Knight has been a special writer for the Paducah Sun-Democrat.

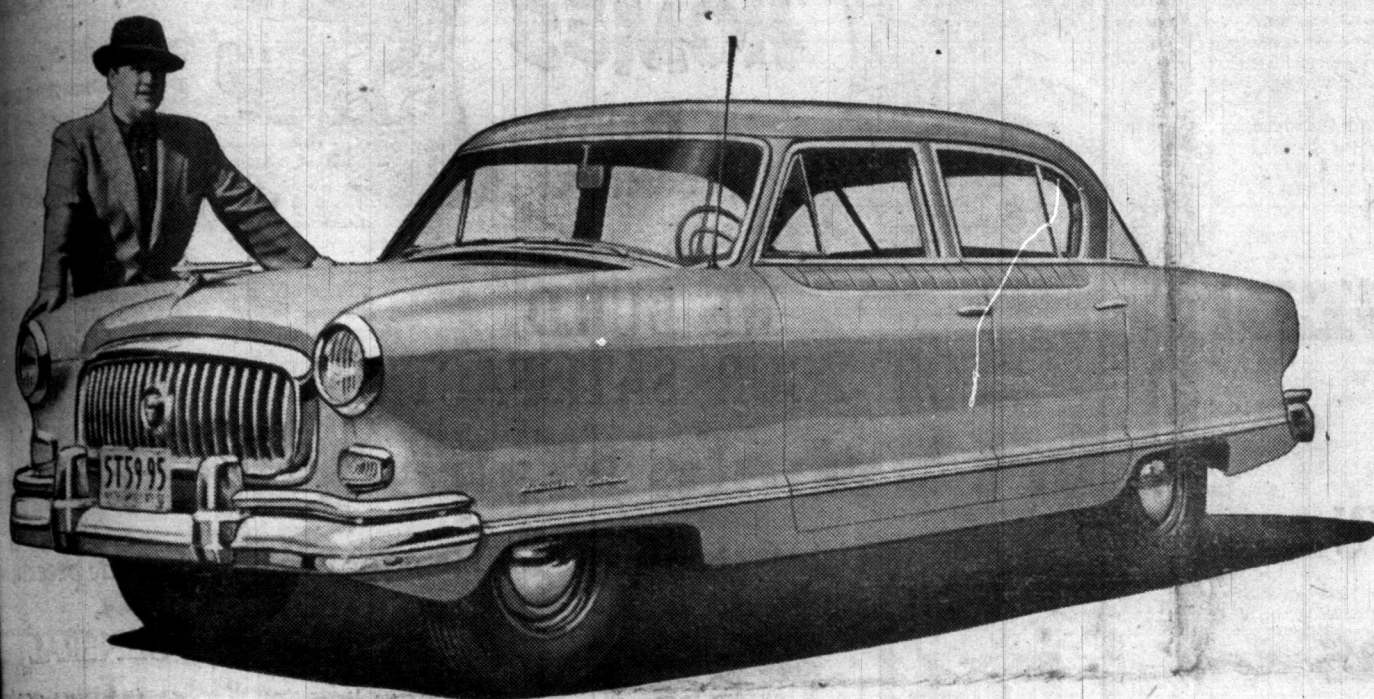
BRIENSBURG BAPTISTS WILL HOLD REVIVAL

long as any of the bonds hereby authorized are outstanding the City will carry for the benefit of the holders of the bonds adequate fire and windstorm insurance on all buildings and structures of the water and sewer system which are subject to loss through fire or windstorm and will carry adequate public liability insurance and will carry for the benefit of the holders of the bonds insurance of the kinds and in the amounts normally carried in the operation of similar properties in Kentucky. All money received for losses under any of such insurance policies, except public liability, shall be paid into the Depreciation Fund and such payment shall not reduce the amounts otherwise required to be paid into said fund. Disbursements of such proceeds shall be made in the same manner and for the same purpose as are other disbursements made from the Depreciation Fund.

