carry this precinct. He has many warm friends who will go to the polls next Saturday and vote for him because they think he is far better qualified, because of his experience on the bench, to make a good judge than his opponent, who is young and inexperienced.

The "Times" is urging Cooks two terms in office as one of the reasons why he must be defeated. They say that he has had it 12 years and will have received, when his present term expires, about \$36,000. This may be true, but this does not disqualify him for another term, neither does it qualify his opponent for the office. Cook has only received the salary fixed by law, and only what every other circuit judge in the State receives, which is \$3,000 a year. And what difference does it make to the man in the furrow, the man behind the plow, the man who bends over the tobacco plant under the scorching rays of an August sun, the man who is taxed to pay these salaries? Won't it cost him just the same to pay a new, inexperienced man? Does any man think that Hanberry will not take every cent of this salary allowed by law? Then, will it not cost the taxpayers as much to pay Hanberry, an inexperienced man, as it would to pay Judge Cook, and very likely more, because Hanberry might make some costly mistakes, while learning the duties of the office.

This is no charitable job to be handed out to some young lawyer because he has not had it before. Why, suppose we, the voters of this district, should undertake to hand out the office of circuit judge to a new man every six years. We could only give six men a full term and the 17th a part of a term in 100 years, which would leave the balance of the voters in these 4 counties to rustle for a living in some other way. Besides, we would have new, untried men on the bench all the time. It is a fact known of all men that Judge Grace was one of the best judges in Kentucky. Why? Because of his long experience on the bench. Then there is the wisdom of primary election.

electing a new, untried man like Hanberry, when we have a man in Calloway, a home man, a man who has come up from a farm in the hills of the eastern part of this county, who by his unaided effort and ability has built up a reputation as a lawyer and judge second to none; and who can, because of his experience on the bench make us a far better judge than Hanberry could hope to do. But now the Murray Ring, through their mouth-piece, the Times, who have by their malicious persecution of Judge Cook made us strong with the people say that we should elect Hanberry and do away with factionalism in Calloway county, which is simply tommyrot and demagoguery with a big D. Why didn't they propose something like this last fall before the county primary was held, when a certain man was a candidate for a certain office? Why didn't you insist that he stay out of the race. There were men running for the office who were not identified with any faction, and who were capable of making a good and efficient officer, and who you could have nominated, but you didn't. But don't never believe that you are deceiving the voters of this county by any such claptrap, for everybody knows that if Hanberry gets many votes in Calloway, it will be because of the desperate efforts of this same Murray Ring to deliver the votes of a certain faction over to him, and if they fail to do this, he could not get enough votes to skin a beef. Let no one be misled by any such palaver, for it emanates from the same men who, six years ago, after making one of the scurviest fights on the bench, to make Judge Cook for the nomination ever known in Calloway county, went over today, "peace and baggage" into the camp of Judge Breathitt and voted for him nearly every mothers son of them. But Cook was elected in spite of them. Now, if you are sincere about dropping this factionalism, why don't you stop this contemptible fight that you are making on Judge Cook who is a citizen of our county, and your fellow townsman, and who is an upright able man and judge, and Christian gentleman also?

And as he has been brought up with the "great common people" of Calloway county he knows how to appreciate our support. So, Mr. Voter, lets go out and vote for Tom Cook, our home man, and make his majority at least 1,000 in old Calloway.

In United States Senate Declares Night Riding Due to Oppression of Trust.

Washington, May 24. That the outrages of the night riders in Kentucky and Tennessee resulted from the oppression of the American Tobacco Company, and that unless the internal revenue tax on leaf tobacco in the hands of the farmer is repealed, these outrages will again occur, was the declaration made by Senator Bradley, of Kentucky, today in urging the adoption of his amendment to the Senate bill.

This amendment proposes to restore in the tariff bill the House provision for the free sale of leaf tobacco by the farmer, which was stricken out by the Finance Committee of the Senate. Mr. Bradley reviewed the growth of the American Tobacco Company from the time of its organization in 1884 with a capital stock of \$25,000,000 to the present day with stock, including that owned in subsidiary companies, amounting to more than \$500,000,000.

Not content with destroying all competition in the United States, Mr. Bradley said the American Tobacco Company drove the Imperial Tobacco Company of Great Britain, its chief competitor, to a compromise and obtained an agreement by which the Imperial yielded up all competition in the United States.

"France, Austria, Italy, Portugal and other countries each meanwhile decreed that the Government would buy and import tobacco as a business, the profit going into the coffers of the Government under what is known as the Regie system," said Mr. Bradley. "The American Tobacco Company, seeing the danger in this direction, entered into a conspiracy with the Regie agents by which the territory should be and was divided, all agreeing to pay the same fixed price and allotting the territory into well-defined districts so that there could be no conflict of interests."

Thus the producers found themselves powerless and hemmed in on every side, continued Mr. Bradley, and after appealing to Congress without effect, as a last resort organized the pooling societies which resulted in a Saturday of crime in Kentucky and Tennessee.

While denouncing the night-riders outrages, Mr. Bradley declared that the tobacco leaf growers were sorely pressed, that they were forced to combine to protect themselves, and that the crimes which resulted were due to the trust's oppression. "If Congress refuses relief in my judgment," said Mr. Bradley, "the same conduct will be repeated, people terrorized and the States materially injured."

The effect of his amendment, said Mr. Bradley, would be that the farmer and all others would be able to sell unstemmed tobacco in the natural leaf without the payment of any tax or charge.

I appeal to you, Senators, in behalf of more than a million Americans who have been stricken down by the ponderous force of an all-powerful trust. I appeal for homes now in squalid poverty where once wholesome plenty reigned, for homes now dark and silent which once resounded with the innocent prattle and ringing laughter of happy children, who, with smiling mothers, welcomed the weary toilers home. I appeal to you in the name of justice, which with blood-red eyes holds aloft the even-balanced scales in which, sooner or later, all will be weighed—and I not only appeal, but I demand justice for my people. In hours of the Nation's extremity they have answered its every call, and now they demand in their extremity that the Nation, which many of their kindred died to save, shall answer theirs.

"If that call shall go unanswered, we may at least indulge the hope that while our oppressors escape here there will come a time when they shall be weighed in the balances of a just God, whose judgment will be 'Thou art weighed in the balance and art found wanting.'"

In Europe, during the early tertiary period, the summit of the Alps was at an insignificant island, rising out of a sea covering all the califal basin. The sediment into this sea the streams brought down vast amounts of gravel, sand and mud, filling a crust to form over the surface, which has gradually thickened in proportion as the earth has cooled. This crust is therefore much thicker in the later geological periods than in the earlier ones. The consequence is that the geologists point out that the inevitable tendency would be for the later wrinkles to be ampler than the earlier ones; for in the earlier geological ages when the crust was thinner, the wrinkles could not sustain itself in so high an elevation as would be possible when it had thickened up in later ages.

One hundred and fifty years ago the occurrence of these shells in the rocks of the Alps has been taken as evidence of the flood, and Voltaire knew of no way to discredit the evidence except to deny it. He suggested that the alps had floated up from the bottom of the ocean and carried there by pilgrims and carelessly thrown away. But Voltaire was no geologist, and he was not able to show the absurdity of the theory of the flood by a better argument, for these shells are found as constituent elements of great thick strata, and are not scattered in the equality of a temporary submergence. This doctrine is reported to have been held by the monks of the Abbey of St. Remy of similar age, with their included recent forms of marine life. The Alps are composed of the same gneiss mountains at an equal height in Thibet and in the Himalayas mountains at an elevation of 12,000 or 14,000 feet.