SECTION 16. When bids for the construction of the extensions and improvements to said combined and consolidated municipally-owned water and sewer system have been advertised for, received and opened upon a public competitive basis, the Mayor is authorized to advise with the engineers and to determine how many bonds authorized by this ordinance should be sold in the first instance to provide funds for the payment of all costs of such construction, for the payment and retirement on January 1, 1953, of said outstanding bonds which are called for redemption on that date pursuant to Section 2 of this ordinance, the fee of the Fiscal Agent employed by the city to advise and assist in the preparation and marketing of the bonds authorized by this ordinance, and an adequate and reasonable allowance for unforeseen contingencies. The number of bonds to be sold having thus been determined, the Mayor is authorized to advise with the City's Fiscal Agent and to determine the identities of the bonds to be sold, if it is determined that less than the entire \$300,000.00 of bonds should be sold. Thereafter the Mayor and City Clerk are authorized to execute and to cause to be published in the Courier-Journal, a newspaper published in Louisville, Kentucky; and of general circulation throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky, an appropriated form of "Notice of Sale of Bonds", as may be recommended by said Fiscal Agent soliciting sealed competitive bids for the purchasing of said bonds, the same to be received in the office of the City Clerk until some day and hour which shall be the occasion of a regular meeting, adjourned regular meeting, or specially called meeting of the City Council, as the Mayor may deem to be desirable; and upon said day and hour the sealed competitive bids theretofore received in the office of the City Clerk shall be referred to the City Council and publicly opened, read, and acted upon. The right to reject bids shall expressly be reserved. Said "Notice of Sale of Bonds" shall be published in the Courier-Journal at least one week in advance of the date specified for the opening of bids. The Mayor and the City Clerk are further authorized to sign and furnish to all interested bidders upon request such additional information as may be prepared by the Fiscal Agent for the purpose of providing to all interested bidders complete information with regard to the bonds and with regard to the municipally-owned combined and consolidated water and sewer system.

SECTION 17. That this ordinance become effective forthwith upon its passage, approval and publication. Adopted by the City Council of the City of Benton, Kentucky, at a regular meeting held on September 8, 1952, and on the same date signed by the Mayor as evidence of his approval and ordered to be published.

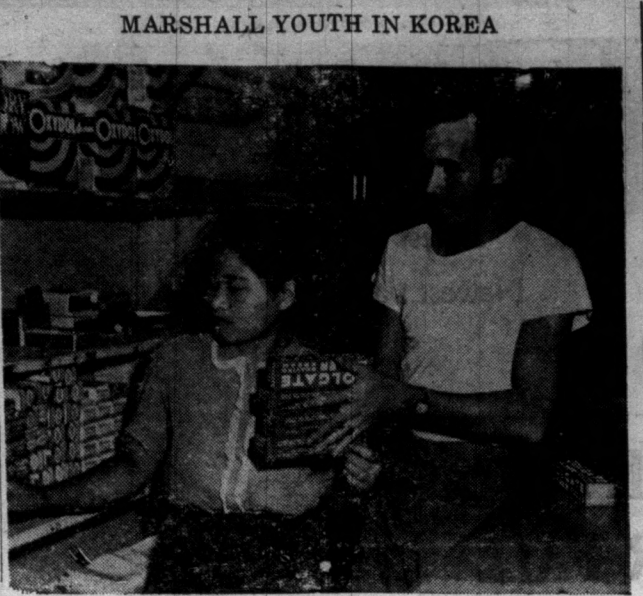

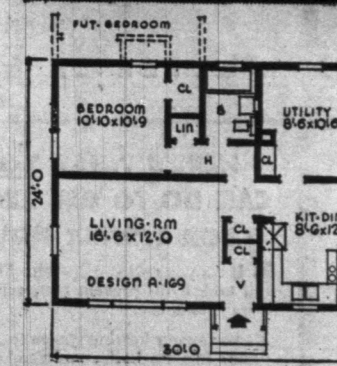
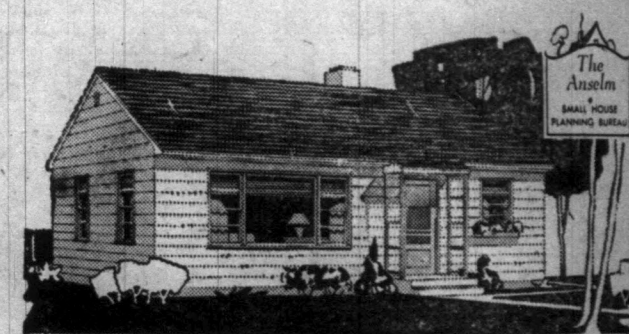