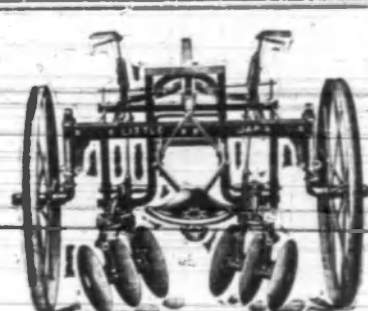

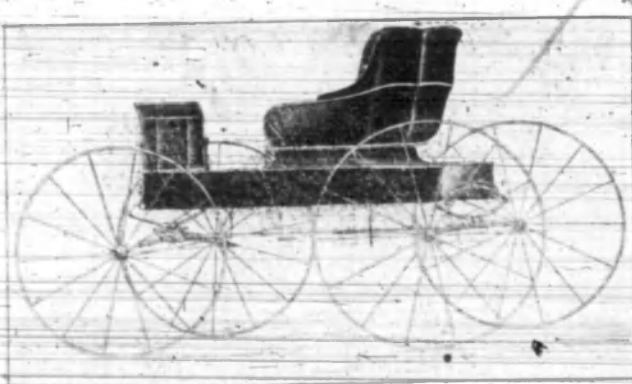

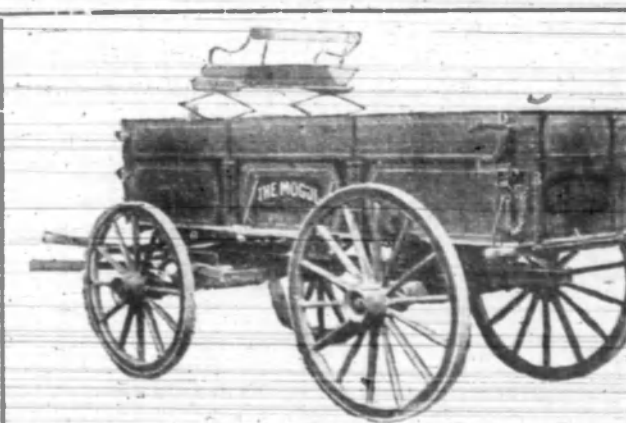

HINTS FROM THE HIRED MAN

Good Husbands Farm Hand Tells of Qualities Necessary to Make Him self Valuable.

An Illinois man taught me how to raise better crops. The farmer has two bushels of seed to the acre with a wheat drill. This gives a uniform growth; the plant is small, and the yield is about as heavy as from a thinner seeding.

I never worked on a farm until I was 45 years old. I had always worked in a beef packing plant in a large city, and I suppose that is where I formed a habit of hustling, which has stuck to me ever since. When I commenced farming I used to listen for the sound of the whistle at dinner time, but I soon learned that in the busy seasons a man cannot put in too many hours. Some of the boys in my neighborhood told me it was a mistake to do any more than I really had to to hold my job, but I take notice that I am now getting \$25 per month and my board and washing all the year round, while the other fellows get about \$18 and are half-drunken the winter.

Farm helps becoming scarcer every year, but I think the farmer himself is largely to blame. Too many farmers regard the hired man as a beast of burden, and give him about the same treatment that they do their mules. How can a farmer expect to keep a good man if he only pays him \$20 per month, makes him sleep in a hot loft in the house or in the hay mow, expects him to work 15 hours a day seven days in the week during the summer and drive him in the fall? I notice that the farmer who keeps his hired man all the year round and treats him with the consideration that is due him generally makes money and seldom kicks about the scarcity of labor.

The farmer who leads and does not drive is the man who gets the most work and the best service out of the hired man.

HOW TO MAKE CHEAP ROLLER

FOR BETTER FERTILE SOILS

With a sandy soil and a natural clay or loam and gravel plus deep plowing and manure, the soil will be better. The combination forms a sand-clay loam at a saving expense. If the soil is entirely of sand a mistake will be made if it is plowed, unless clay can be added. Such plowing would merely deepen the sand, and at the same time break up the small amount of hard matter material which may be found.

If the soil is clay and the surface is hard, it should be broken up. It would result in a clay surface rather than one of sand or gravel. A road between good soil and a hard surface is a good thing. If the road is in the road, it should be broken up. The best method is to run the roller over the surface of the soil and break up the surface. This will result in a better soil.
